"Land of Israel" Favored as New Name for Palestine

JERUSALEM, July 12.—"Land of Israel" is being favored as a name for the Holy Land instead of the official "Palestine." For the present it is in use only among Jews outside of the country writing to Palestine. In the country, Palestine is the official name used universally, except in Hebrew translations of government documents. There the Hebrew letters forming the initials of the two Hebrew words "Eretz Israel" (Land of Israel) are being used parenthetically.

The Hebrew name written in Latin characters is beginning to appear with increasing frequency on postal matter destined for Palestine.

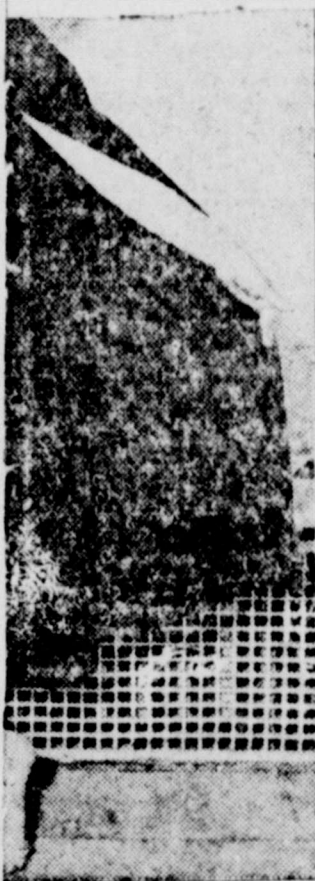
McAdoo Backs Davis; Will Fight for Party's Success

U. S. ACCEDS TO NEW CONVENTION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 12.—The United States has informed the governments of Great Britain, France and Spain of its willingness to accede under certain conditions to the Tangier convention signed at Paris December 18, 1923.

The conditions upon which the United States would accede in brief, would require more detailed interpretation of certain provisions of the convention which are seen as affecting American rights in that zone, and more definite declarations of the intention of the new administration there to maintain an open door policy and acceptance by joint administration for the full responsibility for safeguarding the American interests.

The Tangier convention provides for abrogation of extra-territorial rights of foreign nations in the Tangiers zone and the substitution of a joint administrative authority. Ratification on the part of three signatory governments was completed last May, and the United States is now ready to accede to the treaty under certain conditions.

REPORT FROM WORLD FLYERS

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 12.—The United States army aviators, who are making a round-the-world flight, sailed from Constantinople at 6:00 o'clock this morning, hopping off on the lap to Bucharest, Rumania.

KASUMIGAURA, Japan, July 12.—A. Stuart MacLaren, who hopped off with two companions this afternoon for Minato, on a flight around the world, was forced to return on account of engine trouble. He hopes to be able to start again for Minato tomorrow.

LUTHERAN'S ARE IN GOOD SHAPE

MARLIN, July 12.—The financial report of the Texas District of the Lutheran Church in for at session at Trinity Church here, shows a total collected for the two year period ending June 15th of this year, for district funds, \$60,888; general funds more than \$74,000.

In the church extension fund there are outstanding loans to congregations of \$40,400. Collection for students and colleges more than \$50,000; missions more than \$46,000. There are only two applications for loans from churches in the district, the report stated.

British Build Giant Airplane to Cruise Around the World

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, July 12.—Built with a view of flying around the world, a giant air cruiser will shortly leave the works here for trials at Southampton. The plane has two large floats, is driven by a 650 horsepower engine, and carries a crew of five.
Two pilots sit in front, and behind them in the fuselage is a wireless room. Still further back are the sleeping quarters, as large as a motorbus, and gasoline is carried in two floats in sufficient quantity for a 1,000 mile trip. The plane will have a cruising speed of 80 miles an hour and a full-out speed of 100 miles.

The assailant was pursued thru the building and twice wounded by detectives and police before he was captured. He was identified as Anthony Sarkis, of Newark and Detroit.

BIG CROWD FOR LEGION MEETING

According to advance notices received by the entertainment committee of the Pat Williams Post, American Legion, which will be host to the Legionnaires of the 19th District here tomorrow, the attendance will be all the local Legionnaires hope for.

Reports received Saturday accounted for good delegations from quite a number of posts in the district, and the posts which have not sent advance notices are expected to send strong delegations.

Reservations have been made for from eight to ten from Stamford, fifteen from Miles, fifteen from Abilene, fifteen from Eastland, six from Baird, fifteen from Santa Anna, twenty-five to fifty from Brownwood, Cisco, Brady, Sweetwater, Winters, Coleman, and other places in the district have not been heard from definitely as to the number of delegates coming, but all will be represented at the convention.

The plans have been perfected for carrying out the program as printed in this paper, and for entertaining the guests. The delegates will begin registering at the American Legion hall at 9:30 Sunday morning and the business session will convene at 10:30.

New Oath for Irish Officers

DUBLIN, July 12.—The new army bill of the Saorstad, or Irish Free State government, just introduced in the Dail, imposes on all officers a new form of oath. In addition to the ordinary oath to obey orders the officers will have to swear that they "will not join or be members of or subscribe to any political society or organization whatever, or any secret society whatever."

INDIANS GET VOTE UNDER NEW LAW

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 12.—Provided the various states that embrace their reservations will set up the necessary machinery, thousands of Indians will become voters in the coming elections as a result of the Citizenship Act passed at the recent session of Congress.

With the passage of the law every native-born Indian in the United States automatically became a citizen. Commissioner Burke recently estimating the number at approximately 125,000. At least one-fourth of this number, it is calculated, are adults and therefore are entitled to vote except in states where the election laws fix certain qualifications, such as educational, property ownership or payment of poll taxes, that the new Indian citizens may not be able to meet.

However, this condition is believed by authorities on the subject to be only a minor hindrance to the newly enfranchised Indians going to the polls, the chief obstacle mentioned being the lack of organized machinery. Most of the Indians, it is pointed out, live on closed reservations located in unorganized counties where there are no officials to provide the necessary ballots, polling places and other election facilities.

Not only the Indians in the particular circumstances described are prevented from casting their votes, but even white citizens living on the reservations have no such opportunity.

In one or two states, however, this condition is said to have been remedied by counties bordering on Indian reservations permitting the citizens in unorganized jurisdictions to cast their ballots in the adjoining counties.

More than 200,000 Indians had been made citizens before the passage of the new citizenship act and a large percentage of these are said to be placed in the similar position of not being able to vote solely because the facilities enabling them to exercise this right are not available.

PROPOSES NEW FARM COUNCIL

(By Associated Press)
ST. PAUL, Minn., July 12.—Organization of a national council for the promotion of the interests of agriculture is urged in a resolutions committee report presented at the national conference of farm organizations here today.

The organization proposed will be known as the American Council of Agriculture. It would promote and defend the broad welfare of agriculture under any and all circumstances by such means as appear to it honorable and effective.

Rev. Alvin Swindell began a meeting at Spring Hill Friday night, and he reports an encouraging attendance for the first service. Ballinger people are urged to attend. The meeting will run about ten days.

NEW YORK, July 12.—William G. McAdoo, who was the leading candidate in the race for the democratic presidential nomination for about one hundred ballots, issued a statement to the public today in which he said that he would give John W. Davis, the nominee, his most cordial and hearty support, and would take an active part in the campaign for the success of the democratic ticket.

"I am satisfied that Mr. Davis is in full accord with the progressive program as outlined in the democratic platform," said Mr. McAdoo. Continuing, Mr. McAdoo said, "I am confident that as president of the United States, Mr. Davis will faithfully execute the mandates of the platform."

Referring to criticism from some quarters against Mr. Davis because of his connection with big interests of the country as a lawyer, Mr. McAdoo said, "Mr. Davis' high character, integrity and services should satisfy every apprehension of this sort. If I did not believe this I could not render aid, because I have always believed that the interests of the people should never be subordinated to merely slavish partisanship."

Continuing in his statement Mr. McAdoo said, "the influence and power of these progressive forces must not be dissipated by a division between the various political movements. They must rather be consolidated and used like an irresistible battering ram of that party which offers the best instrumentality for service to the people."

Mr. McAdoo called on Mr. Davis yesterday and he gave out the statement today as he sailed with his wife and two daughters for a six weeks' visit in France, Spain and Portugal.

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With as many original Davis men in the country as there seems to be at this time we can't understand why the convention experienced such troublesome times in nominating Mr. Davis. "I told you so," and "he was my man," is the way many politicians express themselves.

On July 26th both the democrats and republicans are expected to hold precinct conventions and elect delegates to the county conventions. Both parties are expected to hold county conventions on August 2nd, and the county conventions will select delegates to the state convention which meets on August 12th.

Boll weevils are doing some damage in Central Texas, according to reports received here, while further down the line the boll weevil is getting in its work. Farms have not been able to locate a spot where they can farm without having to contend with some kind of a pest.

A conflict in the election law is causing some voters annoyance and vexation. The law provides that persons absent from the state may arrange through a notary public for an absentee ballot not earlier than July 6 nor later than July 16th. Not earlier than July 16th and not later than July 23rd, qualified voters who expect to be out of the county of their residence on primary election day may cast their ballots with the county clerk of their home county. At the same time the law provides that the county chairman shall have the ballots printed on July 14th. As no ballots are printed before July 14th it is impossible for citizens visiting in other states to be supplied with a ticket and get it back to the clerk before the 16th.

A FEW FACTS ABOUT JOHN W. DAVIS

For the benefit of those who have been making some inquiry about the democratic presidential nominee, who he is, what he stands for, etc., The Ledger publishes the following facts:

John William Davis, nominated for president on July 8th, after the convention had taken 103 ballots.

He is a member of the law firm of Stetson, Jennings, Russell & Davis, of New York.

Mr. Davis was born April 13, 1873. He is 31 years old.

He is a native of Clarksburg, West Virginia.

Graduated from Washington and Lee University. Later graduated from the law department of the Washington and Lee University and was professor of law in the university for several terms.

Elected to the House of Delegates of West Virginia in 1899.

Delegate to the Democratic National Conventions in 1900 and 1904.

President of West Virginia Bar Association 1906.

Member 62nd and 63rd congresses, defeating the republican candidate by a vote of 16,000 to 20,000.

Resigned seat in congress to become solicitor general of the United States in 1913.

Ambassador to Great Britain in 1918.

American representative in conference with Germany for exchange of prisoners.

Retired to private practice of law at the end of the Wilson administration.

Has wife and two grown daughters. Been married twice, first wife dying.

Mr. Davis is a prohibitionist, and framed the principal provision in the Webb-Kenyon Act to prohibit the shipments of liquor in interstate commerce to dry territories while he was in congress.

He is a member of the Presbyterian Church, and if elected will be the eighth Presbyterian president.

With reference to their church affiliations of the various presidents, at this time when there is

an alleged attempt to mix religion and politics, the following information will be of interest to the public:

Charles G. Dawes, republican candidate for vice-president, attends the First Congregational Church in Evanston, Ill., of which Rev. Dr. Hugh Elmer Brown is pastor. Mrs. Dawes is a member of this church.

President Coolidge united with the First Congregational Church in Washington, last October. He is the first Congregationalist president.

Warran G. Harding was the first Baptist president.

Besides Grover Cleveland, the Presbyterian presidents were: Jackson, Polk, Buchanan, Benjamin Harrison and Wilson. Abraham Lincoln did not unite with the church, but during the years he was in Washington he was a regular attendant at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church.

The Episcopal presidents were: Washington, Madison, Monroe, William Henry Harrison, Tyler, Taylor, Pierce and Arthur.

The Unitarians were John Adams, John Quincy Adams, Fillmore and Taft.

The Methodist presidents were: Jackson, Grant, Hayes and McKinley.

Van Buren and Roosevelt were members of the Dutch Reformed Church.

Garfield was a member of the Church of the Disciples of Christ. Jefferson was a Liberal.

PRESBYTERIANS WILL CAMP AT BUFFALO GAP

Presbyterians from all over West Texas will pitch camp at Buffalo Gap next week for a ten days' encampment. Rev. R. B. Twitty, of this city, is secretary of the encampment and one of the managers, and he will set up camp at Buffalo Gap next Wednesday. The program begins Thursday.

Several families from Ballinger will camp and spend the entire ten days at the encampment while others will be going and coming from time to time. According to demands for camping reservations a large crowd will attend the encampment this year, people coming from the border on the North and West and from the Eastern part of the West Texas area. One of the principal speakers on the program is Rev. W. C. Kunz, formerly pastor of the 8th Street Church; Dr. Erwin, and prominent members from the church boards, and prominent laymen of the church. Music will be made a feature of the encampment.

The Buffalo Gap committee has provided extensively for the comfort and entertainment of the campers and visitors to the encampment.

WANT SECRETARY OF EDUCATION IN U. S. CABINET

(By Associated Press)
 AUSTIN, July 12—The proposal to have a secretary of education in the president's cabinet is endorsed by educators of Texas, according to S. M. N. Marrs, state superintendent of public instruction, who has just returned from a meeting of the National Educational Association in Washington.

By almost unanimous vote the association, said Mr. Marrs, endorsed the Sterlin-Reid bill now before congress which provides for the cabinet position on education. Texas had 20 delegates at the association meeting. "It is thought that by raising the position of education to the dignity of a cabinet place more effective work can be done toward standardization of education in America," said Mr. Marrs. "Such a step could not be an encroachment on the rights of the states any more than is the work of the secretary of agriculture or that of the secretary of the interior."

Strong resolutions were also adopted endorsing the work of private schools and also advocating the following: A code of professional ethics, teaching the constitution of the United States, education for character building, literacy tests, the ratification of the child labor amendment, more stringent law enforcement, and more adequate provision by congress for the public schools of the District of Columbia.

Natural Gas Flows from Vents in Dry Bed of Tule Lake, Ore.

(By Associated Press)
 KLAMATH FALLS, Oregon, July 12—Eight vents emitting natural gas have suddenly opened in the dry bed of Tule Lake, 30 miles East of here. Tests by J. D. Howard, a local geologist, show the gas to be of paraffine variety. Flames more than a foot in length, burning with intense heat, are reported to have been obtained in tests. The vents or chimneys range in diameter from 6 to 30 inches and are several feet deep.

Between August 5th and 10th last year water disappeared from eight sections of Tule Lake bed. Howard contends that nature is disproving the statements of some geologists that this area is burnt out by volcanic action. Three oil companies are drilling on the same structure running thru the lake bed. All three wells are reported to have shown indications of oil.

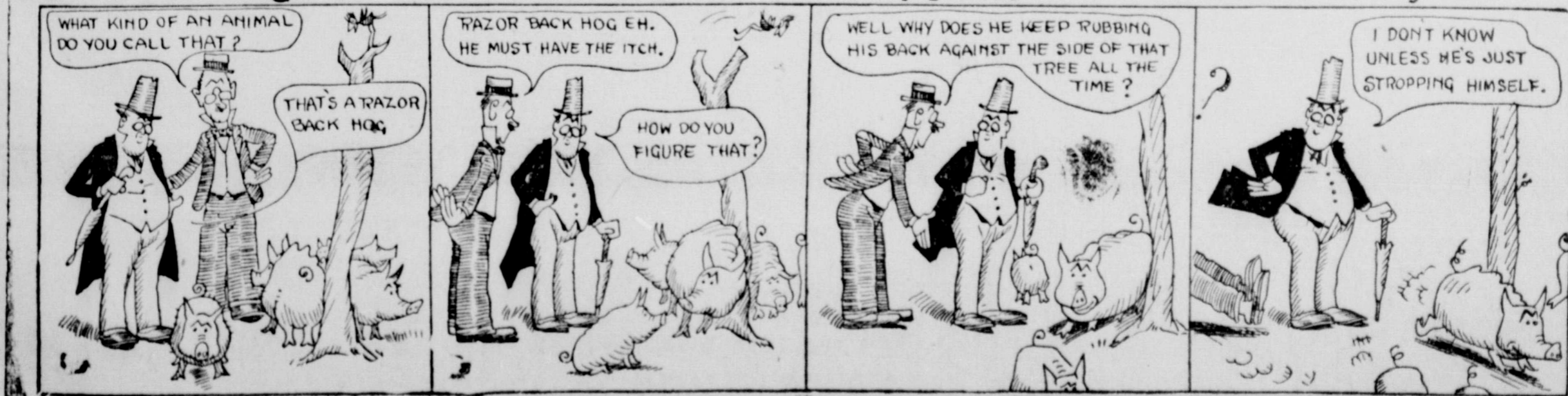

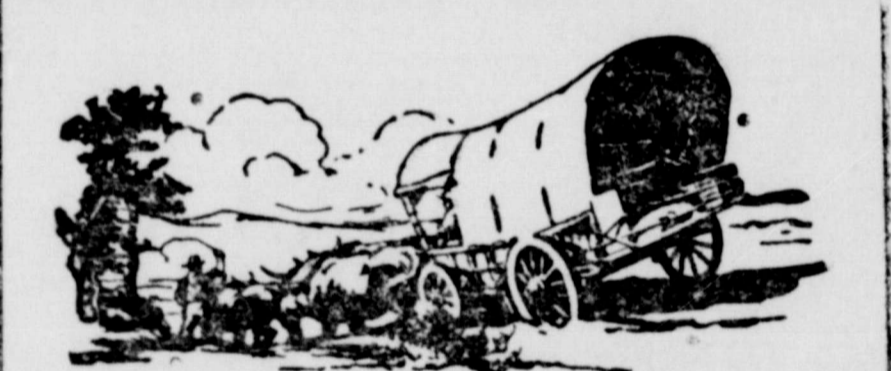
