NOTED BANDIT KILLED IN FIGHT

(By Associated Press)
MUSKEGON, Mich., Nov. 2.—A bandit was slain here Saturday after he had shot and fatally wounded Charles Hammond, a city detective. The man was positively identified today as "Dutch" Anderson, a notorious thug, and a pal of Gerald Chapman, the super-bandit.
The identification was made this morning by finger prints of the slain bandit and those on record in police Bertillon departments of Anderson. Secret service operators who are here today also aided in the identification.
Anderson went to his death fighting, and so did Hammond, who although fatally wounded, wrested the revolver from the bandit's hand in the alley in the shadow of the police station and then killed Anderson with the latter's own gun.
The arrest was made after Anderson, who had \$2,200 in counterfeit \$20 bills on his person, had passed on for a box of candy.

MARTIN DENIED A NEW HEARING

DALLAS, Nov. 2.—W. A. Martin, who was convicted of murder for the slaying of Deputy Sheriff R. B. Parsons of Denton county, and sentenced to 99 years in the penitentiary, was denied a new trial by District Judge C. A. Phippen here today.
A notice of appeal to the higher court was given by the defense counsel.

Completes Copy of Bible on Strip of Paper, Then Swoons
TOKYO, Nov. 2.—A complete copy of the Bible on a single strip of paper has been made by a Japanese Christian missionary, Dr. Ishizuka. The paper scroll is about 110 inches long and 30 inches broad. The strip can be read, but only with the aid of a magnifying glass. The text is in Japanese, more than 1,000,000 characters covering the scroll. It required four years and three months to complete. At its conclusion, Dr. Ishizuka fell into a long swoon.

BODY RECOVERED FROM SUBMARINE

TAX ASKED ON CEREAL DRINKS

WASHINGTON, November 2.—Prohibition enforcement officials today sought aid by the taxing power of the federal government as a means of checking what they described as "a tremendous flood of high-powered beer which is sweeping the nation."
A tax of one cent a gallon on cereal beverages was asked the House ways and means committee by Lincoln Andrews, assistant secretary of the treasury, in charge of prohibition enforcement.
This would afford the government the privilege of inspection of near-beer distilleries.

\$50,000 FIRE AT HOLLIDAY

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 2.—Fire which started in the business district of Holliday, fifteen miles South of here early this morning destroyed a cafe, a drug store, a filling station and a dance hall. The loss was estimated at \$50,000.

NEW PROJECTS GETS ATTENTION

The citizens from a large part of LaSalle county are at the present time very interested in a huge irrigation project that is being promoted there. At a recent meeting held in Cotulla a crowd of interested persons met and voted full confidence in their board of directors and told them to push the work forward. Water engineers and irrigation experts attended the meeting and added to the enthusiasm when they told what could be done on the project there. The project is estimated to cost \$7,331,000 and will place more than 100,000 acres under irrigation when completed.
It is proposed that a bond issue be voted on the district, which is approximately 88,000 acres and which has an assessed valuation at present of \$13,166,538. This is only about \$5.70 per acre valuation on this land and it is thought that with the land put under irrigation it will double and treble in a short time.
Parties in this section who are interested in the proposed district on Colorado River are watching the outcome of the LaSalle project with much interest.

CARS COLLIDE; 2 ARE INJURED

A bad car wreck occurred on the Ballinger-San Angelo highway Saturday afternoon in which an automobile and a motor truck were considerably smashed and several persons injured. A truck had been borrowed from the King-Holt Furniture Company and sent to San Angelo to bring back to Ballinger the produce which had been shown in the Rannels county booth at the All West Texas Exposition. The truck was driven by J. G. Brister and he loaded and left San Angelo about 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon.
According to a statement made by Mr. Brister he was about one mile East of Rowena when he started to pass a wagon which was ahead of him and as he turned his truck out to pass the wagon a high-powered car coming from the opposite direction collided with him. The drivers could not see each other for the wagon until Mr. Brister pulled the truck from behind the wagon and when he did the two machines collided head-on.
Mrs. Brister and three-year-old baby were in the truck with Mr. Brister. Mr. and Mrs. Brister were brought to Ballinger suffering with a number of injuries, but the baby was not hurt in any way.
The car which collided with the truck was reported to have been driven by John Casper.

J. F. MANSKER PASSES AWAY
J. F. Mansker died at the Halley & Love Sanitarium Monday morning at 1:30 o'clock. He had been in that institution for about one year suffering with an incurable disease and death relieved him of the suffering of this world. Mr. Mansker was 86 years and 6 months old at the time of his death and was one of the real pioneers of this country. He moved here in the early days and settled in South Ballinger, erecting the first house in that part of town. He was well known not only by the old timers but with the present citizenship of this county and many friends are today mourning his death.
The body was prepared by Undertakers Jennings and Crews and is being held at the Higginbotham undertaking parlors until time for the funeral which will be Wednesday afternoon at 3:30. It was at first thought that the funeral would be held Wednesday morning, but a daughter at Detroit, Michigan wired Monday that she had missed a train connection and would not arrive in Ballinger until Wednesday afternoon. The service will be held at the First Christian Church with Rev. Ius Q. McCorkle in charge, and Rev. W. H. Doss assisting.
Mr. Mansker was born in Gallatin county, Tennessee on April 14, 1839. He moved from Tennessee in the early days and has been a citizen of this county since that time.
Interment will be made in Evergreen Cemetery with the local Masonic organizations in charge. Mr. Mansker joined the King Solomon Lodge No. 94 at Gallatin, Tenn., in July 1865 and has been a member of that order since that date. His membership has been the local lodge for the past 15 years and he was one of the oldest Masons belonging here.

TREASURY WILL PAY ALL DEBTS

AUSTIN, Nov. 2.—Gregory Hatcher, state treasurer, today declared that the state is still on a cash basis and that all warrants presented at the treasury department will be paid in full.
This is made possible, it is said, through the co-operation of Austin and Dallas banks with which Hatcher has arranged to meet the October payroll for state employees amounting to more than \$500,000.

TURKS MOVE AGAINST MOSUL

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Nov. 2.—A special dispatch to the London Daily Mail from Syria says that large bodies of Turkish troops are moving towards the Mosul district from Turkey.
The London Daily Press has a similar report and it puts the number of Turks engaged in the operation at 5,000 men and adds that the French authorities have given them permission to cross Syria. This report also says that Great Britain has protested to the French government.
The suggestion is that the French commanders in Syria are fearing the Turkish preparations and intend to check British action against the Mosul boundary.

MITCHELL TRIAL STARTED TODAY

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, November 2.—Col. William S. Mitchell, on trial by court martial which resulted from his criticism of the conduct of the government's air services, today asked the court to summon Secretary Davis of the war department and Secretary Wilbur of the navy department, as witnesses.
After rejecting another motion by Mitchell's counsel to dismiss the charges on the grounds that the court had no jurisdiction, the prosecution called to the stand its first witness, A. W. Yeager, a reporter from the San Antonio, Texas, Light, and to whom Mitchell gave a copy of his San Antonio statement containing accusations that led to his court martial. Yeager said that the colonel gave him the statement on September 5th.

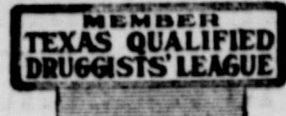

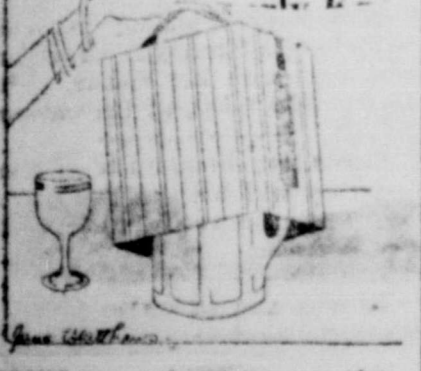

TO AMUSE

Corinne Griffith in New Screen Play at Queen

Corinne Griffith cannot receive too much praise for the superb manner in which she dramatically interprets the role of Lady Helen Haden in the First National production, "De-classe," which opened at the Queen Theatre this afternoon for a two-day run.

Never has the little star lent herself to a part more admirably suited to her dramatic ability. It might have been written for her. Her gowns represent the latest fashions of this country and abroad.

The skillful touch of Director Robert G. Vignola evidenced itself throughout. Lloyd Hughes, in a not overly sympathetic part in the beginning, proves himself capable of handling a difficult role. Clive Brook, a newcomer to motion pictures from the English stage, performs creditably as Solomon. 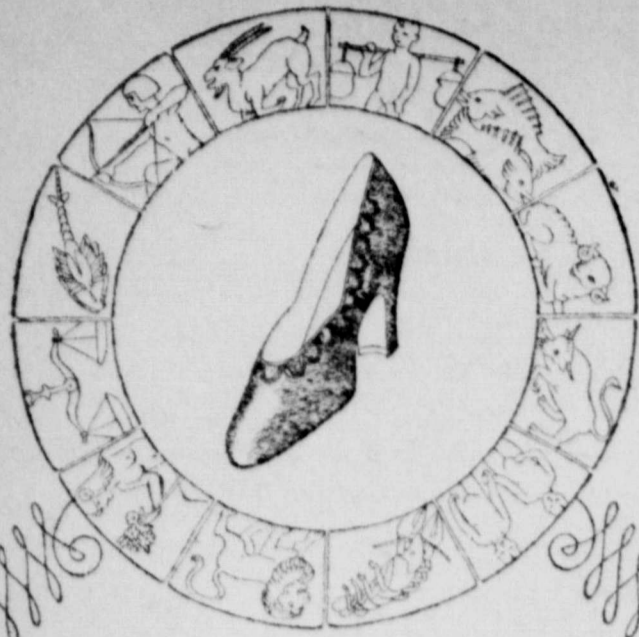

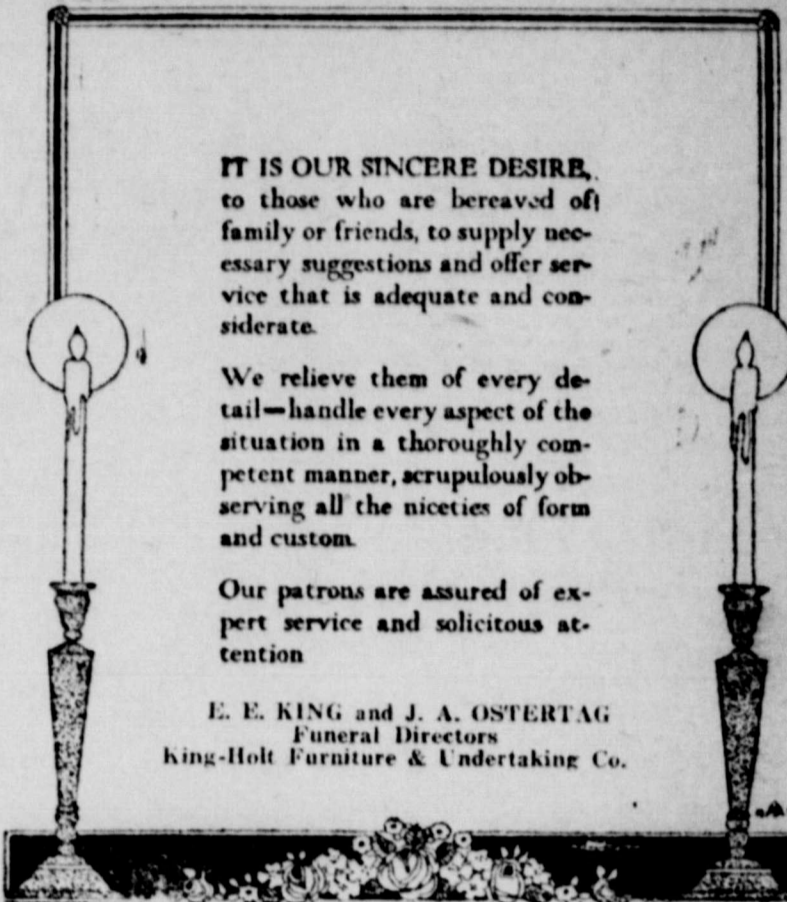
