IS RELEASED ON \$1,000 BOND ON LIQUOR CHARGE

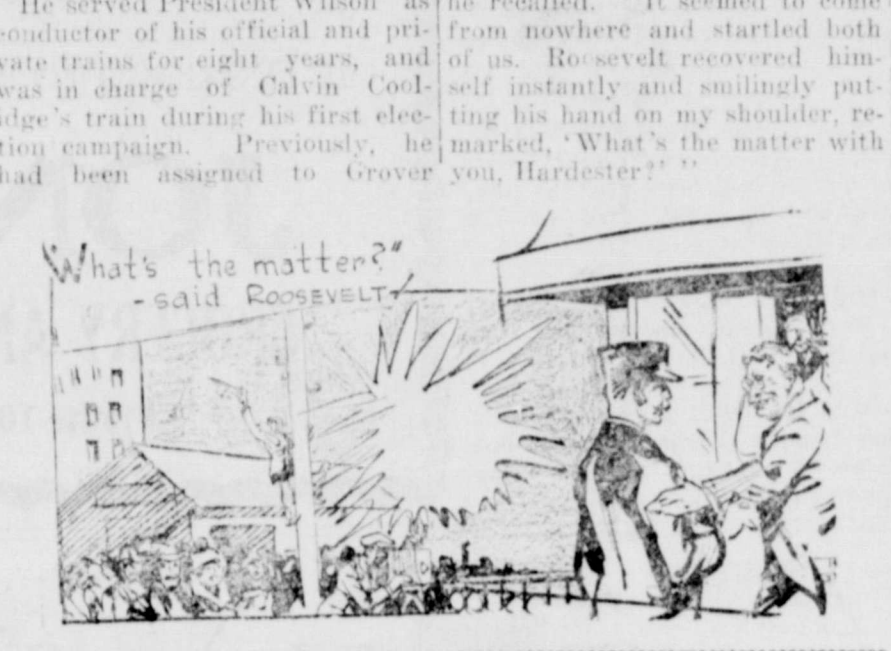
B. Loftin, filling station operator of Winters, was released on \$1,000 bond Tuesday morning after he had been arrested for sale of intoxicating liquor.

"Conductor" of Presidents Saw Teddy Falter Once

WASHINGTON, Mar. 4.—Conducting presidents on official, political and private trips about the country is a familiar experience to Capt. David E. Hardester, veteran Pullman conductor of Washington.
He served President Wilson as conductor of his official and private trains for eight years, and was in charge of Calvin Coolidge's train during his first election campaign. Previously, he had been assigned to Grover Cleveland's private car after his retirement from office, and had "conducted" Presidents Roosevelt and Taft on various trips.
"Roosevelt and Wilson were both effective rear platform speakers," in Capt. Hardester's opinion, and he found them both omnivorous readers between stops, although their preferences differed radically.
"The only time I ever saw Roosevelt falter for a minute as he stepped from his car was when a hidden camera man unexpectedly set off a noisy flash light," he recalled. "It seemed to come from nowhere and startled both of us. Roosevelt recovered himself instantly and smilingly putting his hand on my shoulder, remarked, 'What's the matter with you, Hardester?'"



CRUISER GOES TO QUELL MOB

SHANGHAI, March 9.—The British cruiser Emerald sailed today from Nanking up the river to Wuhu, where a mob yesterday looted the customs house, following the occupation of the town by Cantonese troops.
All foreign women and children are aboard a steamer there and an American destroyer is also standing by.

WOMEN LEGION MEMBERS TO HAVE OWN PARADES

JACKSON, Miss., March 9.—When in Paris act accordingly, so Mrs. Louise Julienne, chairman of the parade committee of the American Legion Auxiliary, has decided women and men will march separately in the Legion parade at the convention in the French city.
Jaunty blue tams, white dresses and blue capes trimmed in red, will be the costumes of the 10,000 women Auxiliary members who are expected to attend. The names of respective states will appear on the tams in white lettering and the Auxiliary emblem will be worn on the left shoulder of the cape.

ALL BODIES ARE NOT RECOVERED IN QUAKE

(By Associated Press)
TOKYO, March 9.—The home office announced today that according to latest advices received here 2,275 persons were killed in Monday's earthquake in Central Japan, with 3,441 injured.
The number of houses destroyed by fire following the quake was 3,606, while 3,113 were destroyed by the quake.
Scenes after the flames died down were described as the most pitiful, with some survivors digging in the ashes for some trace of their missing relatives while others were hunting for crumbs of food and pleading for assistance from the arriving relief workers.
Hundreds of bodies are still beneath the ruins.

TEXAN HELD ON BIGAMY CHARGE

DES MOINES, Ia., March 9.—Emmett Vestel pleaded not guilty today to a charge of bigamy and was remanded to jail in default of bond to await a preliminary hearing on March 22.
Vestel was recently under sentence to go to the electric chair for murder in Dallas but was pardoned by former Governor Miriam A. Ferguson.

NEW MEMBERS ARE SWORN IN

AUSTIN, March 9.—Alexander Brice, of Sulphur Springs, who was elected Saturday, was sworn in as a member of the House of Representatives today to fill the vacancy left by the expulsion of H. H. Moore, of Cooper, involved with former Representative F. A. Dale, of Bonham, in bribe taking charges.
W. F. Keaton, of Bonham, was sworn in yesterday to succeed Dale.

GOVERNMENT RESTS CASE

WASHINGTON, March 9.—The government today rested its case against Harry Sinclair in the contempt charges growing out of his refusal to answer certain questions asked him by the Senate oil investigating committee.
The Anti-Horse Thief Association sponsored a bill in the Kansas legislature to curb roadside "petting."
British co-operative organizations have sent a shipment of 70,000 barrels of herring, 70,000, 600 fish, to Soviet Russia.

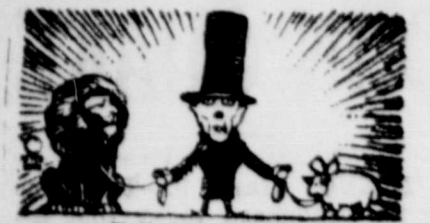

MECHANICAL "SPIDER" SHOOTS COBWEBS

(By Associated Press)
UNIVERSAL CITY, Calif., March 8.—The movies have developed a new deadly weapon.

It looks like a cross between an automatic pistol, a blunderbuss and an electric fan; but it is none of these.

It is a mechanical spider, and it kills time. The "cobweb machine" it is called. In ten minutes it can add centuries to the appearance of a room. It "kills time" so fast that it does the work of millions of spiders in a few minutes.

Mechanically, the new device is something like a candy floss machine. Power is furnished by an electric motor, which revolves at high speed a shaft on which are a fan and a magazine containing a viscous fluid which strings out into cobwebby forms as it is sprayed into the path of the fan's breeze. The device puts cobwebs on a quantity production basis.

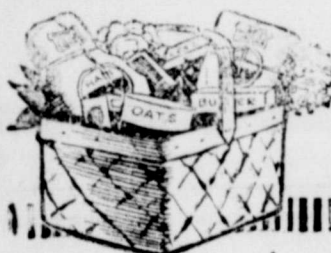

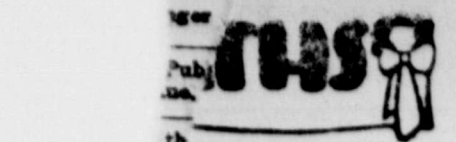

BUCKINGHAM QUILTS BUCKET BRIGADE

(By Associated Press)
 LONDON, March 9. — The bucket brigade and all other paraphernalia of the old fashioned fire fighting outfit at Buckingham Palace is to be replaced by up-to-date apparatus.

An ancient bell resembling those used in the United States to call the farm hands to meals already has disappeared and modern gongs operated by electricity have been installed to summon aid in event of emergency. Notwithstanding the antiquated fire prevention machinery long in use at the king's town residence, the royal palace has not had a

serious blaze for many years. This is attributed to construction and the fact that the buildings are guarded day and night.

The worst fire in the history of the royal houses was in 1698, when Whitehall Palace was destroyed. A laundress had placed a lot of linen before a charcoal fire to dry and within a few hours the apartments of King William III., the privy council office and the office of the secretary of state had been destroyed. The king was in the country at the time and did not hear of the fire for two or three days. Windsor Castle and Sandringham Palace now have direct telephone connection with Buckingham Palace.

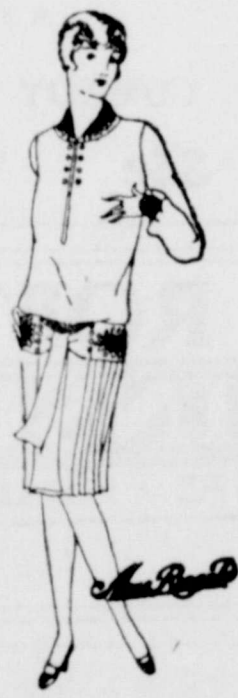
