FT. WORTH, Jan. 16.—3:30 p. m.—The defense in the Ralph Vancil case used three doctors as its first witnesses to prove that Vancil's baby died from natural causes. All the physicians testified they had studied the post mortem report and gave it as their expert opinion that the infant was not killed by asphixiation.

The doctors' testimony is technical and is taking up much time.

FORT WORTH, Jan. 16.—After using nine witnesses, the State rested in the Vancil case at 11:30 Wednesday morning. The court then recessed until 2:00 p. m., when the defense is expected to begin offering testimony to show that Vancil did not kill his baby. The defense gained a point in the cross-examination of the doctors, who declined to swear that the baby was killed by violence or buried alive. Two physicians swore that the baby had jaundice, but said that from 30 to 80 per cent of babies are so affected when


