King George III Was Opposed to Franklin's Device and Ordered Points Made Blunt.

France has probably done more than any other nation to make the world safe against lightning. This is the centenary year of a revised set of rules printed by the Academie des Sciences for the protection of buildings by conductors. The glory of discovery, bowever, must be shared by other nations, Benjamin Franklin begins the story.

"In 1745," he wrote, "I met at Boston a certain Doctor Spence, who came from Scotland. He performed some electrical experiments before me. Then a little later, while in Philadelphia, the great American received from Mr. Collinson of London, a member of the Royal society, his first toy glass tube. "I seized eagerly on the chance of reproducing what I had seen done in Boston.'

From these experiments to the famous kite was an easy step, and from the kite to the lightning conductor the magic leap. Of course, the lightning conductor had a hard struggle for recognition. It was received churlishly by George III, who took his revenge on Franklin by ordering the substitution of blunt ends for pointed ones on the Kew palace conductors.

Sir John Pringle, president of the Royal society, was invited by the king to back him up. Sir John replied that the "laws of nature are not changeable at royal pleasure." The offended king suggested resignation, and resign Sir John did. But the wits were on the side of the president:

Maya's Calendar Dates Back to Aug. 6, 613 B. C.

The earliest dates in New World history are August 6, 613 B. C., and December 10, 580 B. C., by the present system of marking time, the Peabody museum of Harvard university announces in making public the final solution of the chronology of Mayan

The formal New Year had originally stood at the winter solstice just 12 days after the recorded date, December 10, 580 B. C., when the calendar was inaugurated. Other dates strongly emphasized in Mayan records are March 21 and September 23, the points of the equinoxes, and December 22 and June 23, the points of the solstices, says the Detroit News. Three famous tablets at Papenque carry the calculation backward from September 23, 430 A. D., the day of the autumnal equinox, to 8373 B. C. in an effort to reconstruct the conditions of the natural year at the epoch of the Mayan

CEMENT USED BY ROMANS AGES AGO

Carthagenians Made Aqueduct of Volcanic Ash.

One hundred years ago, when Abraham Lincoln, a lad of fifteen was working on a ferry on the Obio river for \$6 a month, an English brick mason named Joseph Aspdin, poking an inquisitive finger into the realm of scientific research, brought out an idea that revolutionized the building world. In the files of the English patent office Aspdin's idea is listed as patent No. 5082, and the record shows that it was Issued by His Majesty King George the Fourth in 1824. The patent covers "an improvement in the modes of producing an artificial stone." What it really meant was that the bricklayer had invented portland cement, for he gave to his material the name "portland" because when it hardened it re sembled a popular building stone found on the Island of Portland. The name has stuck ever since, and from Asp din's discovery the modern portland cement industry has been developed.

Although Aspdin was the original discoverer of portland cement he lacked a score of centuries of being the first user of cementing materials. The Romans and Egyptians were past masters in the art of constructing with natural cements. Long before the Holy Roman empire was even thought of, the Carthagenians had constructed a 70-mile aqueduct in northern Africa. using natural cement in the course of their work. The Romans were especially familiar with the use of this material, and the dome of the Pantheon is probably one of the best existing specimens of their concrete work. On many of these old structures the marks left by the wooden forms are still visible

The cement used by the ancients was really a gift of the gods. It was prepared for them by nature, and they were not aware of the chemical changes the raw materials went through that gave them their cementing qualities. What they did was to mix slacked lime with volcanic ash. There were large quantities of this latter material in southern Italy. The volcanoes did for the Romans what the glant kilns do in modern cement manufacture. They burned the rock, forming volcanic ash, and when this burned material was mixed with slacked lime it made a natural cement. Vitruvius, architect for Augustus. speaks of this material in a number of his writings, while Pliny discourses at length on the use of cement.

During the Dark Ages the secret of the Romans was lost, along with so many other priceless treasures.

In the United States deposits of rock suitable for the manufacture of natural cement were discovered about 1818 in New York state. The building of the Erie canal, which was completed the year after Aspdin's discovery, uncovered further deposits and natural cement was soon being used in various ways.

Another ploneer, Thomas Millen of South Bend, Ind., was in the cement sewer pipe business when he decided to attempt to make portland cement. At the time he was importing his cement from England. He would drive into the country with his horse and buggy and dig a few palls of marl from the lake region near Notre Dame. A pail of blue clay would be secured from the bed of the St. Joseph river, and Millen would drive back to his pipe plant with this material and mix it by hand. He would then burn it in a plece of sewer pipe-probably the first embryo use of a rotary kiln. Later he would grind the burned product in a coffee mill. John K. Shinn, investigating in Pennsylvania, used a bent car axle, suspended from a spring pole, to hammer and crush his raw materials. A crude grinding machine, but it served its purpose for the time

Care of Teeth Taught

Here are the rules of the British Dental association for the care of children's teeth: Be sure the child sleeps with the mouth shut, and when awake breathes through the nose. From the age of two let each meal contain some food that needs grinding. Begin the child's education in hard foods at nine months by giving it a bone, preferably a chop bone, with a little meat on, to exercise its gums. Do not let children drink until the end of the meal. Avoid many sweets and sweet biscuits, and only give them as part of a meal. Finish each meal with a plece of fresh fruit or crisp salad, or, if these are not obtainable, a stale crust of bread, with butter if preferred, but not with jam.

Rubber Pavement

Rubber pavement, which has been in experimental use in England for several years, has now appeared in America. One rallway has paved one of its busy highway crossings with rubber in the belief that in the end it will save money by it, even though the first cost be higher. Because the distance between the tracks is so small, ordinary pavement soon breaks up under the jolts of heavy trucks and so causes frequent expensive repairs.

Eskimos and Indians Same
