THREE KILLERS ARE EXECUTED

(By Associated Press) LITTLE ROCK, June 24.—Longie Dixon, a negro, was executed here today at the state prison for the murder last April of Floella McDonald, a 12-year-old white girl.

CHICAGO, June 24.—Elgin Lyons, of Columbia, a soldier of fortune, was hanged here today for the murder last December of Julian Bonfield, a policeman.

To the last Lyons avowed his innocence.

LINCOLN, June 24.—Frank Carter, Omaha sniper-bandit, was electrocuted at the Nebraska state penitentiary today for the murder at Omaha, 18 months ago, of Dr. A. R. Pearles.

ARMY TO HAVE NON-STOP HOP

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 24.—A San Francisco-to-Hawaii non-stop flight by the Army Air Corps, was authorized today by Secretary Davis.

The flight, which will be approximately 2,407 miles, will be attempted by Lieutenant Lester Maitland and Albert Pegenberger.

The time of departure has not been selected but it is expected to be some time during the month of July.

POSSE AFTER TWO BANDITS

(By Associated Press) CHANDLER, Okla., June 24.—Surrounded in a wooded section of Lincoln county, near Avery, two bandits are believed to be near capture by a posse of more than 100 men.

The pair is believed to be those who robbed the Avery State Bank of an unestimated amount of money.

Officials of the bank were overpowered and bound by robbers a few minutes after they had opened the bank this morning.

J. B. Pace Sr., of the Wilmett county, was in Ballinger Thursday looking after business.

Judge Paul Trimmer has returned from Austin, where he had been looking after business matters for Runnels county.

MINE CONVICTS STILL STRIKING

(By Associated Press) LANSING, Kans., June 24.—Three hundred and twenty-eight prisoners who barricaded themselves in a coal mine of the Kansas penitentiary system here, today continued to strike against the rules.

They have been in the mine several hours without food.

WEATHER HOLDS BYRD'S FLIGHT

(By Associated Press) ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., June 24.—Commander Richard E. Byrd said today that it was improbable that the America would take off on its trans-Atlantic flight either today or tomorrow.

He qualified this statement by adding: "but no one can ever tell about the weather and we will hop off as soon as weather observers say the word."

ARMS DELEGATES STILL IN MEET

(By Associated Press) GENEVA, June 24.—Great Britain will accept in part with the United States, the matter of 10,000-ton cruisers, the Lord Admiral said today.

The question of other cruisers is still under discussion, he asserted.

He declared that if the British project is agreed to, the 10,000-ton category would disappear when the time came for replacement of the vessels and the maximum of all would then be 7,500 tons.

28 CONVICTS ARE RE-TAKEN

(By Associated Press) HUNTSVILLE, June 24.—Ed Crowder, of Houston, reported to be one of the ring-leaders in the break at the Ferguson prison farm Tuesday night, has been recaptured near the farm, it was learned here today.

Officials at the prison said today that 23 of the 35 convicts have now been recaptured.

MADISONVILLE, Tex., June 24.—All but seven prisoners who escaped from the Ferguson state prison farm have been recaptured, word from the farm received here this afternoon, said.

Two more were caught today between here and Sunbuill.

O. C. WELLS NOT YET APPREHENDED

O. C. Wells, one of the thirty-five convicts to escape from the Ferguson prison farm near Huntsville Tuesday night, has not yet been recaptured, according to advices received here.

This was Wells' fifth escape from the state prison and was his second since January 1st, this year. Recently Wells was convicted of assault to murder in Abilene and given 15 years in the penitentiary.

Wells was also charged with the murder of J. A. Mitchell, filling station operator. His case has not been tried although it has been called once and was continued.

At the time of his arrest in Abilene several months ago, he had been out of the penitentiary for several weeks, escaping from a two-year sentence imposed in Tom Green county.

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams said Friday morning that Wells was implicated with Claud Manies, deceased, in the theft of goods at Miles, and that Wells had also told him that he was the man who blew the safe at the Pierce Oil Company station here several months ago.

NOBLE ET AL DRILLING PAST 1,400-FOOT MARK

Noble et al No. 1 Sims, ten miles south of Ballinger, is drilling past the 1,400-foot mark after encountering a flow of water at about 1,452 feet Thursday afternoon.

It was reported here Friday morning that at 1,452 feet a flow of water, about six or seven bails per hour, was struck, and that the bit was in a lime.

SAN ANGELO TO PAVE 250 CITY BLOCKS

SAN ANGELO, June 24.—The city commission of San Angelo this week contracted with Terrell Bartlett Engineers, Inc., San Antonio, for consulting service in paving approximately 250 blocks of streets under the five-year improvement program being sponsored by San Angelo.

All plans for paving will be drawn by the firm, as well as plans for storm drainage and a subway on Oakes Street under the Orient Railroad tracks. They will also supervise construction. They will be paid \$9,000.

Club to Occupy Homestead Of Vice-President's Birth



(By Associated Press) MARIETTA, O., June 24.—On the site of the old Gates homestead, rich in history of the Dawes family, a \$250,000 women's club dedicated to the memory of its founder, Mrs. Betsy Gates Mills, was formally opened with special services on June 13.

Mrs. Mills was an aunt of Vice-President Dawes. The new structure has been donated to the community by William W. Mills, her husband. It includes the Gates home, in which Mrs. Mills was born, and which was also the birthplace of the vice-president. The rooms in which they were born have been preserved exactly as they originally were, and that portion of the Gates home has been incorporated in the manner of a museum in the main building of the "Betsy Mills Club."

Mrs. Mills founded the club in 1911 as a tribute to the womanhood of Marietta. It was her desire that the club should be a "source of comfort and happiness to its members and a force for good in the community." The organization has increased until it has 1,500 members. Rufus C. Dawes, of Chicago, also a nephew of Mrs. Mills, and Vice-President Dawes took part in the dedicatory exercises.

Mr. Phillips, the new president of the organization, was at one time connected with local drug stores. After leaving Ballinger he was in the drug business at Sterling City and from that place he went to Big Spring, where he has been living since.

DENTLER HELD ON DRY CHARGE

H. J. Dentler, local gravel dealer, was arrested and placed in the county jail Thursday night by Sheriff R. E. McWilliams and a squad of deputies who raided the Dentler home, 201 Fourth Street.

Dentler is charged with possession, for the purposes of sale, of intoxicating beverages. About 80 bottles of beer, some of which were cold, and about 200 empty bottles were confiscated.

Mr. Dentler's bond was set at \$1,000 Friday morning by Judge C. H. Willingham, justice of the peace. He was expected to make bond some time Friday afternoon.

John Sides was arrested at the same time at the Dentler home and also placed in jail. No charges had been filed against him up to noon Friday.

The raid was conducted through the aid of a search warrant issued in court here Thursday afternoon. Officers said they believed Dentler had had several customers shortly before the raid.

DENIES PART IN ROBBERY

(By Associated Press) FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., June 24.—Matthew Kimes, notorious Oklahoma bandit, told a representative of the Associated Press here this afternoon that the last bank robbery he committed was at Beggs, Oklahoma.

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., June 24.—Matthew Kimes, notorious Oklahoma outlaw, who was captured yesterday at the Grand Canyon National Park here, today denied participation in the \$35,000 bank robbery at Pampa, Texas, and a number of others in Texas and Oklahoma, when questioned by officers.

Kimes said he knew of the robberies but had learned of them only through the newspapers.

Heid with Kimes in jail here are Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Kady, of Tulsa, Oklahoma, who were with Kimes as he entered the park yesterday morning.

Kimes' arrest was effected after the park foreman on duty at the checking station had recognized him and telephoned ahead to the chief forest ranger of the park.

The bandit was captured by a posse after a gun battle in which there were no casualties.

16 INDICTED IN FLOGGINGS

**Scientists Find Hog Unable
To Control Own Temperature**



"Contented hogs." They have warm houses for winter and a shaded pool for the summer.

Life is what somebody else makes it, if the hog could tell his side of the story.

In winter he freezes and in summer he smothers—all of which he is powerless to prevent.

Unlike other animals, the hog has no way of regulating his own temperature. Horses, cows and kindred farm stock react to the weather as humans do. Their pores close when it's cold and open for perspiration when it's hot.

The United States Bureau of Animal Industry has found that the hog is virtually devoid of this function. Beneath his skin is an adipose tissue that apparently is without feeling.

Even the process of tattooing for identification in the slaughter house has no effect on the hog. The instrument, pointed and barbed, may be thrust into his back with extraordinary force and he will not bother to grunt.

His queer constitutional make-up, scientists say, is responsible for the fact that a hog may freeze to death in sub-zero weather, or drop dead by the roadside if carelessly driven through summer heat to the market.

HORSE, MULE SHORTAGE

There were 21,013,000 horses and mules in the United States January 1, 1927, according to estimates of the Department of Agriculture. The figure represents a decline of 17 per cent since 1920. Unless breeding be resumed, the department says, the present number will be reduced 30 or 40 per cent in the next five years. That will mean an acute shortage on farms.

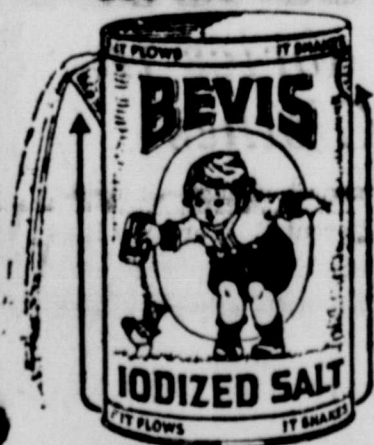


GRETA GARBO

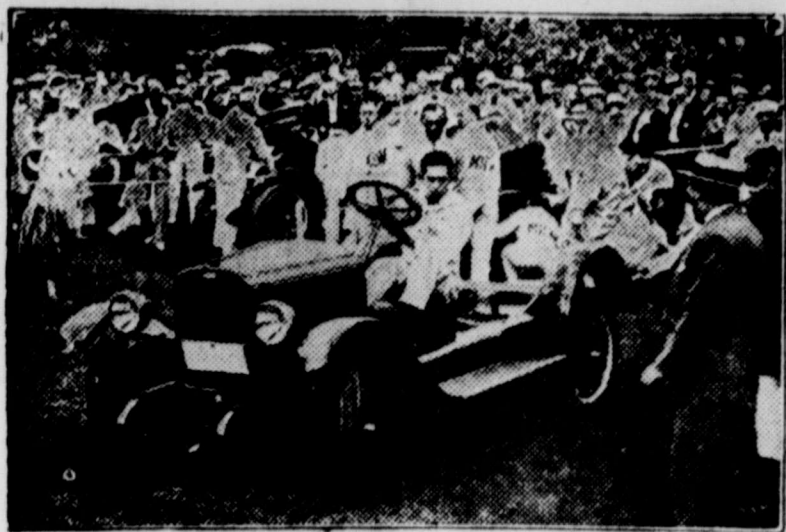

DENVER, Colo., June 23.—Leaves, grass, stems, weeds and other plants are used by Mrs. Pansy Stockton, Denver artist, instead of her water colors and oils for the newest work she is showing, which she calls "sun paintings."

"The state is my palette," says Mrs. Stockton. She creates a "sun painting" by gluing to a special kind of paper all the foliage which she and her husband pick during their summers in Colorado.

Many of her "paintings" are drawn from subjects in Mesa Verde national park in the southwestern part of Colorado. Mrs. Stockton has discovered, she says, that clouds and waterfalls are as easily executed with milkweed and wild thistle as with oils and water colors. She uses wild tobacco for gray hills and mountains. Often to find the mosses for her unique creations, Mrs. Stockton must make trips of several miles through waist-deep snow.
