Second Trial for Killing Her Husband

(By Associated Press)
 FORT WORTH, Oct. 17.—Mrs. Lillian Broussard, age 26, went to trial today on the charge of killing her husband, Louis Broussard, on September 16th. This is the second trial the woman has faced since the murder of her husband, the jury in the first trial disagreeing.
 The state is contending that the woman killed her husband in cold blood. The defense is pleading self defense and is attempting to show that Mrs. Broussard killed her husband because she was afraid that he would kill her after he had cursed and abused her for infidelity.

Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Williams left Wednesday afternoon for Temple, where they went to be with their son, Robert Louis, who will undergo an operation within the next two or three days. Reports from the young man Wednesday stated that he had improved considerably, and the surgeons felt that his condition was such now that the operation could be successfully performed.

CUERO, Tex.—Early pecans are expected to start to market within two weeks, according to growers in the Guadalupe valley. Pecans are bursting their outer hulls now, it is said. Several carloads are expected to move from this point.

BIG DEAL IN OIL LEASES

Associated Press reports and reports received through other well informed circles, report the sale of leases on 10,000 acres of land in Reagan county, including the Santa Rita well and two other wells which are being drilled, for more than one million dollars.

The Texon Oil & Land Company sold this much of their holdings in the Reagan county field, and retain more than 36,000 acres for further development. According to well founded reports the sale was made to the Benedum-Trees interests which control the Transcontinental Oil Company. It is also reported that renewed and greater development will be carried on in the new West Texas field.

The new interest being shown in the new proven territory brightens the outlook for the University of Texas to be the richest school in the world. The University does not share in the profit realized from the sale of the leases on the land just acquired by the Transcontinental interests, but the increased development and production will bring greater revenue to the University through the royalties.

FILING BRIEF IN FREIGHT RATE CASE

 CROSBYTON, Tex., Oct. 17.—In compiling the brief to be presented by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce before the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington considering the retention of the common point inclination, a vast variety of information is shown. Among other information to be shown will be the value of the manufactured output of the separate West Texas counties, also value of annual agricultural products. Figures so far for Brown county show \$8,032,219 in agricultural and \$1,672,403 in manufactured products. Figures for Nolan county also assembled show \$3,720,475 in agricultural products.
 No separate figures have been gotten up for the cities of Brownwood and Sweetwater but in each case the figures of the counties are practically the figures of those cities.

HOLMAN BUYS BAKER HOME

According to a deal made this week between C. L. Baker and George Holman, and made public Wednesday, the home of Mr. Baker on Eighth Street is transferred to Mr. Holman for a consideration of \$16,000. Mr. Baker has had the place on the market for some time.

The Baker home was built by H. Giesecke several years ago, Mr. Giesecke selling the home to Mr. Baker about two years ago. It is one of the best homes in the city, and Mr. Holman gets a bargain in the residence at the above figure.

The Holmans will get possession of their new domicile on January 1st, according to terms of the deal, and in the meantime Mr. Baker will set about providing a new home for his family. He expects to either buy or build a smaller home. Mr. Holman stated that his present residence on Broadway was for sale.

DEBT COMMISSION TO MEET SOON

WASHINGTON, October 17.—A meeting of the American debt commission within a week or ten days has been forecast by Senator Smoot, republican, of Utah, and one of the members of the commission. Mr. Smoot made the announcement following a conference with Secretary Mellon today. Senator Smoot declined to disclose what developments served to change the previously announced plans to delay further meetings until the opening of congress.

PLEADS GUILTY CARRYING GUN

A traveling lady plead guilty in the county court in Ballinger Wednesday morning and paid a fine and costs amounting to \$122.80 for carrying a firearm. It was charged that the lady stopped at a local cafe while passing thru the city a week or ten days ago, and laid a pistol on the table while she took lunch. It was said that the lady went West, and when she returned thru Ballinger again this week she was detained here on a charge of carrying a gun and plead guilty to the charge.

The lady was traveling in an auto, and claims that she was representing a wholesale concern, and carried the weapon with her wherever she went for protection, stating that she did not know that she was violating any law. As ignorance is sometimes considered a poor defense in such cases, the court only saw fit to impose the usual fine, and the lady paid the fine and went on her way rejoicing.

FREE FEED FOR BERLIN IDLERS FULL PROGRAM FOR LEGION

 BERLIN, Oct. 17.—The city authorities here have announced the immediate opening of fourteen feeding kitchens for the distribution of free meals, free allowances of wood and coal, to aid the unemployed and prevent suffering among the poor people of the city as far as possible.
 In the districts where food riots occurred yesterday all is reported quiet today. The announcement that food would be distributed and fuel provided for the unemployed had a tendency to relieve the situation to some extent.

HIGHER COURT REVERSES CASE

(By Associated Press)
 AUSTIN, Oct. 17.—Bail in the sum of ten thousand dollars was granted by the Court of Criminal Appeals today to Jeff Hicks, who is being held in jail in Cherokee county charged with killing Ocie Payne.

It is charged that Hicks shot Payne following a quarrel. The lower court denied the right of bail, and the case was appealed to the superior court, which granted bond in the above sum.

The state's motion for a rehearing in the case of Luther Collins, of Harris county, a negro, given the death penalty on a charge of criminal assault, was denied by the higher court. The conviction was recently reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals and sent back for a new trial, and the state asked for a rehearing before the appellant court.

30 GOVERNORS IN CONFERENCE

 WEST BADEN, Ind., Oct. 17.—Governors and representatives of the executives from thirty states and territories, including Gov. Pat Neff, of Texas, came here today for the annual conference of governors.

Prohibition enforcement, taxation, agriculture and uniform legislation, water power development, railroad valuations, are the principal subjects to be considered. The governors, or at least most of them will go to Washington to meet President Coolidge in a conference to discuss prohibition enforcement Saturday.

W. P. King was in the city from the Creves country Wednesday, and reported plenty of rain for the present at least.

LLOYD GEORGE SLIGHTLY ILL

 CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—David Lloyd George has cancelled all engagements for today, but hopes to keep a speaking engagement tonight at the International Amphitheatre at the stock yards. Owing to the continuance of a slight temperature the doctors ordered him to remain in bed and rest for the greater part of the day.

The premier's secretary said that Lloyd George was suffering with a bad cold aggravated by fatigue. The secretary said that with so much of the tour of the United States still ahead, with the example of President Harding's death, and former President Wilson's break down on tours, he felt that the former British premier must be given the best care possible.

CARRIER HELD FOR MURDER

 CENTER, Tex., Oct. 17.—The grand jury here today began an investigation into the slaying yesterday of William Cook, at Choice, Texas, seven miles South of here.

J. C. Bolea is being held in jail charged with the killing. Bolea is a rural mail carrier, about 45 years old, and married. Mrs. Cook, wife of the dead man, is postmistress at Choice, where Bolea was serving as mail carrier.

FIXING PROPERTY VALUES FOR THE CITY

The board of equalization has been in session this week passing on property renditions. Quite a number of property owners have been notified to appear before the board and show cause why their renditions should not be raised, and several accepted the invitation. The usual adjustments were made, and an effort to equalize the burden of taxation.

TEXAS TEMPERATURES SHOW BIG VARIANCE

 HOUSTON, Oct. 17.—Texas temperatures showed a range of 67 degrees in September, the highest being 107 at Encinal, September 1; and the lowest at Clint, 40, on September 20, according to the monthly weather summary issued by L. H. Daingerfield, meteorologist. The greatest daily range was 50 degrees at Clint, September 27th.
 The average precipitation for this date, as shown by the records of 212 stations, was 4.61 inches, which was 1.79 inches above the normal. The greatest amount for the month was 12.94 inches recorded at Fort McIntosh, and the lowest was .30 recorded at 02 Ranch.
 The average number of clear days was 13; partly cloudy, 10; and cloudy, 7.

Flood Menace is Subsiding in Oklahoma

 OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 17.—Oklahoma City is emerging today from the most disastrous flood in the history of the state, and her citizenship has set about in perfecting relief and reconstruction measures.
 With thousands homeless, two known to be dead in Oklahoma City, and millions of dollars worth of property laid waste, railroad and highway traffic paralyzed, public utility service demoralized, the flood waters here are rapidly receding.
 Most of the refugees have returned to their homes, and it is estimated that not more than one thousand people are now under the care of the relief agencies.

PLAN IRRIGATION FOR STONEWALL COUNTY

 HASKELL, Tex., Oct. 17.—The local unit of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been advised by John A. Norris, chairman of the State Board of Water Engineers that R. L. Clark, hydrographic engineer, will visit Haskell in the next few days to confer with representatives from Haskell, Stamford, Hamlin and Aspermont, relative to the Upper Brazos River Irrigation District.
 The new district proposes the building of a dam in Stonewall county which will enable the impounding of many million gallons of water, same to be used in irrigating lands in Haskell, Knox, Stonewall, Fisher and Jones counties.

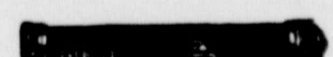

WARNING TO THE WISE

In fixing the penalty in "jake" cases tried before him at San Angelo this week, Federal Judge Atwell stated that any merchant who kept extracts on his shelves was violating the law, and he made it clear that all such violators would be convicted if brought to his court on charges supported by the proof.

According to Judge Atwell's construction of the Volstead Act, it is not necessary for a merchant to make sales to be held in contempt of the prohibition amendment, but the mere fact that the merchant has the extract in stock is in conflict with the purpose and letter of the Volstead Act.

Two men were convicted for selling extracts in Ballinger, and others were convicted for violating the law in other towns in the San Angelo district.

Empty extract bottles can be seen scattered around certain places in almost every town, and while the man who drinks the stuff has little regard for his stomach, the man who sells it for the sake of making a few cents profit has less regard for the law and health of his fellowman. The federal judge says that possessing any concoction containing more than one-half of one per cent alcohol is a violation of the law, and that should be sufficient warning for the wise.

The meeting of the six weeks School of Missions will be held tonight at the Eighth Street Presbyterian Church. The classes will be called together following a short devotional service at 7:30.

ROADS CAN'T REFUSE COTTON

Special to The Ledger:

CROSBYTON, Tex., Oct. 17.—Clarence E. Gilmore, Chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, in answer to a complaint filed with the Texas Chamber of Commerce on behalf of the Federated Farm Bureau of Mitchell county states that where a railroad company in Texas refuses to give a shipper of cotton the bill of lading because the platform is overcrowded with cotton, that the railroad company has no right to refuse the cotton because it is the opinion of the commission when there is not sufficient platform space to hold all cotton as tendered, if tender by the shipper on the railroad right-of-way is a legal tender and it is the duty of the railroad company to receive and receipt for same.

In other words, the commission considers that under the laws of Texas a failure to have adequate platform space is a disability of the carrier and ought not to inure to the disadvantage of the shipper by delaying the securing of bill of lading.

THE FLAVOR LASTS

With the High School Classics

"For man is man and master of his fate."—Idylla of the King.

This is the spirit that we find set forth in Henley's "Invictus":

Out of the night that covers me,
Black as the Pit from pole to pole,
I thank whatever gods may be
For my unconquerable soul.

It matters not how strait the gate,
How charged with punishments the scroll,

I am master of my fate;
I am captain of my soul.

Few men, however, are satisfied to be masters of their own fate; they wish to be masters of the universe and its fate as well—as Epictetus puts it:

"When it is in our power to take care of one thing, and to apply to one, we choose rather to take care of many, and to incur ourselves with many: body, property, brother, friend, child and slave; and by this multiplicity of incumbrances we are burdened and weighed down. Thus, when the weather doth not happen to be fair for sailing, we sit screwing ourselves, and perpetually looking out. Which way is the wind? North. What have we to do with that? When will the west wind blow? When itself, friend, or Aeolus please; for Jupiter has not made you dispenser of the winds, but Aeolus."

Just as Descartes arrived at his philosophy of belief through first doubting everything, even mathematics, so a man becomes master of his fate through being able to say sincerely:

Conduct me, Jove, and thou, O Destiny,
Wherever your decrees have fixed my lot.

Or through meaning what many millions say by rote, meaninglessly: "Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven."

Epictetus points out Diogenes as an example of a man who was master of his fate and captain of his soul: "Not because he was of free parents, for he was not; but because he was so himself, because he had cast away all the handles of slavery, nor was there any way of getting at him, nor anywhere to lay hold on him to enslave him. Everything sat loose upon him, every thing only just hung on. If you took hold on his possessions, he would rather let them go than follow you for them; if on his leg, he let go his leg; if his body, he let go his body; acquaintance, friends, country, just the same. But he would never have forsook his true parents, the gods, and his real country."

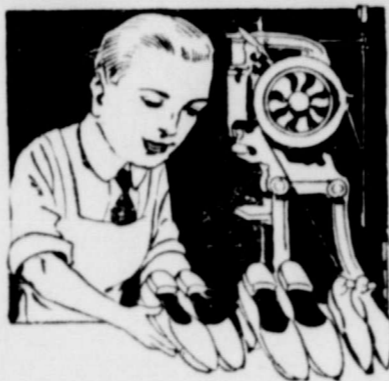

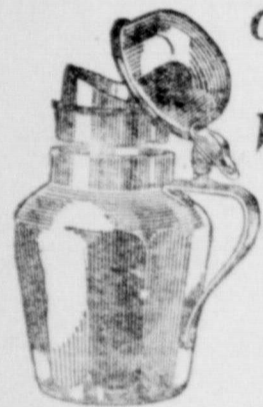

636 MILES SEALS FOR CHRISTMAS

AUSTIN, Oct. 17.—Six hundred and thirty-six miles of Tuberculosis Christmas Seals for the 16th Annual Sale in Texas have been received by the Texas Public Health Association and its local associations.

Texas' quota this year is 40,300,000 seals. The seals are one inch long. If placed end to end they would reach from Denison to San Antonio following the Katy tracks and from there to Houston following the S. A. & A. P.

Although the seals sell for only one cent each, the amount of good that they can accomplish is tremendous. The seals make possible health educational work, clinics, children's camps, nursing, health lectures and demonstrations, the Modern Health Crusade, etc.

The seals this year show a small child seated before a fireplace and the smoke of the fire forms a picture of Santa Claus. The words "Merry Christmas, 1923" appear at the top and the double barred cross, the emblem of the nation-wide fight against tuberculosis, is at the sides.
