Mrs. Hamon is quoted as saying that she would not go to Washington under any circumstances. She said that any papers relating to her husband's political connections probably were burned months ago.

BUREAU HEAD IS INDICTED

BALTIMORE, Md., April 16.—Charles Forbes, former director of the United States Veterans' Bureau, was indicted by the federal grand jury here today at the close of an investigation into the sale of army supplies alleged to be worth three million dollars. The sale was made to the Thomson Kelly Company, of New York and Boston for a consideration said to be \$600,000.
Nathan Thomson, head of the company which bought the supplies, and Commander Charles O'Leary, of the United States navy, who was chief of the supply division of the veterans bureau at Perryville, Maryland, at the time the goods were sold, were also indicted. The charge against Forbes is conspiracy to defraud.

Other hands nearby rescued the man from the grave of gravel, and he was brought to town on a wagon and later carried to his home in the Southern part of the city and a physician called to dress the wounds and render medical aid.

FALL FROM WINDMILL BREAKS MAN'S BACK

(San Angelo Standard)

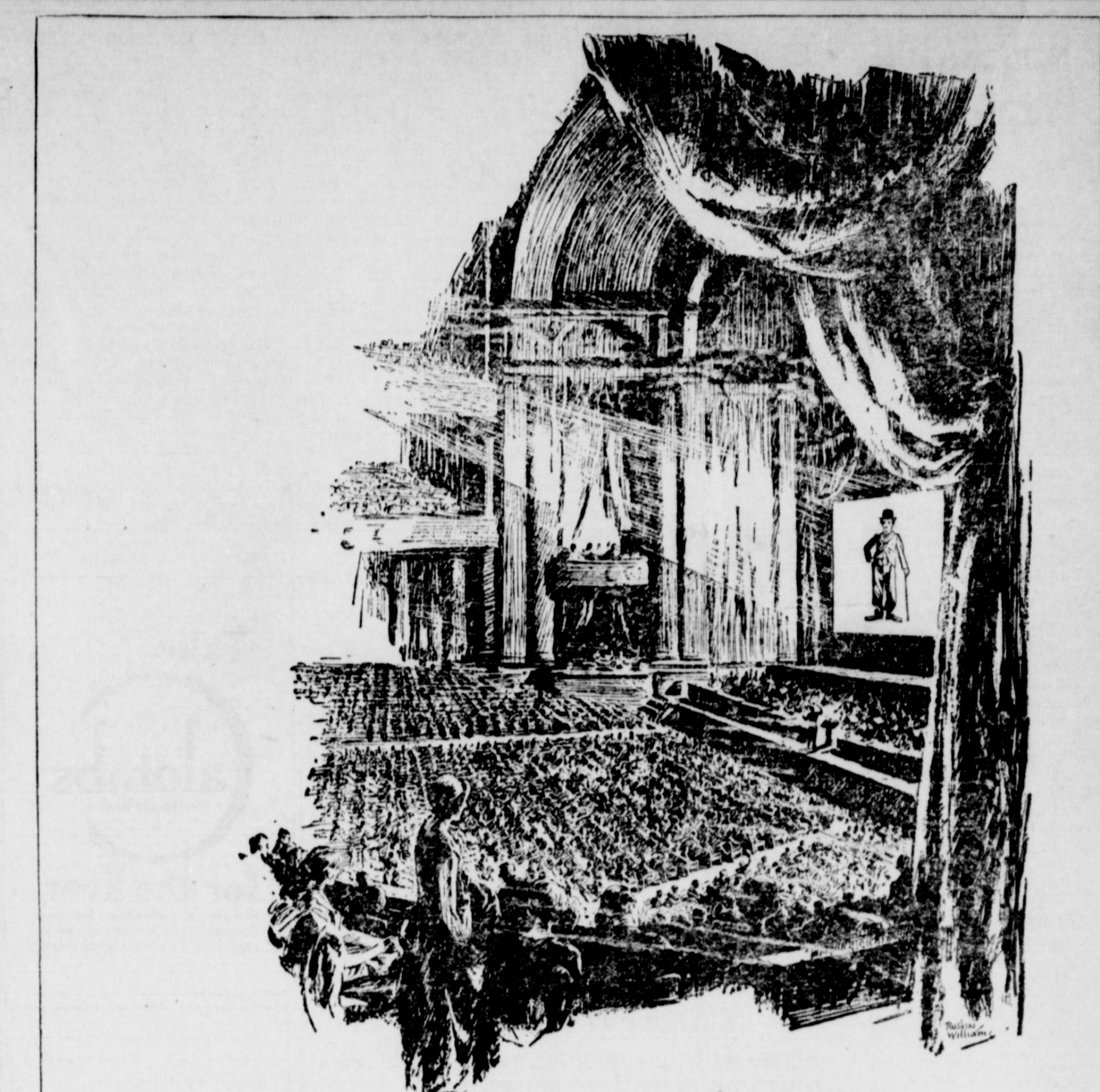
An X-ray examination Tuesday revealed a broken vertebrae in the back of P. A. Ratliff, Glasscock county rancher, who was brought to St. John's Sanitarium late Monday evening from his ranch near Garden City. Mr. Ratliff fell thirty feet from the tower of a windmill late Sunday, striking on his back across a fence, and falling from there face downward in a pile of broken glass, sustaining cuts about the face. Mr. Ratliff was precipitated from the tower when a rope, to which he was holding, broke. He is paralyzed from the hips down, but hopes are entertained that he may survive, altho he may never regain use of his limbs.
