EXPLOSION DEAD INCREASED TO 12

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, October 22.—Franklin Bigelow Jeffry, seaman, whose home was at Lynn, Massachusetts, died this morning, bringing the total number of deaths from the explosion on the cruiser Trenton to twelve.

Of the six surviving members of the turret crew who were on duty at the time of the disaster, four are still believed to be in a critical condition, and will probably die from injuries sustained.

WASHINGTON, October 22.—Deteriorated powder will probably be found as the cause of the explosion Monday on board the U. S. cruiser Trenton, according to some naval ordnance experts. Normally this service charge is inclined to become unstable after being subjected to a high temperature, and under other unusual conditions. In such a state it is held the powder may become ignited by even the slightest friction.

WASHINGTON, October 22.—Three additional deaths during last night brought the total number of fatalities from the explosion Monday night on the cruiser Trenton, to eleven. Arthur McCormick, of Charleston, Massachusetts; George Luker, of Belvidere, New Jersey; and George Gaffney, of New York city, all seamen, were those whose deaths were announced today by the navy department.

Four were killed outright when a forward gun on the Trenton exploded Monday night, and the other victims of the accident died later, the three deaths last night resulting from injuries caused by the explosion.

NEGRO MOTORIST KILLS BABY AT SWEETWATER
Sheriff Bob Miller, of Conecho county, was here Tuesday night en route home from Abilene, where he had been on business, and reported that negroes wanted for running down a woman and her baby in Sweetwater, were caught in Anson, arrested and returned to Sweetwater. There were three negro men in the car. The report that the negro had come to Rannels county was an error. They went direct from Sweetwater to Anson. Sheriff Miller also stated he learned in Abilene that the baby was not dead, but was in a serious condition, and not expected to live.

Local officers have been assisting Nolan county officers in a search for a negro motorist who ran down a woman and baby at Sweetwater last Saturday night. The baby was killed, and the woman injured, according to reports received here. The negro driving the auto did not stop to offer any assistance, but stepped on the gas and is believed to have come to Rannels county. The officers were trying to locate a party of negroes suiting the description who are believed to have come to the Winters country. No arrests had been made up to Wednesday.

FORMER LEGION HEAD IS SHOT

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Oct. 22.—Col. John Emery, former National Commander of the American Legion, was shot and slightly wounded today as he sat in his office.

Chedell Simpson, age 44, husband of Col. Emery's stenographer, is being held for the shooting. Mrs. Simpson had filed action for divorce against Simpson.

Col. Emery was shot in the left shoulder and the wound is not considered serious.

RESUMES TRIAL IN BIG OIL SUIT

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 22.—Testimony to support the charge that profiteering may have been behind the granting of the E. L. Doheny interests in 1922 certain contracts of leases involving naval oil reserves in California, was scheduled for presentation at today's session of the trial in the federal court here of the government's suit against the Pan-American Petroleum Transport Company. The suit is being pushed by the government for the cancellation of the contracts and leases.

According to an opening statement yesterday, Frank Hogan, chief counsel for the defense, there was no profiteering back of the oil lease transactions.

WAGON HIT BY TRAIN; 1 DEAD

GARLAND, Tex., Oct. 22.—H. K. Jones, age 63, a farmer living near here, was fatally injured today when a wagon in which he was riding was struck by a Santa Fe freight train near here. The man died while being rushed to a hospital at Dallas.

SHENANDOAH MAY NOT STOP ON RETURN

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 22.—Preparations are being made today for the naval dirigible Shenandoah to start on its East bound flight to Lakehurst, New Jersey, tomorrow. The airship commander was considering today plan for eliminating the schedule for a stop at Fort Worth, and the craft may make the trip back to Lakehurst without stopping at any point from coast to coast.

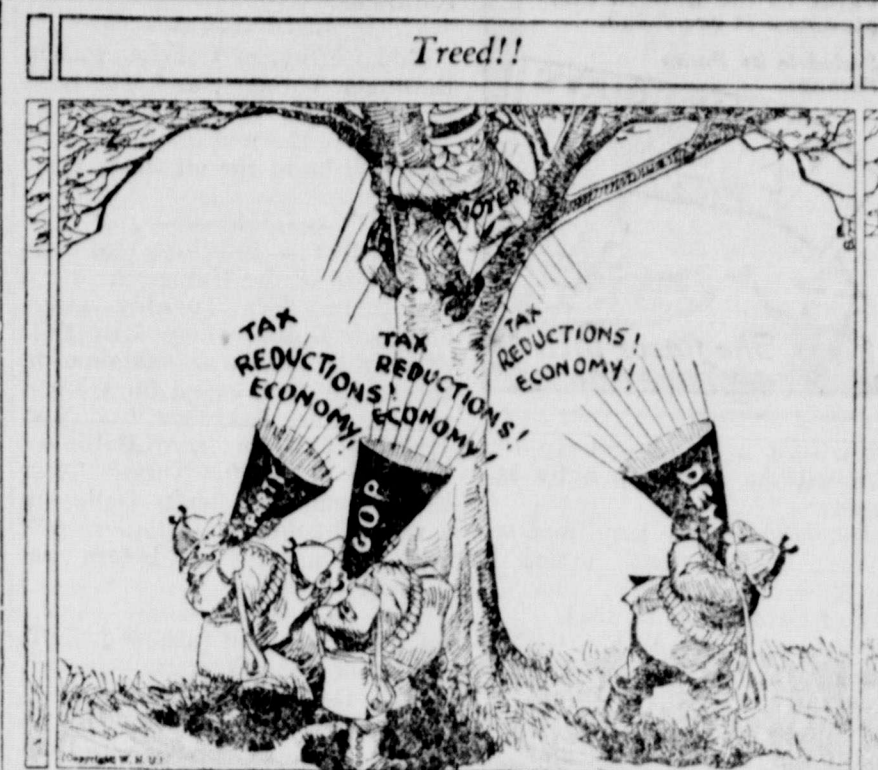
FIXES VALUE OF TEXAS RAILROAD

QUARANTINE ON TEXAS POULTRY PUT IN OFFICE

Unless the embargo on Texas poultry is lifted in time to move the Thanksgiving turkeys to the Northern and Eastern markets, the poultry growers of this state will suffer heavy loss.

Texas is one of the largest poultry producing states in the United States and the poultry crop is good, but dealers are out of the market and will buy only in limited quantities until the quarantine is lifted.

No poultry can be shipped out of Texas at present on account of the foot and mouth disease fright, and Thanksgiving is only a month off. Local dealers have been getting out advertising matter and prospects were good for strong competition in the turkey market, when the report came that Texas poultry could not be moved out of the state until the foot and mouth embargo was raised.

Livestock authorities have the situation well in hand, and the disease has not spread out of the area where it was originally discovered, and there is no cause for alarm, but the strict enforcement of the quarantine rules is threatening to play havoc with poultry growers.

THREE DROWN IN CAR CRASH

NEW DEMOCRATS PUT IN OFFICE

A called meeting of the Rannels County Democratic Executive Committee was held at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon for the purpose of putting into operation the new organization. Several of the newly elected committeemen, including Chairman-Elect H. O. Jones, of Winters, were in attendance upon the meeting.

The delay in turning over the county political machinery to the newly elected committeemen was occasioned by a request from the chairman-elect that Chairman Estes Lynn remain on the job until all the matters pertaining to the last primary were attended to and the business of the party in holding the 1924 primary elections closed.

Mr. Jones was installed as county chairman, and the new organization will begin functioning at once. No announcement has been made by the newly organized committee as to whether any steps will be taken to assist in bringing about the election of the Democratic nominees in the November election. Meetings of the committees have been called in some counties and campaigns launched to put speakers in the field in behalf of Mrs. Ferguson and other nominees of the August primary. A split in the committee has developed in some counties, and in Bexar county there was a move to oust the duly elected chairman because he declined to support the full ticket as nominated.

TWO SERIOUSLY HURT WHEN CAR TURNS OVER

Mr. and Mrs. Lee Richards, of Bronte, were probably seriously injured, and experienced a narrow escape from death, when their car, a new Ford, turned over on the Ballinger-Norton road a short distance from the West Ward school building shortly after noon Wednesday. Homer Young, a young man, suffered scratches about the face and head and Lee Broom, another young man, escaped from the wreck without a scratch.

Mr. and Mrs. Richards were coming to Ballinger and the two young men were riding to Ballinger with them. The young men had been picking cotton in the Bronte country, and were returning to their homes, Young being en route to Hattiesburg, Mississippi, and Broom to Lott, Texas.

The auto in which the party was traveling was badly demolished, and that all the occupants were not instantly killed is considered a miracle by those who visited the scene of the accident and viewed the wrecked car.

Mr. Richards was driving the car, and according to the young men in a statement to The Ledger, he pulled to one side of the road to pass another car which he was meeting, when a casing on the front wheel of the auto blew out, the car swerving and leaving the embankment turned a flip.

Mr. and Mrs. Richards were both out and bruised, Mr. Richards being the more seriously hurt. The full extent of the in-

juries of the man and his wife had not been determined when The Ledger received a report of the accident. Mr. and Mrs. Richards were placed in an auto and brought to the office of Dr. O. R. Lasater, and later the King-Holt ambulance was called and they were removed to the home of Col. G. G. Odom pending the arrival of Mr. Richards' brother, Tad Richards, who was notified of the accident.

Lee Richards is well known throughout this country, having resided in Rannels and Coke counties practically all his life. He has many friends who will regret to learn of his misfortune and wish for his speedy recovery.

PIONEER FINANCIER DIES IN COLORADO

HAS PICTURE LARGEST MAN IN THE WORLD

Sam Harris, the largest man in the world, who died at his home in Farmersville Sunday and was buried Tuesday at that place, was well known by E. E. Holt and son, W. A. Holt, of Ballinger. Mr. Holt and son formerly lived at Farmersville, and were well acquainted with the big man. They say he was a good man, and was popular in his home town, where he served as mayor. W. A. Holt, of the King-Holt Furniture Company, has a large photograph of Mr. Harris made while sitting by the casket which he had made for himself, together with a picture of the undertaker who laid the man to rest Tuesday.

Desiring to be buried in a nice coffin, and realizing that a casket would have to be made for him, and that if it was not made before he died, it would be impossible to get one from the factory and a cheap one would have to be

used, Mr. Harris placed an order with a casket company for his own casket, and it was made and shipped to Farmersville and stored away and held until the man died.

Mr. Harris was the largest man in the world, weighing at the time the picture was taken, 691 pounds. He tried many remedies and schemes to reduce his weight, but they all failed, and he finally accepted a proposition to go on exhibition, and it was while he was appearing in Ballinger last week that he became ill, returned home last Thursday, and died Sunday.

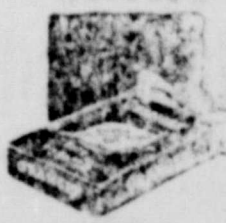

64,206 PEOPLE USED TELEPHONE DURING FAIR

During the Rannels County Fair week the local office of the West Texas Telephone Co. kept a traffic record of the local business handled from 8:00 a. m. Monday, October 13th to 10:00 p. m. Saturday, October 18th, this record being kept for a 14 hour period each day and the figures show the following facts:

For the period 32,103 local calls were handled averaging 5,350 calls per day. This will give an hourly average of 381 calls and the time elapsed in answering the line signals averaged 1.05 seconds.

Taking the average time of each conversation at 3 1/2 minutes will give the total of 1,872 hours spent in using the telephone, on the basis of an 8-hour work day it would require 2 persons, (one on each end of the connection) 234 days or 9 months to talk the calls handled in the 6 days.

As it takes 2 persons to complete a call the calling party and the called party, this will show the telephones of the Ballinger exchange were used 64,206 times or more than 10 calls per station for the total number of telephones in the exchange.

Mrs. Ferguson Answers Charges Made By Butte

TEMPLE, October 18.—Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Democratic candidate for Governor, Saturday issued a statement in reply to the charges and insinuations being made against her and in connection with her candidacy by Dr. George C. Butte, who was nominated by the Republican Executive Committee as her opponent for the governorship.

She denounces as false certain statements made by Dr. Butte and designated as both infamous and contemptible certain insinuations uttered by this man, who proclaims he stands upon "the mountain top of a broad patriotism."

Her statement follows: "To the good people of Texas: "The campaign of slander and bitterness that the Republican candidate for Governor is waging against me justifies this statement.

"The press has carried the charge that I am not favorable to prohibition. This charge is false. I have been a consistent lifelong prohibitionist. It is a well known fact that during the time my husband was Governor, I never allowed a drop of any sort of intoxicating liquor to be served in the Governor's mansion. I stand now as I have always stood in favor of individual, precinct, county, nation and worldwide prohibition. I favor the most rigid enforcement of all liquor laws, including both the Dean law and the Volstead act, and I favor the passage of a law that will put the drug store bootlegger in the penitentiary.

"I am a friend to all of our educational institutions from the country school to the University. I favor taking all of our educational institutions out of politics, and will when I am Governor consult and counsel with the friends of these institutions about all matters in which they may be interested. The Governor's office will be open to the ex-Students' Associations of our University and other state schools, and I shall at all times welcome advice and suggestions from them.

"The charge that the Republican candidate has so often repeated that I will barter pardons, patronage and appointments is too base to discuss. Only a diseased mind can believe that I, an elderly woman, whose life has been spent in Bell County, Texas, and against whom no charge has ever been made, could be unmindful of any official oath and untrue to the millions of good men and women who have so signally honored me.

"These charges and insinuations would be in bad taste as coming from anyone, but coming from one who describes himself as 'standing on the mountain top of a broad patriotism,' are both infamous and contemptible.

"In making appointments to the judiciary, I will do so only after consulting lawyers of the highest character and standing, and my judicial appointments will be made only from persons of this class. In other appointments the same ideals will be observed. My one and only purpose will be to appoint only those who are honest and competent, and that without regard to their past relations to my husband and me.

"I made a clean, fair campaign in both primaries. I was nominated by the Democratic party by a majority of nearly 100,000 votes, and I know that the sense of fair play that is so prominent in the very make-up of the good men and women of Texas will

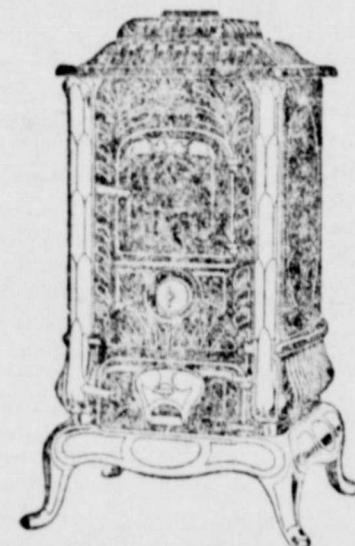

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She denounces as false certain statements made by Dr. Butte and designated as both infamous and contemptible certain insinuations uttered by this man, who proclaims he stands upon "the mountain top of a broad patriotism."

Her statement follows: "To the good people of Texas: The campaign of slander and bitterness that the Republican candidate for Governor is waging against me justifies this statement.

"The press has carried the charge that I am not favorable to prohibition. This charge is false. I have been a consistent lifelong prohibitionist. It is a well known fact that during the time my husband was Governor, I never allowed a drop of any sort of intoxicating liquor to be served in the Governor's mansion. 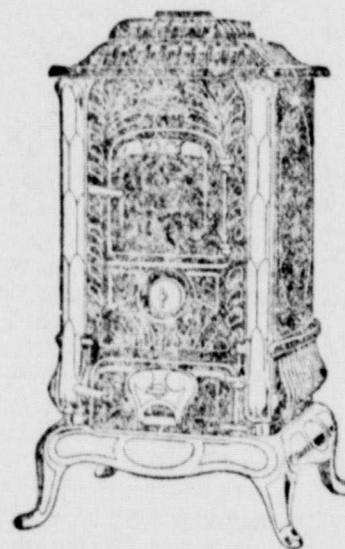
