STATE FINISHES SHEPHERD CASE

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, June 17.—Today will see the end of the state's case against William Darling Shepherd, it was said by Joseph Savage, assistant state's attorney, shortly before the court opened today.
Charles Faiman, proprietor of the National University of Sciences at Chicago, who was indicted with Shepherd after he testified that for the promise of \$100,000 he taught Shepherd how to kill William McClintock and supplied the live typhoid germs for the deed, will be the last state's witness, Savage said.
Miss Marie Hall, the nurse who attended McClintock in his last illness, was the first witness on the stand this morning.

THREE GAMES THIS WEEK

The Ballinger baseball team is beginning to come to life. Sec. Motley announced Wednesday morning that five games had been arranged, three of them being definitely settled. Bronte is playing here this afternoon (Wednesday), Eden will be here tomorrow (Thursday), and the fast team from Midland will meet the Ballinger bunch next Wednesday.
The management of the Ballinger club had been experiencing difficulty in securing any games to be played at home. Tuesday five towns were called over long distance but none of the teams could arrange to get nine men to come to Ballinger for games any time soon. Most of the places near Ballinger have teams that are largely made up of men who work on the farms and these boys are too busy for the great American game at present.
Bronte and Eden both have excellent teams and have been winning from all teams they have played so far this season. Midland has one of the fastest teams in West Texas and the Ballinger aggregation will have to hustle to beat these fast organizations. The Midland team is making an extended trip and Ballinger is one step on their schedule.
All games will be called at the Rummels County Fair Park at 5:00 p. m. Fans are urged to attend, as the Ballinger club is still in debt for their new uniforms and equipment and this series of games is expected to put them in the clear. Good fast games are assured each day and you are guaranteed to get your money's worth at each one.

ARCTIC PARTY SAILS TODAY

(By Associated Press)
BOSTON, June 17.—The arctic expedition under Lieut. Commander Donald MacMillan sailed from the navy yard at Charleston this afternoon in the steamer Peary, bound for Wiscashett, Maine.
From Wiscashett the Peary and the schooner Bowdoin will clear for MacMillan's ninth voyage into the far North.

ABILENE CALLS BOND ELECTION

Mayor Charles E. Coombs, of Abilene, plans to submit to the voters of Abilene at an early date one of the largest bond issues ever voted on by a city in West Texas. There are four separate issues the total amount of which is \$808,000. The issues are divided: \$50,000 for sewers, \$250,000 for water bonds, \$250,000 for public permanent improvement bonds, and \$258,000 for school bonds.
The water bonds of \$250,000 will be used for the building of a purification plant and extension of water mains to the fast growing additions of Abilene. The public improvement bonds of \$250,000 will be used for the erection of a suitable municipal auditorium, fire station and city hall. The \$258,000 school bond issue will cover improvements recommended by the school board and will call for two new ten-room one-story buildings.
The mayor has called a joint meeting of the school board, city commission, and city advisory board for 4:00 p. m. Wednesday, and at this meeting a date for submitting the big bond issue will be definitely settled.

STOCKHOLDERS OF COUNTRY CLUB HOLD ANNUAL MEET

The stockholders of the Ballinger Country Club held their regular annual meeting in the American Legion hall last night, with a quorum present. After hearing the reports of the various committees three new directors were elected, as follows: M. C. Atkins, E. Sheppard and R. G. Erwin; the four hold-overs being J. G. Douglass, W. B. Halley, A. McGregor, and C. P. Shepherd, there being seven directors.
The three retiring directors are: A. J. Thorp, Roy Reeder and W. A. Francis.
A big golf tournament is planned for the Fourth of July, and all preparations are being planned for the occasion.

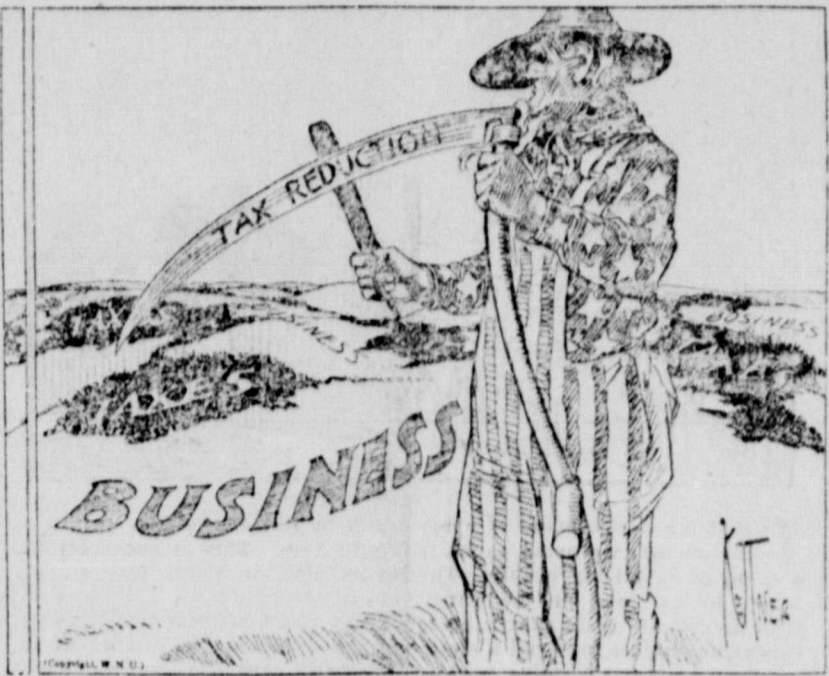
NATIONAL GUARD VISIT WINTERS

28 Pardons are Granted Today

AUSTIN, June 17.—Gov. Ferguson's executive clemency record for a single day's order was increased to twenty-eight proclamations this afternoon when he granted thirteen additional pardons, paroles and restorations of citizenship.
The first quota this morning was to negroes in recognition of June 19th, Emancipation Day. The second quota began by designating the usual list.

Western Canada Welcomes Girls from British Isles

WINNIPEG, Man., June 17.—The domestic servant problem in Winnipeg has been materially relieved by the arrival of a batch of British girls, included among the large quota of settlers reaching here during the past few weeks.
While the majority of these domestics have remained in this city, a number have proceeded to different points in the West. The girls were brought to Canada under the auspices of the Salvation Army.
Statistics show that the population of Western Canada has been augmented by more than 6,000 newcomers during May, the majority immigrating under the British Empire colonization scheme.

FIST FIGHT ENDS IN ONE SHOT

DALLAS, June 17.—A fist fight in a ring lighted by automobile headlights last night a few miles from Dallas in the presence of about twenty-five young men and women, ended when Ferrell Bickers, age 22, was shot and fatally wounded.
A man who Bickers said was settling an old grudge, is accused of having fired the shot.
Among the witnesses was an 18-year-old girl to whom Bickers was to have been married next Saturday.

WOOL SALE AT SAN ANGELO

The largest sale of wool reported this year was held at San Angelo Tuesday when 476,226 pounds of wool owned by West Texas sheepmen was contracted.
There were about 50 buyers present and the wool was divided into different lots and sealed bids made on each lot. The report stated that only two lots were sold, totalling the above amount, and brought a good price. One lot sold for a little more than 41 cents while the other exceeded 44 cents. Joe Blakeney of San Angelo, and Charles F. Angell of Boston, bought 153,994 pounds for the firm of Hallowell, Jones & Donald of Boston. William Campbell of Chicago, bought 51,653 pounds. A. S. Baker of Boston, bought 5,313 pounds for the firm of Haines, Bloomfield & Kincaid, of Boston. James A. Hill of San Antonio, bought 24,122 pounds for Jeremiah Williams & Co., of Boston. John E. Allison of San Antonio, bought 71,447 pounds for Adams & Leland, of Boston. S. D. Ranier of Llano, bought 63,955 pounds for Farnsworth & Stephenson Co., of Boston. E. J. Harlow, of Charlottesville, bought 58,631 pounds; and E. Hughes of Merton bought 47,111 pounds for Studley & Emery, of Boston.
Of the wool sold Tuesday 219,481 pounds was 8-month and 256,745 was 12-month stuff. The Wool Growers Central Storage Company had in its warehouses when the sale started over 2,000,000 pounds of wool.

HICKS COMPANY OPENS BRANCH AT ABILENE

A. C. Connell, of the Hicks Rubber Company of Ballinger, returned Tuesday from Abilene, where he attended the formal opening of the Hicks Rubber Co. at that place. The Abilene opening was a huge success in every particular and during the day more than 5,000 persons passed through the new house. Souvenirs of small rubber roses, large pencils, and balloons for the kiddies were given to all those who attended. Visitors were registered as they passed thru the new plant and at the end of the day a number of tires and tubes were given away.
Mr. Connell stated that the company planned to open a number of stores in West Texas at an early date.

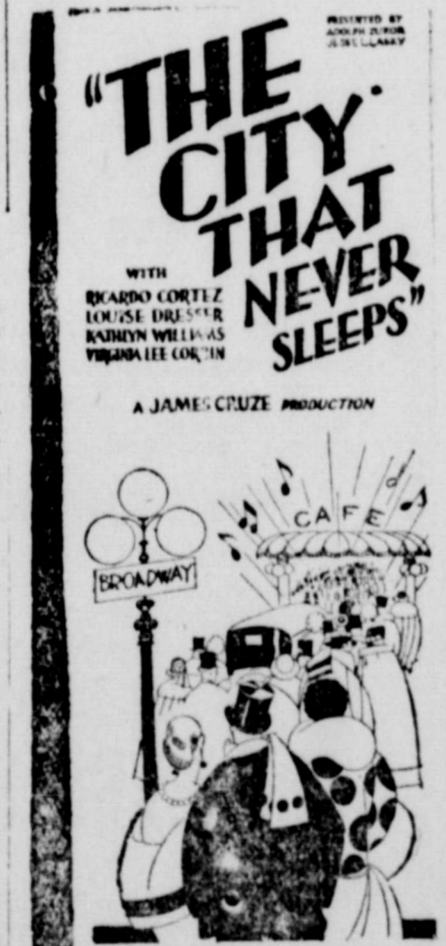

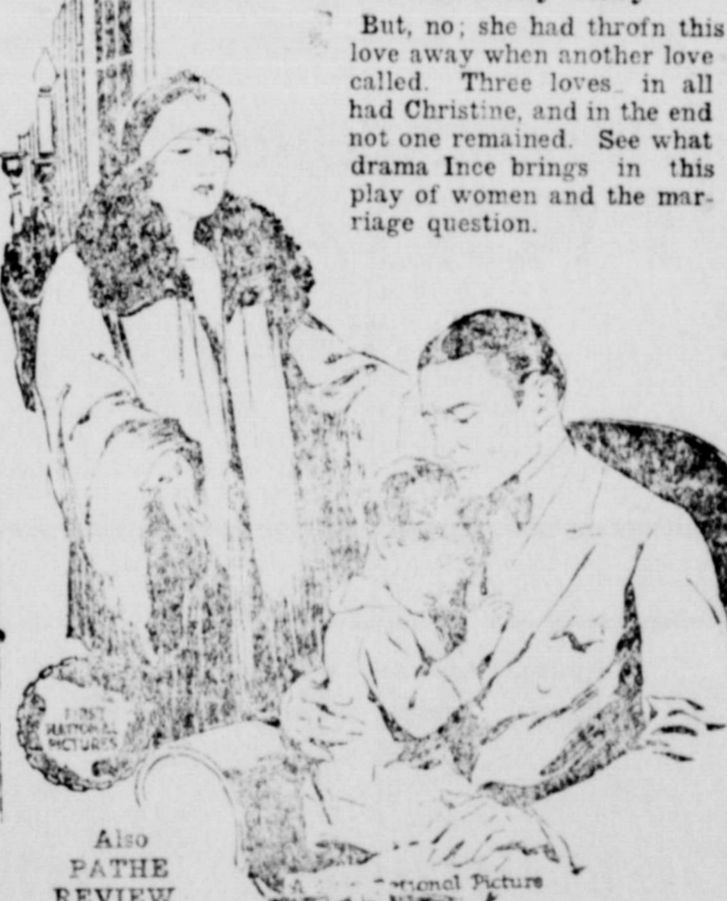

Talpa Girl Married

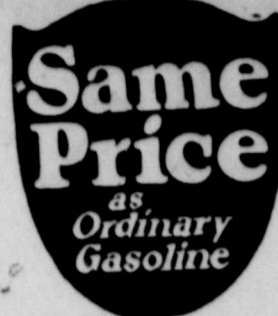
