
# **Area Seniors** Are Awarded **Scholarships**

Eligible farmers in Bailey County are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration County Committee, FmHA County Supervisor Henry W. Taylor III, announced

As a result of the 1985 farm bill, two of the three members of FmHA county committees must be elected, he explained. The third member is appointed by FmHA. The Bailey County committee assists the FmHA county office in reviewing afflications for FmHA farm loans and on other farm credit

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee.

"Farmers in this county. serving on the committee, can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said For this first election, only,

two members will be elected at the same time. One will serve a one year term of office and the other will serve two years. In the future, all terms of

service will be for three years each on a staggered basis. Nominating petitions must be returned to the FmHA Bailey County office by Tuesday, June

Officially, 2.1 inches of rain were recorded in th NWS rain gauge at KMUL Radio, however, some residents in far northeast Muleshoe, reported in excess of three inches of mois-

No severe weather accompannied the rain, whose approach was heralded by lightning and booming thunder.

As the rain fell very fast, and very hard, motorists attempting to travel west of Muleshoe on FM1760 found the travel difficult to impossible, and the local Texas Department of Highways and transportation was forced to close 1760 shortly after 11 p.m.

No accidents were reported with the rain, although many vehicles were reported to be stalled after trying to drive through high water, both in the city, and west of Muleshoe.

On Thursday, with heavy rain falling most of the morning, a number of accidents were reported on the highways around Muleshoe, with most of them being large trucks that had jackknifed during the rain.

# Camp Community, said he re-Rural Electric Co-op Marks 50th Birthday

Two former members of Congress, the Governor of Texas, and rural electric leaders observed two milestones and honored one of the patriarchs of rural electrification at a ceremony May 21 in Austin.

The dignitaries joined to recognize the connection of the one-millionth co-op meter in the state--hooked up early this year--and the 50th birthday of the enactment of the Rural Electrification Act.

Participants also paid tribute to the late Sam Rayburn of Bonham, one-time member of the Texas Legislature and longtime member and speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Rayborn co-authored the act-with Senator George Norris of Nebraska--which sparked the extension of electric service throughout rural areas. Previous to the act, only three percent of U.S. farms has access to

Governor Mark White spoke briefly and praised Rayburn's REA and acknowledged the greatness of the man:


"Some people might remember that it was Ben Franklin who stood out in a thunderstorm and brought lightning down with a key and a kite--and they might remember the name of Thomas Edison and a little invention called the light bulb.

"But across the vast expanse of rural Texas, everyone knows that electricity was discovered by Sam Rayburn."

A former colleague of Rayburn's, retired Congressman W.R. 'Bob' Poage of Waco, reminisced about the man who some call the greatest Speaker of the House in U.S. History. Poage was himself a powerful Congressman, serving 40 years, most of them as chairman of the House Agriculture Committee.

Poage recalled his first two years in Congress in which he and Rayburn shared a prejudice Soil and Water District of Bailey County.

# Creative Living with Sheryl Borden

Surveys confirm that most people only use their microwave ovens for reheating and defrosting foods. 

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



# **Protect Yourself From** Home Selling Fraud

Dealing with a person who advertises "I buy homes for fast cash," can make you the victim of a costly deal.

Dr Jane Berry, a housing specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX), says that homeowners with assumable VA or FHA mortgages can be victimized by their ability to sell their homes through a simple rather than a formal assump-

She explains that in a formal assumption, the person buying the property assumes responsibility for any nonpayment of the

For a simple assumption, however, the original mortgage holder remains responsible for any default which might occur on the loan. Simple assumption of FHA and VA loans can be accomplished between buyer and seller without HUD, VA or the mortgage company's appro-

In some cases, a homeowner will even pay the buyer a fee to take over his loan on a simple assumption, even through he's sacrificing the downpayment, equity and everything else that was invested in the property. says Berry.

This may seem like an attractive deal to families in financial trouble, she says, especially when the buyer agrees to let the family stay on as renters of the property for an amount less than their mortgage payment.

Such an arrangement may work out for both parties, as long as the new owner continues to make mortgage payments as agreed, notes the specialist.

But Berry says there are numerous instances of new owners taking deposits, rentals and other fees and then failing to make mortgage payments. Then when foreclosure results, the action is against the original owner of the VA or FHA mortgage, not the buyer who made the simple assumption of the loan.

"Not all buyers in this circumstance are out to defraud homeowners," she remarks,

"but it is up to the homeowner to determine whether the prospective buyer is legitimate and intends to meet the mortgage commitment.'

The housing specialist advises making every effort to check out the credit record of a prospective buyer.

If you have any doubts, she' recommends sticking to a formal assumption, where liability for any future default would rest with the new buyer.

Berry also points out that with VA and FHA mortgage rates falling, it will be to the advantage of most buyers to simply get their own mortgage rather than assume yours at a higher rate.

# Social Security News & Views

Many beneficiaries who work apparently feel that when they make their annual earnings report by April 15 to the Social Security Administration, they have met their obligation to report earnings for the year. This is not true and often leads to overpayment of benefits.

Now is a good time to review your 1986 earnings in the light of your present work and make sure your earnings estimate has not changed. Remember, the benefit you receive reflects your estimate of earnings. The annual earnings test permits retirees to have some earnings and still receive Social Security benefits. Earnings above the exempt amount reduce the benefit by \$1 for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount.

The earnings limit for 1986 is \$7,800 for people 65-70 and \$5,760 for people under age 65. Beneficiaries age 70 during the entire year are exempt from the earnings test.

An annual earnings report is required from people who work or expect to work and earn over the exempt amount who receive some benefits for the year. It requires the person to report earnings from the past year and to estimate earnings for the present year.

However, recent studied indicate that many people fail to report changes in their estimates and incur overpayments-the payment of benefits to which they are not entitled. This is generally done by withholding all or portions of future checks, but may be repaid in a lump

As part of a program to reduce its debt load Social Security has been sending a mid-year reminder to working beneficiaries. The notice, which generally goes out by August, alerts them to the need to correct their earnings report as soon as possible to avoid accumulation of debt.

But waiting for the reminder is just as bad as waiting for next year to the extent that the longer one waits to adjust benefits, the more money he or she may have to repay.
