WASHINGTON, July 12.-The United States has informed the governments of Great Britain, France and Spain of its willingness to accede under certain conditions to the Tangier convention signed at Paris December 18,

The conditions upon which the United States would accede in brief, would require more detaiied interpretation of certain provisions of the convention which are seen as affecting American rights in that zone, and more definite declarations of the intenpolicy and acceptance by joint American interests.


