WHITSITT HERE TO COMPLETE AUDIT

Carolina Hiker Seeks to Lower Walking Record

ASHEVILLE, N. C., March 23.—A tradition of strength will be behind Mrs. Charles Hutchins of Burnsville, N. C., mother of two children, when she sets out over rugged mountain roads, March 25 in an attempt to break Miss Eleanor Sears' record of walking 40 miles in eight hours.
She will hike from her home town, which is the county seat of Yancey, to Asheville, a distance of 43 miles, and if the mark of the Boston woman is crashed, Mrs. Hutchins will invite her to "come down and try my mountain roads" in a joint contest.



The people of Yancey county are a sturdy folk. History relates that almost a hundred years ago, in the same square at Burnsville from which Mrs. Hutchins will start her walk, one Nathan Dempsey whipped ten men, one after another; killed a bear with his fist, and later, in giving a friend a gentle tap, put him to sleep for two weeks. A peace warrant was sworn out against his right hand.

A young and pretty woman at 33, Mrs. Hutchins has spent most of her life hiking over the mountains, swimming in icy pools and driving an automobile over the roads.

She was married at 14 and is the wife of a prominent attorney, who with their 12-year old son, will supervise the walk. Bernice, who is 14, is in school.

SAYS SHANGHAI TO BE BASE OF WORLD REVOLT

(By Associated Press)
SHANGHAI, March 23.—Shanghai is to become the base for a world revolution, says a manifesto issued by General Pai Tsung Hsie, Chinese commander, to the Chinese people today, but foreigners must not be attacked or their property destroyed for 80 years, the proclamation reads.
Imperialists under the protection of unequal treaties, have reduced China to a state of vassalage; foreign usurpers have checked the development of Chinese industries and education, the manifesto continues, and have secured for themselves special privileges, but the Chinese have awakened and Shanghai will become the strong base for Chinese nationalism, the statement added.

SHANGHAI, March 23.—The night was comparatively quiet after two days of chaos and disorder. It was, however, followed today by continued firing in the

northern part of Shanghai not far from the border of the international settlement, where there is still a remnant of Northern troops holding out.

Nevertheless, the general situation in and around the city is more peaceful than at any time since the vanguard of the Southern armies marched into Shanghai on Monday.

American troops suffered their first casualty last night when a marine patrolling the customs jetty was slightly wounded by a bullet.

SHANGHAI, March 23.—An armed mob, numbering about 500, made a demonstration today before the British posts guarding the boundary of the international settlement.

The rioters fired rifles in the air.
The troops did not fire and the mob finally withdrew.

**1926 AUTO TAX
WAS \$71,787.77**

In the past year, automobile
taxes collected in this county by
W. L. Brown, tax collector,
amounted to \$71,787.77, accord-
ing to figures compiled in his
office Wednesday.

Of that amount \$50,485.29 went
to the State Highway Department
while the remaining \$21,302.48
was turned over to the Commis-
sioners Court of Runnels County.

The commissioners spent this
money on county roads—not
designated highways, which run
from Bradshaw on the north to
the Concho county line on the
south, and from Talpa on the
east to the Tom Green county
line.

Precinct No. 1 received \$8,
139.16; No. 2 received \$5,948.31;
No. 3, \$3,071.10; and No. 4,
\$4,143.91.

The average tax against cars in
this county was \$12.59.

This year the county will get
almost as much more to spend on
its roads as in 1926. Mr. Brown
stated. This is due, he said, to
the fact that 30 per cent of the
weight fee of the county will be
turned over to the commissioners.
This amount will figure be-
tween \$14,000 and \$15,000, which
will give the commissioners be-
tween \$35,000 and \$40,000 to
spend on roads which are not
designated state highways.

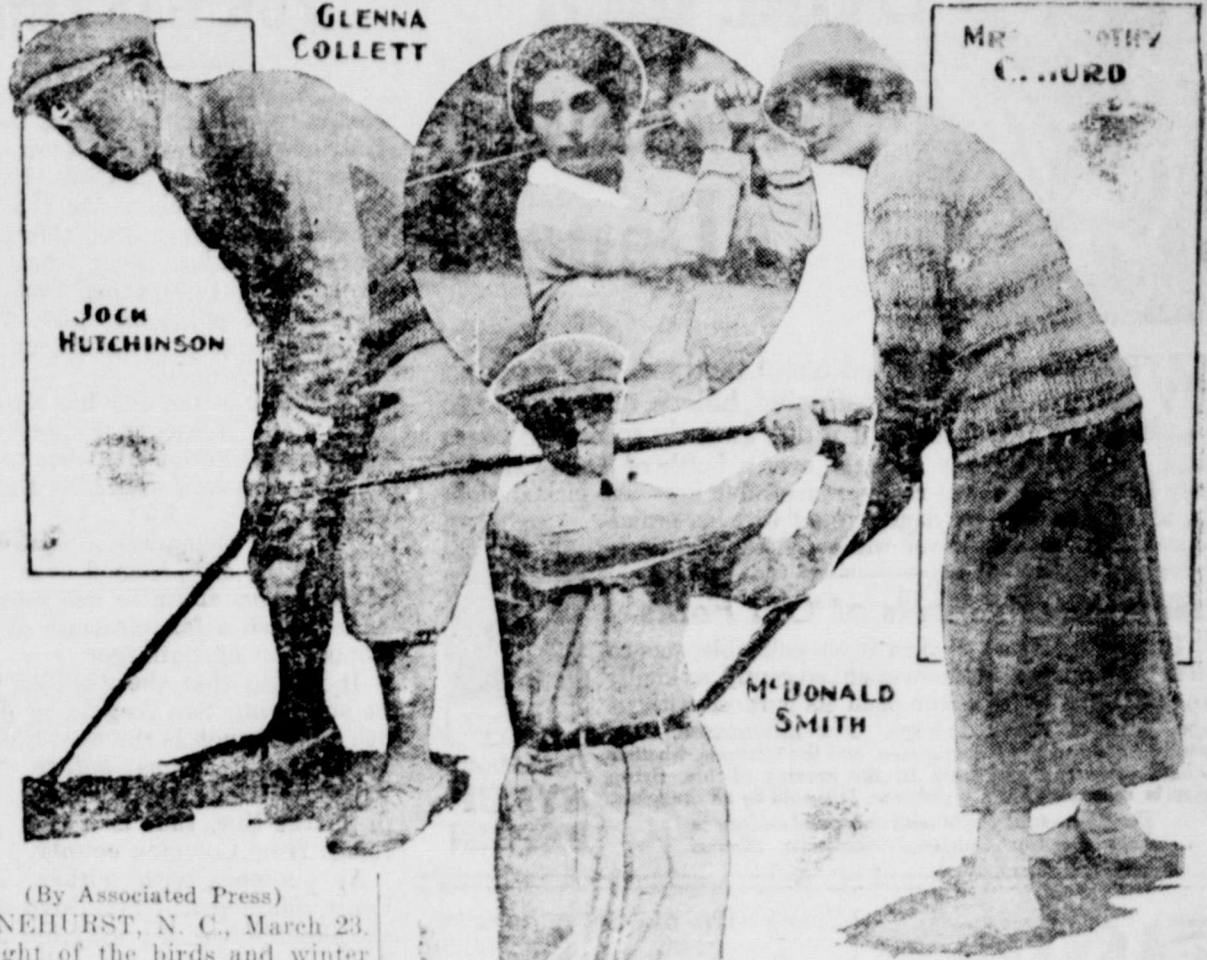

Golfers Begin Their Northward Flight

PINEHURST, N. C., March 23.—Flight of the birds and winter tourists northward from the more salubrious climes of the extreme South, and the annual United North and South Sport Carnival here long have been synonymous. This year will be no exception.

The Women's United North and South Golf championship will open March 24, and six days later the United North and South Open will be underway. Then on April 4, the United North and South amateur tournament will draw a strong list of players.

It was back in 1901 when the tournaments had their beginning, and three years later the women's event came into formal being. Mrs. Myra D. Paterson, Englewood, N. J., won the qualifying round that year with a score of 101—quite a contrast to Glenna Collett's 77 in 1926.

Among the open champions are Donald J. Ross, now the noted golf course architect; Alex Ross, his brother; Jim Barnes, Walter Hagen, Fred McLeod, Jack Hutchinson, MacDonal Smith and Bobby Cruikshank, the defending title holder this year.

Glenna Collet, Mrs. Paterson, Mary Fownes, Mrs. Ronald H. Barlow, now president of the Women's Senior Golf Association, and Louise Fordyce, defending champion, are a few of the women title winners.

The open and women's events often have been stepping stones to higher honors. Alex Ross won his second Pinehurst championship the same year he romped

away with the National open money. In 1909, McLeod preceded his capture of the National open with a win in the North and South. Jim Barnes held the North and South and Professional Golf Association titles in 1916, and Hutchinson repeated in 1921.

Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd was runner-up in the North and South when she held the British, American and Canadian titles in 1917, and the following year she returned to capture the Pinehurst event.

Many of the former champions, as well as other prominent golfers, will participate in this season's tourneys.

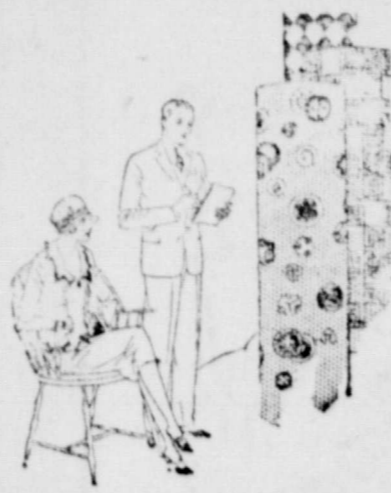

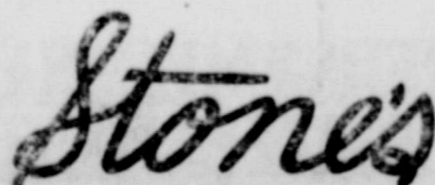
