35,298 BALES GINNED; HALF OF CROP IS IN

At the close of business last Saturday the gins in Runnels county had tied out 35,298 bales of cotton, according to figures compiled by the Ballinger Cotton Oil Company. They resumed operation Monday morning on full time with perhaps another 35,000 bales yet to be ginned.

Arthur Giesecke, manager of the local mill, made an estimate based on reports gained from seed haulers and gin men, and according to conservative opinions expressed by those whom he interrogated, about fifty per cent, or perhaps a little more, of the 1925 crop has been ginned. Some of the ginners expressed an opinion that more than half the cotton was out of the field, while others believe that less than half has been picked.

Those who have canvassed the situation estimate that the county

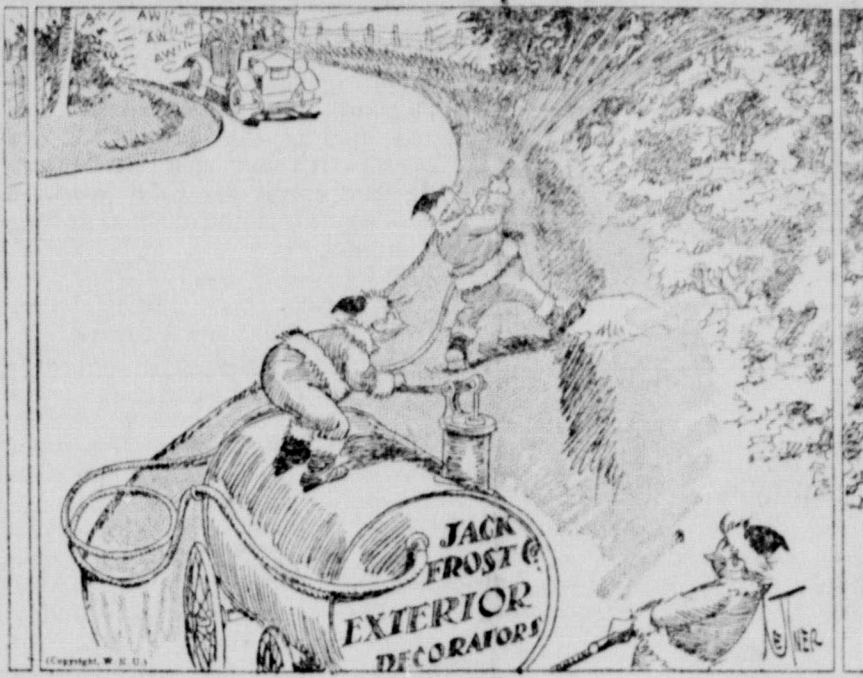
AUTO TOLL IN 10 STATES 114

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—Airplane accidents figured three in Sunday's news reports, with one fatality. Automobiles took a toll of seventeen lives in the Middle West. Five persons were killed by trains and more than a score were injured in various other mishaps.

In one of the airplane accidents, Marvin Goodwin, formerly manager of the Houston baseball club, and who was recently sold to the Cincinnati Nationals, was seriously hurt when his plane fell 200 feet at Houston.

Automobile fatalities in ten Middle Western states numbered fourteen. Four deaths occurred in auto accidents in Texas.

1 DEAD; ANOTHER IS DYING IN SHOOTING

TEXAN MISSING ON BURNED SHIP

PORT ARTHUR, Tex., Oct. 19.—Relatives of B. C. Ferrell, of Port Arthur, second officer on the steamship Comanche, which burned to the water's edge off the coast of Florida Saturday night, were concerned over his safety today. Repeated efforts to get in communication with Ferrell were made by his mother here, but so far they have brought no response.

The Comanche was burned Saturday night, and when fire was discovered on the vessel the band began playing a jazz tune to calm those on board until they could be taken from the ship in life boats.

Oldest—Biggest—Best

Pauline Bell, 25-year-old negress, died Monday morning, and Lorena Taylor, 9-year-old negro girl, was reported to be in a dying condition, as the result of wounds sustained when J. J. Roy, a negro man, fired on the negroes in a cotton picking camp near Marie Sunday. It was stated that there were no hopes for the negro girl.

Justice court convened in Ballinger at 1:00 o'clock Monday afternoon to take the testimony of eye-witnesses to the tragedy. It was said there were eleven negroes who witnessed the shooting. Roy was still at large late Monday. He left the scene of the shooting about.

A negro man and a negro girl are in a negro hotel in Ballinger in a dying condition, and a negro man at Marie is suffering with two bullet wounds in his arm as the result of a shooting at a negro cabin half a mile East of Marie about noon Sunday.

The shooting took place following a quarrel at a two-room shack where a party of cotton pickers were camped, and is alleged to have resulted from jealousy and from a quarrel over money matters. The officers are looking for a negro by the name

AUSTIN, Oct. 19.—Members of the state legislature who oppose the calling of a special session at this time totalled thirty-seven today, according to replies to inquiries sent out by the Associated Press as to whether they favored or opposed the special session. Thirteen members expressed themselves as being in favor of the special session, and eight said they were undecided.

YEGGS BLOWS SAFE; GET GOOD HAUL

URBANA, Ohio, Oct. 19.—A band of robbers held the citizens of North Lewisburg at bay this morning, blew the safe of the bank of that town, and escaped with considerable loot. Approximately \$3,500 in cash was taken by the bandits.

Telephone wires were cut before the robbers blew the safe. The cashier of the bank said that twelve explosions were heard and citizens who attempted to reach the bank following the explosions were ordered back by one of the bandits standing guard outside the building.

TROLLEY HITS TRUCK; 1 DEAD

WACO, Oct. 19.—G. W. James, age 50, a salesman for a local plumbing firm, was fatally burned today when a Texas Electric interurban car struck a motor truck which the man was driving East of Waco.

The truck immediately burst into flames after the impact, and James sustained injuries and burns which will prove fatal.

DAILY BULLETIN HAS
A BIRTHDAY

The Brownwood Bulletin came out with an anniversary section last Thursday, the occasion being to mark the twenty-fifth milestone in the life of the Bulletin.

On October 15, 1900, the first issue of the Bulletin was printed and distributed, and since that date the Bulletin has been a power for good in Brownwood, missing an issue only when the publishers deemed wise to observe some special holiday.

The Bulletin was established by Will H. Mayes, former lieutenant governor, and until a short time ago, dean of the school of journalism at the University of Texas. Since its birth, or about 1901, H. F. Mayes assumed business management of the plant, and is still directing the business end of the paper. Prior to that time Mr. Mayes was engaged in the newspaper business at Ballinger, owning the Banner Leader.

Twenty-two years ago James C. White became an employe of the paper, later becoming editor, and is today the managing editor of the Bulletin.

The anniversary section consisted of a brief history of the twenty-five years of continuous development of the Bulletin and Brownwood, together with reminiscences of early days in Brown county.

OSAKA, Japan, Oct. 19.—A statistician discovered that the Osaka central postoffice handled 4,172,829 cross-word puzzle replies from June 25 to August 31, which is nearly half the total amount of mail matter handled by the office during the same period.

The largest number received in one day was 223,297, on July 2. It was stated that if the total of cross-word replies were put from end to end they would reach from Tokyo to Kyoto.

of J. J. Roy, who is said to have done all the shooting.

According to a report of the trouble the negro Roy and Pauline Bell, age about 25, came to Runnels county together from Corpus Christi to pick cotton. About a week ago they fell out, and the woman left Roy and took up lodging at another negro cotton picker's camp. Sunday, Roy, with two other negro men, visited the cabin where Pauline Bell was staying, and Roy accused the negro of getting off with all the money when she left him. After a quarrel between the pair, the negro pulled a pistol and shot up the camp generally.

Apparently crazed with jealousy, Roy shot Modeste Wayne through the arm twice, turned the gun on Lorena Taylor, 9-year-old negro girl, and shot her through the lungs. Pauline Bell tried to flee from the scene of the shooting when Roy followed her, chasing her around the house and into a room where he shot her through the bowels.

There were several eye witnesses to the shooting, but none attempted to detain the negro who did the shooting, and after he had emptied his gun he made his escape and is still at large. Complaint has been filed in the justice court here charging the black with attempt and assault to murder, and if his victims die, which is thought probable, murder charges will be filed.

The negro woman and negro

girl were rushed to the sanitarium at Ballinger, and after an operation they were carried to the home of Alice Vernon, where it was said there was little hope for their recovery. The negro who was shot through the arm was given medical attention at Norton, and his condition is not serious.

After shooting three of the negroes, Roy fired five shots at

another bystander, but missed him, and fled.

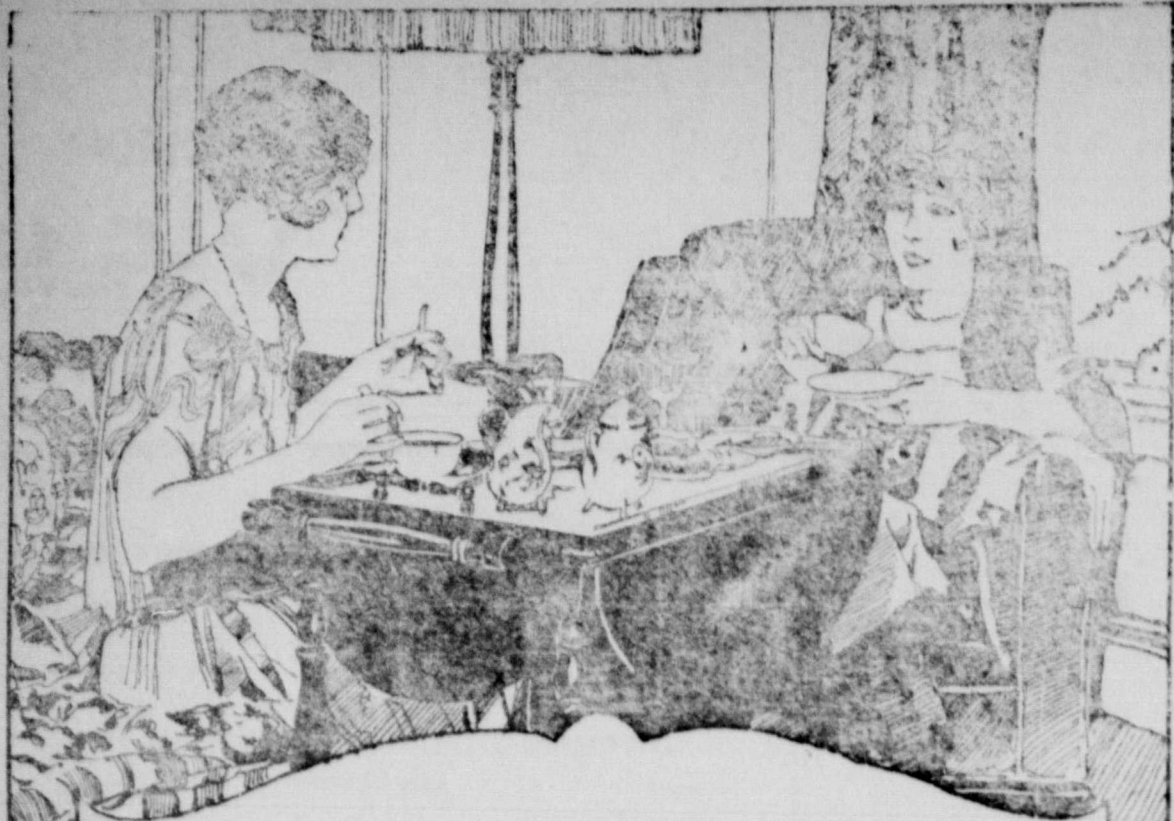
