

The inmates of the asylum effected their escape last night when several score lunatics battered down a section of the steel mesh wire fence after killing one of their own number and seriously wounding two guards.

The dead convict is William Jackson, a negro, who was convicted on a murder charge and confined in the criminal asylum for insane. The wounded guards are James Senney and Ralph Dild . Senney was stabbed below the heart and there is little hope for his recovery. Dilday was clubbed about the head and is also serioully injured.
