## OVALO BANK ROBBED BY TWO MEN

### More Marines are Ordered to China

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, March 26.—Fifteen hundred more American marines were ordered to China today and unless the situation improves there is a prospect that infantry units of the American army will also go over as an expeditionary force in the Chinese trouble zone.

The marines will be gathered from along the Atlantic seaboard and will cross the continent by train. They will sail from San Diego as soon as they can be concentrated there.

The transport Henderson has been ordered from Corinto, Nicaragua, to take the contingent across the Pacific.

Reinforcement of the expeditionary force was decided upon today after Admiral Williams, the American naval commander at Shanghai, had requested it, in an urgent message received this morning.

The admiral said that continued disorders among the undisciplined Cantonese troops in the Yangtze River section made the outlook exceedingly precarious.

PEKING, March 26.—American Consul Chefoo today requested the United States to dispatch a destroyer to Peking following clashes between police and Northern troops.

SHANGHAI, March 26.—All Americans in Nanking, other than the one known dead and four injured are accounted for as safe, in wireless dispatches received here tonight. The 120 Americans who took refuge in Nanking University from rioting by the Chinese, are all reported aboard the ships.

The known American casualties are: Dead—Dr. J. E. Williams, of Shawnee, Ohio, vice-president of Nanking University; injured—Miss Anna Moffett, Ft. Sheridan, Illinois, of the Presbyterian mission, shot twice in the body by a Nationalist soldier; she will recover; Private Plumley, Marine Corps; an American bluejacket, unidentified; Earl Hobart, manager of the Standard Oil Company's plant at Nanking, whose ankle was broken.

Williams was shot in cold blood at his home near the university. The crime was witnessed by his wife and other Americans.

One of the witnesses today said Williams stood outside his home while the Cantonese were looting it. As they departed he called out "good-bye," whereupon a soldier turned and shot him down.

### BURNS CAUSE GIRL'S DEATH

HILLSBORO, March 26.—Doris Herring, 11, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Herring died today from burns received last night when a can of oil exploded.

The Herrings live at Lakenon, north of here.

### MERCHANT HIT BY TRAIN DIES

LA GRANGE, March 26.—Emil Sulik, 38, a prominent merchant of this section, hit by a train at Lena today, died shortly after the accident.

Sulik is survived by his widow, one daughter and one son.

Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Jonas, of near Ballinger, are the parents of a fine 8-pound boy born to them on March 23.

### TONG LEADERS GIVE ORDERS

NEW YORK, Mar. 26.—Chinese tong members were told by their chieftains today that there is no warfare and there must be no killings.

This order was drafted after a conference, called by District Attorney Banton, who threatened wholesale deportations if the warfare, which has already taken a toll of ten lives in six cities, did not cease.

### CUT IN FIGHT WITH BANDITS

SPUR, Tex., March 26.—Cam H. Murray, former state ranger from Lubbock, is recovering here today from knife wounds received in a fight with three robbers last night.

Murray said he wounded one of the robbers but there was no trace found of the wounded bandit.

The robbers, who accosted Murray on the highway, left a car with a Dallas county license.

### MOODY SIGNS ANOTHER BILL

AUSTIN, March 26.—Gov. Dan Moody today signed the bill passed by the legislature simplifying methods of handling county funds and designed to provide additional safeguards.

### SANTA ANNA TO HAVE ICE PLANT

Santa Anna is to have a 15-ton ice plant, Earl Morley, district superintendent of the West Texas Utilities Company announced here Friday afternoon. The plant is now under construction and will be one of the finest in this district.

The growth of Santa Anna, and the enlargement of the oil fields near that town, made it necessary to erect an ice factory there. The utilities company has been furnishing Santa Anna with ice from its Coleman plant but have now seen fit to build a plant in Santa Anna to take care of the growing territory.

The new ice plant will be constructed in Spanish style.

### Riviera Looking To Betty Nuthall as Lenglen Successor

CANNES, March 26.—The brilliant careers of Suzanne Lenglen and Helen Wills have stimulated the appetite of Riviera tennis crowds for women players of their caliber and every ambitious manager of tennis tournaments feels the need of personalities.

Betty Nuthall, the 16-year-old English girls' champion, is the hope of the Riviera tennis promoters at present. Her quick rise from the child-wonder class to the position of serious opponent of crack players at the Cannes tournaments bears out what enthusiastic critics in England have said of her from the first. When she recently defeated Mrs. Anthony Corbiere of Boston 6-0, 6-4, the managers sat up and were hopeful. Mrs. Corbiere's remarkably steady and brainy play make her a dangerous opponent for the best players at Cannes.

Betty's smashing drive, although not backed up as yet by a uniformly steady game, will bring her in among the first eight at Wimbledon this year, critics say, since seeing her Riviera play. Many of them consider her development more remarkable than was Joan Fry's at a relative stage of her career.

Last year at Wimbledon Betty Nuthall played with long hair. She found her hair requiring attention which she needed for her game. This season the curls have vanished and the girls' champion has a bob which she keeps trim with a ribbon band.

Betty is shorter than Helen Wills, and more sturdily built. But she is agile and her most severe critics do not find her slow on the court.

## Ballinger State Bank

OVALO, Tex., Mar. 26.—Two men held up the cashier and bookkeeper of the First State Bank here about 11:20 o'clock this morning, and robbed the institution of about \$4,000. In their haste to get away the robbers overlooked \$12,500 in U. S. government bonds.

The two bandits entered the bank with drawn guns and demanded, "Put 'em up."

The younger of the two went into the vault, secured the money, and then the two bankers were ordered inside the vault where they were closed in. The vault, however, failed to lock on them.

Leaving Ovalo, they drove one mile south and turned toward Coleman, travelling in a Buick Six sedan.

had seen their car there. An alarm was quickly broadcast and officers in all directions were notified.

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams and a force of deputies left Ballinger about noon to search the north and northeastern sections of this county.

In a telephone conversation with a reporter for The Ledger, shortly after 1:00 o'clock, I. N. Wilkinson, cashier of the bank, stated that he could identify the man who made him sit in the floor after ordering him to throw up his hands.

"He first told us to put 'em up," said Wilkinson. "I was forced to sit down in the floor of my cage while the man went into the vault. He came out with the money and then Joe Harrison, bookkeeper, and I were told to get into the vault. We remained there about five minutes and then came out."

The younger man was about 33 or 34 years old, Mr. Wilkinson declared. The other was about 40 years of age. One wore a striped jacket and was about 5 feet tall. The older man was about 5 feet 10 inches in height, and weighed about 200 pounds. Both were roughly dressed.

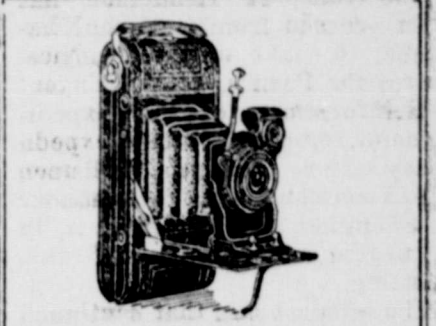

**COTTON MEN AID DISTRIBUTION OF VALLEY CITRUS**

(By Associated Press)  
HOUSTON, March 24.—Rio Grande Valley grapefruit growers are entering the British markets with the aid of cotton men.  
Every once in a while Houston cotton shippers have sent to European connections samples of Texas grapefruit. Englishmen have liked them so well that when the British steamship Nessian of the Leyland Line sailed from Houston she carried fifty cases to Liverpool and Manchester for

English consumption.  
Not that it has anything to do with grapefruit, but as a matter of common interest, the agents of the ships here noted that she carried three cases of oil well machinery to the British ports for trans-shipment to Calcutta, India.  
Other cargo included 12,000 bales of cotton, 1,493 bags of cottonseed meal, 1,500 pockets of rice, and 868 pieces of lumber.

BROWNSVILLE — Plans are under way to pave the old military road, built by Gen. Zachary Taylor in the Mexican War. Federal and state aid is to be sought for the hard road, which it is proposed to run from Point Isabel thru Brownsville to Laredo, following the course of the military highway.

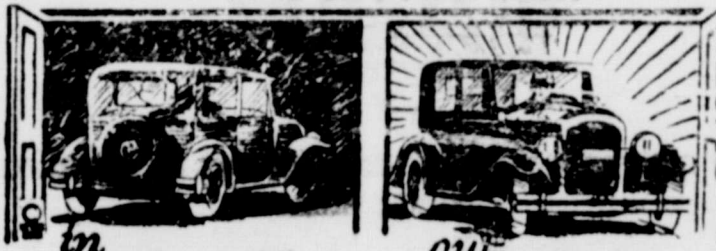

## GETS 18 GALLONS CORN IN A RAID

Wm. N. Ellisor, 39 years of age, a bachelor, is in the county jail, charged with manufacturing intoxicating liquor. His bond was set at \$1,000 after he had made a confession to County Attorney C. P. Shepherd.

Ellisor was arrested Saturday morning about 6:30 o'clock when Sheriff R. E. McWilliams, Deputy Sheriff John White and Policeman Walter Watson raided the house occupied by Ellisor about ten miles south of Ballinger on the Wm. Halfmann rent farm.

Arnold Sinclair, of Norton, a 16-year-old youth, was arrested with Ellisor, but he was dismissed as no complaint was filed against him.

About 18 gallons of alleged real corn whiskey and 100 gallons of mash were confiscated, together with a still, modernly equipped.

In his signed confession, Ellisor declared that he brought the still to this county from McLennan county in 1923 when he came here to pick cotton. He says he had owned the still for about six years and had at various times made whiskey. Ellisor lived for a while in the Norton and Oak Creek communities west of here and recently moved to south of Ballinger, where he was arrested.

Since moving, Ellisor said he had sold about 30 gallons but that he did not know the names of the people who purchased the liquor. He had made about eight runs since January 1st, this year, he declared.

In the confession, Ellisor told how he made his whiskey and

that he first started making whiskey for his own use.

Ellisor believes that he will make the \$1,000 bond within the next few days. He is in jail here today.
