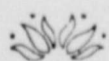

LINDY GOES TO NEW YORK FOR WELCOME

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, June 13.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh dropped down out of the skies onto the waters of lower New York Bay at 8:45 a. m. today after a quick flight from Washington and a change of planes at Mitchell Field, Long Island.

Within a few minutes after his landing in the bay Lindbergh was taken aboard the City of Macon and the boat proceeded full speed ahead up the narrows with craft of all descriptions fluttering flags and welcome banners.

BOLLING FIELD, Washington, D. C., June 13.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh hopped off from Bolling Field in an army airplane after his Spirit of St. Louis had developed engine trouble today.

The take-off was an easy one, lasting only 100 feet. Lindbergh nosed his plane almost straight into the air and circled the field until he was over the Potomac River, then put the plane through a series of stunts.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The San Francisco-to-Hawaii air flight as planned will be made in a short time, Col. Charles Lindbergh said today, but he warned that the use of the air route navigation methods was highly important.

The famous flyer discussed the trans-Pacific flight at a breakfast given here in his honor by the

National Aeronautical Association.

NEW YORK, June 13.—Mrs. Evangeline Lindbergh, mother of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, arrived here today from Washington.

Major William Deegan, representing Mayor Jimmie Walker's reception committee, received her. She was driven immediately to an apartment reserved for use by herself and son.

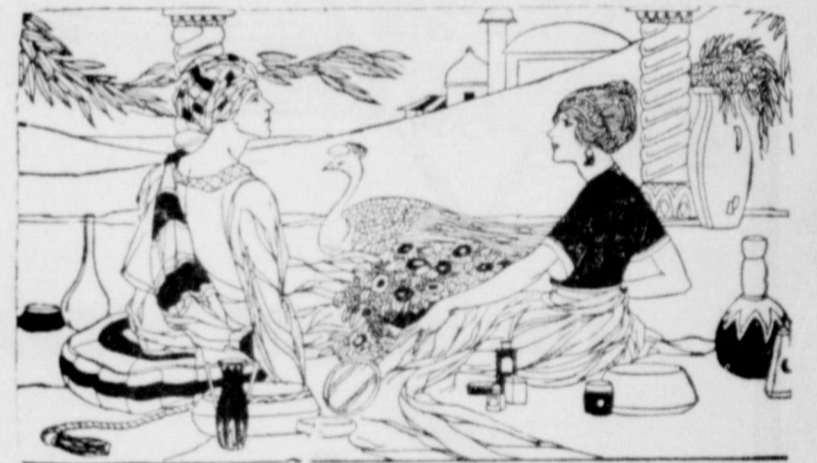

Wherever she may be, the American farm woman is an exponent of economical home improvement government data shows.

Through county home demonstration agents, and perhaps the state home furnishing specialist, she has learned how to beautify her surroundings in a limited time and with a small expenditure.

The accompanying picture is considered an outstanding example. It shows a living-room from which wall paper, unsightly from twenty years' use was removed. The plaster was patched and the walls given two coats of dark cream paint.

An old wood-burner stove, in use for many years, was removed and the fireplace cleaned and repaired. An old-fashioned pair of andirons, with tongs and shovel,

was purchased for \$1.10, and the whole fireplace painted black.

The floor, already in good condition, was cleaned and oiled. All woodwork in the room was painted a dark brown color. Old chairs were painted or varnished. Stone crocks, bought at a sale, were painted yellow for use as vases. A small writing desk was made of boards and broom handles.

Rugs were dyed yellow and brown and fashioned into a rug. A table runner was made from an old linen sheet dyed yellow. Inside curtains were fashioned of cream scrim, and the valance and side draperies made of material already on hand.

Candlesticks were purchased for ten cents, bringing the entire cost of improvement to a total of \$10.50.

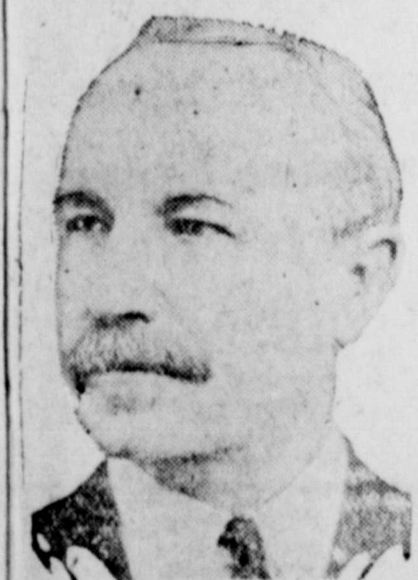
