GRIDIRON GAME HERE FRIDAY

Sonora High School will come here next Friday to offer opposition to Ballinger High in the first football game on the local field this season. This will be the first appearance here of a team from Sonora and students and local football fans are anxious to see what Ballinger's new foe has to offer.

In a long distance call, the Sonora coach stated that his team is young and inexperienced, containing only three men who have worn cleated shoes before this season. He also stated that Sonora is not meeting any of the stronger teams of this section this season.

With three weeks of practice behind them since the last game, Ballinger High will present a nifty machine than has shown here in several seasons. Although Lyle Talley's withdrawal from school dealt a severe blow to the defensive power of the Cliff Dwellers, the gap will be filled acceptably by one of the new men who have been coming out since the Santa Anna disaster. The team that faces Sonora will not be a bunch of "babies." Fred Atwell, 170 pound center; Wesley Woods, 167 pound tackle; Fred Schmickle, 145 pound guard, and several other heavies will make the squad look more like a bunch of "beffies." The line will average 155 pounds to the man and the backfield will average 150 pounds.

Gordon Thomson's work at quarterback takes a good deal of worry out of Coach Smith's mind. In the scrimmage games in which Thomson has run the team he has proven to be a heady field general; at any rate he will not make any of the quarterback blunders that have been made in previous games. Jim Flynt's punting was a feature of the Santa Anna contest and Jim also does the passing in nice style. M. I. Rayburn showed what he can do at plunging the line at San Angelo and since he has recovered from his injuries he can be relied upon to gain through the line.

Members of the team do not promise a victory but they vouch that there will be a battle out at Nicholson field Friday. Students will sell tickets downtown this week and it is believed that a large crowd will be out to see the tussle. The coach and the team are working hard to show Ballinger some real football this season and it can be remembered that Ballinger takes on Winters next month.

REPUBLICANS ARE WINNERS

(By Associated Press)

BERLIN, Oct. 23.—Reports from various points in the Rhineland this afternoon indicated that the separatists generally had been defeated, and especially at Aix La Chapelle, Muenchen, Gladbach and Bonne.

Severely beaten at Aix La Chapelle by the trade unionists, and ejected from the public buildings which they had been holding since midnight Saturday, the separatists were ousted and the republican colors hoisted over the government building at Wiesbaden by a band of followers of Dr. Dorten, leader of the previous Rhineland republic movement.

At this place the police were disarmed, locked in the barracks, and the crowd fired on by the secessionists, and ten persons were wounded.

A general strike has been proclaimed by the trade unionists. It is reported that a republic has been proclaimed at Duisberg, and the public buildings there occupied this morning.

TELLS OF GRAFT IN VETS. BUREAU

(By Associated Press)

BERLIN, Oct. 23.—The Berlin government today maintains that the Rhineland republican movement has been generally defeated.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—The special Senate committee which is investigating the Veterans' Bureau, was told today by Director Hines that on one occasion the bureau had \$64,000 for architects' plans for the hospital at Livermore, California, and then found that the drawings submitted were not suitable. Hines said that the payment of the architect's bill was made before he came into office.

Hines added that Matthew O'Brien received the money and that he followed closely the standard plans received from the war and treasury departments.

RADIO CENTERS AT HAWAII

HONOLULU, Oct. 23.—Hawaii is destined to become the radio hub of the Pacific, according to Arthur A. Isbell, of the Radio Corporation of America. Due to its geographical location at the cross roads of the Pacific, the territory is the logical location for army, navy and commercial radio stations working with the United States and the remainder of the Pacific area.

MOTOR CAR GOES TO FALLS SHERIFF

According to official announcement of J. B. Shackelford, passenger and freight agent of the Abilene & Southern Railway, the motor car service between Ballinger and Abilene will be inaugurated on November 1st.

The motor car, completely equipped, with capacity of forty-four passengers, and ten foot baggage and mail compartment, will be delivered to the Abilene & Southern this week, and the management of the road has promised to inaugurate it with a service that will eliminate all delays between Ballinger and Abilene.

The car will make two round trips per day, and the complete schedule will be published in The Ledger, together with a picture of the car and the official announcement of the passenger agent within a few days. The schedule provides for the arrival of the car at Ballinger at 9:35 a. m. and it will depart on the return trip at 10:15. The car will arrive at Ballinger at 4:20 in the afternoon, and returning to Abilene, leave Ballinger at 5:15.

This will give direct connection with the Santa Fe at Ballinger, and will give good connections with the T. & P. at Abilene.

HAITI ERADICATES RABIES

The citizens were given due notice, and then a liberal supply of poisoned meat was distributed throughout the city. The resulting mortality met the most sanguine expectations, and the menace of rabies came to an end.

BOOMING FORD FOR PRESIDENT

(By Associated Press)

DETROIT, Oct. 23.—A call for all Ford-for-President clubs throughout the nation to meet in Dearborn, the home of Henry Ford, on December 12th, for the purpose of organizing a national conference to support the automobile magnate for president, has been issued.

Several local Ford clubs met here last night, and formulated plans for launching the presidential boom for Mr. Ford, and issued a call for the meeting.

It was announced that the formation of a new national political party, with Henry Ford as the standard bearer, will be undertaken at the conference.

William Kronberg, secretary of the Dearborn Ford-for-President Club, estimated that there are more than three hundred Ford clubs already in existence, and that he expected at least three thousand delegates to attend the conference.

RETURNS LIQUOR TO FALLS SHERIFF

MARLIN, Oct. 23.—After checking up the liquor confiscated in the raids made by the sheriff, C. O. Moore, and other Falls county officers, and which the officers had stored in the Marlin jail, Ranger Sergeant Wheatly, in charge of the rangers who arrested Sheriff Moore and four other men yesterday on charges of selling whiskey, today turned the entire stock of liquor back to the custody of the sheriff. Wheatly said that the rangers had no evidence that any of the confiscated stock of liquors was missing from the jail.

In arresting Sheriff Moore and deputies the rangers made the charge that Moore and other men had been selling whiskey which they confiscated from bootleggers.

WILL TAKE VOTE ON IMPEACHMENT BY WEDNESDAY

(By Associated Press)

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 23.—A full day in listening to the reading of the voluminous transcript of the testimony on which twenty-two charges of impeachment against Gov. J. C. Walton are based, was today's program in the lower House of the Oklahoma legislature, with voting on the impeachment scheduled to follow immediately. However, it appeared likely that there would be no vote taken until tomorrow.

Opposition to impeachment action, it is said by the political observers, is negligible, and it is expected that the governor will be ousted without further delay.

The testimony given by Dr. E. T. Bynum, former adviser of Gov. Walton, and who was recently removed by the governor from the office of state bank commissioner, was read before the House today. The testimony was read just as given before the investigating committee and in substance Dr. Bynum stated that his removal from office was due to his refusal to appoint an unqualified man as assistant bank commissioner at the behest of Gov. Walton.

FOOD RIOT GRIPS GERMAN CENTERS

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, Oct. 23.—A Berlin message to the Central News Bureau here says that a telegram from Aix La Chapelle states that the police have succeeded in expelling the republicans from the town and regaining complete mastery of the situation.

Disorders arising in Hamburg continued today, according to reports received here. A general discontent over the present prices of food is causing the uprising to gain strength, the message said.

In some places the police stations have been stormed by the rioters and the policemen disarmed, but reinforcements have succeeded in recapturing the stations. A large number of food shops have been plundered.

SLIGHT CHANGE IN LIBRARY HOURS

The Shakespeare Club, which has charge of the Carnegie Library for the present, and until other arrangements can be made for financing the work, announces that the public library will be open only on Tuesday and Saturday afternoons, from 3:30 to 5:30. This cuts the Thursday afternoon, and the library will be open only two days in the week instead of three as heretofore.

A second and last call is also being made for the books which were out when the library closed a short time ago. There are a number of books out, and the names of the persons who have them are on the records. If the parties holding books which are the property of the library do not return them the books will be called for and a fine assessed against the person to whom they were issued as provided for by the rules of the library.

The Shakespeare Club ladies are serving as librarians for the above hours free, and they deserve credit for the interest they are showing in trying to save the library for the city.

ANCIENT OMEN FORECASTS BLOODSHED IN EUROPE

(By Associated Press)

GENEVA, Oct. 23.—The "blood of the Burgundians" has appeared again on the water of Lake Morat, near Neuchatel, portending more trouble for old Europe, if ancient legend is to be believed.

The reddening of the water of this lake is caused by the flowering of an aquatic plant, which, however, blooms very rarely. The phenomenon was seen in 1476, when 36,000 Burgundians under Charles the Bold were defeated near the lake by the Swiss. The last time the waters were red was in 1914, just before the outbreak of the World War, a circumstance said to justify the old saying, "When blood is seen on Lake Morat there will be bloodshed in Europe."

LAWYERS TILT IN OIL FRAUD CASE

(By Associated Press) FT. WORTH, Oct. 23.—Former Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey, chief counsel for the defense, today charged that the "government is trying to prolong the ease and crystalize the minds of the jury," in the trial of Dr. Frederick A. Cook and thirteen other alleged oil promoters on charges of using the mails to defraud. The statement from Bailey came after United States District Attorney Zweifel had insisted on reading a letter received by a witness from one of the defendants. Judge Bailey said that he was willing to admit the literature was received by the witness just to expedite the ease, but he objected to taking up the court's time in reading the letter. Federal Judge Killits, before whom the case is being heard, characterized Bailey's statement as "buncombe."

FIRST SIGHT LOVE MARKED START OF ROYAL ROMANCE

(By Associated Press) BRUSSELS, Oct. 23.—The engagement of Prince Humbert of Piedmont, heir to the throne of Italy, to Princess Marie Jose of Belgium, which is to be officially announced November 4, is the culmination of a love match of long standing. In 1916, Queen Elizabeth of Belgium, desirous of placing the little princess—she was then 12 years old—outside the range of air plane raids and big guns continuously shelling La Panne, where the Belgian royal family had their modest war home, took her daughter to Florence, when under private teachers she studied English and Italian. Queen Elizabeth, accompanied by the Princess, spent the 1917 vacation at Venice. There, under the constant menace of Austrian airplane raids and German-Austro offensives, the Prince, a youth in a sailor's costume and the Princess, wearing a plain white dress, met for the first time. It was love at first sight. When Prince Humbert visited Belgium last year there were many who noted that although the tour was supposed to be officially conducted, the heir to the throne of Italy preferred the company of the Princess, now a beautiful young woman, to receptions and listening to addresses by burgomasters.

The engagement has been very popularly received here. Rev. and Mrs. E. W. Bridges left Tuesday morning in their automobile for Corsicana in response to a message stating that Mrs. Bridges' mother was at the point of death. The message said for Mrs. Bridges to come at once if she wanted to see her mother alive. Rev. Bridges will probably not be able to get back by Sunday, but in the event of his absence Rev. W. H. With the High School Classics

"I can never rightly know the meaning of what I hear at church, only a bit here and there."—Silas Marner.

There are two main reasons why the hearer may not understand the meaning of what he hears at church or elsewhere: the thought may be a complex one, or the words used may be unknown to the hearer. It is the rare speaker rather than the usual one who can speak simply enough to be understood by his entire audience. To do so often requires a translation of thought from the speaker's vocabulary that it is as definite a translation as one from Latin to English.

Every day, on all sides of us absurd ideas and notions are being taken from speeches and articles that seem perfectly simple and clear to the speaker or writer. Several years ago a high school teacher of English and her class got into an argument on this subject. She assured them they did not know everyday English; they assured her they knew enough to be able to read the newspapers and magazines, which was as much as anybody needed to know. Thereupon, the teacher challenged them to bring in the next day any editorial article from any newspaper or magazine, and satisfy her that they knew the meaning of all the words in the article they selected.

The pupils were members of the Junior class, and of average ability. When the next day came, one after another rose, read his article, and acknowledged that he didn't know what this or that word meant. Finally, the last boy, the ablest pupil in the class, rose. He had selected the shortest article he could find, one of only a half dozen lines. The words in it were of the simplest, and he smiled triumphantly as he read the last sentence, which stated that the governor's efforts had been futile. The teacher asked him the meaning of "futile." He said that was easy, everybody knew what futile meant, but he couldn't just express it. The teacher then asked him whether the governor succeeded or failed in his attempt, and he had no idea. The word futile was familiar in sound; but quite without meaning to him. Because he knew the sound of the word, he had assumed that he knew the meaning. The same thing is true of a surprisingly large number of the words we hear and use.
