BROTHERS FIGHT NEAR NORTON

An altercation occurred at Norton Tuesday afternoon between two brothers, John Drake and Lee Drake, it was reported Wednesday morning, which resulted in severe injury to the latter, Lee Drake. The fight occurred in the field of Lee Drake, and was the result, it is alleged, of trouble growing out of the separation of John Drake and his wife.

From the facts as detailed, it appears that Lee Drake rendered some assistance to John Drake's wife when the separation occurred, which angered John Drake and brought about the difficulty.

Lee Drake's injuries were attended by Dr. Mitchell of Norton, which injuries consisted of a wound on the head said to have been inflicted by some sharp instrument.

Complaint was filed against John Drake in the county court, charging him with aggravated assault, and his bond was set at \$300.00 for his appearance at the first Monday in August, at which time said case will be called for hearing.

John Drake has six children and has been married twice. He has resided in the Norton community several years.

FIND STRONG FLOW OF WATER IN STERLING CO.

Drillers at the Hull well No. 1 in the George Hull pasture on the Mosse Herrin Survey No. 6 struck a water-bearing sand around the 200 foot level which they estimate will produce at least 33 gallons of pure water per minute or fifty 40-gallon barrels per hour. Six miles east of this point on Survey No. 6 in the Ben Harlen well the same thing occurred. This goes to show that a subterranean lake exists underneath the surface in this locality.

At the rate of 33 gallons a minute, if this amount of water was pumped into a tank one acre square it would cover it 2 inches deep in 24 hours. In 100 days, if the pump was kept going, and the one-acre tank was high enough to hold it, the water in the tank would be 16 feet, 8 inches deep. This amount would cover 1 and 2-3 acres of land 1 foot deep in the 100 days.

If these lands with their proven possibilities were located in places like California where they know the value of good land and water, they would be fortunes to their owners. As it is it will be left to the younger generation to develop their riches. The day will come when a quarter section of this land will be worth a hundred sections as they stand now because if you give a man plenty of water, the problem is solved.—Sterling News-Record.

NEW DORMITORY TO COST \$150,000

ABILENE, July 11.—Plans are going rapidly forward for the new dormitory for men at Simmons College to replace Cowden Hall, erected in 1907 and destroyed by fire in the spring of 1922. Work on actual construction will begin this fall.

The new building will be the last word in modern dormitories, and something new in the western part of the country in this line. Costing approximately \$150,000, and accommodating 125 men, it is to be built on the plan employed by English universities and many of the Eastern colleges in their residence halls for men. The rooms will be grouped about five different entries; there will be three rooms for every two men, and a bath to every two suites of rooms.

Each suite of rooms is to consist of two single bedrooms and a study. The building will be three stories high and fireproof.

HEAT KILLS 12; LIGHTING KILLS 5

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, July 11.—Lists of deaths which were caused yesterday by excessive heat in many parts of the country, were swelled today with the reports of casualties from storms that last night brought relief to the heat sufferers.

Twelve persons yesterday died from heat, including one in Iowa, one in Michigan, five in Nebraska, and four in Illinois.

Lightning last night killed five, including three in Michigan and two in Iowa.

If there is any firm in Ballinger that has not been seen by the local committee they are requested and expected to fall in line, and if there is any trash around their premises to have it cleaned up before next week.

HOPPERS LET UP AUTO SALES IN RUNNELS CO. GOOD HERE

D. F. Eaton, county farm agent, travelled about eighty miles in the Northern and Western parts of Runnels county Tuesday and he stated to a Ledger reporter that the grasshoppers were not doing as much damage in the county as heretofore had been reported. The county agent said his office had not been receiving as many complaints of damage by the insects as he did when the pests first hit Runnels county.

Mr. Eaton stated that the crops in this section, which he covered Tuesday were looking good and that they received a little rain in some localities this week. Around Maverick and Bronte the precipitation appeared to have been heavy as the county agent had to use mud chains on his car to pull thru on the roads. Points West of Ballinger received good rains the latter part of last week and the first part of this week.

CEMENT TRUCK TO SHOW HERE

CEMENT The Portland Cement Company of Texas and the Texas A. & M. College are operating a truck thru this part of Texas which carries an apparatus for demonstrating the proper mixture of concrete. The truck this week is demonstrating in and around Brown county, and next week the truck will be in Ballinger. On July 18 and 19 the truck will demonstrate at the S. H. Meeks place near Winters. The demonstration here will be made on the D. Oliver farm.

This truck is sent out by the extension service of A. & M. and the Portland Cement Company. It is accompanied by M. R. Bentley of A. & M., and a Portland company representative who deliver lectures to the farmers telling how they may be able to better equip their farms with cement tanks and other concrete necessities. The county farm agent's department of Runnels county will co-operate in the demonstrations.

EDEN COUNTRY WILL CELEBRATE

The business men and ranchers of the Eden country are planning a big barbecue and basket picnic to be held in the Pfluger Motte near Eden on July 18th.

CHICAGO, July 11.—Rum running along the Florida coast has developed into such a flourishing industry that some of the Florida auto dealers sell cars especially built to transport liquor, furnish a negro chaffeur, and guarantee the safe delivery of it anywhere, the Chicago Daily News declared today in its second of a series of copyrighted articles.

SAN ANGELO TO PAVE TWO MORE BLOCKS

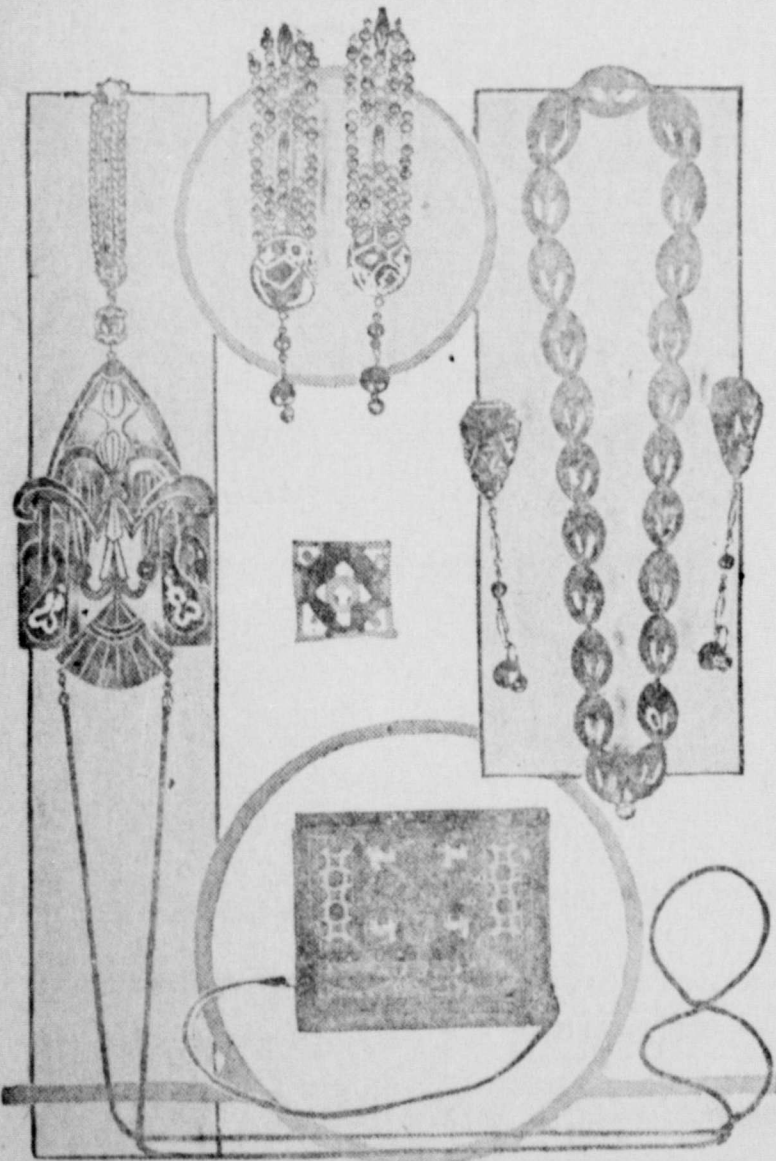
Two more blocks of paving are being put down by the city of San Angelo connecting West Harris and Beauregard at Oakes and Koenigheim streets.

ALTON, Ill., July 11.—An investigation was begun today to determine the cause of the explosion yesterday at the plant of the Western Cartridge Company at East Alton, where twelve employees were killed, including seven women and five men, and twenty-three injured.

**HARNESS VERMONT RIVER
TO SUPPLY ELECTRICITY**
(By Associated Press)

WILMINGTON, Vt., July 11.—The Deerfield Valley between this town and the Massachusetts state line is in process of transformation from a quiet, picturesque country with one little village and several agricultural communities to a great artificial lake. This reservoir of energy is destined to send power over electrical transmission lines to mills and factories many miles distant in Massachusetts.

On either side of the valley are chains of high hills running almost parallel to the Deerfield River. Here and there the valley widens to include open fields, and again the hills close together to leave but a narrow pass for the river. At Davis Bridge, where the valley is wide, a dam is being thrown across. Under present plans the valley will be flooded in

1924. Against the huge dam the river will send water from its sources in the Vermont mountains until it reaches a depth of 200 feet. The water will back up against the hillsides and submerge fields now under cultivation. It will cover the little community now known as Millers' Mills and will wash back to the outskirts of Wilmington. The lake to be created will be ten miles long and half a mile wide.

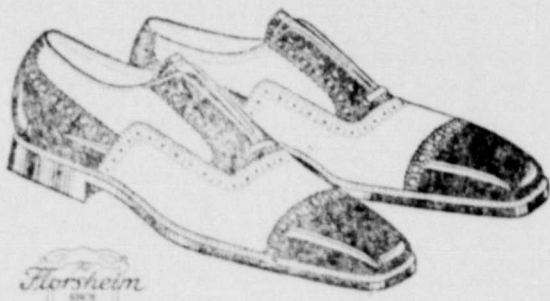
