6 KILLERS MAKE BREAK FOR LIBERTY; 1 ESCAPES

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, March 12.—Six convicts, under death sentences for murder in a prison break a year ago, made a new drive for liberty from the county jail at Joliet, Illinois, today with the aid of smuggled saws and guns.
An hour later, five men lay wounded, two seriously, and only one convict was at large.
It cost \$1,000 to pull the job.
Three of the convicts, who were Mexicans, fled to Chicago, where two of them were recaptured after a gun fight with policemen. In the meantime, two of their three American companions were besieged at the Joliet jail.
A confession by Charles Buchowski, one of the six felons who attempted to escape, said that \$1,000 was provided for the dash for liberty. This statement led to an immediate investigation.
The break was attempted at 1:00 o'clock this morning when the Mexicans forced a guard to release them. They escaped in an automobile with the guard after having given their American companions two pistols and some saws. The Americans, however, were subdued by gas bombs.
The Mexicans were traced to Chicago where they exchanged shots with the police in which encounter, Gregorio Rizo, one of the convicts, was probably fatally wounded. Two policemen and a taxi driver were less seriously hurt.
Roberto Torrez was recaptured but Bernardo Roastill is still at large.
The other prisoners are Charles Shader and Walter Staleski.
All the felons were under death sentences in connection with the slaying of Peter Klein, deputy prison warden.
Broch Connors, a trusty, was shot in the leg by an officer before his identity was learned.

COMPROMISE ON GAS TAX BILL

AUSTIN, March 12.—Torn last night from the grip of a four-hour filibuster, a compromise on the gasoline tax bill was voted out of the Senate by 31 and was sent to the House today for concurrence.
In the Senate, provisions were made for this year's tax to be three cents, and two cents thereafter.

A free conference on the bill seems inevitable as the House passed the straight 3-cent provision so overwhelmingly that small prospects remain for a concurrence in the Senate amendment.

Gloom Hangs Over Whisky Trade; John Bull's Bill Cut

EDINBURGH, Scotland, March 12.—Gloom prevails in the whisky business. Consumption of spirits has been on the decline, and the Scottish output this season will be the smallest in a great many years.
Whisky is to be cheaper, too. The reduction will approximate a penny a drink over the bar.

In 1926 consumption of British made spirits fell from 29,000,000

to 11,250,000 gallons. This is attributed partly to a lower tax on foreign wines, consumption of which having increased from 9,983,000 gallons in 1916 to 16,830,000 gallons in 1926.

Many distillers have not begun operations at all this season, and this is resulting in widespread unemployment and threatens to seriously affect the agricultural industry, which sold its produce to the distillers.

It was stated at the sheriff's office today that at the present rate there would be more than 50 felony cases for investigation by the fall term of the grand jury.

Five complaints are for burglary and theft, three for violation of the liquor laws, two for forgery, one for horse theft, and one for driving a car while intoxicated.

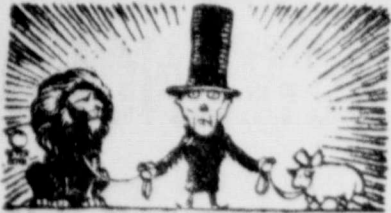

Seventy fruit trees have been planted on top of a London office building which already boasts an 18-hole putting course.

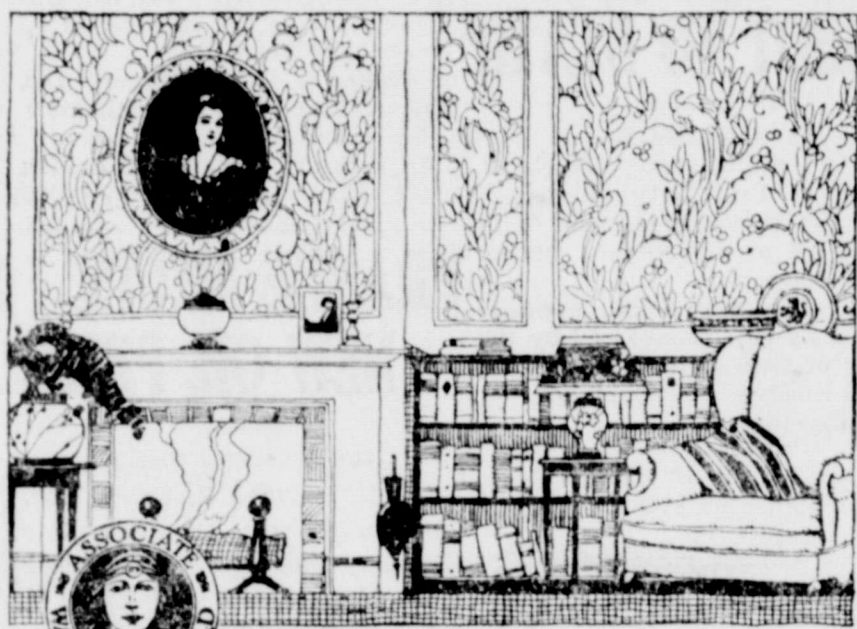

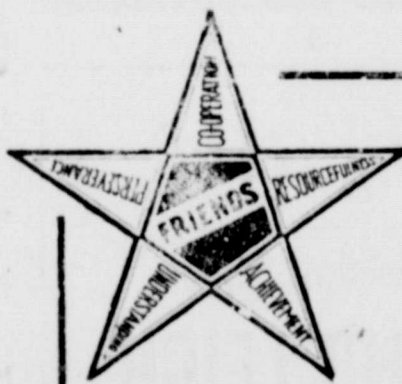

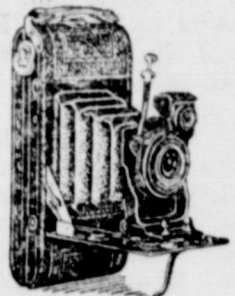
