TWO EARTHQUAKES ROCK CALIFORNIA

(By Associated Press)
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—Two violent earthquakes rocked central coast counties of California today just an hour apart. The first shock occurred at 4:36 o'clock and continued for 20 seconds, with the second tremor coming exactly an hour later being much sharper but lasting only 15 seconds.
No injuries or serious damage to property have been reported. The center of the shocks appeared to be between San Francisco and Monterey Bay. The quakes were felt as far South as San Luis Obispo, approximately 250 miles South of here and as far North as Napa, some 50 miles distant, and at Stockton, 90 miles to the East.
In San Francisco, Oakland and San Jose, the largest cities affected, the large buildings swayed like trees, driving the inhabitants to streets and parks for safety.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—Another light earthquake was felt here at 6:42 o'clock this morning. It was the third shock of the day.

MUCH OIL WELL ACTIVITY IN SAN ANGELO DISTRICT

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 22.—Activity in the San Angelo district is lively and during the week ending October 16, 297 wells were being drilled, John Hoffer, deputy supervisor of the oil and gas division of the Texas Railroad Commission, reported to Judge H. E. Bell, head of the division, here.
The district covers 32 counties. In it there are 254 producing wells, and the average daily production for the week ending Oct. 16 was 45,007 barrels, Hoffer reported. All of this oil was so-called pipe-line oil.
This is the district where potash deposits exist and where the University of Texas owns oil and gas lands.

Judge Bell said if the governor approves the appropriation bill passed by the special session of the legislature for the oil and gas division, this great district will be divided and another deputy supervisor will be placed in the territory. The judge said that it is obvious that one supervisor cannot properly supervise the drilling and plugging of 297 wells scattered over 32 counties, and at the same time supervise 254 producing wells. The producing wells are in Scurry, Howard, Mitchell, Reagan, Upton, Crane and Crockett counties.

RECOVERS TWO BODIES IN LAKE

MARQUETTE, Mich., Oct. 22.—Marquette Harbor on Lake Superior off from here, today gave up the bodies of Arvid Erickson and Emil Skoglund, game wardens, who Roy Nunn last night confessed slaying on September 29.

The slaying, according to Nunn's confession, police said, resulted when the wardens attempted to arrest him at Sand Plains, near here, for the unlawful possession of a gun.

He led the police to the place where he deposited the bodies.

LEASES POULTRY PACKING PLANT

F. C. Behrend, of the Pecan Valley Produce Company, of Brownwood, has leased the poultry packing plant from the Jeanes Company and will operate it for the season. Mr. Behrend has leased the plant for one year. He is building an office facing Broadway and at the corner of the poultry pens, and is busy getting things in shape for the poultry marketing season which opens on November 1st.

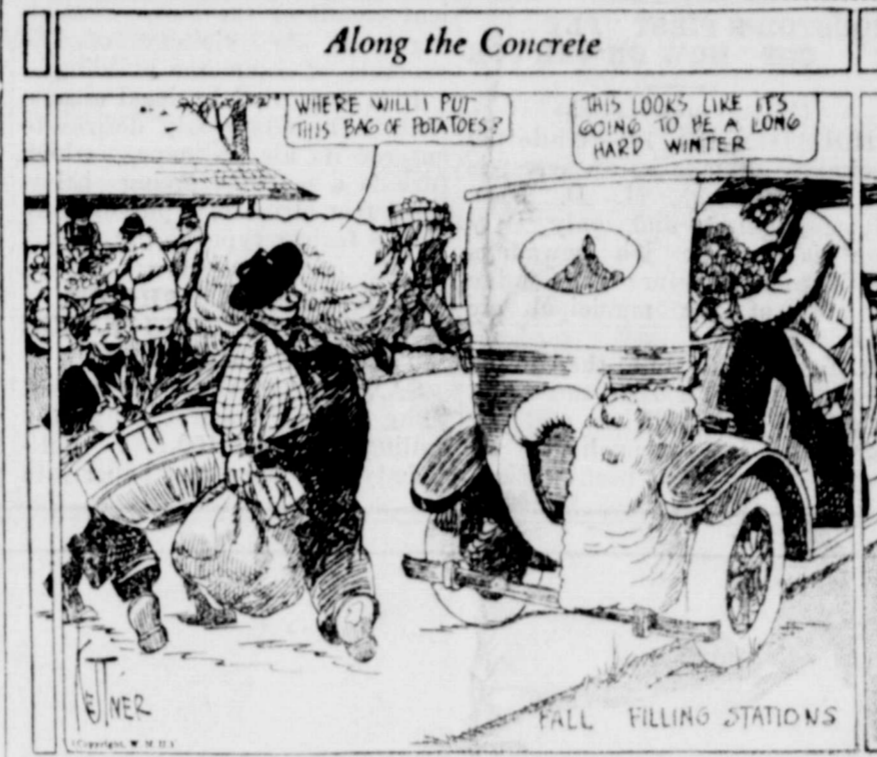
WATSON DENIES KLAN TESTIMONY

CONTINUES PROBE OF HIGHWAY COM.

AUSTIN, Oct. 22.—When Frank Lanham and Joe Burkett were members of the State Highway Commission, the Board of Control as the State's purchasing agent, was ignored by the highway commission, and when the board declined to approve awards the practice of leasing trucks and equipment and paying for them until they became state property, was adopted by the highway commission, R. B. Walthall, member of the State Board of Control, testified before the House investigating committee today.
Walthall said that even warrants for payment of highway accounts were drawn in the highway department when they should have been drawn by the state comptroller.

**HOUSTON'S FIRST "FLY
COP" NOW ON THE JOB**

HOUSTON, Oct. 19.—While the
technique of making an arrest is
yet to be solved, M. D. Dice,
Houston's first and only "fly
cop" is on the job nowadays
ready to hale before the judge
violators of the municipal air
ordinance.

Offenders will bid the judge
good morning, if Dice can catch
them, which he admits will be
hard to do inasmuch as no
method as yet has been worked

out by which speeders, or left-
hand-turn fiends in the ether can
be ridden into a non-existent
curb to answer the usual ques-
tions concerning the location of
the fire.

Another insect in the "fly
cop's" ointment has been brought
to light by local aviators who see
in his appointment curtailment
of their right to fly as high, wide
and handsome as they wish. They
declare the commercial machine
which Dice is to use is too slow
to catch the majority of planes
whose home port is in this neigh-
borhood. Planes carry no license
numbers, they add, and it would
be a simple matter to duck the
"fly dick" by hiding in conven-
ient clouds or the haze emanat-
ing from the vicinity of the
chamber of commerce building.

**"KITE CAMERA" SHOOTS
SCENES AT LONG RANGE**

(By Associated Press)
SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 19.—A
"kite camera" operated by the
pulling power of 100-foot centi-
pede-type bamboo and paper kite

has just been used successfully
for the first time in making
motion picture long shots of
troop movements at Camp Stan-
ley, near here.

The camera, wound up with a
spring, is set and released at a
height of seven feet, grinding
away all the time as it ascends a
kite string to a height of 1,000
feet. The camera weighs seven
pounds and is carried up by a
butterfly contrivance with a trap,
or catch of rubber bands. When
it strikes the kite the catch
breaks, the wings automatically
fold, and the camera is carried
back by its own weight to be re-
loaded.

A "balloon camera" also is be-
ing developed for some battle
scenes. A gas bag twenty feet in
circumference will have a carry-
ing power of eighty pounds. It
will hold a 60-pound camera sus-
pended in a cradle and operated
by two men, being held by
handles and then released on
signal to rise to a height of 100
feet, shooting down on the action
for a scant fifty feet of film,
grinding automatically.

(By Associated Press) ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 21.—Playless children make up the principal part of the prison population, said Dr. Charles Platt, of New York, president of the National Probation Association, in an address today before the Playground and Recreation Association.

"To meet this new source of crime, we must lay down in childhood those character attributes that will make a normal social life possible," Dr. Platt declared. "The schools do not do this, since they give facts rather than principles. Punishment has failed as a preventive. Laws have no deterrent effect upon children, nor will increased penalties."

"The remedy is well directed play which is as much a commun-

ity duty as is a well directed school."

Riviera in Throes of Greatest Land Boom

(By Associated Press) NICE, Oct. 21.—Frenzied speculation never surpassed even in the hectic days of the Florida land boom has struck the French Riviera. Hundreds of thousands of dollars are being lost and made in a wild scramble for land from Toulon to Mentone.

The English are in the majority among speculators but Frenchmen, Germans, Americans and Spaniards are all taking advantage of the unprecedented rise in land values.

Every kilometre on the Corniche road between Cannes and Monte Carlo is littered with huge posters advertising lots for sale. Juan les Pins, a hamlet a year

ago, has developed into a brilliant casino town practically overnight. In the fall of 1925, land around the few French cottages and the one inn could be bought for twenty francs per metre. It now brings 300 francs.

At Venice, Grasse and Saint Raphael, the same speculation is in progress.

(By Associated Press) BALTIMORE, Oct. 21.—Every year for fifty years there have been among the entering stud-

ents at Johns Hopkins University one potential college or university president and 29 college or university professors, a survey of the Johns Hopkins alumni directory has shown.

Deadens Room to Music Only for Player's Ears
(By Associated Press)

URBANA, Ill., Oct. 21.—Echoes of his own playing is pleasant to the player, but frequently not to the listener. To please both, the University of Illinois has devised an arrangement of furniture in a room so that all echoes go to the player and none to the listener.

Professor F. H. Watson, an authority on acoustics, deadened a room by having a great deal of sound absorbing material placed in it. Musicians first found it hard to play there, but easier as successive portions of the deadening materials were removed. As the reverberation increased, however, the pleasure of the listeners grew less.

In the trial which led to the discovery of the ideal arrangement, sound-absorbing material was scattered generally over the room. To this the comment of the musicians was adverse. Some of the materials was then removed to the opposite end of the room. The transfer continued until all the sound-absorbents were in the end of the room

farthest from the players. Approximation of these conditions in home and concert hall will materially increase the enjoyment of music, he said.
