CAMPAIGN QUARTERS BOMBED

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, April 5.—Two headquarters of Democratic political workers were bombed today by men riding in two automobiles. The fronts of both places were demolished but no one was injured. The bombers escaped.

CHICAGO, April 5.—Shooting during the city election here today alarmed the negro voters but there were no casualties. Several men in an automobile fired rounds of shots as they passed polling places.

MOODY VETOES SIXTEEN BILLS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, April 5.—Governor Moody today signed the administration bill eliminating the offense of manslaughter from the Texas criminal statutes. The governor declared he would submit to the impending special legislative session a proposition adding a "saving clause" to meet objections raised by the attorney general's department.

AUSTIN, April 5.—Sixteen bills passed by the last legislature including the Pollard bill preventing heads of state departments or institutions from being retained as legal counsel and several local road measures, seeking imposition of special penalties were held unconstitutional and were vetoed by Governor Moody today.

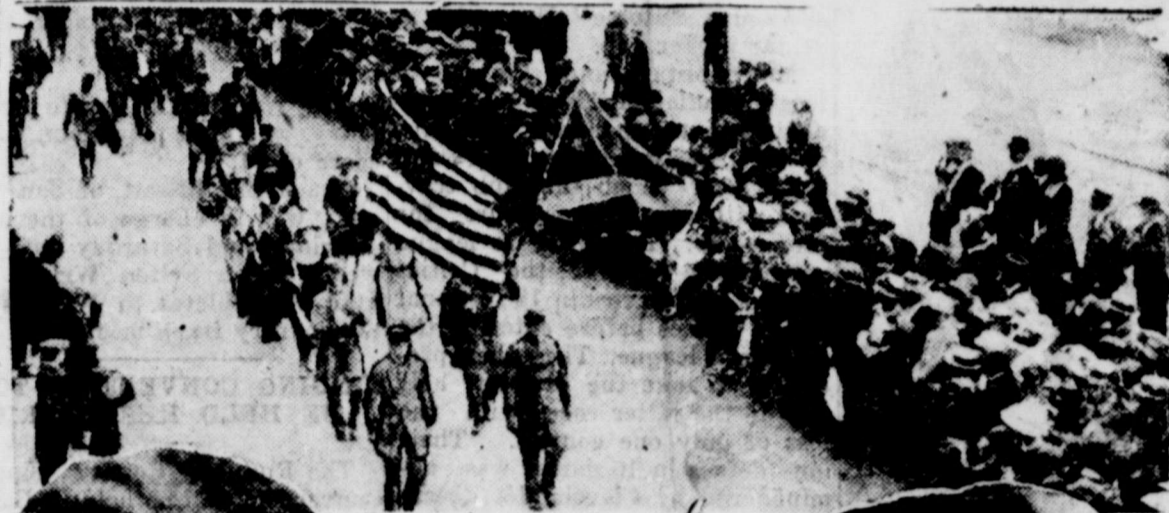
VOTING TODAY FOR OFFICERS

At 2:05 o'clock Tuesday afternoon 325 votes had been cast in the regular city election being held and by closing time at 7:00 o'clock, it was thought that approximately 500 ballots would be cast. Early voting was very popular with some people. For a time it appeared that one of the largest city votes ever polled would be cast but the voting slowed down about noon and in the afternoon hours became rather brisk again. Two full tickets were in the field, although it was reported that some mixed ballots were being cast.

Ranks Thinned to Only a Few Hundred Confederate Veterans Meet Once Again

TAMPA, Fla., April 5.—The thin grey line of the Confederacy once again formed here today, when a few hundred of the thousands who followed Lee, Jackson and Longstreet through the sodden fields of the War Between the States gathered in annual reunion. Once again the "Rebel yell" will resound, but the swelling, cutting volume of former years will be missing. The grand parade will wind through Tampa's streets but the long line will be dwindled and the quick steps that once kept pace with drummer's beat will be followed by those of a slower cadence, while many of the veterans, too old and broken to march, will ride in automobiles provided for them. For death has so thinned the ranks that only a scattering few from the states that composed the Confederacy are left to gather around the reunion campfire and swap stories of the stirring and survivors flames as intensely as ever.

KIRK WILL PROBABLY HAVE ANOTHER TRIAL

SWEETWATER, April 5.—It was intimated here, Monday afternoon by Judge Fritz R. Smith, presiding in the L. Paul Kirk murder trial, that the case would go to trial a third time on a second change of venue. The jury in this case was unable to agree, and at 2:35 o'clock Monday afternoon, Judge Smith dismissed it. Kirk was charged with the murder of Crawford A. Tabor, in Rannels county, on the night of December 19, 1923.

The jury received the case late Saturday night about 10:20 o'clock and had deliberated until 2:35 Monday afternoon. The jury had reported early Monday morning that they were unable to agree and it was decided to dismiss the jurors. It was understood that the last count stood 8 for conviction and 4 for acquittal.

In Kirk's first trial held at Ballinger, before Judge J. O. Woodward, in 1925, the jury was also dismissed after being unable to agree on a verdict. The count in the first trial was said to be 9 for acquittal and 3 for conviction, when the judge dismissed the jurors.

In ordering the jury to deliberate early Monday morning, Judge Smith declared that this case had cost the State \$2,802.24. Of this sum \$2,295.34 was ex-

ASK PERMISSION TO BUILD ROAD

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 5.—Permission to build 90 miles of new railroad across the Texas-Oklahoma border is sought from the Interstate Commerce Commission by the Clinton & Oklahoma Western Railroad.

The new line would extend from its present terminus at Cheyenne, Oklahoma to Pampa, Texas. No estimates of the cost of the proposed extension were filed, but the petition said that a rich agricultural area, a portion of which is underlaid by oil sands, would be given direct rail communication with Tulsa and Oklahoma City.

MAJOR BILLS FOR SESSION

AUSTIN, April 5.—Five major bills are to be submitted to the legislature in called session either on May 2 or May 9, Gov. Moody officially announced today.

Legislation that will be submitted will include the prison reform appropriation, judicial reform, highway reform and civil service.

LOOTING AND KILLING CONTINUE IN CHINA

Kidnappers of Wilkins are Killed

MEXICO, D. F., April 5.—Tried at court martial for kidnapping and murdering Edgar Wilkins, American electrical engineer, seven men have been shot to death by a firing squad. Wilkins and his son were motorcycling near Guadalajara when they were captured by bandits who held Wilkins for \$10,000 ransom. The guilt of the culprits was established Sunday night after the 10-year-old son of Wilkins had identified one of them as the leader of the band which captured his father and himself. The executions took place early Monday morning.

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Basketball Team Has Eight Seasons of "Pro" Victories

NEW YORK, April 5.—One of the most amazing records in the history of professional basketball has been carried unchecked thru its eighth successive season by the New York Celtics.

With the recent winning of the last half honors in the American League as the climax to a 36-game winning streak, this basket-tossing machine ran its total for the 1926-1927 campaign to 77 triumphs in 86 games, and its eight-year mark to 714 victories out of 795 starts.

In the claim to world supremacy they have made for the last five years, the Celtics point to the fact that 90 per cent of their battles have been fought as a traveling team. An average of more than 70,000 miles a season has been covered by the club in its journeys thru the East and Middle West.

Outstanding in the array of Celtic talent is versatile Nat Hol-

man, considered by critics as one of the greatest passers the game has ever known. Holman has been the backbone of the club throughout its long period of success.

Three other stars have answered the Celtic roll-call for at least seven years—Christ Leonard and Dutch Dehnert, guards, and Johnny Barry, forward. Dehnert is the only member of the trio, however, who has held with Holman the distinction of filling a regular role throughout the long stretch of victories. Recently Dave Banks, forward, joined the fold after the sale of Johnny Beckman, famous forward, to Baltimore, while Joe Lapchick succeeded "Horse" Haggerty as center a year ago.

Metropolitan and Eastern league championships were included in the pennant triumphs of the team in 1920, 1921 and 1922, after which the club traveled without a "home court" for four years. Returning to league competition last fall, the Celtics ran up 15 victories in 18 National circuit games before entering the American league. They then proceeded to take the second half title in the latter race with the loss of only one contest. Their lone defeat in 16 games was administered by Cleveland's Rosenblums, the present American league titleholders.

The Celtics and Rosenblums, who won the first half of the American league race, will meet in the basketball "world series," April 6-7, at Cleveland, and 9-10 at Brooklyn, a fifth game to be played if necessary to decide the title.

The Celtics' greatest year, in 1922-1923, yielded 102 victories and only six defeats.

BALLINGER GETS THIRD IN MEET

The Ballinger Bearcat athletes went to San Angelo last Saturday only to come out in third place at a meet that 60 Ballinger, San Angelo, Winters and Miles athletes took part in.

H. Alagood, who took the meet here for Ballinger from San Angelo and Miles a short time ago, was able only to score five points in this meet for the Bearcats. San Angelo was high with 57 1-2 points; Winters, second, with a score of 36 1-3; Ballinger, third, with 27 1-6; and Miles, fourth, with 13.

Rip Ward, San Angelo Bobcat entry, was high point man with a score of 11.

Coach Bill Bissett, of San Angelo, was in charge of the meet. Friday and Saturday of this week, Coach Felton Wright will take his athletes to Winters to the country track meet.

(By Associated Press) MEXICO, D. F., April 4.—Baseball has entered into international relations as an influence of friendship across the Rio Grande.

Ban B. Johnson, to stimulate baseball interest in Mexico and thereby, he hopes, further friendship and understanding with the United States, has presented

Mexico with a trophy which is to be emblematic of the baseball championship of this country.

Flags of the United States and Mexico are engraved upon the trophy. Bronze figures of Cobb, Speaker and Walter Johnson, in action, surmount a base of mahogany and marble, silver and gold. Embodied there is the belief of the donor and the inspiration of his gift—that in the democracy of baseball lies a true foundation for real friendship between two peoples loving that game.

The trophy was presented to Excelsior, a city of Mexico newspaper which has helped to establish baseball in Mexico, by American Ambassador James R. Sheffield. Excelsior conducted the competition in which a city of Mexico team called "Comintra" won the trophy. It was then turned over to the national department of education, where it remains permanently upon exhibition, in the name of each year's championship team.

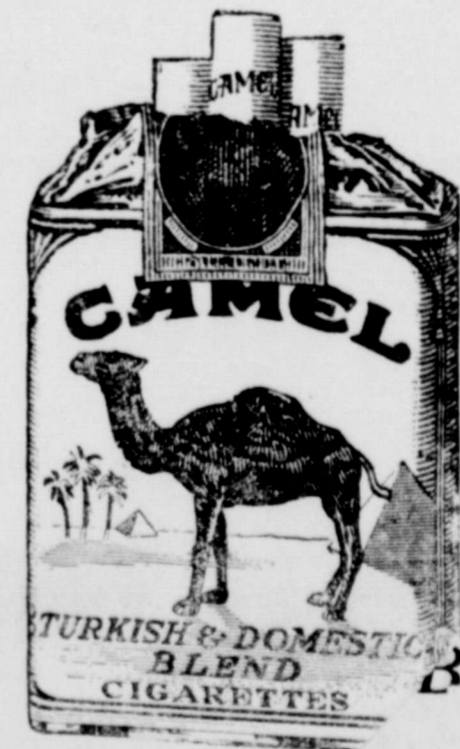

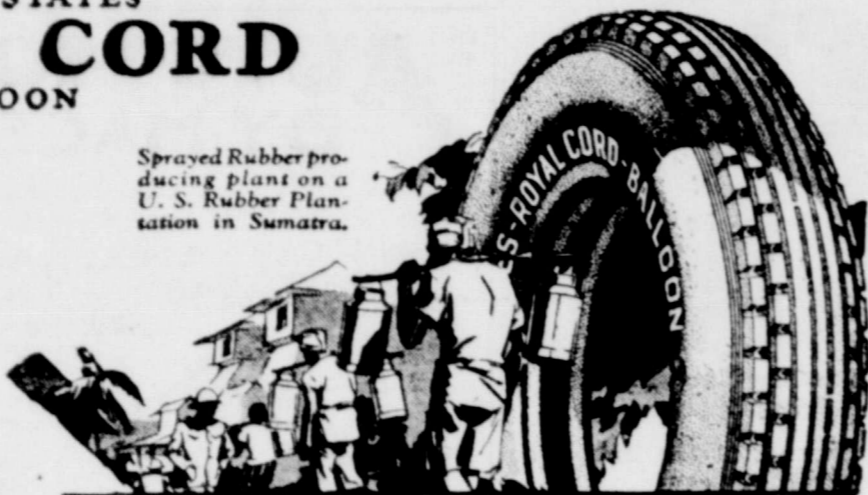

J. Hall Paxton, son of the Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Paxton, Presbyterian missionaries, is assistant vice-consul at Nanking and is credited with effective work during the occupation of the city by the Cantonese forces. He was rescued with others by American and British forces.

Prior to that emergency he went to Kuling in person and escorted a group of 40 American men, women and children who were isolated and in danger. The party had difficulty in reaching the coast and according to letters from missionaries received in Danville, Va., where Paxton formerly lived, roaming bands of soldiers frequently stopped them and required bribes before they were permitted to proceed. It cost the party \$400 before it reached the coast.

Paxton is a graduate of Yale and also studied at Cambridge, England, and in Paris.
