

Waters Devoid of Life

Deserts are usually considered as waterless, but there is a large area of the sea itself which some scientists believe to be relatively devoid of life. This is the equatorial region of the Pacific ocean for a distance of from a few hundred to more than 2,000 miles west from South America. Evi dence points toward a great dearth of marine life over this vast area. But Dr. W. E. Ritter, director of the Scripps Institution for Biological Research, on a recent voyage to Australia and while crossing the western edge of this so-called marine desert observed several species of sea birds which evidently fed on some sort of sea life as the nearest land was 1,000 miles away. Thip officers also reported having seen porpoises which must also get their food from waters about them, so that there cannot be an entire lack of marine organisms,
