WASHINGTON, March 26 .- Fifteen hundred more American marines were ordered to China today and unless the situation improves there is a prospect that infantry units of the American army will also go over as an expeditionary force in the Chinese trouble zone.

The marines will be gathered from along the Atlantic seaboard and will cross the continent by train. They will sail from San Diego as soon as they can be concentrated there.


