## REINDICTED IN TEAPOT DOME OIL SCANDAL

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 27.—Albert Fall, Edward Doheny and Harry Sinclair, indictments against whom as the result of an oil scandal were recently dismissed on technicalities, were re-indicted today by a grand jury of the District of Columbia.

## MORE RAIN SOAKS RANNELS COUNTY

Over half an inch of rain fell in Ballinger Wednesday morning, bringing the total for the week, or since Sunday morning, up to almost two inches. Reports indicated that the rain was general over the county, being heavier at some points.

The season is sufficient for the present, and the farmers are eager to get back in the fields. "We can run a month without rain now," said a farmer Wednesday morning, while another said he would be ready for rain again in two weeks. All agree that the conditions are promising for the present.

The hard wind which preceded the rain Sunday night is said to have damaged cotton in the North and Northwest parts of the county. The gale of dust which prevailed for a short time, killed the cotton, and replanting will be necessary in some fields.

Ed S. Kubela was in the city from Rowena Wednesday and reported good rains in that section of the county. Mr. Kubela says that most of the cotton is up in the Rowena country, and the farmers had plowed out a considerable portion of their crop and had the weeds well under control when it began to rain.

## LOANS ON COTTON BREAK 2 BANKS

(By Associated Press) HUGO, Okla., May 27.—The City National Bank, the third and only remaining bank open in Hugo, closed its doors today. A notice tacked on the door said the closing was by order of the board of directors.

The closing of the first two banks was attributed to inability to liquidate old loans made on cotton.

## SICK WITNESS DELAYS TRIAL

(By Associated Press) HASKEL, Tex., May 27.—The condition of Mrs. Frank Wood, state's witness in the trial of Mrs. Frank Collier, of Wichita Falls, charged with murder in connection with the death of her son-in-law, Elzie ("Buster") Robertson, continued such today that court recessed until this afternoon.

Mrs. Wood fainted on the witness stand yesterday morning and recess was announced until 3:30 o'clock when her condition was such that further recess was announced. She was not able to appear on the witness stand this morning when court convened and Judge Bryant announced a recess until this afternoon.

Should Mrs. Wood's condition continue so she cannot resume her testimony, the lawyers say they see possibilities of a legal tangle as the Texas laws fail to provide for adjournment after a trial has been started, and the state's witness in a criminal case becomes unable to appear in court because of illness.

## OFFICERS SEEK HIDDEN WITNESS

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 27.—Robert White, a missing witness in the William D. Shepherd murder trial in Chicago, came to New York more than a week ago and has hidden himself from the police. Officers here are searching for him at the request of Chicago authorities, it was learned today, and he will be returned to Chicago when apprehended to tell the court what he knows about the death of William McClintock, the millionaire foster-son of Shepherd, and for whose death Shepherd is on trial.

## THREE HANG FOR DEATH 160 PEOPLE

(By Associated Press) SOFIA, Bulgaria, May 27.—Three of the leaders in the recent bombing of a cathedral in which 160 persons were killed, were hanged here today, and three others were sentenced to die later in connection with the bombing. The three men put to death today were executed on the public square in the presence of thousands of persons. Troops formed a line about the execution place which was located just behind the Jewish cemetery.

## SEEKS CONTROL FOREIGN LABOR

(By Associated Press) AMARILLO, May 27.—An international labor conference between the United States and Mexico to control immigration and Mexican labor was recommended here today by the convention of the Texas Federation of Labor.

The proposed international conference would include the American Federation of Labor, the state federations of labor of the states of Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and California and the national labor body of Mexico.

The convention in session here called on the American Federation of Labor to arrange for such a conference to find a solution for the immigration problem which it declared is serious in all the Southern and Western states. It was requested, however, that a solution of the problem be left to the action of the Mexican federation as far as possible, after some plan had been agreed upon.

## NEW METHOD TO GET INDUSTRIES

(By Associated Press) MARLIN, Tex., May 27.—An attempt to devise new methods for bringing industries to Texas is to be made the big feature on the program of the Texas Commercial Executives Association which meets here in first session tomorrow.

The convention of commercial secretaries and managers will be in session three days. The attendance promises to be large.

**ORDERS NEW RATE ON SEED**

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 27.—The railroads of the Southwest have been ordered by the Interstate Commerce Commission, in a decision today, to establish by August 20th, new rates on cotton seed and cotton seed oil, related oils and cotton seed meals to accord with distance rate scales previously laid down.

The new schedules will control the charges on products moving out of Eastern Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Western Louisiana producing territory, and in general will not result in material alteration of existing rates.

**ORDINANCE NO. —**  
An Ordinance Prohibiting the Burn-  
ing of any Trash, Refuse, Waste  
Paper, or other Inflammable  
Material with the Fire Limits of  
the City of Ballinger and provid-  
ing for the removal of all such  
Trash, Rubbish and Refuse to the  
City Dump Ground; fixing a Pen-  
alty for Violations; and Declaring  
an Emergency.  
Be it Ordained by the Board of Com-  
missioners of the City of Ballinger,  
Texas.

**SECTION I.**  
It shall hereafter be unlawful  
for any person or persons to burn  
in any street or alley located with-  
in the fire limits of said city, as  
they have been heretofore or may  
be hereafter defined and fixed by  
ordinance, any waste paper, paper  
boxes, trash, refuse or rubbish of  
any description, or to deposit any  
such waste paper, paper boxes,  
trash, refuse or rubbish of any  
description in or upon any such  
street or alley within said fire  
limits, whether such articles be  
deposited in any box or other  
receptacle or on the surface of  
any such street or alley.

**SECTION II.**  
Any accumulation of any such  
waste paper, paper boxes, trash,  
refuse or rubbish of any descrip-  
tion shall be deposited in the  
building where they shall have  
accumulated as near to a door  
leading on to any such street or  
alley as is practicable, and in a  
receptacle which may be moved  
and emptied into a vehicle, and  
any such person or persons and  
the agents, servants and em-  
ployees of any corporation occu-  
pying any premises within the  
said fire limits, on which said  
premises such waste paper, paper  
boxes, trash, refuse or other rub-  
bish may have accumulated shall  
be and they are hereby required  
to dispose of any such waste  
paper, paper boxes, trash, refuse  
or rubbish by depositing them in  
the city dumping ground.

**SECTION III.**  
It shall hereafter be unlawful  
for any person or persons to  
scatter or distribute within the  
city limits of the city of Ballinger  
or to cause the same to be done,  
any hand bills, circulars or  
dodgers, by handing same to the  
inhabitants of said city, or by  
posting or in any other means  
than by placing them in yards or  
houses.

**SECTION IV.**  
Any person or persons, firm, of-  
ficer, agent, servant or employee  
of any corporation violating any  
of the provisions of this ordinance  
shall be deemed guilty of a misde-  
meanor and upon conviction shall  
be fined in any sum not less than  
\$1.00 nor more than \$100.00.

**SECTION V.**  
The fact that there is now a  
widespread practice among the  
citizenship of this city in burning  
trash and refuse in the streets and  
alleys of said city and depositing  
same upon the surface of said  
streets and alleys of said city and  
of scattering dodgers and hand-  
bills throughout said city all of  
which acts are hereby declared to  
be a nuisance, and a menace to the  
public health and safety of per-  
sons and property, creates an  
emergency, and more than one  
reading of this ordinance is here-  
by expressly dispensed with and  
the same shall take effect and be  
in force from and after its pas-  
sage, approval and publication.

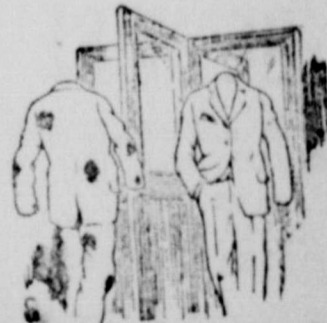

**Man Declared Flathead Indian  
Now May Lose Land and Funds**

WASHINGTON, May 26.—A curious tangle, which apparently was unraveled when Congress passed an act declaring Harry Leon Beauchaine to be a Flathead Indian and therefore entitled to the emoluments of a member of that Montana tribe, has developed a new snarl, with the decision of the Interior Department that Beauchaine is not a Flathead.

Obtaining the right to inclusion in the final Flathead rolls, Beauchaine won a share of the tribal income and a tract of land. Later, however, the department said it learned that he not only was a son of a white man, but that he already was enrolled as a member of the Coeur d'Alene Indian tribe of Idaho.

Interior department counsel now recommends that Beauchaine's name be stricken from the Flathead rolls, and that Congress be asked for authority to deny him a share of the Flathead funds as well as to cancel the land patents granted to him.

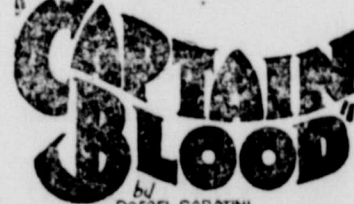

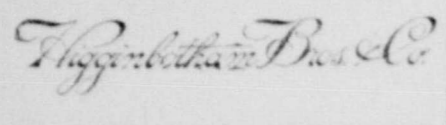
