32 ARE KILLED IN TEXAS TORNADO

WILL ENTERTAIN CLUB MEMBERS

Boys and girls, members of the rural clubs of Runnels county, who are to gather here Saturday for a joint rally at the court house lawn, will be the guests of the Chamber of Commerce at the Palace Theatre at a morning matinee, J. D. Motley, secretary of the chamber, said Monday.

"Mr. Seales, manager of the theatre, has consented to allow the chamber the use of the Palace free for a matinee," Mr. Motley said. "The program will start about 11:00 o'clock and continue for more than an hour."

The films to be shown are furnished by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. They show the finest dairy and poultry farms in Texas and are of an educational nature. There will also be a two-reel comedy for the boys and girls in addition to an added feature entertainment, possibly by local high school girls. This however, will be worked out this week, Mr. Motley said.

The girls and boys are coming to Ballinger in answer to a call issued last week by Mrs. Lura Hollingsworth, county home demonstration agent, and C. W. Lehberg, county agricultural agent. The girls will hold a clothing contest with some 35 entries. Prizes will be awarded the first, second and third winners.

Mr. Lehberg and his club members will conduct stock and grain judging contests.

At noon luncheon will be eaten on the court house lawn, with the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce furnishing refreshments. Club members will bring their own lunches.

A program of entertainment for the afternoon, following the judging and the contests is being prepared this week.

TAG DAY DRIVE NETS ABOUT \$500

Approximately \$500 was collected here Saturday by the women of the Ballinger churches to be sent to the flood sufferers in the Mississippi Valley. The money has been turned over to E. D. Walker, local representative of the Red Cross, who will forward it with other donations to Red Cross headquarters at St. Louis.

The exact sum raised Saturday through the sale of tags amounted to \$483. There is still other money to be turned over to Mr. Walker for flood relief. About \$100 was collected before the Tag Day drive and it will also be sent to the sufferers.

Mr. Walker said Monday that the fund was still open and would be until Wednesday when the entire amount will be forwarded to the St. Louis office and from there it will be distributed to the stricken area.

"SUGAR BOWL" IS THREATENED

(By Associated Press)

NEW ORLEANS, May 9.—The "sugar bowl" of Central Louisiana was threatened with inundation today as flood waters from the Mississippi River, surging from six dyke crevasses in the Northeastern part of the state, piled up against the Bayou des Glaises levee, seeking an outlet to the sea.

A funnel-shaped stream covering thousands of square miles of the delta in Northeastern Louisiana poured straight into the backwaters that already had subjected the levee to enormous pressure.

DALLAS, May 9.—With the reporting of six more deaths, the total dead as the result of tornadoes early today stood at 32.

The additional six were: Mr. and Mrs. George Stidman and two children, killed near Wolfe City; and Mr. and Mrs. Lackey, killed near Kellogg.

DALLAS, May 9.—Ten persons were reported killed in a tornado which struck Garland and Nevada early today. About 40 were injured.

The storm hit the residence section of Garland about 3:30 o'clock and roared through Nevada a few minutes later.

According to the latest reports, eight were killed at Garland and two at Nevada.

The Garland dead are: Charles Smiley and wife; Lilith Smiley, aged 10; Emma Bridges, 18; Monroe Todd, 35; Grandma Nicholson, 78; C. R. McLeod and wife. The West portion of Nevada was demolished but owing to high water and interrupted telegraphic service, communication of details were not available from there.

The storm passed over Dallas but was too high to do any damage.

NEVADA, Collin County, Tex., May 9.—Sixteen persons were killed and about 50 injured when a tornado struck this town of about 800 population about 3:00 o'clock today. Some of the injured are expected to die. Practically the entire business district, including fifteen brick structures, was destroyed. The Odd Fellows hall was the only building left standing.

The dead are: Mrs. R. C. Evans, 22; Mrs. J. T. Lemons, 45; Mrs. B. Craft, 65; the baby of Will Vaughn; Miss Pauline Martin, 15; J. T. Robinson, 64; J. D. Cope, 66; Gladys Lemons, 12; Mrs. Bessie Tackett and the two Tackett children; Mrs. J. M. Wilson, 50; Mrs. J. C. Johnson, Mrs. Etta Vaughan, and two negro children.

The First Baptist and First Methodist churches were badly damaged but the remains of the Baptist church was turned into a temporary hospital.

The school house was destroyed. Property damage is estimated to be about \$1,000,000.

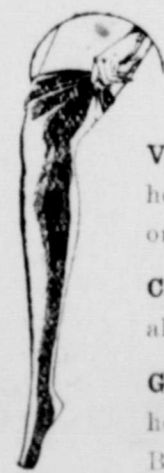
A relief train was rushed here from Greenville.

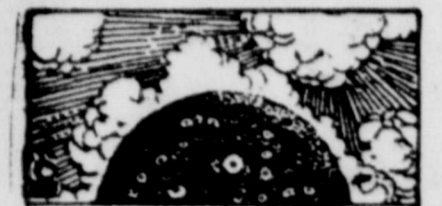

NATIONAL GUARD FACTS

Why support a National Guard in time of peace?

First—Within the confines of the United States there are 100,000,000 souls, and the total enlisted and commissioned personnel of the Army and Navy both aggregate approximately 120,000 men, scarcely enough men to act as instructors should an emergency arise, much less defend the extensive borders of the United States and its outlying possessions.

Fourth—Ballinger has a National Guard company and a good one. New men of the right type can be used at any time. The local company meets every Thursday night at the American Legion hall. One hour and a half each week cannot be spent to a better advantage than working with this unit. Visit them any Thursday evening and see what they are doing and if you like it join in with them and render some public service while you can.

The committee will then work out a report of the two weeks campaign and call another meeting to be held here where reports from the various sectional committees will be heard.

The campaign was extended this week on account of trips to Maverick, Hatchel and Benoit being rained out last Wednesday night.

W. B. Currie, C. W. Lehberg, Mr. Motley, E. E. King, president of the Runnels County Fair Association; M. C. Atkins, president of the local chamber; R. E. White, county superintendent; and G. L. Huckaby, field editor of the Farm & Ranch, visited the different towns in the county.

"We are getting much better support from the various communities than was looked for," Mr. Motley said Monday, "and according to the interest and the number of leading citizens of the county taking part, the creamery is almost certain."

SUNSHINE CAKE

In the spring months the house-keeper need not stint on using eggs, says the Bureau of Home Economics in recommending a recipe for sunshine cake, leader in popularity in the sponge-cake group.

These ingredients have been found to suit the queen's taste:

Six egg whites, 3 egg yolks, 1 teaspoon flavoring, 1 teaspoon cream tartar, 1 cup sifted soft what or pastry flour, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt.

Beat yolks and whites separately, adding half the salt to the whites so they will beat up very stiff. Add sugar to beaten yolks and begin adding flour which has been sifted with cream of tartar and rest of salt. This mixture will be so stiff that some beaten egg whites will have to be added for moisture before all flour is mixed in. Fold egg whites in carefully so as not to release any air. Add flavoring, either vanilla, orange or lemon extract. Pour batter when mixed into smooth ungreased tube pan. Cake should be baked slowly in very moderate oven.

JACKSON, Miss., May 9.—From copy desk to governor within 15 years is the record of Dennis Murphree, who automatically became chief executive of Mississippi upon the death of Gov. Whitfield.

While the new governor relinquished his duties as editor of the Pittsboro (Miss.) Monitor at the age of 25 to enter the state legislature, he has never completely given up newspaper work. He became lieutenant-governor in 1923 and now at 41 is the first member of the newspaper fraternity in many years to serve as chief executive in the state.

Governor Murphree will continue the policies of his predecessor for the remainder of the term, which expires January 1, 1928.

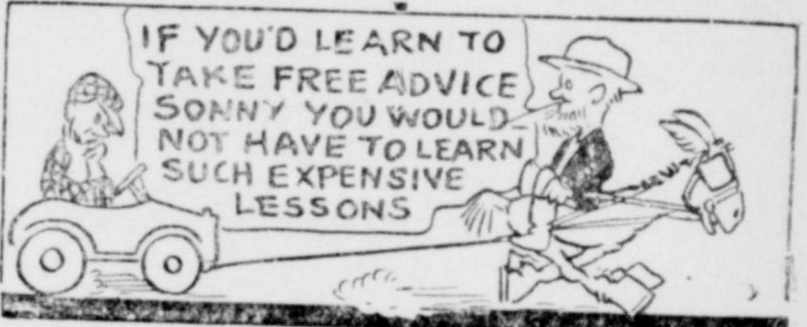

Camera Records Growth



Biographical sketches of barnyard babies at the government experimental dairy farm at Beltsville, Md., are written with a camera.

From calfhood to maturity photographs of the dairy herd are made at regular intervals, and with a record of dates of various weights and other changes affixed to each picture investigators are able to record the changes of conformation and development in such a way as to provide material assistance in dairy cattle breeding studies.

A feature of the photographic work is the use of a background, cross-ruled in six-inch squares, for "shooting" animals at various stages up to a year old. Older animals pose on a semi-circular board track, but all the pictures are taken with the same camera, which is placed on a post and at the same focal length. In this way comparisons between various animals and between different pictures of the same animal can be equitably made.

The photographs show some striking changes in general conformation of an animal in a single year, marked shifting in the angle of the rump in a few months' time and other transformations. They show, it is claimed, an indisputable story of the records of each animal and are of much value in a breeding test where comparable information is gathered in each succeeding generation.

MASON STARTS RE-BUILDING LOCAL GIN

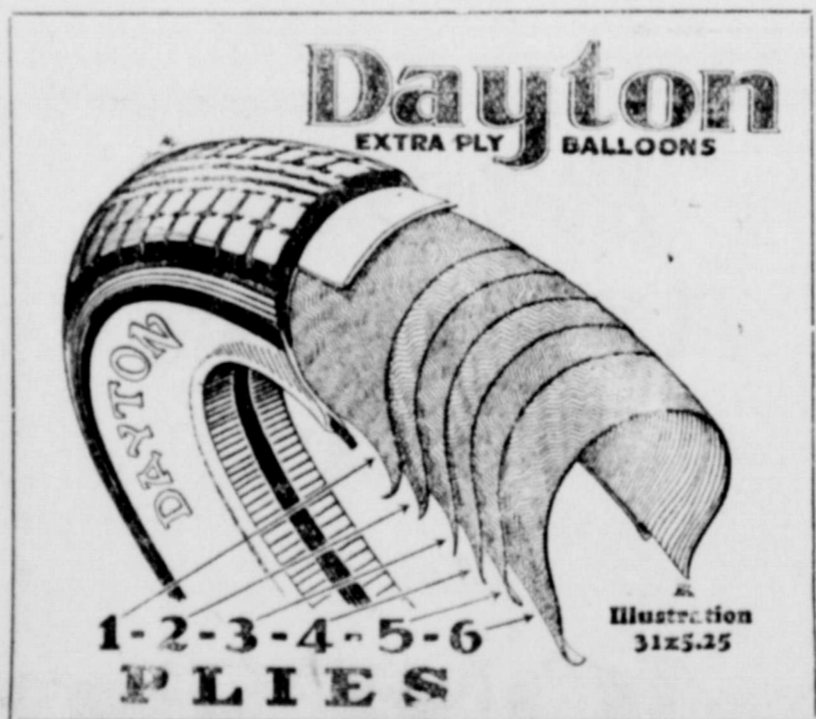
