TWO MORE BILLED IN TABOR MURDER

Bills of indictment against W. S. and L. S. Proctor, of Norton, charging them with murder in connection with the death of Crawford A. Tabor, were returned by the grand jury in its final report Friday afternoon about 4:00 o'clock.

This brings the bills returned in the Tabor murder case up to four, L. P. Kirk and Reuben Cope having been indicted by the grand jury Thursday, and were released under \$10,000 bond Friday afternoon, after appearing here when notified that bills had been returned against them.

Saturday morning the two Proctor boys voluntarily appeared at Ballinger and surrendered to the officers, and were released under \$10,000 bond, friends accompanying them to Ballinger and promptly affixed their signatures to the bonds.

The bonds for W. S. and L. S. Proctor were signed by S. T. Proctor, W. E. Puckett, John J. Hood, A. J. Hood, Elgin Davidson, F. E. Berryman, Sid Oliver, Jeff Ensor, J. D. Smith and H. T. Freeman, the same sureties signing both bonds.

The bond for Reuben Cope was signed by R. B. Hambricht, L. C. Underwood, D. W. Turner, Jake Stubblefield, J. M. Mackey and J. D. Good.

The sureties on the L. P. Kirk bond are Cross Payton, L. B. McCarty, and I. A. Griffith, all of Abilene.

The murder cases are docketed for the September term of court and a large array of counsel has been employed on both sides. A. K. Doss of this city, and Walter Woodward of Coleman, represent W. S. and L. S. Proctor and Reuben Cope. They are also assisting three attorneys from Abilene in the L. P. Kirk case. Special counsel has been employed to assist in the prosecution, it being reported that Judge T. T. Crosson has been retained by J. N. Wells to assist the state in the case.

L. S. and W. S. Proctor and Lane Rhinehart surrendered to the officers in connection with the case a short time ago, and all made statements in which they admitted being present when Tabor was killed, but declared they had no part in the killing, and were not present for any unlawful purpose. The state's attorneys declined to hold the three men and declined to accept their statements. Rhinehart was not indicted and it is reported that he has been given immunity for testimony before the grand jury, and will not have to face trial on charge of murder in connection with the death of Tabor.

The murdering by someone of Crawford A. Tabor on the night of December 19th has attracted statewide attention, and much interest will be developed in the trial of the cases. Tabor was an innocent man at the scene of the trouble when he was killed. He

LEGION OPPOSES BONUS CHANGE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 19.—The American Legion today endorsed the insurance provision of the soldier bonus bill which has been taken up by the Senate. In a message to each member of the Senate, Commander Quinn asked that no attempt be made on the floor to amend the bill as it now stands.

Quinn mentioned specifically in his message the proposed amendment by the finance committee of democrats for a full cash payment option, and expressed the belief that if such an amendment was adopted that chances of the bonus bill becoming a law would be endangered.

HOURS REDUCED FOR YARDMEN

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, April 19.—A decision expected to reduce working hours of yardmasters and yardmen from twelve to nine hours was made today by Federal Judge Cliffe, in the case of the Interstate Commerce Commission against the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad. The decision will effect 8,000 men.

QUARANTINE LIFTED TO RELIEVE 800 MOTORISTS

(By Associated Press)
PHOENIX, Arizona, April 19.—Governor Hunt, of Arizona, today lifted the foot and mouth disease blockade at Yuma in order to permit the passage into this state of approximately 800 motorists who are reported to be in a pitiful condition as the result of being held on the California side of the state line.

The tourists were stopped by the quarantine when they reached the state line and are reported to be without sufficient camping equipment or food.

It was reported yesterday that 1600 tourists in autos were held up on the California-Arizona border on account of the quarantine, and many of them were in dire need of food. The authorities were speeding up arrangements to get relief to the motorists, while some of the stranded travelers attempted to rush the line and continue their journey.

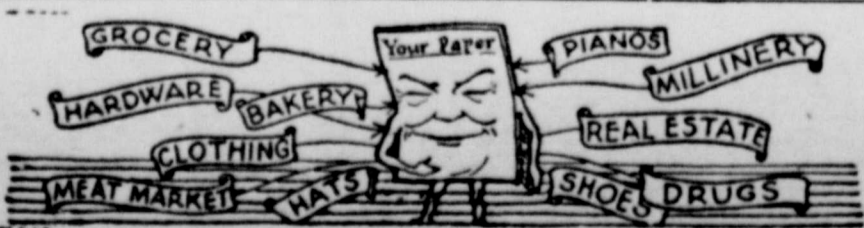

CITIZENS ICE CO. TO SELL PLANT

A deal is brewing, and which promises to be closed within the next day or two in which the Ballinger Light & Power Company will take over the Citizens Ice Co. The purchase money is on deposit in a local bank, being held in escrow subject to final consummation of the deal.

The Ballinger Light & Power Company own and operate the old ice plant here, and it is presumed will concentrate the business and operate only one plant, unless the volume of business demands that both plants be kept in operation. However, no statement has been given out either by the representatives of the old company or the new company.

The Citizens Ice Company was organized three years ago to meet a popular demand created by the failure of the old company to supply ice and give satisfactory service at that time. The old company claimed that conditions were such at that time that it was impossible for them to meet the demands. About 250 citizens purchased stock in the new company. After the new plant was put in operation, creating competition, the old company cut its price and retained ice at much less than the former price, while the new company maintained the schedule of prices in effect at the time the plant was constructed. The low price and keen competition has gained back for the old company many customers and the stockholders, realizing that the field was not large enough to support two ice plants, with no outlet for their product due to the building of other ice plants in neighboring cities, have accepted a proposition to sell out.

WHEELER MAKES \$1,000 BOND

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 19.—Senator Wheeler, of Montana, appeared before United States Commissioner McDonald here today and furnished bond in the sum of \$1,000 for his appearance on May 5th at Great Falls, Montana, to answer an indictment charging him with accepting money illegally for appearing before the Interior Department in land cases.

Senator Wheeler went before the commissioner voluntarily soon after he was advised by the district attorney's office that an indictment had been forwarded here with a request for service.

"ONE HORSE FARMER" DIES IN CITY FRIDAY

Henry Seipp, one of the best citizens of the Maverick section, and known as "the One Horse Farmer," died at the sanitarium in Ballinger at noon Friday. Mr. Seipp was brought here at 10:00 o'clock and died two hours later. The deceased was 76 years of age and for twenty-one years had been a citizen of Runnels county. He was born and raised in Gillespie county, later moving to Travis county, and coming to Runnels county from Travis county in 1903 located in the Maverick country, where he has resided all these years.

Mr. Seipp was well known for his thrift and live-at-home methods of farming. He made it a rule of his life to first raise plenty to eat at home, and thru the strict adherence to that rule he became known as "the One Horse Farmer."

The remains were returned to the home of the deceased near Maverick Friday afternoon, and the funeral was held from that place and interment made in the Bronte cemetery Saturday afternoon under the direction of the Sons of Herman.

In the death of Mr. Seipp this county has lost a good citizen.

CAUSE OF FIRE BEING PROBED

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, April 19.—Samuel Moore and Leo Unell, owners of a sporting and novelty concern, are in custody of the officers today for questioning in connection with the blaze which cost the lives of eight firemen and one civilian last night. Samuel Polinsky, said to have some insurance dealings with Moore and Unell, the police declared, had insurance policies aggregating \$32,000 and they were issued to Moore and Unell, but he had them in his possession. The fire destroyed a box factory and those killed were caught under the falling walls.

500 MILES DIVIDE DAY'S MEALS FOR ARMY FLIER

(By Associated Press) SANTA MONICA, Calif., April 19.—Breakfast in Los Angeles, luncheon in San Francisco, nearly 500 miles away; afternoon tea in San Diego, a jump of another 600 miles, and dinner back at home in Los Angeles, such is the outline of a day in the life of Lieutenant Corliss C. Moseley, commandant of Clover Field, the army air base at Santa Monica.

Lieutenant Moseley has arranged his daily meals thus not once, but several times. Piloting a bi-plane, he leaves Clover Field early in the morning and wings his way to the Presidio of San Francisco by 10 o'clock, as a rule, snatches a bite to eat, confers with army officers and is off for San Diego, arriving there usually about 4 p. m. Long before summer dusk he drops down again at Clover Field, steps into his waiting automobile and rolls 12 miles to Los Angeles, home and dinner.

On a recent Sunday Lieutenant Moseley flew up to San Francisco, across to Yosemite National Park in the Sierra Nevada mountains, hovered over the mighty falls and returned to Clover Field, a non-stop flight of more than 1,000 miles.

was, unarmed when he was shot down and as far as it is known did not have an enemy in this county. He was living on the farm of his father-in-law, J. N. Wells and was accompanied to the scene of the shooting by Mr. Wells when a stranger called at the Wells home on the night of December 19th and asked for help in getting a "stalled" auto started, which the stranger said had gone dead in the road about two hundred yards from the Wells home, according to a story of the killing as told by Wells. Wells carried his gun with him when he went to help the man in "auto trouble," and says that he fired on the parties in the car when they told him to "stick 'em up."

There were many conflicting reports in connection with the murder, and for a time the officers were baffled in their efforts to find a clue which would justify an arrest. A day or two following the shooting Cope was found wounded in an Abilene hospital, and placed under arrest. He has never made a statement nor told how he was injured. Later Kirk was arrested and released on \$10,000 bond to await the action of the grand jury. Evidence upon which the grand jury indictments were returned has not been made public, and nothing short of a trial will disclose many circumstances connected with the death of Tabor.

Grand Jury Returns 12 Bills; In Session 14 Days

The grand jury adjourned about 4:00 o'clock Friday afternoon, after being in session fourteen days. The body was impaneled on March 31st, but recessed from time to time and only worked fourteen days. Of the twelve indictments returned, four of the defendants have been sentenced to the penitentiary. Four of the other cases were the murder cases growing out of the death of Crawford A. Tabor. Two other felony bills returned consisted of one burglary in which two men were jointly indicted, and one liquor law violation case in which two men were jointly indicted. The other two cases making up the twelve bills found by the grand jury were misdemeanors. The defendants in the last two felony cases and the two misdemeanor cases have not been arrested.

The report of the grand jury should be read by the parents of the boys and girls. Matters were called to the attention of the grand jury which the parents of the land are responsible for and in its report the investigators say "during our investigations many matters of minor infringements of 'proprieties' have been brought to our attention and we cannot recommend too strongly that parents keep closer watch over their young boys and girls at all times."

Grand Jury Report

"Ballinger, Texas, April 18, '24. To Hon. J. O. Woodward, Judge of District Court, Runnels County, Texas.

"We, your grand jury for the March term of court beg to submit to you our report as follows:

"We have been in session 14 days and have carefully investigated all violations of the law which have been brought before us by the officers and citizens of our county. We have examined 168 witnesses and as a result found 12 true bills of indictment, 10 for felony, 4 of which are for murder; and 2 for misdemeanors. "We have visited the jail and find the same being kept in a clean and sanitary condition with an exception of some of the bed clothing, which should be changed more often and would recommend that some repairs be made such as broken window lights be replaced with good ones and some

other minor repairs. "We desire to compliment the custodian of the court house and lawn. He seems to be faithful in discharging his duties and as a result the premises are kept clean and the court house lawn made attractive at all times.

"We wish to thank the officers for their untiring assistance in bringing matters before us for our attention.

"We have received the reports from all the county officers and desire to thank them for filing same promptly and for the efficient manner they appeared.

"During our investigations, many matters of minor infringements of propriety have been brought to our attention and we cannot recommend too strongly that parents keep closer watch over their young boys and girls at all times.
