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BRYAN'S FUNERAL TO BE FRIDAY

(By Associated Press)
DAYTON, July 28.—The funeral services for William Jennings Bryan will be held at Washington Friday afternoon, the exact hour to be announced later.

Mrs. Bryan announced today that the services would be held in the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church. Mr. Bryan was an elder in the Presbyterian church, and had been prominent in the work of his church for many years.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 28.—Mrs. William Jennings Bryan went by automobile to Chattanooga today. She was accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. Ruth Sherwin Jennings, widow of the former governor of Florida.

The purpose of the trip was to give Mrs. Bryan an outing and to do some shopping. They expected to return to Dayton before 2:00 o'clock when the body of Mr. Bryan will be laid in state.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 28.—"The Tennessee case," an address prepared by William Jennings Bryan in defense of the Tennessee anti-evolution law, which the late Commoner was prevented from delivering at the Dayton trial because of the early termination of the case, was made known to the world today by Mrs. Bryan.

Bryan declared in the address which he had prepared that the evolution case was no longer local, but that it had assumed proportions of a battle royal between the unbeliever who attempts to speak through so-called science and the defenders of the Christian religion speaking thru the legislature of the state of Tennessee.

"It is for the jury to determine whether this attack upon Christian religion shall be permitted in public schools of Tennessee by teachers employed by the state and paid out of the public treasury," was the conclusion drawn from the undelivered speech of the great defender of the bible.

EVOLUTION CASE IS POSTPONED

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 28.—Hearing of Washington's evolution case set for today was postponed until Friday. On that day a motion of the government to dismiss the case will have preferred status as a question before the court.

The delay in the case was agreed to by Justice Biddons of the District of Columbia supreme court, when counsel for Loren Wittner, who brought the suit on the grounds that the pay of local school authorities should be stopped because they were teaching the science of evolution. Counsel for Wittner insisted that more time was needed to study the government's motion to dismiss. The government filed a counter motion yesterday asking that the case be dropped.

Every man or woman who will make the trip to Brady tomorrow (Wednesday) is requested to be at the court house square at 5:30 in the morning. You will be furnished a way.

With few exceptions, every business firm, and many individuals in Ballinger have listed their automobiles, agreeing to furnish a car and driver, and in many cases those furnishing the car have made up the party to go with them.

There are many who have expressed a desire to go, but who must depend on someone with an auto to furnish them a seat. All these, together with the Turkey in the Straw Band, are urged to be at the starting point on time. It will require several cars to take the band boys, but the committee in charge of soliciting automobiles reported Tuesday afternoon that they were meeting with good response.

It is an important trip, and one of which the results mean much to Ballinger. The delegation is going after the sheep and goat raisers' convention for next year. The convention will bring thousands of visitors to Ballinger, and Ballinger has a good chance to win the convention.

In addition to campaigning for the sheep and goat men's show the local boosters will advertise the Rannels County Fair. A special committee has been busy throughout the day arranging banners, advertising matter has been prepared, and with four different musical organizations from Ballinger on the stage at Brady, the delegation from here will make themselves conspicuous.

In addition to the Turkey-in-the-Straw Band, the Texas Syncoopers, the Saxophone Sextette, the Hawaiian Orchestra, and a negro harmonica orchestra will accompany the Ballinger delegation. The entertainment to be staged by the Ballingerites will put pep in the Brady gathering.

The roads from Ballinger to Brady are in good shape, and the drive can be made in little more than two hours. The trip promises to be one of the most enjoyable auto excursions ever put on from this city, and those in charge of the campaign to get the 1926 convention of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association are very optimistic.

SLIGHT BLAZE IN MOVIE SHOW

Fire broke out in the operating room of the Macrooy Theatre about 11:00 o'clock Monday night, and just as the third reel of the program was being shown and as the show was about to close down for the night. One reel of the feature picture was destroyed, the machine damaged and the electric wiring in the projection room burned. The loss was covered by insurance, and efforts were being made Tuesday to get the show in readiness to present the program Tuesday night.

There were only about one dozen people in the theatre at the time of the fire, the crowd to attend the first show having left the building a few minutes before the fire broke out. Those in the building rushed out without a panic. More excitement would no doubt have occurred had the fire broken out earlier and while the theatre was crowded.

The fire company was on the scene in double quick time and the blaze was confined to the operating room and entrance.

NEW YORK, July 28.—The government's rum blockade off the Atlantic coast has been run by the largest liquor laden vessel ever seized in New York harbor. Champagne and whisky valued at \$250,000 were landed and gobbled up by bootleggers before the customs officials knew what was happening.

The 2,000-ton steamship Augusta was seized and twenty-five men arrested after the boat had been unloaded and the liquor distributed out to the trade.

RUSSIA TAKES ENTAILS BUSINESS FROM GERMANY

(By Associated Press)
MOSCOW, July 28.—The export of entrails to foreign countries is one of the chief items of Russia's foreign trade. Exports of this commodity during the last six months amounted to over \$1,000,000, official statistics show. Russia has found a ready market in the United States for this kind of material. American sausage makers having purchased 45 per cent of the total export of entrails during the last six months.

In pre-war time Russia did a great trade in entrails. It had an unlimited supply of sheep's intestines and special factories were built in Leningrad equipped with the latest mechanical devices for sorting and preparing the goods for export. The whole trade was previously in the hands of Germany, which had a monopoly for purchasing entrails in Russia, but Soviet exporting organizations are now preparing to deal direct with the consuming countries.

AIRPORT ON THE THAMES PLANNED

LONDON, July 28.—A new development in air service between the continent and London is being planned for the near future. Experiments are being carried out with a view to the establishment of an airport on the river Thames at Hammersmith, just below Putney, where French amphibian planes will alight and set down passengers on a specially constructed landing stage. The authorities stipulate that such landings shall occur before nine o'clock in the morning so that dislocation of river traffic may be avoided.

Monument to Busoni Unveiled

BERLIN, July 28.—A sepulchral monument for the late Ferruccio Busoni was unveiled at the cemetery of Schoenberg recently. The impressive ceremony was conducted under the auspices of the Academy of Fine Arts and many admirers of the great musician attended.

COOLIDGE TALKS ON TWO ISSUES

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 28.—Consummation of the European security pact, in the opinion of President Coolidge, would lay a broad foundation for further disarmament.

Mr. Coolidge also expressed himself on the federal trade commission today. He said that he believes that the federal trade commission has a useful function and he is not in sympathy with the suggestions that it should be abolished.

A travelling man who comes

The Brady Standard announces
that it will issue a daily paper
during the three days of the
sheep and goat raisers' conven-
tion. Brady is not large enough
to support a daily paper every
day, but it shows enterprise on
the part of the Standard to dress
up on special occasions.

A number of inquiries have been
received in Ballinger from per-
sons seeking openings for dry
goods and clothing business. This
is perhaps due to the fact that
crop failures in other parts of the
state make it necessary for some
of the merchants to close up or
move. There are no vacant
houses in Ballinger, and this will

prevent any line of business from
being overdone here.

With central and a section of
South Texas starved out on ac-
count of the drouth, West Texas,
or that section where the crops
are good, will no doubt be over-
run with people seeking work.
This might bring about a trouble-
some situation for the people of
this part of the state to cope with,
and a warning should be sent out
to those who contemplate coming
to investigate before they come,
and not to come here expecting to
find money growing on trees.

IT'S WORTH THE EFFORT

According to reports from
Brady, 10,000 people gathered
there Tuesday morning to attend
the sheep and goat raisers' an-
nual meet, and a large wool-
mohair growing area was repre-
sented with fine sheep and goats.

This is the convention Ballinger
is after. Delegates from twenty-
eight counties will decide the
meeting place for 1926. Ballinger
offers ideal accommodations with
her fair park and livestock sheds
already provided for such a gather-
ing. Brady had to spend much
money building sheds and pens to
handle the sheep and goats put on
sale at the convention.

Wool and mohair are important
commodities of this section of the
state, and Ballinger has long
since been a good market for such
products. The counties with the
largest membership in the associ-
ation are neighboring counties to
Runnels, and Ballinger is in a
position to poll a good vote in
the selection of the 1926 meeting
place.

To say the least of it, nothing
but benefit can result from the
booster trip which will be made
to Brady Wednesday. Of course
there are some business firms
which conduct their business on
the policy of get all and give
nothing, who will not join in the
effort to bring the convention
here, but will share in the bene-
fits to be derived by the city from
such a meeting.

The trip to Brady will be worth
all that it cost those who are be-
hind the move.

of 35, dressed in a suit of dark
velvet with broad collar of fine
lace, and with hair falling in long
curls over his shoulders.

The owner has had photo-
graphic copies made and
despatched them to every famous
gallery in Europe where contem-
porary portraits of Charles I are
known to be. Experts at these
galleries are reported to have un-
animously pronounced that the
original is not a copy of any
known portrait of the king.


