## RUNNELS FAIR DID NOT LOSE MONEY

For six years in succession the Runnels County Fair has made money. However, the 1926 fair did not make as much as has been made on previous occasions and it was all on account of the rainfall that was recorded each of the five days of the fair program last week.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce Wednesday, a report was heard from the fair association by its secretary, J. D. Motley, who is also secretary of the chamber of commerce.

"The Fair Association cleared approximately \$500," Mr. Motley said, "we would have cleared more had the weather been agreeable. As it was the association took in between \$7,500 and \$8,000 with expenses estimated at about \$7,000. With clear weather the association would easily have collected during the four days between \$12,000 and \$15,000."

During the six years' life of the Runnels County Fair, each year's program has been more than self-supporting, with no exceptions. The association would have been enabled to make further improvements at the park had the rain been delayed one week this year.

"The association has never lost money," Mr. Motley declared, "but there is a deficit, although it is not due to any one of the six shows. It comes from improvements that have been made at Fair Park during the past two years. Of the \$15,000 capital stock of the association, there is some \$3,000 that has never been subscribed. There is approximately \$1,000 worth of the stock that has been subscribed but the money has never been collected."

At the chamber of commerce directors' meeting Wednesday ten of the board subscribed for ten shares each in the fair association and they will hold these shares until the association finds a market for the stock. This was purchased in addition to that which they already had purchased some time ago. The chamber underwrote the remainder of the stock and will hold it also until the association is prepared to sell it and get back even after the improvements are paid for.

There will be a meeting of the executive committee of the fair association in a few days, and the fair board will also be called together in the immediate future. Dates for the 1927 fair will probably be set within the next few weeks, Mr. Motley asserted.

In the past, excessive radiation has sometimes resulted in dangerous burns to the patient. This hazard will be eliminated by the use of the new registering clock, Dr. Strauss said.

## EXPECT TO SHIP 35,000 TURKEYS

Runnels county's turkey crop for the 1926 Thanksgiving and Christmas season is expected to run more than 35,000 fowls this year, local dealers and packers forecast. In 1925 there were some 25,000 turkeys shipped from this county to Eastern and Northern markets, which is an equivalent of about 300,000 pounds or 15 carloads of dressed turkeys.

The 1926 crop is estimated to be about 35,000 fowls other than the many consumed at home during the turkey season.

While the Thanksgiving shipping season does not open until November 1, the dealers here believe the price per pound will range around 25 cents. They are now bringing 20 cents per pound. The crop this year other than being larger than last year is also regarded as much better than in 1925 and the birds are thought to be more numerous in adjoining counties. This county will also get a large number of turkeys from Comcho, Coleman and Coke counties.

At the number estimated to be shipped from Ballinger at 25 cents per pound, the total in dollars and cents will be more than \$105,000. Runnels county is a good poultry county but the number of turkeys that are expected to be shipped out this year is below that of other counties in this section.

HAVANA, Oct. 20.—Havana was struck by a West Indies hurricane today, with wind velocity reaching from 120 miles to 150 miles per hour. The streets were flooded and littered with debris.

The storm as it left Cuba headed Northeastward. It was indicated that the storm was traveling about ten miles per hour and was headed for Key West, Florida.

A few persons have been slightly injured but no loss of life has been reported.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Hurricane warnings again flew over Southern Florida today in the face of an approaching gale. This morning the disturbance was reported to be central near Gerona on the South coast of Western Cuba and moving North-Northeast.

The Weather Bureau predicted that Northeast winds would increase the reach of the hurricane force late today over the extreme portion of Southern Florida.

HAVANA, Oct. 20.—A heavy storm struck Havana today, flooding the streets, stopping transportation and putting the power systems out of commission. The city is cut off from communication with the interior.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 20.—All communication with Havana via Key West, was lost by the Western Union Telegraph Company here today.

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 20.—More than 150 homes were demolished in the Vibora and Jesus del monte residential districts of Havana today by the hurricane which swept through the Western part of Cuba, according to advices received by the local Cuban consulate.

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 20.—Steadily increasing wind and falling of the barometer was registered at Key West this morning, the Miami Daily News was advised by telephone.

The wind was reported at a speed of 35 miles per hour.

Over in Ellis county, one of the banner cotton counties of Texas, the women have taken a pledge to wear cotton clothes wherever practicable. They are on the right track to help boost the price of cotton. The world is not long on cotton, but the people are short on clothes.

It is a penitentiary offense to steal chickens, the value of the chickens considered. At the prevailing price of eggs and poultry, a thief does not have to pull many hens from the roost before he becomes subject to a prison penalty. A man who steals chickens would steal a horse, cow, auto, or anything else he thought he could get away with, and therefore is entitled to the same punishment that the law fixes for stealing a fiver.

"Infamous lie, political falsehood," with other comment, is the response coming from Jim Ferguson as witnesses testify before the investigating committee that Ferguson got the money here and there for "carrying in the wood and water" for the governor. It was naturally to be expected that Mr. Ferguson would get mad when the boys began telling ugly stories on him. Who wouldn't?

Chopping sixty-odd dollars per bale off cotton within a period of five or six months is calculated to cripple the South's pocket-book, but times are not so distressing as the blow to the cotton market might indicate. The people have been longing for a bumper crop, and they got it, and maybe the results will teach us a lesson. If all the cotton that could be produced in the South every year brought two-bits per bale, somebody would have more money than they know what to do with while the rest of the world would go hungry. Cotton cannot take the place of food, and there are some things money cannot buy.

The feeling in the Norris murder trial at Fort Worth, which is scheduled for November 1st, was no doubt made more acute Tuesday when the mayor of that city issued an ultimatum prohibiting a parade which Norris' followers, said to be 10,000 strong, were planning on the eve of the trial. Norris is charged with killing a friend of the mayor, and the murder grew out of statements which Norris made from the pulpit about the mayor. It goes without saying that the court will never be able to convict the preacher as the killing took place under circumstances altogether favorable for Norris, but the point we wish to make is that there is entirely too much grandstand play in such cases for the best interests of the public. Justice is often defeated by creating a sentiment which cripples the court in trying the case on its merits. Fort Worth will be indeed fortunate if more lives are not sacrificed on its altar of strife and factionalism.

**LOUISIANA CAMPAIGN IS ONE OF LANGUAGES**

(By Associated Press)

BATON ROUGE, La., Oct. 20.—He spoke to the voters in French from platforms in the Southern parishes, he addressed them in the King's English in North Louisiana; he "harangued" crowds in the Creole "patios" and in straight-from-the-shoulder American language.

And at the end of his campaign in the Democratic primary Dudley J. LeBlanc, of Abbeville, scion of an old Louisiana French family, emerged with a lead of 15,462 votes.

LeBlanc's campaign was unique. Louisiana is divided, racially speaking, into North Louisiana and South Louisiana. North Louisiana is settled by the stock which is to be found in practically all other Southern states. South Louisiana's people are often descendants of the old French settlers, but most of them claim as forebears those famed Acadians who drifted down the Atlantic coast with Evangeline, Longfellow's heroine. These latter are commonly known as "Cajuns."

So in South Louisiana he made his promises in French; in North Louisiana he made the same promises in English.

**70,000 Corporations Use Delaware State Charters**

DOVER, Dela., Oct. 19.—Attracted to this state by one of the most liberal general incorporation laws found in the union, between 65,000 and 70,000 corporations throughout the nation today are doing business under Delaware charters.

The feature of the law which has made the state a Mecca to incorporators are few, but compelling. It is easy to comply with. It is speedy in operation. And it restricts the state's interest in, and supervision over, its charter holders to the apparent minimum compatible with the protection of stockholders.

Financially, Delaware requires an organization fee of ten cents per \$1,000 for the first \$2,000,000 of authorized capitalization, and five cents per \$1,000 thereafter. Upon issues of no-par stock an arbitrary value of \$100 per share is set, for the purpose of taxation only. Because of this latter provision, the total corporate value of Delaware charters is undeterminable.

The annual tax also is levied on the basis of authorized capitalization. Simple annual reports are necessary, but they do not require disclosure of the corporations financial affairs. Of all the company's books and records, only an original or duplicate stock ledger must be kept in Delaware. Here, except for provisions safeguarding stockholders, the state's interest ceases.

Stock held by non-residents is not taxed, nor is it subject to an inheritance levy. The corporation itself has no income tax to pay.

Incorporation can be completed within 24 hours. The incorporators need not personally appear or even be named. They may attend their first incorporators' meeting by proxy; the minutes and stock ledger will be mailed to them anywhere in the United States. Stockholders' and directors' meetings may be held anywhere.

Other powers of a Delaware corporation include issuance of any class of stock desired, with or without voting powers, and with no limitation upon the relative amounts issued or the rate of dividends.

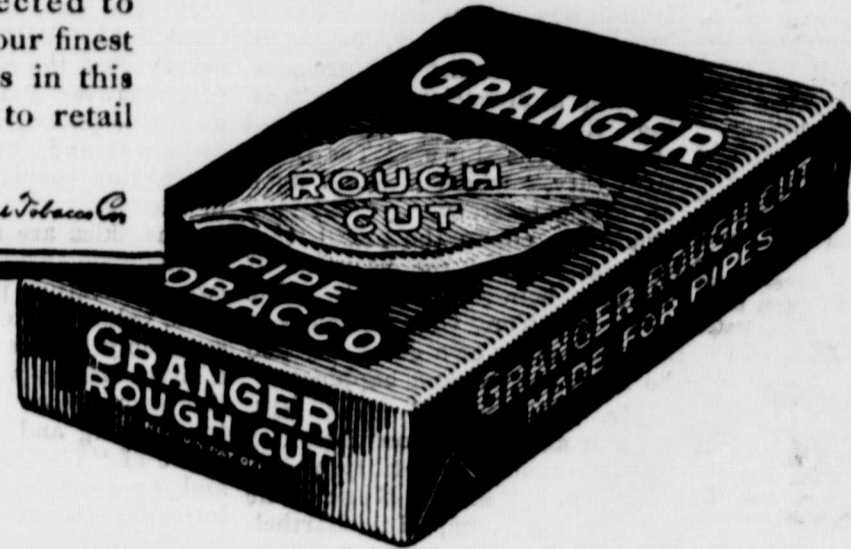

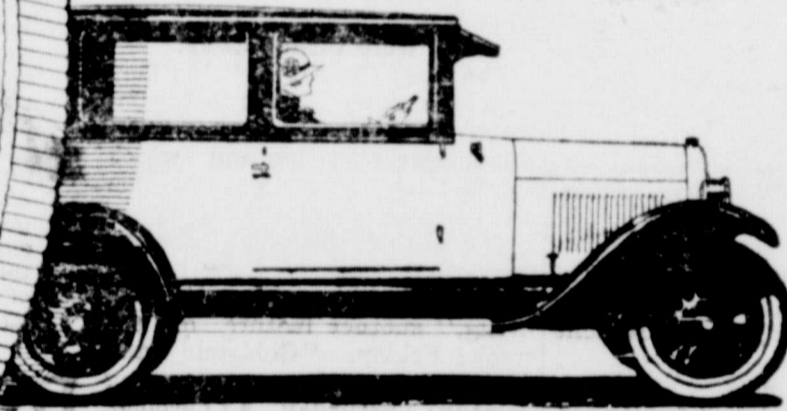

**TEXAS SKIES OFFER NEW EFFECT IN PHOTOGRAPHY**

(By Associated Press)

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 20.—Discovery that the cumulous clouds of Southwest Texas act as a remarkable photographic filter that gives soft and beautiful effects for motion pictures, has resulted in successful experiments whereby the skies are now being used as the principal background for two big feature productions.

The value of backlighted clouds, commonly known as clouds with a silver lining, was first brought into prominence by Director Victor Fleming and Cameraman Jas. Howe of "The Rough Riders," and is now being used to a revolutionary extent in "Wings."

J. H. Jarboe, of the U. S. Weather Bureau, explained that the white, fleecy Texas clouds register on film while the California clouds scarcely do at all, because the former have less moisture and therefore less density, permitting the sun's rays to penetrate. Also, being light and evanescent, they are swept in rapidly changing formations by the Gulf breeze. The density of the rolling California clouds hides the sun cast a shadow that permits no exposure on negative.

**SACRED OPERETTA AT COTTON PALACE**

"The Birth of the Messiah" to Be Presented in Coliseum Free on First Two Sunday Afternoons.

Waco, Texas.—Central Texas patrons of the 1926 Texas Cotton Palace exposition will this year have the opportunity of witnessing one of the most imposing spectacles in the annals of grand opera. The Thaviu organization, coming direct from the Sesqui-Centennial exposition at Philadelphia, offers a diversification in amusement features which can not be exceeded.

"The Birth of the Messiah," said to be the most impressive of sacred operettas, will be presented in the coliseum on the first two Sunday afternoons, beginning October 24. Critics of opera who are acquainted with the theme are especially enthusiastic over the fact that "The Birth of the Messiah" has been booked for the Cotton Palace. It is generally conceded to be the most inspiring and educational personification of Biblical history ever set to music.

Grand opera will also be the night attraction in the coliseum throughout the first week, and the afternoons will be filled with concerts and entertainments by the score or more of artists, in addition to the band, which comes to the exposition with the Thaviu organization. Supervision of the stage production will be under the personal direction of A. F. Thaviu, and a new system, an innovation in the annals of Cotton Palace theatricals, will be the presentation of all coliseum attractions absolutely free to the patrons who have paid the front gate admission price.

**Pagan Days Portrayed.**

The production takes the audience back to the pagan days in the time of King Herod. The main spectacle is divided into three scenes embodying the events just preceding and during the birth of Christ. The first act takes place in the temple of Herod during the worshipping of pagan gods. A prophet enters, denouncing the religious rites of Herod. The birth and approaching rule of the Messiah is prophesied by the prophet, saying that the new Lord will rule heaven and earth. The Romans in worship at the temple ask Herod to prosecute the intruder. Herod, however, insists that the sacred temple shall not be polluted with the blood of the offender, and to appease the Romans he commands the captain of his guard to go forth and capture the new king.

In the second act an orchestral prelude opens the scene upon the rolling plains of Bethlehem. A shepherd is seen watching his flock and a chorus of female voices is heard from the clouds, singing "In His Cradle." The shepherd sings "Rejoice Greatly." A caravan slowly moves across the stage followed by the Three Wise Men, who camp for the night. The wise men explain that they are following a wonderful star, and the prophet enters again, declaring the appearance of the Messiah, saying "Follow His star in the east." Suddenly the star in all its brilliance shines forth and the wise men and the prophets kneel and chant "The Hymn to the Star."

The Three Wise Men are shown with pilgrims in the prologue to the third act carrying gifts and offerings to the Babe of Bethlehem. The prophet and shepherd follow slowly. They arrive at the manger in Bethlehem and the pilgrims are paying homage to the Child. The prophet sings "My Prophecies Are Fulfilled." The Virgin sings, "O King of Love." The chanting of "Holy, Holy, Holy," by the pilgrims is followed by "Adestes Fideles," by the audience. "The Hallelujah Chorus from the Messiah brings the pageant to a close with all standing.

Realistic Stage Effects. Accentuating this brief resume of the theme of the scenario which, together with the music, was arranged by A. F. Thaviu, will be the most realistic stage settings and lighting effects.

**Sees Recreation For Workers In the Arts**

(By Associated Press) ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 20.—Light opera, lectures and music, rather than baseball or tennis, are the suitable recreations for workers in modern industry, declared James H. Maurer, president of the Pennsylvania Federation of Labor, in an address today before the Playground and Recreation Association of America.

"The popularly accepted idea of recreation is athletic sports—running, jumping, swimming, golf, lawn tennis, and baseball," he said. "All these sports are without doubt very good for those who need that kind of recreation, but few workers engaged in modern industry need them."

"Their work gives laboring men all the physical exertion necessary. What they need is recreation of a different kind, such as music, lectures, good books, light opera, educational dramatic productions, adult education in a class room equipped with restful chairs and with an atmosphere of democracy.

"The coal miner or steel worker can well afford to sit on the grandstand and watch the bank clerks play baseball. The bank clerk can well afford to play golf on a hot summer day while the coal miner sits under a shady tree reading a good book or listening to a band concert. Both will be getting the physical and mental recreation needed, and both will be healthier, happier and better equipped to face the problems of life."

To avoid industrial stagnation and unemployment, workers are demanding increased wages and decreased hours of labor. This, he said, means additional hours of leisure which should by all means be turned to good account.

Religion in America is superficial because it must make its appeal to people who are in a

hurry, said Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver in another address.

"The Kingdom of God comes without haste," said Dr. Silver. "The heart of the religious mood is meditation, the hushed and silent contemplation of life's profundities. But what American ever meditates? We need more time to get acquainted with ourselves. We should develop a new science—the Science of Leisure.

"We have not enough amateurs in our society—men who, out of sheer love of life, set about to utilize their leisure time purposefully and creatively. Our industrialized civilization demands specialization, which tends to narrow man's mental and spiritual life. Most of us have only one world in which to live—the world of our vocations. For the purpose of earning a living—that is admirable. For the purpose of earning life—it is fatal."

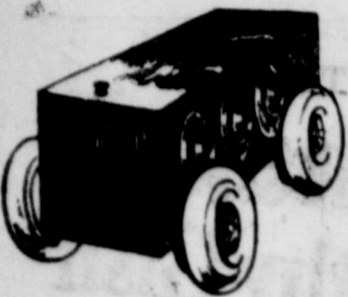
