LINDBERGH LANDS IN PARIS AT 10:21

SECOND SHERIFF OF RUNNELS DIES AT ABILENE FRI.

John W. Clappitt, 77 years of age, the second sheriff to serve Runnels county, died Friday at 12:30 o'clock at the home of his daughter, Mrs. O. D. Dillingham, in Abilene. Funeral services will be held here Sunday afternoon from the Eighth Street Presbyterian Church at 3:30 o'clock, with Rev. Alvin O. Rue, pastor of the church, officiating.

C. R. Crews, of Higginbotham Bros. & Co., will go to Abilene early Sunday and bring the body to Ballinger for interment.

Details of Mr. Clappitt's death are not known here. He was known to be in bad health but his condition was not known to be serious at the time of his death.

Mr. Clappitt was a member of the Eighth Street Presbyterian Church here, having joined that faith some 35 years ago. For several years he was active in the church, being a ruling elder. The pioneer was very attentive in his Sunday school and church duties and was always present when his health permitted.

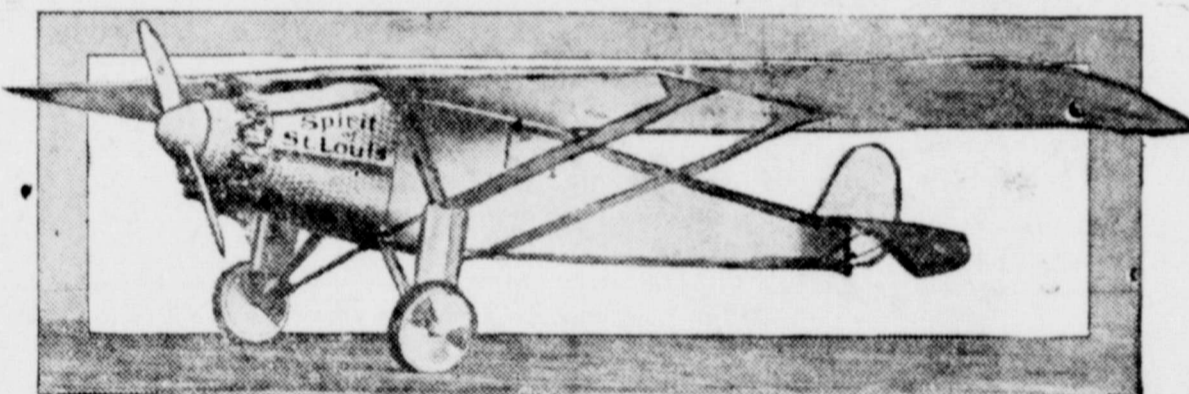
STORM DUE ON TEXAS COAST

PARIS, May 21.—Captain Charles A. "Lucky" Lindbergh, American aviator, landed here safely tonight, completing his non-stop flight from New York to Paris.

Lindbergh in his plane "The Spirit of St. Louis" came down on the landing field at 10:21 p. m. Paris time, two hours ahead of estimated time.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 21.—the Atlantic behind him at Smer-Captain Charles A. Lindbergh's wick harbor, Lindbergh went airplane, "The Spirit of St. Louis," passed over Valencia Island, in Southern Ireland, at 9:00 a. m., Eastern standard time, according to a report broadcast from Chatham, England, and picked up at the radio station at Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, and relayed to the government station here.

NEW YORK, May 21.—Like he was bound for a day's picnic, "Lucky" Lindbergh took five sandwiches to see him through to Paris, B. F. Mahoney, president of the Ryan Air Lines, builders of his plane, "The Spirit of St. Louis," today gave out aent the flyer's food supply.

"He is carrying two ham sandwiches, two roast beef sandwiches and one hard boiled egg sandwich. I had to press the last one sighted flying over Dover, on him—he said four would be enough," Mahoney declared.

Lindbergh carried two canteens of water, about four quarts in all, but no coffee. As reserve rations he took two small cakes, highly concentrated in food alue, sufficient for a week. The plane has a device for making moisture out of one's breath.

NEW YORK, May 21.—The French Cable Company announces the receipt of official advices saying that Captain Lindbergh's plane passed over Bayeux, on the French coast, at 8:00 o'clock tonight, French time.

LONDON, May 21.—Dispatches from three points in South-western Ireland this afternoon confirmed the report that Capt. Charles A. Lindbergh, American aviator, had spanned the Atlantic Ocean with the most hazardous part of his New York to Paris non-stop flight behind him.

The plane was sighted by a collier off the southern coast of Ireland, later over Smerwick harbor and then over Dingle Bay.

HARRY FLOOD BYRD

RICHMOND, Va., May 20.—If
you finger the pages of Virginia's
history, you will find the name
"Byrd" scattered here and there
from Colonial times. And among
the latest of these are Governor
Harry Flood Byrd and Com-
mander Richard Evelyn Byrd,
brothers.

While Richard Evelyn is en-
gaged in flying, Harry Flood, as
one of the youngest governors
ever to hold office in Virginia, is
embarked on an extensive state
legislative program. Before
assuming the governorship, he
had served in the general
assembly and headed his party as
chairman of the Democratic State
Executive Committee.

He owns two newspapers and is
one of the largest commercial
apple growers in the country.

**More than 1,000 People
Present at Mason Party**

More than 300 delegates from
the seven districts of the West
Texas Utilities Company gath-
ered at Mason, Thursday night
and Friday for the second quar-
terly party of 1927, to celebrate
the extension of service of the
greatest utilities organization in
West Texas.

Delegates and district officials
of the company began gathering
in Mason early Thursday after-
noon and by 10:00 o'clock Friday
morning more than 300 repre-
sentatives of the company, in-
cluding George W. Fry, general
manager; Price Campbell, gen-
eral superintendent; Joe A.
White, commercial manager;
Fred W. Schroeder, transmission
superintendent; W. Grady Kin-
solving, traffic manager, and
other officials.

The meeting convened about
9:30 o'clock at the Mason county
court house with Lamar Thaxton,
Mason attorney, delivering the
address of welcome.

Mr. Thaxton in his address told
of the assets of Mason county,
something of its history, and de-
clared in closing that he was
speaking for the citizens of
Mason and Mason county when
he said that the West Texas Utilities
Company was considered an
asset to the town and county. He
then presented Mr. Fry with the
keys to the county jail.

P. W. Campbell, superintendent
of District B, Cisco, responded to
the address and made a short but
interesting response. While he
was completing his talk the Bal-
linger Booster Band, headed by
J. D. Motley, secretary of the
Ballinger Chamber of Commerce,
and Earl Morley, superintendent
of District G, made its appearance
in the court room and played a
very peppy concert.

Mr. Motley was introduced and
made a short talk, naming a few
of the many things the West
Texas Utilities Company had
done for West Texas and in
closing asked all employees of the
company and Mason citizens to
visit in Ballinger.

In the afternoon the Ballinger
band led the parade thru Mason
streets and was cheered from
every corner. Short concerts
were also played for the women's
morning session and at the polo
game in the afternoon. At the
home of C. L. Martin, Mason
county ranchman, the band was
heard on almost every occasion
and was praised very highly by
Mason citizens. H. H. Carsey is

director of the band.
The Mason band, organized
only a short time ago, under the
direction of R. P. Rose, was heard
in the morning and at the polo
game.

Following the general assembly
the company photographer took
a group picture with Mr. Fry and
the Ballinger band in the center
of the photograph. The meeting
then adjourned with the district
superintendents and assistant
district superintendents meeting
in the court house and the women
with the remainder of the crowd
gathering in the Mason theatre.
The women's meeting was taken
up entirely with a well-arranged
program, including a one-act play
"Let's Stay Married," given by
the San Angelo women's organi-
zation. This playlet was pre-
sented before the Federation of
Women's Clubs district conven-
tion at Ozona on May 4, and four
other invitations have been re-
ceived to stage the sketch.

Mrs. Waite Smith, of Ballinger,
presided at the women's meeting.
Violin solos and readings were
presented by various members of
the organization.

The other meetings were very
short, and at 12:30 o'clock lunch-
eons was served by the women
through the Mason Chamber of
Commerce at the tourist park, a
spot covered with large pecan
trees on the banks of a small
stream fed by springs from the
hills.

The parade followed with the
Ballinger band at the head.
Mason business closed at 2:00 o'-
clock and all went to the polo
game.

The remainder of the day was
spent at the ranch of C. L. Martin
and sons, nine miles south of
Mason on the Fredericksburg
road.

The polo game was the first
feature of the afternoon's enter-
tainment with Fredericksburg
winning over the Utilities team
by a score of 4 to 1. The field
was rather slow as it had been
newly constructed. The Mason
and Ballinger bands furnished
music for this occasion. Kneese,
playing position No. 2 on the
Fredericksburg team, was star of
the game, scoring three of his
team's four points.

The burro polo game between
employees of Districts G and T,
was won by Chester Cherry, Jack
Whitaker, J. W. Wilson, Bill
Coleman and others of the Ballinger
organization. The score was
3 to 0. This was one of the
most entertaining features of the

program.
Probably the most enjoyable
part of the day's program came
when the crowd, now estimated
at more than 1,000 people, from
all sections of West Texas, started
gathering at the modern ranch
home of C. L. Martin, pioneer of
the county, who was instrumental
in the extension of the lines of
the company to the south.

Here the crowds saw the mod-
ern conveniences afforded when
electricity is available on the
farm or ranch. The home faces
south with a beautiful lawn, and
a wonderful pear, apple, plum
and peach orchard on the west,
with strawberry vines, mint
plants and other trucks and fruits
not usually grown on the farm.

For the barbecue 1,500 pounds
of beef and 500 pounds of chevon
were prepared by old timers who
knew how to cut and barbecue
meat. The count at the table
showed that more than 1,000
passed by.

Following the barbecue, a dance
orchestra from Houston, of eight
musicians, played for a dance,
beginning at 9:30 o'clock and
continuing until 1:00 o'clock.
This was the grand finale which
brought to the end a perfect day.

Registrations at the office of
the company in Mason showed
that more than 300 employees from
all districts of the company were
present. There were also guests
from Ballinger, Abilene, San
Angelo, Breckenridge, Stamford,
Cisco, Santa Anna and Freder-
icksburg.

The program was arranged and
all details were worked out for
this party by W. G. Owsley,
of Mason, superintendent of Dis-
trict F, and formerly of this city;
Earl Morley, of this city; C. E.
Coombs, of Mason; G. L.
Murphy, of San Angelo; and Joe
A. White, of Abilene. To these
men, credit must be given for
the most successful quarterly
party ever attempted by the West
Texas Utilities Company.

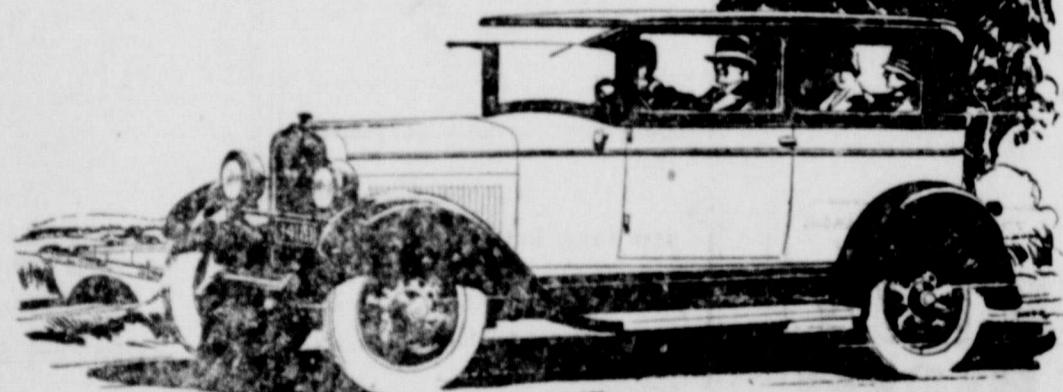

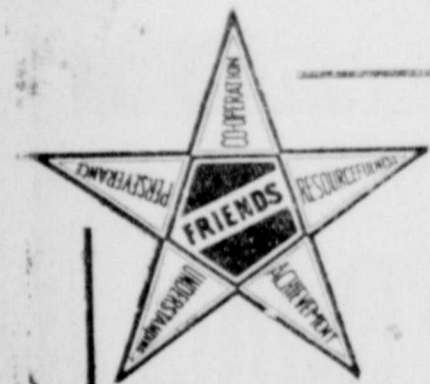
