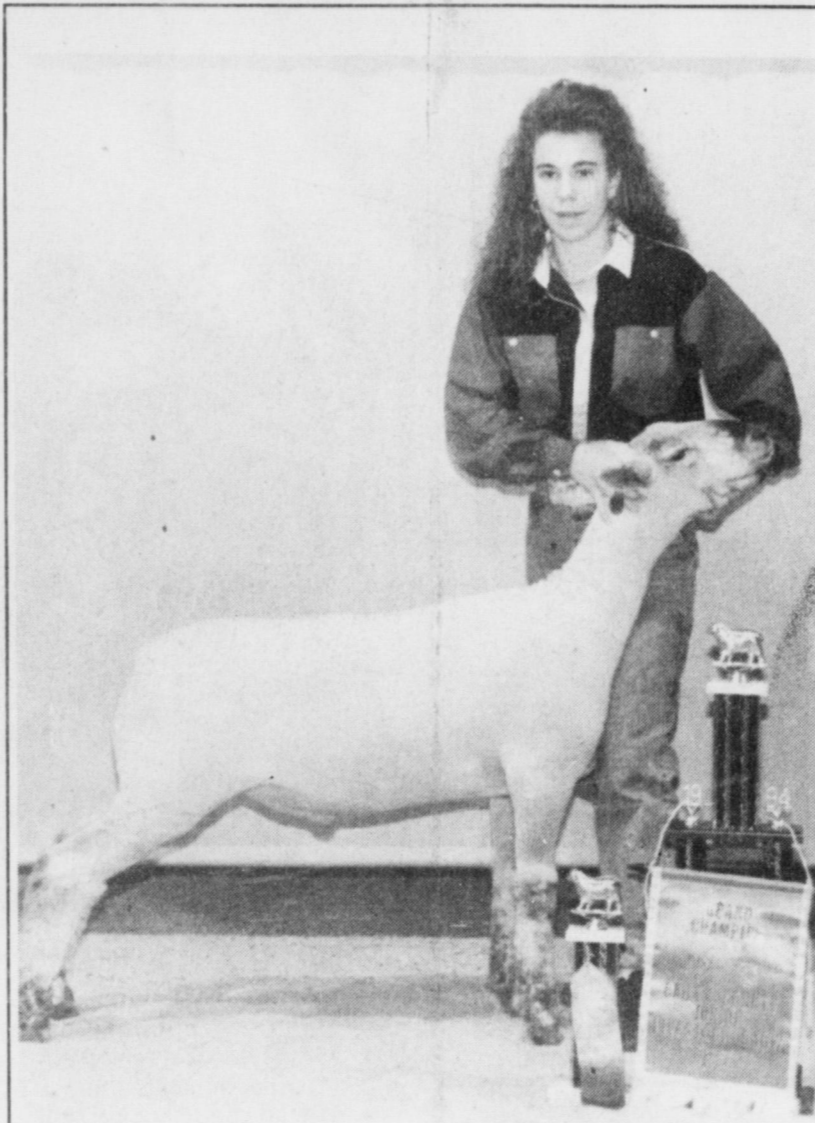

Two students from Muleshoe are among the 564 Eastern New Mexico University students named to the 1993 fall semester Dean's Honor Roll.

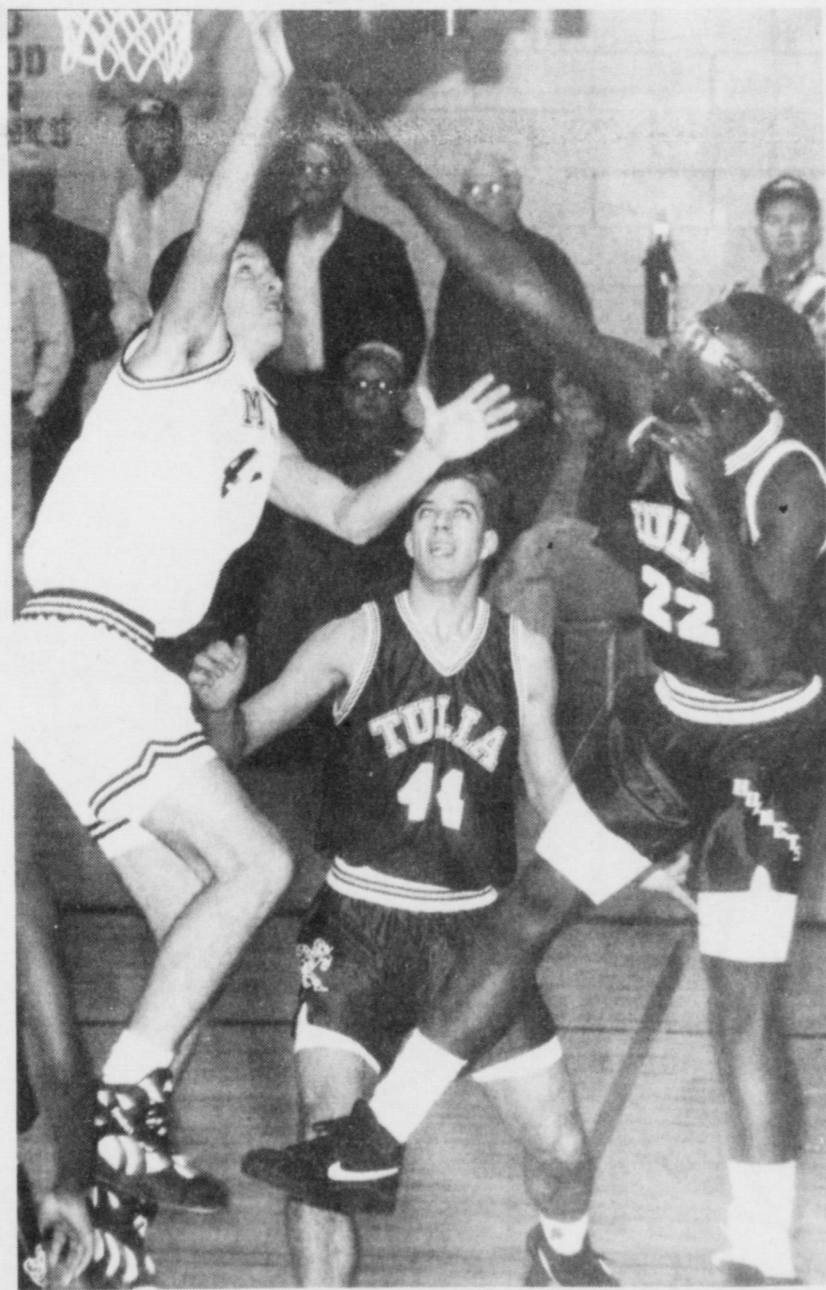

## Lady Mules 2-0 in District

The Muleshoe Lady Mules improved to 2-0 in District 2-3A play at home Friday, beating Floydada 43-34.

Misty Davenport and Brooke Sinclair led the Lady Mules with nine points each.

The Mules did not fare as well, falling 55-42 to the Whirlwinds.

District play opened for the 1993-94 basketball season in Muleshoe last Tuesday night, as the Lady Mules and the Mules took on Tulia on their home court. The Lady Mules claimed a close victory, 46 to 45, while the Mules dropped the hard fought game by a score of 45 to 63.

A campaign called "Hunting for a Championship" had been launched earlier in the day at an afternoon pep rally in an effort to "pack the gym" for Tuesday nights opening district game. Dressed in camouflage, the fans (students and adults alike) packed the gym to cheer on the home town teams.

According to Coach Adair, Muleshoe Athletic Director, our district is always one of the best in Texas. Currently, several teams in our district

are highly ranked in both boys and girls basketball. The latest edition of the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches ranks the girls 12th in the state with Dimmitt and Friona making the list, and Tulia coming on as an early season power house having victories over several ranked teams in girls basketball.

The Lady Mules took the court with the fans cranked up for a win. First quarter action found the ball moving up and down the court as the evenly matched teams both struggled for a lead. At the end of the first quarter the Lady Mules were down by four points, but rallied back to lead the scoring with a 28 to 24 half-time score. The fourth quarter was close again, with the score 37 to 35 as the Lady Mules retained a 2 point lead at the end of the third quarter. The fourth quarter was a rugged battle, but the Lady Mules maintained their control and composure to come from four points behind to win the game. The last minute of the game, the score was tied 44 to 44 and Tulia went to the free thrown line. The first shot was no good, but

the second one went in making the score 44 to 45 with 45 seconds left of the clock. The Lady Mules brought the ball down court with confidence and determination and managed to get the ball to post Mandy Cleavinger for an under the basket shot. The basket was good, and the Lady Mules were ahead by one with 11 seconds left on the clock. The Lady Mules followed the ball back down court to play a solid defense, and win the first district game 46 to 45 over Tulia.

High scorers for the Lady Mules were Misty Davenport with 17, Brenna Wheeler with 4 three-pointers and a total of 14 points, and Allyson Field with 9 points. Kristen Holmans was credited with 7 assists and 7 rebounds and did a great job of handling and controlling the ball according to Coach Gruhlkey. The girls were 10 out of 12 from the free throw line, and played a controlled competitive game. Keep up the good work girls.

County Clerk presented Commissioner's Court with a

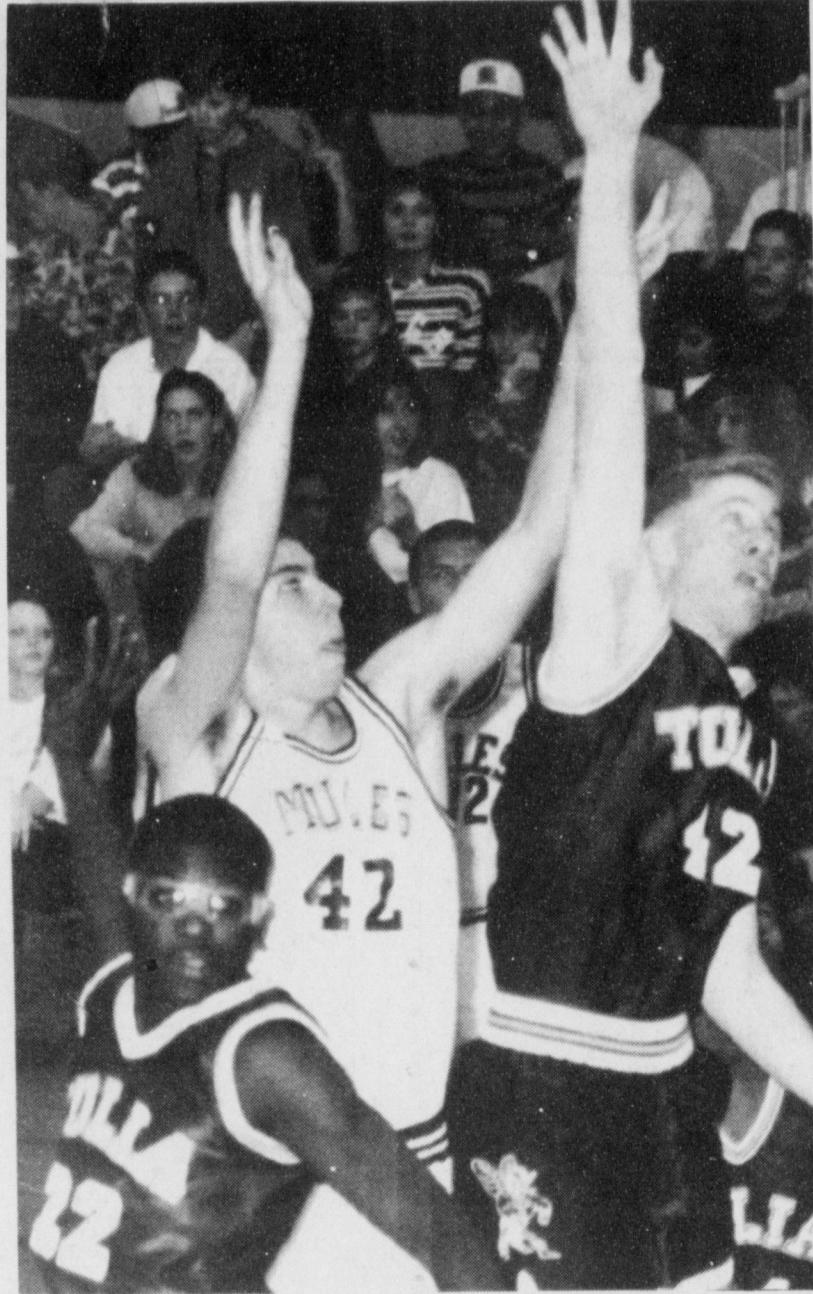

Special guests included Leah Schulze, sister of the groom, of Detroit, Michigan; Mary Etta

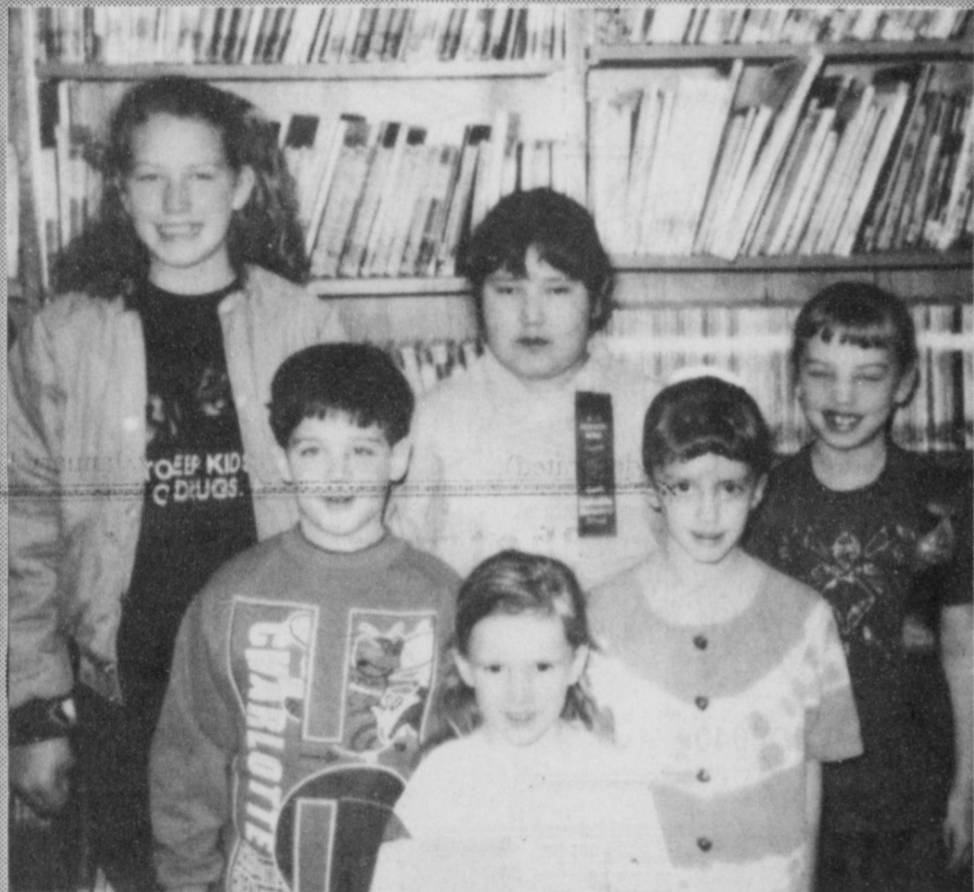
Bryan, grandmother of the bride and Dee Brown, grandfather of the bride, both of Muleshoe.

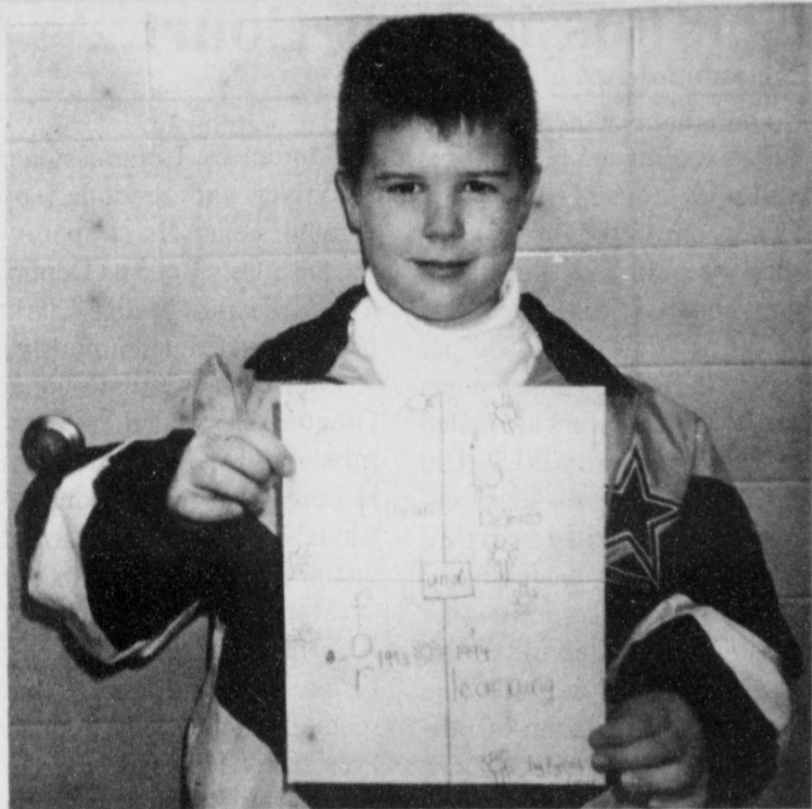

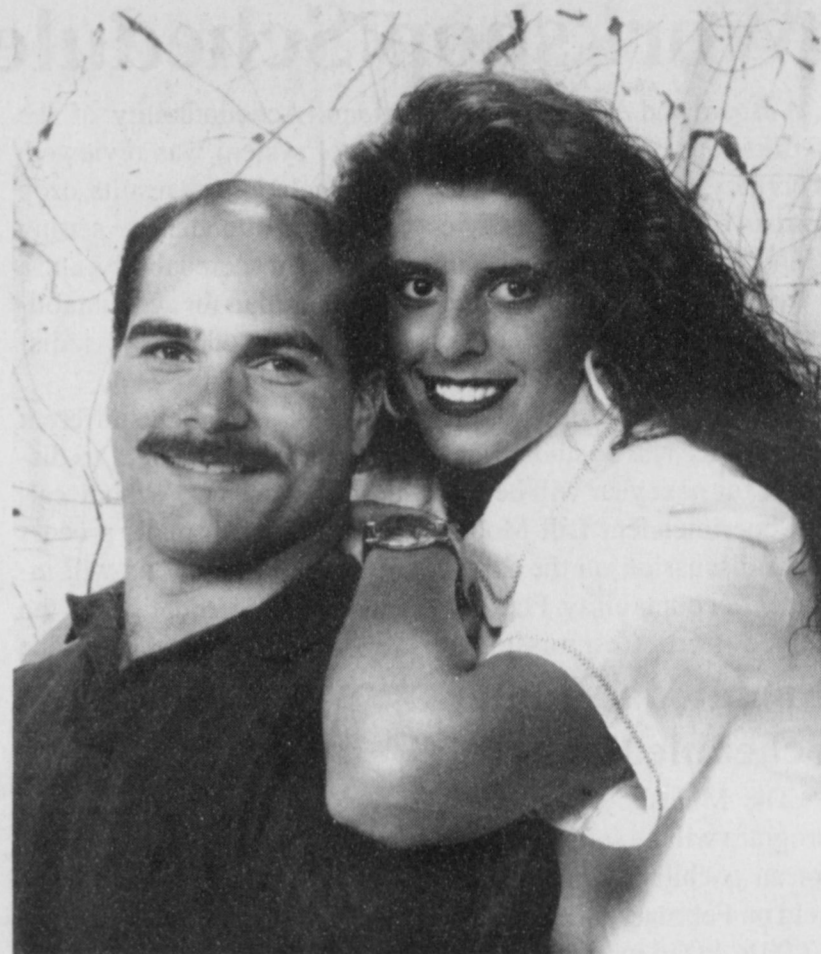

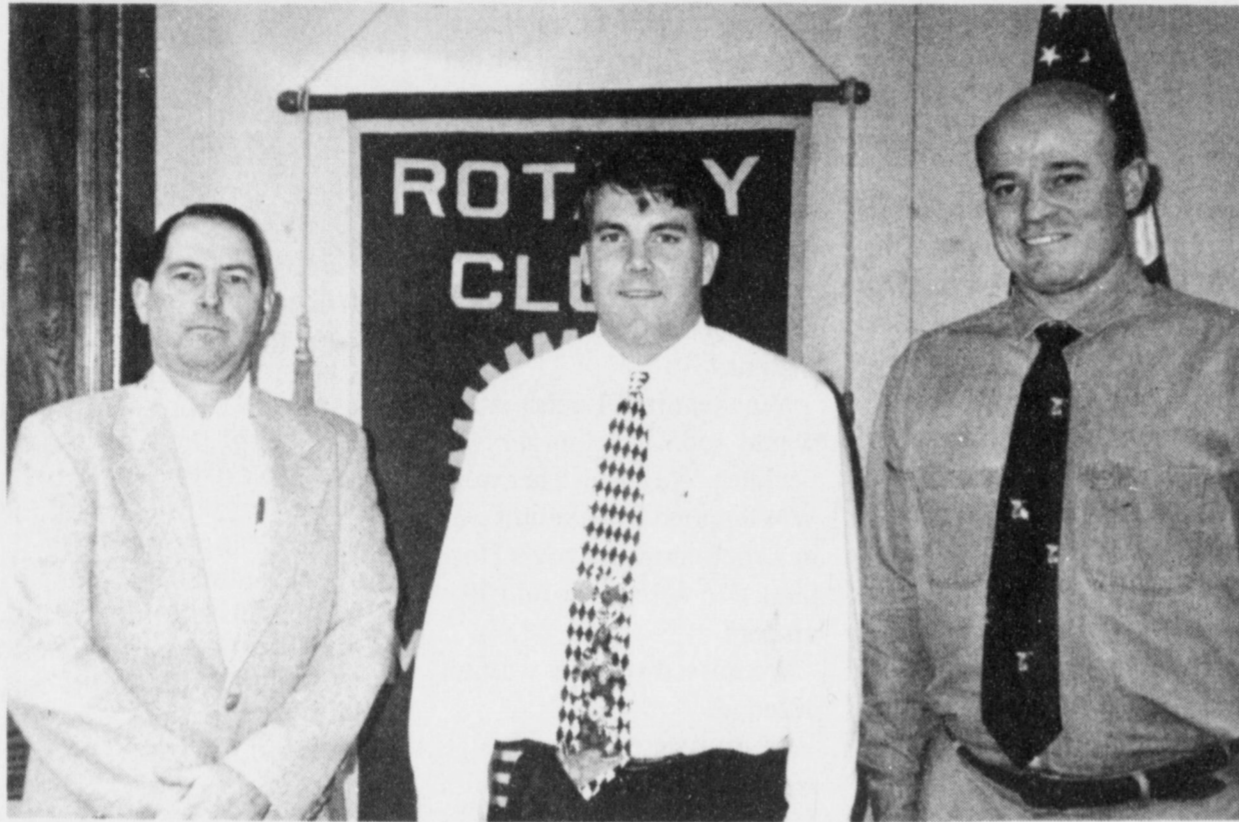

Unity Within Diversity

In his fine book co-authored with Philip Yancey, Fearfully and Wonderfully Made, Dr. Paul brand writes of the amazing diversity, yet equally amazing unity, of the cells of the human body.



He describes Lifesaver-shaped red blood cells feeding the other cells with oxygen while sleek muscle cells "full of coiled energy" stand ready to spring into motion. Bone cells which when sectioned resemble tree rings, "live in structures that exude strength." Nerve cells provide the computer-like network instantly flashing messages to and from the brain.

All of these cells and others just as diverse work in union so perfectly that, as Brand writes, "When things are going well--my heart contracting rhythmically, my brain humming with knowledge, my lymph laving tired cells--I rarely give these cells a passing thought." But, as the physician writes, if we will think about the myriad cells of the body

for a moment, we can let them teach us a lot about the Body of Christ. Just as God works through the amazing diversity of the body's cells to create one living being, his Spirit works through the astounding diversity of the members of the church to form the living Body of Christ.

The same God who chose to people the world with a plethora of "Pygmies and Watusis, blond Scandinavians and swarthy Italians, big-boned Russians and petite Japanese," chose to compose the Body of Christ out of folks as diverse as Simon Peter the fisherman and Paul the Christian-killer. That Body is composed of believers from "blacks in North Carolina who shout out their praises to God" to white Austrians "accompanied by magnificent organs and illuminated by stained glass." And you. And me.

So the wise doctor writes, "The Body of Christ, like our own bodies, is composed of individual, unlike cells that are knit together to form one body." And we discover that "the basis for our unity within Christ's Body begins not with our similarity but with our diversity." Amen!

**News From Congressman Larry Combest**

Responding to a recommendation from U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas), the U.S. secretary of agriculture announced on Tuesday that he will lower to 11 percent the amount of cotton acreage that cotton growers must keep out of production under requirements of the Acreage Reduction Program (ARP). Recently, Congressman Combest was joined by several members of the House Agriculture Committee requesting that the current 17.5 percent level be lowered to between 10 and 12 percent. The 1993 crop production estimate had been reduced by more than 700,000 bales since a report upon which the preliminary ARP percentage was based. The 11 percent ARP level was announced early Tuesday by

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy.

"I welcome Secretary Espy's decision to allow cotton producers to use more of their land under ARP," said Combest.
