SUBMARINE SUNK WITH 34 ABOARD

Grand Jury Finds Dozen Bills in Five Days Work

The grand jury for the September term of district court made its final report and adjourned at 2:00 o'clock Friday afternoon. The investigators returned twelve indictments for felony and none for misdemeanor. Most of those indicted or either out on bond or are confined in jail. The report of the grand jury speaks for itself, and is as follows:

"To the Honorable J. O. Woodward, Judge of said court.

"We, the Grand Jury impaneled for the present term of this court, respectfully submit the following as our report: In so submitting this report we would especially direct attention to the fact that the observation along general lines contained herein and at somewhat more than customary length are occasioned by belief of this grand jury that the greatest law enforcing power in this or any other county is the power of public sentiment. We, therefore, solicit the earnest consideration of the good citizenship of this county to this report to the end that there may be continued an increase in the county a respect for the law, and for order that is the inevitable results of an enlightened and wholesome public sentiment.

"These specific results of our session are submitted as follows:

"We have been in session five days. We have examined and looked in all infractions of the law that have been brought to our attention. We have examined thirty-one witnesses. We have returned true bills in twelve felony cases and no misdemeanor cases.

"We believe that, in the majority of cases, minor infractions of the law have been properly handled throughout the county by the County Justice and City court officials. However, in our judgment there have been committed in some parts of the county petty violations of the law that should have the immediate attention of the local enforcement officers.

"The local peace officer is charged with a great responsibility. He may not realize it but he has much to do with the moulding of character and shaping the lives of the youth of his community. He should as far as possible know intimately each boy and young man in his precinct, watch over and counsel them, warn them of evil things and guide them toward the right. The officers should not drag them into court for every boyish prank, but should be firm and stern with the viciously inclined, for maybe a punishment for a slight offence against the state at the proper time will obviate the necessity of punishment in the future. We have no sympathy for the man of mature years who will lead into or join with boys in the community a crime against the state; such a one deserves severe punishment by the state.

"We have examined the new county jail recently completed and find the same modern in every respect. It has every con-

venience for health and comfort of the inmates. There is ample room to handle every kind of prisoner and keep them separate. The cells are provided with sewerage connection, and are so arranged that misdemeanor prisoners, juveniles and women prisoners may be kept separate and especially padded cells for the insane inmates. It appears to be safe and in our opinion will hold any criminal placed therein. We wish to compliment the Commissioners Court of Rannels county on the construction of the much needed public building, and we feel that it will meet the long needed want of Rannels county.

"We have noticed with special interest the manner in which the court house and the surrounding ground are kept. We wish to compliment the keepers, M. C. Falls, for his excellent work and his uniform courtesy to the officials and the public.

"We wish to commend the work of our County Sheriff R. E. McWilliams, since his incumbency, and we feel that his active prosecutions of his duties as sheriff is appreciated by the public in general.

"We suggest that the Commissioners Court provide a plan for working misdemeanor prisoners who are not able to pay their fine and who while being in jail are an expense to the county, with no returns.

"We wish to thank our Honorable District Judge for his splendid charge to the Grand Jury, explaining our duties as grand jurors and thereby enabling us to more efficiently perform our duties.

"We have examined a report submitted to us by our Honorable Commissioners Court, which said report was made by John S. Oglesby, expert public accountant, and are glad to note that the financial condition of the county and the books of the various officers are in good condition, and said report showing that Rannels county's condition will compare favorably with any county in Texas, and is in much better condition than a great many counties.

"We wish to thank the County and District Attorneys for their faithful and efficient work and

WEALTHY WOMAN MURDERED; HER JEWELS MISSING

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 26.—The trail of \$10,000 worth of missing gems, which she is known to have worn on her person nearly all the time, is being followed by officers investigating the mysterious killing of Mrs. Ada McCobb, age 39, a wealthy globe-trotter whose body was found with the skull crushed, in her apartment here late yesterday. Mrs. Mabel Longworth Sheridan, who was found in the room with the dying woman, was charged with the murder.

The exact extent of Mrs. McCobb's fortune is not known, but information obtained by the police places the total estate at more than \$1,000,000 and in addition she had about \$40,000 in gems. She had extensive real estate holdings in Maine and owned interests in several Mexican mines.

FRENCH MISSION IS PRACTICING ECONOMY

PARIS, Sept. 26.—The French debt funding mission to the United States sailed unaccompanied by a single woman, although some of the delegates have American wives. The fair sex is not represented even among the stenographers, secretaries and clerks.

Strict economy ruled when the mission was created, and Finance Minister Caillaux said: "I am not even taking my valet with me. In these days of financial penance, we must show the Americans we do not intend to spend a single franc of France's money without absolute necessity."

BOSTON, Sept. 26.—Thirty-four members of the crew of the submarine S-51 lie imprisoned today 125 feet beneath the surface of the Atlantic Ocean, and it is feared that all have perished.

The submarine went down last night after being rammed in a collision with the ocean steamer City of Rome, of the Ocean Steamship Company. The City of Rome was on a voyage from Savannah to Boston when the accident occurred.

Three survivors of the submarine were picked up by the City of Rome, but it is a matter of conjecture as to whether the remainder of the undersea boat's crew are alive in the vessel, or whether they are dead as a result of the collision.

DR. HOWARD IS RESCUED

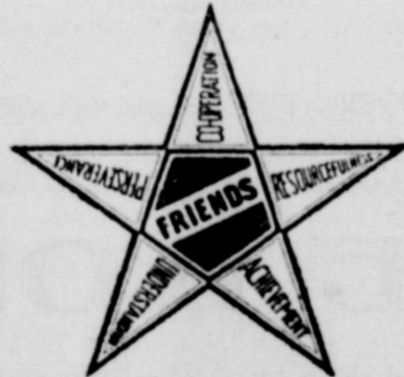

It was not, as might have been expected, given the name of some feminine beauty of royal blood, nor even an ordinary dictionary term redolent of sweetness, light and other qualities possessed by dahlias.

It was named the "Jack Hobbs Dahlia" after the modern king of

professional cricketers. Hobbs all this season has been more than ever in the public eye and admiration. Not only has he exceeded the record of 126 "centuries" made by the greatest of bye-gone cricketers, W. G. Grace; but he has beaten his best previous aggregate runs in a season, which was 2,827 in 1920. A "century" is 100 or more runs scored by a batsman in a single inning.

\$10,000.00 OIL SUITS AT ANGELO

SA NANGELO, Sept. 26.—An oil suit involving ten million dollars, and growing out of the discovery of oil in the Reagan county field, has been filed in federal court here.

The Texon Oil and Land Company are made defendants in the suit, and Hugh Tucker, geologist, is plaintiff. Mr. Tucker is seeking to recover an interest in the Texon company based on an agreement between Tucker and Frank T. Pickrell, vice-president of the Texon company.

Mr. Tucker bases his claim on services rendered for the oil company in locating the Santa Rita discovery well in Reagan county, and an alleged agreement between himself and Pickrell for an interest in the properties developed. Tucker is asking for a tenth interest in all the properties as well as a tenth interest in all oil which has been sold.

CELEBRATED GRAPES BRING STIFF PRICE

(By Associated Press)

PARIS, Sept. 26.—The highest prices ever paid for grapes from the famous "king's vine" at Fontainebleau were realized at the annual sale when a sum nearly double that of 1924 was taken in.

The 1925 production, which was of good average quality, brought 1700 francs for thirty-six lots of 25 pounds each, as against 900 francs in 1924.

The grapes come from the celebrated vine planted by King Henry IV., in the fifteenth century. With the care given it by Louis XIV., and despite Napoleon's indifference, it is now considered the finest specimen of its kind in Europe.

It has a counterpart in Hampton Court, England, which produced this year 600 bunches of grapes.

MUST STATE PLACE CHEESE MANUFACTURED

PARIS, Sept. 26.—The world's butter and cheese men, when they meet in solemn conclave here next year, will be asked to ratify a rule drafted by the International Cheese Commission at Berne, Switzerland, by which the place of manufacture of all kinds of cheese would have to be clearly stated.

Thus, cheese manufactured in America but resembling emmenthal would have to be described as "American emmenthal," to distinguish it from the Swiss article.

The meeting of the cheese commission was attended by representatives of France, England, Germany, Italy, Sweden, Norway, Holland, Denmark, Austria, Hungary and Switzerland.

SUBMARINE IS SUNK WITH 34 MEN ABOARD

(Continued from Page 1)

Rome, was located today by a rescue craft searching for the vessel. This was reported in radio messages to the Newport naval training station. The radio reports said there was no sign of life, but the crews of the rescue ships which are standing by and being every effort possible to raise the U-boat were optimistic that some of the thirty-four men who went down might be alive.

The position of the S-51 is given as being about a mile and a half South of Southeast of that first given by the steamer City of Rome, which ran into the sub last night. Four submarines are among the rescue ships standing by and offering all aid possible.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Lieut. J. D. Glascock, of San Antonio, Texas, is among the missing in the submarine S-51 off

the Atlantic coast, according to a list of the missing given out this afternoon by the navy department. He was the only Texan on the crew of the vessel the list showed.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—The steamship City of Rome should have remained on the spot, unless urgently impelled to leave, after rescuing the submarine S-51 last night, Secretary Wilbur, of the navy department, declared today.

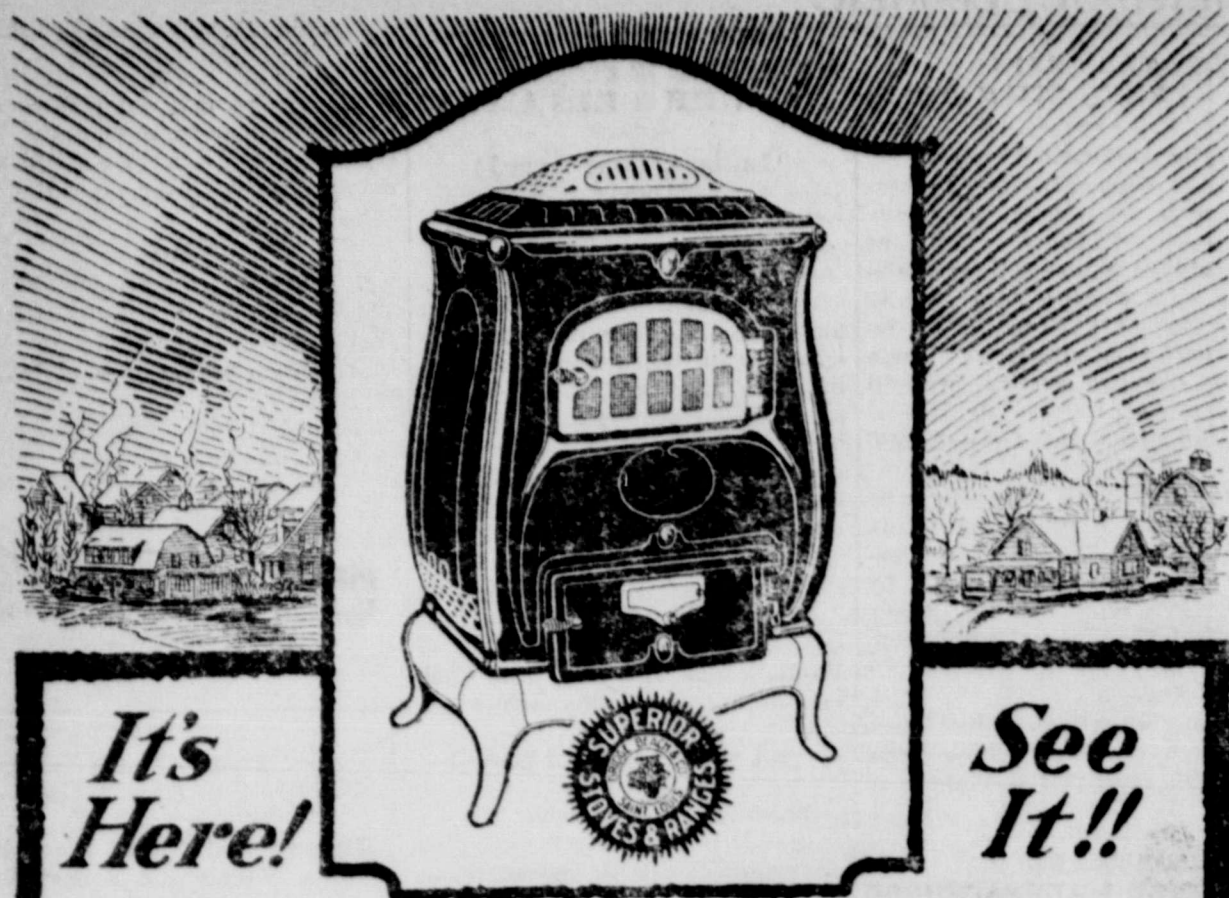
