Admission will be \$5 per person.

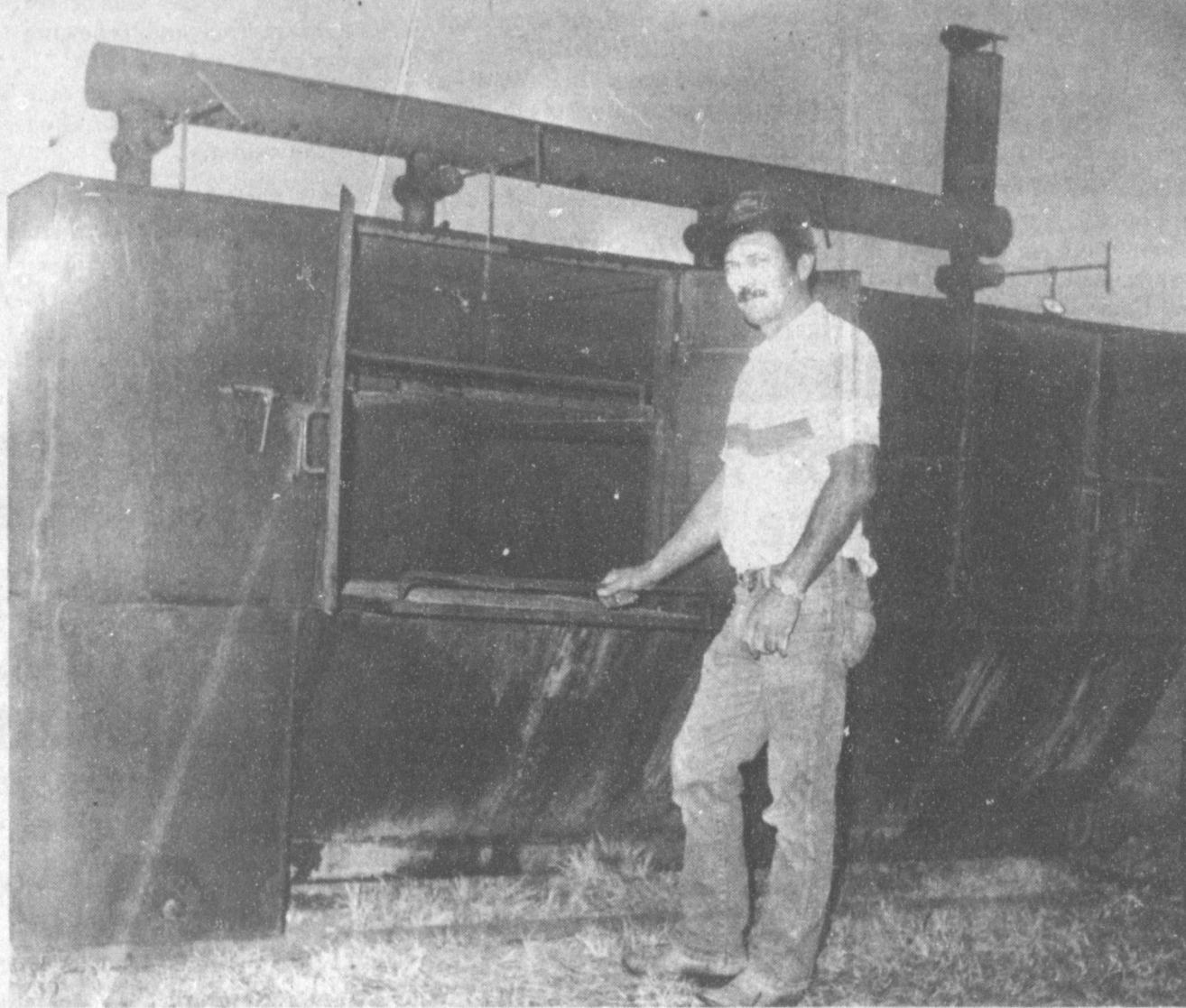

District Approves Required Improvement To Meet Deadline

During the meeting of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board of Directors Wednesday night, a large number of items were discussed, with several being approved.

Immediately after opening the meeting, an Executive Session to consider personnel was properly moved from late in the agenda, with an immediate session being conducted by board members in the board room. On coming out of executive session, no action was taken and Board President Tim Campbell explained that though board members held a discussion on a doctor to provide emergency room coverage at the hospital, no final decision was made during the session.

John Chisholm, administrator of Muleshoe Area Medical Center explained that with the affiliation with Methodist Hospital, Steve Grappe had moved permanently to Amherst and would be working with the Muleshoe facility.

Grappe, representing Methodist Hospital, has suggested that Methodist will cover the initial cost of recruiting new doctors for Muleshoe, which is expected to cost around \$18,000. MAHD would then reimburse Methodist at a later date.

Will Receive

Local Passes

Muleshoe Independent School District Superintendent told *The Journal* late last week, "It is the intent of the Muleshoe Independent School District to support you, as senior citizens of our community, as you support the activities of our students."

"Therefore, the MISD Board of Trustees has elected to present to you a MISD Local Pass, which allows you to attend locally sponsored school events at no cost. The MISD Local Pass will replace the 65-or-over Club cards held now.

Persons eligible for the MISD Local Pass include all school employees; school board members; senior citizens (age 65 or over) and local news media.

Limitations of the MISD Local Pass are A. Good only for events sponsored by the Muleshoe Independent School District (This includes district and non-district athletic events.); B. Certain District 2-AAA or Regional activities, even though they may be held in Muleshoe, are not covered by this pass. (e.g. district 2AAA One Act Plays.); C. The MISD Local Pass is not acceptable for activities such as dinner theatre productions, suppers, etc.; D. The MISD Local Pass covers only one admittance and is non-transferable; and E. The MISD Local Pass is not acceptable for department activities (such as speech/drama, home economics, etc.) used as fund raisers unless approved by the sponsor and/or principal.

Senior citizens wishing to receive a MISD Local Pass card may go by the School Administration Office at 514 West Avenue G.

Acreage Measurements Need Special Attention

Measuring service adjustment leads the August report from Danny Noble, County Executive Director of the Bailey County ASC office.

MEASURING SERVICE

Remember!! As soon as the ASC office gets your farm measured, you will be notified of the measured acreage, and you only have five workdays in which to adjust (if any) and certify your acres in the ASC office.

Noble says, "Please notify this office if you have to adjust prior to plowing anything up. If you requested measurement service on corn, please be sure that we have completed the measurement service before cutting it for silage or grain. Failure to certify prior to harvesting could cause your farm to be out of compliance."

MAINTENANCE OF ACR AND CRP

Weed control measures MUST be carried out in a timely manner on acreage designated as ACR throughout the calendar year. Weed control measures also MUST be carried out timely on CRP land throughout the lifespan of the CRP contract. Failure to control noxious weeds will result in total loss of the farm program benefits and/or your CRP contract.

Muleshoe Resident in Abandoned House Fire

Editors Note: The following article was taken from Friday morning's addition of the Amarillo Daily News:

Castro County authorities are probing unusual circumstances surrounding the death Wednesday of a 33-year-old Department of Agriculture employee found burned in an abandoned farmhouse.

Sherry Dawn Powers of Hereford died at 3:18 p.m. Wednesday at Lubbock General Hospital.

According to Joe Hoard, a Castro County deputy investigating the incident, the sheriff's office received a call at 10:34 a.m. Tuesday about a burning structure nine miles northwest of Dimmitt.

When Hoard arrived, ambulance attendants were bringing Powers out of the burning abandoned farmhouse.

Hoard said the farmhouse, which was attached to a railroad car, had been vacant for several years. The structure had no working utilities and no cause for the blaze has been established. The state fire marshal's office is investigating the fire.

He said he has not determined why Powers was in the structure. Her car was parked outside.

An employee of the Hereford office of the ASCS, Powers had been at the office the morning of her death, ASCS Office Manager Ted Peabody said. Powers, he said, left the building during her break Wednesday morning, say-

EMERGENCY HAYING AND GRAZING

If anyone is going to hay or graze ACR and/or CU acres for pay during the 5-month restricted period (May 15 through October 14) you MUST come into the ASC office and designate the ACR or CU to be hayed or grazed before any haying or grazing occurs during the consecutive 5-month restricted period and sign a register.

COLLECTING 1988 deficiency overpayments

Congress passed, and the President signed into law, the 1989 Fiscal Year Dire Emergency Supplemental Legislation. This act includes a provision that changes the due date for repaying over payments of 1988 deficiency payments to December 31, 1989.

This includes advance payments not earned because:

1. Producers did not earn deficiency payments for any production for which disaster payments were made.
2. The final payment rate is less than the advance rate, as in the case of barley, oats, and possibly corn.

LAND DEVOTED TO NON-AGRICULTURAL USE

The County Committee is now required in November of each year, beginning in 1989, to review all appropriate records including aerial photographs and ASCS-578's to determine whether land has been devoted to non-agricultural uses. Owners will be notified in writing of such findings and of their appeal rights.

INTEREST RATE

The loan interest rate for August is 8.125 percent.

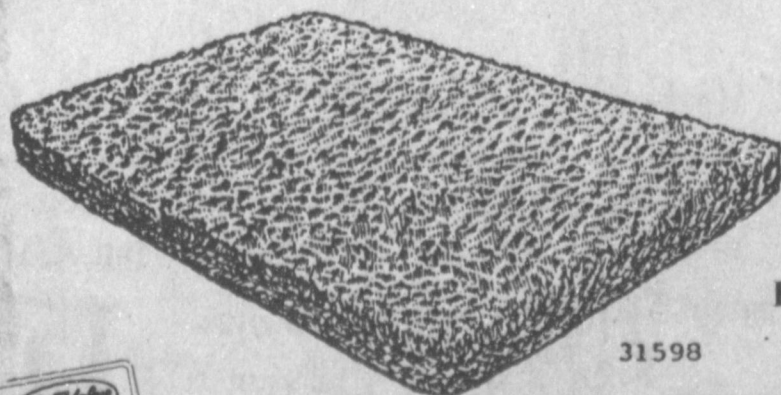

Hunting, Fishing 1989 Licenses On Sale

Texas hunting and fishing licenses now are available at Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices and retail license outlets across the state.

Current hunting and fishing licenses and stamps expire Aug. 31 and the new licenses take effect Sept. 1.

New hunting and fishing regulations guides also should be available from most outlets this week, officials said. The free guides contain information on license and stamp requirements, seasons, bag limits and other useful information.

The Texas Legislature made very few changes in hunting and fishing license requirements or fees for the coming fiscal year. The fee for the resident alligator hunting license was increased from \$25 to \$35. The resident hunting license remains priced at \$10, residential fishing is \$8 and the resident combination hunting and fishing license still is \$15. Special stamps include the Texas Waterfowl Stamp (\$5), White-winged Dove Stamp (\$6), Salt-water Sportfishing Stamp (\$5), and Freshwater Trout Stamp (\$5). In addition, waterfowl hunters are required to have a Federal Duck Stamp (\$12.50), available from most post offices.

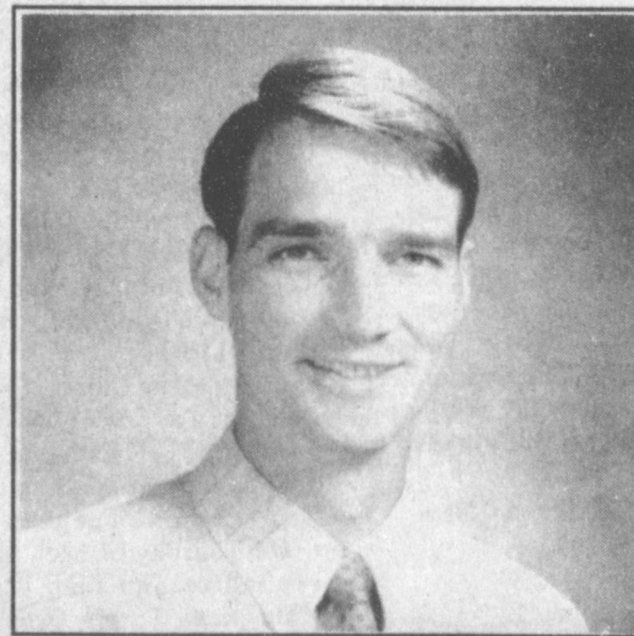

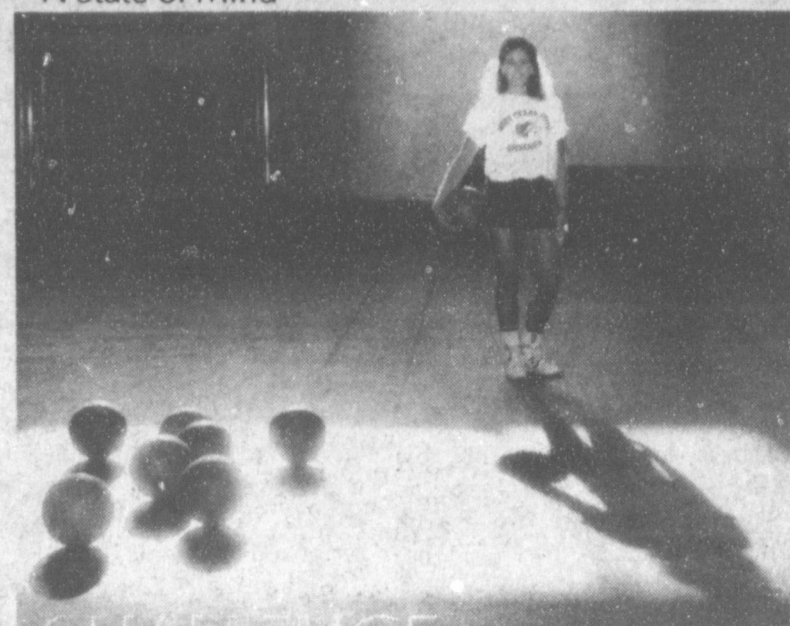

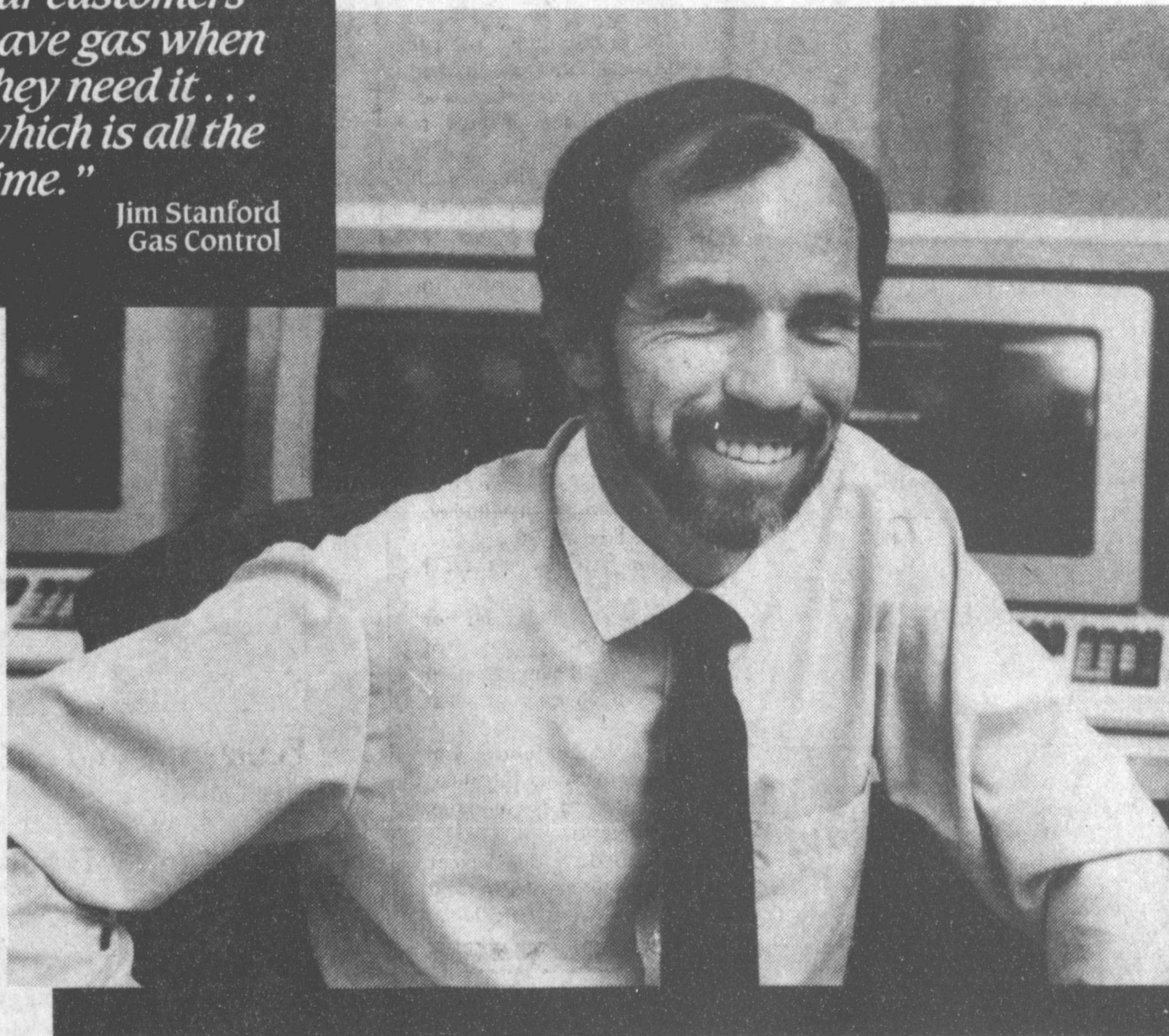

Crane Hunt Area Will Be Expanded

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is proposing to expand the area open for sandhill crane hunting this fall.

Ron George, sandhill crane program leader, said lesser sandhill cranes which have traditionally wintered in West Texas have been increasing in number and expanding their range eastward along the Red, Brazos and Colorado River drainages.

The area proposed for inclusion is bounded roughly by Childress, Abilene and Junction on the west, and Interstate Highway 35 and 35-W on the east. It would add portions of the Rolling Plains, Cross Timbers and the northern Edwards Plateau ecological areas.

George said approximately 15,000 to 20,000 sandhill cranes now winter in North Central Texas outside the legal hunting

area where they cause locally heavy damage to winter wheat. "An open season in this area should reduce crop depredation complaints and permit additional hunting opportunities for Texas sportsmen," George said.

The season opening proposed for this new area (designated as Zone B) would be delayed until late November or early December to ensure that all of the endangered whooping cranes which migrate through this area have had time to reach their wintering grounds on the Texas coast. A 72-day season is proposed for Zone B.

George said Zone C in South Texas has the shortest proposed season (37 days) due to the need to prevent overharvest of greater and intermediate sandhill cranes which winter primarily in South Texas.

The sandhill crane population

in Zone A (West Texas) is mainly comprised of lesser sandhill cranes which are the most numerous of the three subspecies wintering in Texas. The proposed season for Zone A is 93 days long.

Proposed season dates are: Zone A, Nov. 11-Feb. 11; Zone B, Nov. 25-Feb. 4; and Zone C, Jan.

6-Feb. 11. Shooting hours would be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. The proposed bag limit is three per day, six in possession. These proposals are scheduled to be considered by the Parks and Wildlife Commission on Aug. 31.

Persons wishing to comment on proposed sandhill crane hunting regulations may do so by writing Ron George at TPWD

Headquarters or by calling 1-800-792-1112 or (512) 389-4778.

A free Federal Sandhill Crane Hunting Permit is required in addition to a valid hunting license to legally hunt cranes in Texas. Permits may be obtained by submitting in writing the

name and address of each hunter to any of the following TPWD offices or the Buffalo Lake National Wildlife Refuge, Box 228, Umbarger, TX 79091, (806) 499-3382, or the Muleshoe NWR Box 549, Muleshoe, TX 79347, (806) 946-3341.
