### Body Little Baby Found In Feed Lot

### WALTON OPPONENT ELECTED SPEAKER

(By Associated Press)  
OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 11.—Martial law, which had been in effect throughout Oklahoma since September 10th, was lifted today by Gov. J. C. Walton in a proclamation issued shortly after the legislature convened.

The proclamation calls in all National Guardsmen and returns full authority to all the civil officers of the state.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 11.—W. D. McBee, democratic representative from Stephens county, and leading Walton opponent, was elected speaker of the House today over Leslie Salter, republican, when the Oklahoma legislature, which was called in extraordinary session by Governor J. C. Walton, convened today.

The House was called to order shortly after noon o'clock by D. A. Stovall, of Choctaw county. Stovall was chosen as majority floor leader at a caucus of representatives held last night. A few minutes later the Senate convened. Both branches then recessed for a joint session of the legislature to receive the message of the governor.

Governor Walton did not appear before the joint session of the legislature in person as he had been expected to. The governor's message was brought to the assembly and read by the clerk. In his message Governor Walton called upon the legislature to enact an anti-Ku Klux Klan law, "to save the state from the disaster which it is facing through the existence of the organization." He said the law "must have teeth."

The governor offered a bill prepared by himself, providing for the unmasking of all citizens, and compelling secret organizations to publish a list of their memberships. The executive charged the Klan with being responsible for hundreds of outrages which he claimed had been committed in Oklahoma. He laid before the lawmakers transcripts and testimony adduced by military courts and from inquiries made by secret representatives. The governor, in his message, requested the solons to examine the records, and then publish them.

### STRONG ARM METHODS RULD IN GERMANS

(By Associated Press)  
BERLIN, Oct. 11.—President Ebert today invested Chancellor Stresemann with authority to dissolve the Reichstag in the event that the government's authorization bill giving the chancellor wide authority in the dictation of measures for the economic rehabilitation of Germany failed to command the necessary two-thirds majority. Stresemann immediately informed the coalition leaders and the socialists who thereupon called a caucus with the intention of uniting the party in support of the authorization law. A minority defection in the ranks of the socialists had threatened the measure.

The Reichstag today voted on the first two paragraphs of the authorization bill, but when the measure as a whole came up for final vote, the entire nationalist party left the chamber. This left the body without a quorum. The Reichstag then adjourned until Saturday when the final vote on the measure is expected to be forced.

### BABE GETS TWO HOMERS TODAY

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—The sky became overcast near the time for the second game of the world's series today, and the fans were slow in gathering in the Polo Grounds where the contest is being held between the New York Americans and New York Nationals. The Giants took the game yesterday, but the Yankees were leading 4 to 2 in the fifth inning, with two home run clouts slammed out by "Babe" Ruth. Two other homers were made in the game, one by a Giant player, and another by a Yank.

### TURKEY MARKET REPORT TO BE ISSUED SHORTLY

AUSTIN, Oct. 11.—Within the next few days the initial issue of the daily turkey market report, planned by the State Marketing Department will appear. The report will keep a daily record of the arrivals of dressed poultry in the important Eastern markets, and the trend of sales both at consuming points and at dressing plants in the state and nation.

The large prospective turkey crop in the state and need for expert marketing to avoid market pitfalls is said by officials to have created a demand for the turkey report. It is an innovation in reports with the state department.

### MEXICO CONTROL COTTON PESTS

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, Oct. 11.—President Obregon of Mexico has taken steps to control and eradicate the most destructive pests of cotton—the boll worm and the boll weevil, according to advices received here by R. E. McDonald, chief entomologist of the State Department of Agriculture. The move will be a decided aid to Texas in its campaigns against these insects. Mr. McDonald stated today.

The Mexican president has issued a decree ordering control measures. A copy of the decree has been received by the State Department of Agriculture here. Under Mexican laws, the president can issue such decrees against pests and citizens are bound to observe them, under heavy penalties.

The decree defines territories affected by the cotton pests and prescribes control measures. Seed inspection and disinfection, clearing of lands, fumigation of seed houses and barns, and preventive steps during the growing season are directed by the order. Heavy fines for violations are prescribed.

The order of the Mexican president comes as a result of extended investigation conducted by republic officials, said Mr. McDonald. A representative of the government, Francis M. Bernardino, spent eight months in Texas studying control measures adopted by this state. It is just recently that he returned to Mexico City, and been appointed Commissioner of Plagues, in charge of the cotton pest control campaign.

Texas has been hampered in its campaign against cotton pests in the past by lack of control measures on the part of surrounding states and Mexico, McDonald said. He declared that the action of the southern government would go far toward helping this state in the eradication of the cotton pests.

AKRON, Ohio, Oct. 11.—Eight children were killed, and one man and three children seriously injured at a grade crossing near New Milford, fifteen miles East of here early today.

A horse drawn school bus, driven by the man, and loaded with children were en route to school when the bus was struck by a fast passenger train at a crossing on the Pennsylvania system.

The identified dead are: Mildred Shaw, age 11; Verna Shaw, age 9; Thelma Benschoff, age 8; Margaret Kuntz, age 12; Julia Wamcik, Ella Stiancha, Richard Silvestri, and Harold Shaw, age 9. Louis Kline, driver of the bus, was badly injured.

WILLIAMSPORT, Penna., Oct. 11.—Three persons were killed and seven injured when a passenger train on the Elmira division of the Pennsylvania system struck a bus at a crossing near here this morning. The dead are George Ault, Sarah Hall, and an unidentified woman. Matthew Waltz, who was driving the bus, is the most seriously hurt of the seven who were injured.

"I have known tracts of land around El Paso in which the original survey called for 48 acres, which on second survey were found to contain 198 acres," Mrs. Vogel said.

Best Known Men in Livestock World Will Pin on Ribbons at Dallas, Oct. 13-23

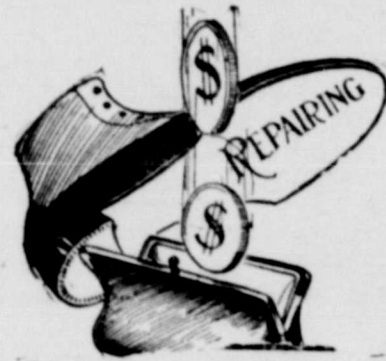
