NEW TERRITORY IN LOUISIANA INUNDATED

(By Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, May 19.—Residents of West Atchafalaya basin were gathering up their possessions today and fleeing from their homes because of flood warnings issued by the weather bureau. Their homes are 100 to 150 miles from New Orleans.
Sudden inundation of an additional portion of the Saint Landry parish was sending several feet of water into Beggs, Garland, Bubuisson, Whiteville and into the country surrounding Bunkie, it was reported.
More than 5,000 persons are estimated to be in the inundated territory.

NEW ORLEANS, May 19.—Flood waters streaming through the Bayou des Glaives break was tearing through the Evangeline country today driving thousands from their homes.

OKMULGEE, Okla., May 19.—Matthew Kimes and his bandit gang who held up two banks at Beggs yesterday, killed Chief of Police McAnally, and escaped with \$18,000, have been cornered at Quay, Pawnee county, by a posse of more than 100 armed citizens and officers, according to Constable E. W. Jones, of Beggs. Jones declared that the robbers had apparently headed for the Osage country, where it is believed they have been making their headquarters.

STORM DAMAGES NORTH STATES

CHICAGO, May 19.—Peoria, Illinois, and Indianapolis, Indiana were hardest hit in the latest serious storm which lashed through portions of Indiana and Illinois late yesterday.
Several persons are believed to have been drowned at Peoria, where six inches of rain fell within a few hours, flooding the downtown streets and basements. The loss at Peoria has been estimated at \$750,000.
More than 100 persons were injured in Indianapolis when an 80-mile per hour gale struck the city.
Damage there is estimated at \$3,000,000.

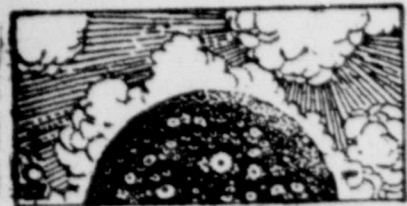

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A COMMUNITY AUDITORIUM

There is not an auditorium in Ballinger that will seat more than 1,000 persons and if Ballinger ever has programs like those held last Sunday morning and Tuesday night, something will have to be done in order to accommodate those wishing to attend.

On several occasions Ballinger has had district conventions, church and lodge gatherings, club meetings, etc., that demanded large a auditorium but there has not been a building that would seat more than a thousand people.

Ballinger needs an auditorium that will take care of as large a crowd that might ever gather here. The baccalaureate sermon last Sunday morning was attended by 1,000 odd persons and many were turned away unable to get in the auditorium. Tuesday night at the graduating exercises about 1,000 attended with more than 200 being turned away.

An auditorium is badly needed here, an auditorium to hold just such programs in, an auditorium in which might be held winter band concerts and entertainments, union revival services, district conventions and other meetings that bring large crowds.

A city auditorium under the control of the city commission, with offices for the city officials, fire department, etc., would serve the purpose.

Why not start a move to erect such a building and give all Ballinger citizens a chance to attend when big programs are held here?

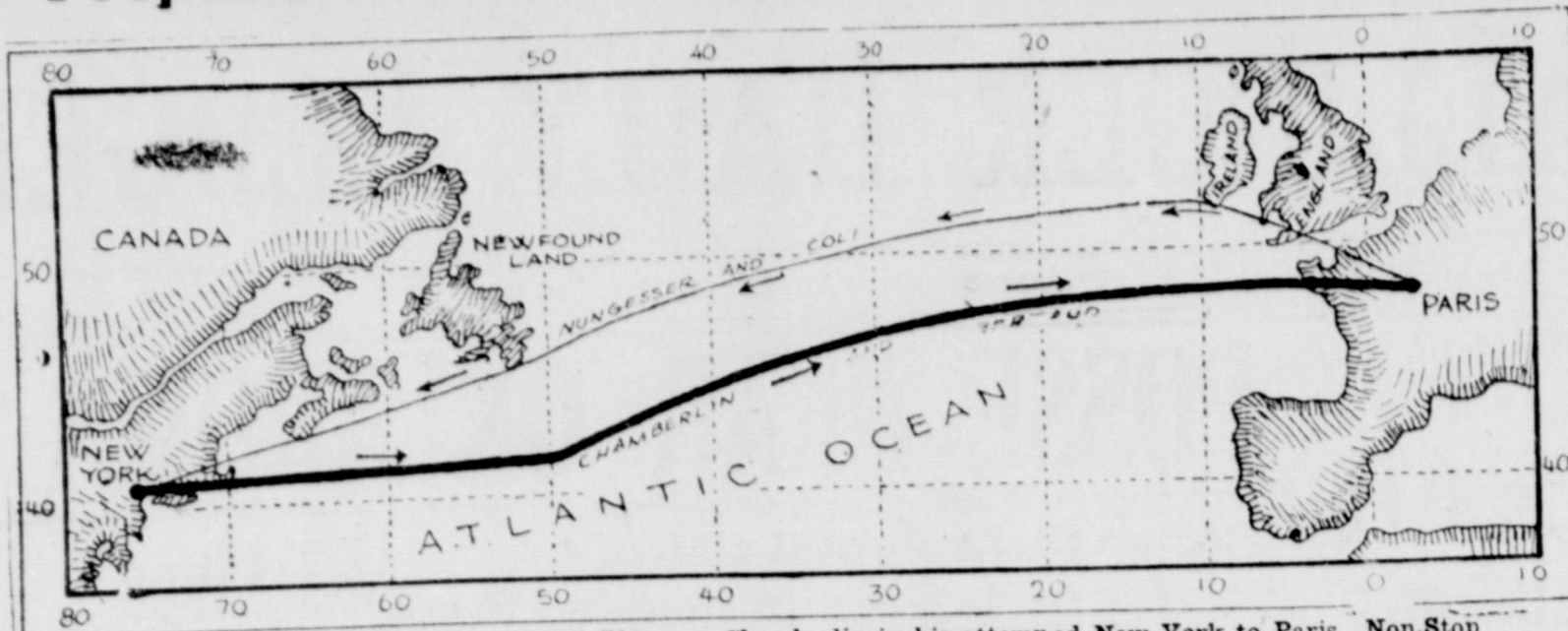

He hopes to convince them all that North Dakota's products are the best in the world, and through them to convince the world.

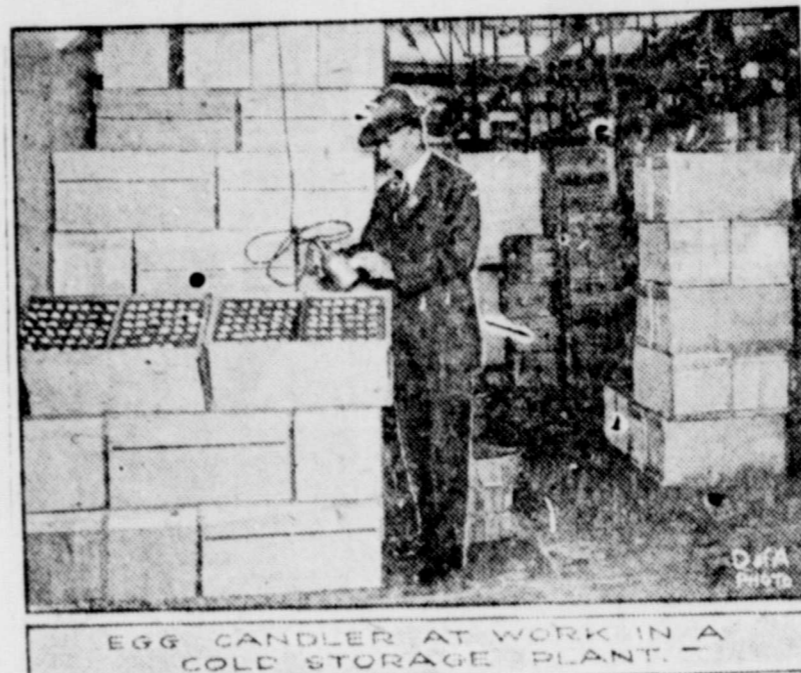
Sorlie sold shoes so well that he became also a banker, a general merchant and a garage owner. He sells ideas so well that he is serving a second term as governor.

Good Eggs are Described in Campaign for Better Product

An egg is an egg to most people. Few realize, agricultural authorities say, that the health of these two-ounce products may be judged by the behavior and appearance of the yolk and white when they are flipped into the breakfast skillet.

Dairy experts of the Department of Agriculture have prepared a 14 by 20-inch poster for distribution in a drive to encourage the production and marketing of better eggs.

A good egg may be determined, it is explained, on the basis of four characteristics: a clear, firm white, and upstanding yolk, a

good flavor and a strong shell. Strong shells mean reduction of breakage losses. A good flavor is best maintained by keeping eggs in sanitary places. When broken, the white should be clear and divided into two portions. If the quality is good, the thicker and firmer portion immediately surrounding the yolk will stand up well, while the thinner white section will tend to flatten out in the dish. The yolk should be of uniform yellow color and hold its form well.

So much for the egg after it is broken. The candler, a small instrument with an electric light, may be used to peer through the shell for bad qualities.

(By Associated Press) OAKLAND, Calif., May 17.—Eight in number, as virile, vigorous and full of vim as a Cook County election were the Chicago Sea Scouts who sailed through the Golden Gate on the "Northern Light" and headed for Arctic regions.

The Sea Scouts, maritime cousins of the Boy Scouts, range in age from 15 to 20 years. They are the guests of John Borden, wealthy Chicagoan, member of the National Sea Scout Council, who has made several trips into the far North, exploring, hunting big game and whaling.

The "Northern Light" was built by Borden expressly for the Borden-Field Museum Alaska Arctic expedition. It is a yacht of the auxiliary power schooner type, displacing 500 tons.

A polar bear hunt in the frozen wastes has been promised the juvenile adventurers.

The six or seven months in the frozen North will not be a "dog's life" for the husky young sailors and their mascot, a St. Charles spaniel. It isn't that kind of a ship. It is not only the first time the cold waters at the top of the world have been invaded by Sea Scouts but also it probably will be the most luxuriously equipped expedition to break Polar ice. The 140-foot yacht was constructed at a cost of \$250,000.

With two radio receiving sets aboard, the young explorers will not know the lonesomeness of the old days of Peary and Cook, the enter "Bear" and the "Boxer." "What do we call the pooch? He's no pooch," said the spokesman. "He's a \$10,000 dog and his name's 'Sky Rocket'."

The "Northern Light" will proceed through the Inland passage, through the Aleutians and then in the direction of Point Barrow into the realm of the polar bear.

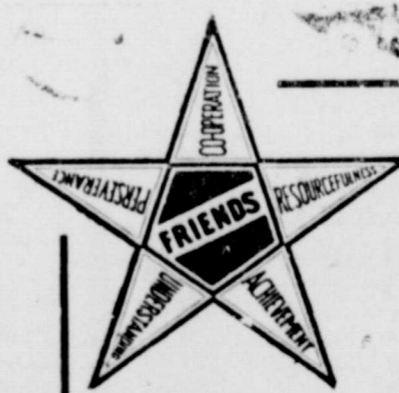

WINSTON HOOPER MAY ENTER OLYMPIC GAMES

Winston Hooper, son of Rev. and Mrs. R. B. Hooper, of this city, has just finished a very colorful career in track work at Southern Methodist University at Dallas this year, having set many new records in the Southern Conference. The young runner will enter the bigger meets during June and July and stands a good chance to qualify for the Olympic

Games this year. In case he does qualify the city of Dallas will pay his expenses to take part in these contests.

The following is taken from the Dallas News at the close of the track season:

"Winston Hooper, greatest miler ever turned out of the Southwest, hung up his Red and Blue running togs of S. M. U. Monday, after galloping over the cinder paths for three years for the hilltop institution.

"The little 'running fool' ended his career with the goal which he set for himself—to hold the records in the mile and the half-mile of the Southwestern Conference.

"In his last meet in Houston, Saturday, Hooper ran the greatest races of his career for Mustang glory. He promised his team-mates he would break his own mile and half-mile records. He clipped two seconds from the mile but fell just two-tenths of a second short of setting a new record in the half mile.

"Hoopers has been running for many years and trains the year round. He was picked in 1926 as one of the 'big four' mile runners in the United States.

"Altho making no announcement to the effect, it is rumored Hooper will not quit the running game, but will run under the colors of the Dallas Athletic Club, as Charlie Paddock does for the Hollywood A. C.

"Hooper has an eye on the Olympics and he will run in the Southern A. A. U. meet at Houston next Saturday and on June 11 he will participate in the national collegiate meet at Chicago. On July 4, Hooper plans to run in the National A. A. U. in Chicago, from which likely will be picked the runner to represent the United States in the Olympic Games."

Eggplant in New Recipe



STUFFED EGGPLANT

Eggplant is almost universally served in fried slices. By way of variation it may be stuffed and baked occasionally. Federal Home Economics experts suggest.

Many mixtures may be used. Most of them will contain a starchy material like bread crumbs, cooked rice, or left-over macaroni and cheese.

Onion flavor gives zest to whatever stuffing is used. The onion should be cooked, but not fried, in butter or other fat, and then blended with the rest of the stuffing. Bread crumbs, the experts say, should always be combined with the butter to make them rich before they are added to other ingredients. A recipe for stuffed eggplant:

One large eggplant; one teaspoon salt; four tablespoons chopped peanuts; two cups finely cut raw cabbage or cooked stringed beans; two tablespoons butter; one cup fine bread crumbs.
