## 3 DEAD IN MEXICO'S WAR ON CHURCHES

(By Associated Press)  
TEPIC, Nayarit, Mexico, March 12.—Three representatives of the state government of Nayarit are dead and a number of people injured, one girl being near death, as the result of a disturbance caused when orders for closing a Catholic church here were carried out.  
The government authorities were met by armed opposition from the church followers, and three state officers were killed in the fighting.  
Closing the church was a part of the campaign being carried on for the enforcement of the law prohibiting foreigners from teaching religion in schools.

### Male Dance Partners Wanted in London

LONDON, March 12.—Dance partners for women, that is, presentable partners who are skilled dancers and can keep up a respectable conversation in any company, are becoming a real luxury in London.  
The demand for "professional partners," who do not look as if they were "professional," is so keen on the Riviera that London lounge loafers have nearly all gone South. The rumors that Nice and Cannes are filled with elderly women who will pay presentable escorts five pounds a night and all expenses caused an exodus from London cafes.

## BLAST REVEALS LIQUOR STILL

CHICAGO, March 12.—An explosion of a liquor still in a North Side building today did little damage but revealed to the authorities one of the largest illicit alcohol plants yet found in this city.  
The big plant consisted of four stills each with an estimated capacity of 10,000 gallons per week. Six vats were found in the building, each with a capacity of 10,000 gallons and five of them were filled and in operation when the explosion occurred.  
Officers got busy following the disclosure and an investigation will probably lead to filing of charges and arrests.

## T. L. & P. CO. TO EXTEND ITS LINE

HUNTSVILLE, March 12.—Maintaining his innocence until the very last, William Vaughn, negro, was electrocuted at the state prison here today. Vaughn went to the chair early this morning and in his last statement he declared that he was not guilty.  
The negro was found guilty and sentenced to die for an attack upon a young white girl at San Antonio.

## THOMAS FELDER DIES SUDDENLY

SAVANNAH, Ga., March 12.—Thomas Felder, of New York, died suddenly here today.

NEW YORK, March 12.—Thomas Felder, who died suddenly in Savannah today, was convicted here last year with Gaston B. Means, former department of justice agent, for conspiring to bribe government officials in a fraud case. The two men were charged with conspiracy in connection with the Crager system glass casket fraud case in 1923. They were convicted and fined \$10,000.

## LEAGUE TALKS OF GERMANY

GENEVA, March 12.—Representatives of the allied powers and Germany met for two hours today to discuss the difficulties which have arisen over the plan for Germany's admission to the League of Nations, and elevation to a seat in the league council.  
After the session members taking part in the discussion gave out the impression that the situation was brighter, and there are prospects of settling the difficulties.

## HEAVY FROST; DAMAGE LIGHT

(By Associated Press)  
DALLAS, March 12.—While frost last night was heavy in the lowlands and other sections of the Texas fruit belt, little damage is believed to have resulted, according to reports received here by the weather bureau.  
Rising temperature has been predicted for tonight and tomorrow.

The temperature dropped to thirty-two degrees above zero early Friday morning and a blanket of frost formed over this section. While tender vegetation suffered blight, it is the opinion of most of those reporting that the fruit crop escaped serious damage.  
Orchards throughout the country were veritable flower gardens, peach, plum and apricot trees being in full bloom, and many trees were putting on foliage. The tender foliage in some places appeared to be nipped by the freeze, but where the fruit was protected by the blossom it is not thought damage will result.

It was what the weather man calls a "wet frost."

## CLAIMS BROWN LEADS EASTLAND IN OIL FLOW

It has been stated on good authority that Brown county is now leading Eastland county in the daily production of oil. Those in position to know say that Brown county is now producing about 3,500 barrels every twenty-four hours and this beats what is being done in the fields of Eastland. Starting out of Brownwood, the traveler now sees scores of pipe lines, water lines, oil lines and gas lines crossing the road and leading to productive localities, while along almost all the roads innumerable derricks may be seen which indicates that a great season of oil activity is setting in for this part of Texas. —Brownwood Bulletin.

## FORT FIRES ON TWO JAP BOATS

PEKING, March 12.—While two Japanese destroyers were proceeding up the Pei River below Tientsin today, they were fired on from a fort near the mouth of the river.  
Troops of the national army are in charge of the fort from whence the firing came. Machine guns and field batteries were used in the bombardment and one of the Japanese officers and two men were wounded.

**SHIPPING TRUCK  
OUT OF LAREDO**

(By Associated Press)

LAREDO, March 12.—Winter vegetables are rolling out of the Laredo district at a heavy rate daily now both by freight and express. A report made by the International Great Northern Railway Company shows that from November 4, 1925 to February 26, 1926, 685 carloads were moved and shipments were continuing heavy.

The report showed the following shipments of vegetables during the period covered in the report: spinach, 374 carloads; green beans, 2 carloads; beets, 12 carloads; cabbage, 30 carloads; carrots, 75 carloads; lettuce, 5 carloads; mixed vegetables, 82 carloads; mustard greens, 27 carloads; onion sets, 15 carloads; romaine, 2 carloads; tomatoes, 48 carloads. In addition to the local vegetables, there was shipped from here 10 carloads of onions and three carloads of tomatoes imported from Mexico.

The movement of the Bermuda onion crop from the Laredo district by special trainloads is expected to begin within the next 15 or 20 days. Present indications are that from 1,500 to 2,000 carloads of onions will be handled out of Laredo.

After the first thousand carloads of onions have been shipped from the district, the shipments will be taken over by the committee appointed by onion growers at a recent meeting held in Laredo, and the prorating of daily shipments among the various growers will restrict the daily marketing to that number of carloads calculated to hold up prices and reap good returns for the growers.

The committee in each onion growing community represented in the Laredo conference will abide by this agreement, so there is no possibility of oversupplying the market and the consequent demoralization of prices, such as has been experienced in other years.

At each place a five-stand seventy saw plant will be put in operation with the beginning of the 1926 cotton season. The plants will be equipped with electric power and current will be furnished by the West Texas Utilities Company.

Mr. Pearson was for many years manager of the Ballinger cotton oil mill, and is an experienced gin and mill man.

Mr. Guin was connected with oil mills and gins in Ballinger and at Winters for several years before going to Atlanta, Georgia, where he represented one of the big wholesale gin supply houses. He recently returned to Ballinger and joined Mr. Pearson in the building of the two new gins.

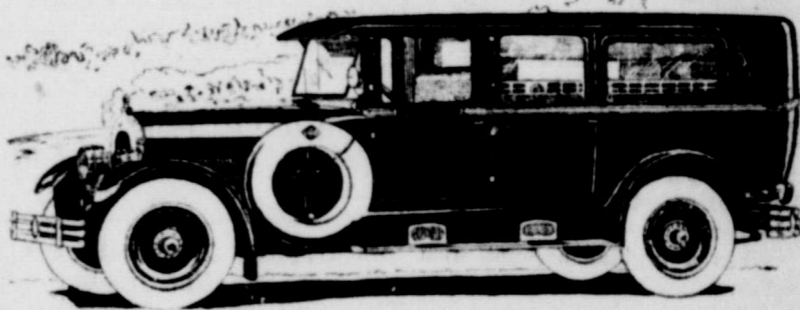
