ATLANTA, Ga., April 30.—A series of tornadoes in this section early today took a toll of more than twenty lives, caused upwards of a million dollars in property damage, according to reports received here. Seven persons are reported missing and forty-two injured.

One tornado in Riverside Mill, a village near Anderson, South Carolina, killed nine persons and injured more than a score. Fifty houses in the village were destroyed and the mill building damaged, causing a loss estimated at \$500,000.

Three persons were killed when a school house twelve miles from Columbia, South Carolina, was wrecked.

One white woman was killed and several persons hurt by a tornado near Chipley, Georgia.

Four negroes are reported killed and five missing in Opelika, Alabama.

can industry. The basis of this waste lies largely with the individual consumer, who, thoughtlessly, in most cases, creates a demand for endless varieties, styles and grades.

The industries in which there is an average 49 per cent waste, according to Mr. William A. Durgin. chief of the division of simplified practice in the Department of Commerce, are metal trades, boots and shoes, textiles, printing, building and men's clothing. Perhaps there are other industries where the percentage of waste is just as great, but the ones mentioned have been

particularly surveyed. As an example of what can be done toward eliminating waste in industry, it is pointed out that a large producer of men's shoes recently eliminated 98.7 per cent of his former line. A manufacturer of food products has, through simplified practice, decreased the variety of his output 82 per cent, with a decrease of 73 per cent in cost of rales force, a 78 per cent saving in advertising and an 80 per cent saving in overhead, with an increased sales volume of 600 per cent.

An almost endless list of instances of this kind may be found in the records of the division of timplified practice.

It is a splendid phase of thrift work, in which each individual cau prove of helpful co-operation. It also emphasizes the fact that there are perhaps few businesses that cannot, by intensive study of this phase of their activities, introduce methods that will very greatly contribute to their more profitable op-

\$100,000 STEER **DEALS IN CONCHO**

Concho county ranchers are making deliveries this week of about 1750 head of three, four and five year old steers, several trainloads of the steers being shipped out to Kansas and Oklahoma, according to D. C. Broiles. editor of the Concho Herald who was over from Paint Rock Tues

day.

The price paid for the steers figured about \$6.50 per hundredweight, some being sold by the weight and some sold at so much per head. D. E. Sims & Son sold the largest number of steers, fours and fives and delivered about 1100 head. W. O. Shultz sold 350 head of threes. J. J. Ball, who is ranching on the old Massey ranch, sold 200 head of threes and Hargrove & Beckton sold 75 head of threes.

Most of the steers were purchased by J. H. Parker, of Kansas City, an East Texas buyer getting part of the lot. The steers will be put on range in Kansas and Oklahoma.
