The murre has a large, tough shelled egg which the gull's bill cannot penetrate. But these robbers drop it on the rock below or nose it along until it drops to the shelf below, when they can devour the contents.

Oftentimes I have seen a gull pick up a young murre or cormorant not long out of the egg and swallow the youngster alive. The downward course bulge in the gull's neck.


