## 3 KILLERS OF WARDEN SENT TO DEATH TODAY

(By Associated Press)  
JOLIET, Ill., July 15.—Three of the seven men who slew Deputy Warden Peter Klein in a break from the state penitentiary a year ago, were hanged in the heavily guarded Joliet jail yard today.

The men were Roberto Torrez, Walter Stalesky and Charles Duchowski. They were all sent to their deaths simultaneously on triple-trapped gallows.

JOLIET, Ill., July 15.—Roberto Torrez, Walter Stalesky and Charles Buchowski, three of Illinois' most desperate criminals, were left of the seven who slew Peter Klein, deputy warden and escaped from the new "break-proof" state penitentiary at Stateville, near here, on May 5, 1926.

They were recaptured only to participate in two more daring attempts to escape. Torrez was a Mexican, Stalesky and Buchowski, Americans.

In the first break, James Price made good his bid for freedom and is still at large. With the three finally doomed to hang, three others—Bernardo Roa and Gregario Rizo, Mexicans, and Charles Shader, American, and youngest of the lot—were recaptured quickly and sentenced to death.

The case of the six was pending before the state supreme court when on March 12 last, the three Mexicans saved their way out of their cells and shot their path to liberty.

Roa, a gigantic man, got clear despite lameness from some of 21 bullet wounds inflicted in his recapture after his first escape.

Rizo and Torrez, the latter wounded, were retaken on the outskirts of Chicago after they had shot two policemen.

Special guards were assigned, but four of the five remaining convicts again tried for liberty a month ago, while their case was still pending before the supreme court. Stalesky and Duchowski got no further than the jail yard, where in a fight centering about the scaffold built for their execution they were recaptured.

Shader, a triple slayer at 21, escaped. Rizo was killed with a bullet fired by a policeman from the very gallows upon which he was to have been hanged. Torrez refused to try for liberty in that break. A few days ago the supreme court affirmed the convictions of the three survivors.

It is not established that May 5th was decided upon for the first prison break for any other reason than that plans were matured on that date. But nevertheless is the "Cineo de Mayo," one of Mexico's most popular military holidays. Likewise July 15th is another that stands out in Mexico's history, for upon July 15, 1867, Benito Juarez re-entered the capital after the execution of

MEXICO, D. F., July 15.—President Calles has ordered the release of all Catholic lay leaders in prison on charges of sedition. They number 28, all being officers and leaders in the League for the Defense of Religious Liberty.

The president accompanied his orders with an explanation that the attempted religious revolt had failed and therefore the conspirators were no longer a menace.

Two were discharged, three were indefinitely suspended and one resigned.

## DOCTOR SHOTS SELF ACCIDENTLY

SAN ANTONIO, July 15.—Dr. H. A. Long, prominent San Antonio physician, was found dead in an apartment here today with a bullet wound through his thigh. He had apparently bled to death.

The police are holding a woman and her three daughters, who occupy the apartment.

The women were later released when the coroner rendered a verdict of accidental shooting.

BRUGLARS CALL AT BRONTE  
BRONTE, July 15.—Burglars made a number of calls here Wednesday night and ransacked a number of stores. They broke in the First National Bank and though making no attempt to blow the vault, did get a revolver from one of the drawers in the cashier's cage.

The City Drug Store suffered the largest loss, as here they got \$400 worth of jewelry. The McCuiston Drug Co. lost \$3 in the cash drawer and \$20 worth of safety razors. The Home Motor Co. found it was short \$4.90. There are no clues to the burglars.

VIENNA, July 15.—A crowd rushed the palace of justice today, smashing the windows, forcing open doors and throwing documents and papers into the streets.

The manifestation grew out of a jury's verdict which gave a number of soldiers their freedom after having been charged with killing a Socialist in a fight.

HONOLULU, July 15.—The steamer *Wilhelmina* reported by wireless today that the monoplane "The City of Oakland" landed in the sea at 5:15 a. m. today, Honolulu time, after running out of gasoline and summoning steamships to her aid by the timely use of radio.

According to computation here, the plane had been in the air 21 hours and had covered a distance of 1,800 miles. The machine was presumably 400 miles from the nearest land.

Ernest Smith and Emory Bronte, aviators, were equipped with provisions enough to last for ten days, a pneumatic life raft and facilities for distilling water, so the flyers had the consolation that they might remain adrift if they could make a safe landing.

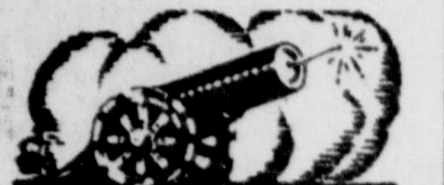

**PILOT RENEWS LICENSE FIRST ISSUED IN '58**

METROPOLIS, Ill., July 15.—Back in the fifties Capt. W. A. Jordan began steamboating.

He still holds and has renewed this year for another season the marine engineer's license first issued to him in 1858, and he believes himself to be, at 86, the oldest marine engineer in Illinois and probably in the country in actual years of river service.

Born across the Mississippi from St. Louis, Jordan began his river service at the age of 16 on vessels owned by his stepfather which plied on the Tennessee, Cumberland and Ohio rivers and down to New Orleans.

When the Civil War broke the boats were confiscated by the federal government, and Jordan became an engineer in the "mosquito fleet." After the war he worked on the Nashville, the

Mr. White declared Friday that he had not yet completed the program for the institute but that he was making an effort now to get lecturers and instructors for the two-day session. The program will be announced within the next two or three weeks, he stated.

A special feature of this institute will be the night session on Thursday evening, September 1, Mr. White said. A special program is being prepared for this meeting at which the citizens of Ballinger will be invited to attend. All meetings of the institute will be held at the high school buildings.

The other three days which are allotted to the institute work of the schools, will be used by the teachers during the school session when the county superintendents will call them in on Saturdays to discuss school work.

Teachers will come from the following counties to attend the institute: Runnels, Tom Green, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Irion, Reagan, Crockett, Concho, Upton and Schleicher.
