## BIG BEND LEVEE HAS CREVASSE

(By Associated Press)  
BATON ROUGE, La., May 13.—Tremendous pressure by the greatest Mississippi flood finally broke the Big Bend levee today at Moreauville on the Bayou des Glaises, on which, during the past week, more than 1,000 workers have labored to save the dyke.

It is thought that about a 100-foot crevasse of water will affect about 25,000 people and 60,000 acres, relief officials said.

Officials said that in the immediate vicinity on the way to the Gulf of Mexico it was estimated that an additional 60,000 people would be driven from their homes and that nearly one million acres would be inundated.

State Commissioner of Agriculture Wilson estimated the loss in the newly flooded area at \$10,000,000.

NEW ORLEANS, May 13.—Surprise blanketed Louisiana's "sugar bowl" today as rising waters crept toward the top of Bayou des Glaises levees where for three days a crevasse has been expected.

Determined residents are still waging a desperate fight to hold the Big Bend levees against the rising waters. Their efforts were hampered by rain yesterday.

## FALL-SINCLAIR CASE POSTPONED

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The trial of the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy case was postponed today in the District of Columbia Supreme Court from May 23 to October 17.

Continuance was asked by the government counsel so that a further effort might be made to serve a subpoena on James O'Neill, former president of the Prairie Oil & Gas Company, described as a pivotal witness.

Announcement was made that H. M. Blackmer, long sought witness, had been located in France and that a subpoena had been served on him.

## HOUSE WORKS; SENATE IDLE

AUSTIN, May 13.—With the Senate adjourned until Monday, the House went into session today to consider school appropriations contained in the total of more than \$53,000,000 which must be cut to fit the revenue.

After a lengthy discussion the House decided to take action first on the revised bill carrying \$4,500,000 to supplement the available school funds.

## Fine Feet Bring Fine Service Biologists Say About Horses



To get the utmost service out of these horses which have survived the machine period, see that their feet are trimmed "on the level" once a month, says the Biological Survey.

Proper attention to this particular, it adds, makes a horse more serviceable by preventing needless strain on the tendons, deformity of the feet and legs, unsoundness and improper action. Normal positions of the legs, the survey declares, are made possible by trimming the feet so that the body weight is uniformly distributed over all four legs.

It is essential to start trimming the feet when the horse is young. In leveling the survey says, it should be remembered that the hoof grows faster in the toe than in the heel. Normal angles for fore pasterns are 45 degrees and for back pasterns, 50 degrees.

When removing surplus portions of the hoof, the survey suggests that generally it is best to lower the heel first. A knife, rasp and pinchers are needed for a proper trimming, and the advice is that the knife should never be used on the bars or frog. Ragged portions of the frog may be removed with pinchers.

If the foot being trimmed has been shod, an indication of what portion needs most attention can be obtained from studying the wear of the cast-off shoe. Horses that are allowed to run and work bare-footed should have the edges of the wall rounded off with the rasp to prevent chipping and cracking, say the experts.

## SNYDER KILLERS ARE TO DIE NEXT MONTH

### CONTINUES SEARCH FOR TWO FLYERS

(By Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, May 13.—A concentrated search of the wide and rocky areas of the extreme north-eastern Atlantic coast was underway today for Captains Coli and Nungesser as new reports bolstered the theory that the lost plane passed over that region in a fog last Monday morning.

America, France and the Canadian government are continuing to search along the Atlantic coast, the English Channel and off the shores of Ireland.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Feasibility of sending the dirigible Los Angeles as far north as the coast of Labrador in search of the French flyers, Nungesser and Coli, was considered today by the United States navy.

Neither of the defendant's showed any emotion as Justice Scudder pronounced the sentence.

An appeal from the sentence is contemplated by counsel for Mrs. Snyder and Gray. The appeal will be made direct to the Court of Appeals, the state's highest tribunal.

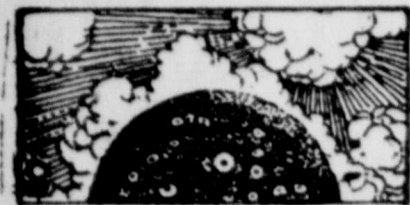

**WILL THEY GO TO THEIR DEATH?**

Sex makes little or no difference in murder trials in New York, it appears from the verdict recently rendered by the jury in the Snyder-Gray trial, as both the woman and the man in the case received the death penalty, and today were sentenced to death in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison by the justice who heard the trial.

Both got what was coming to them and unless the higher courts reverse the case, in about one month they will go to their death. Both blamed the other until after the verdict was announced, and then Gray after thinking it over, is reported to have said: "I didn't want to hurt her."

Probably the couple calmly killed Snyder as he lay in his bed. Will they go to their death as calm and composed as they were when they put another to death that their longing might be fulfilled?

The higher courts should leave the verdict as it stands and should affirm the sentence of the pair of murderers.
