## LINDY STARTS TOUR OF U. S.

NEW YORK, July 20.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh today starts his three months air tour of the nation, during which he will visit 75 cities in the 48 states.

Taking off from Mitchell Field this afternoon in his monoplane "The Spirit of St. Louis," Lindbergh planned to make his first stop at Hartford, Conn.

The tour is being made under the auspices of the Guggenheim Foundation in the interests of commercial aviation.

## Kin Seek Grave of Ranchman Whom Billy the Kid Avenged

ALAMOGORDO, N. M., July 20.—The semi-centennial of a slaying that started Billy the Kid on his career as one of the most notorious killers in the Southwest has passed virtually unnoticed.

George Coe, aged New Mexico rancher, however, recalled the shooting to death of Robert Tungstul that resulted in bloody guerrilla fighting in the late '70's, known as the "Lincoln county war."

Two nephews of Tungstul are seeking his grave.  
It was to avenge Tungstul's death that William Bonney, whose sobriquet was "Billy the Kid," was said to have killed 21 men, exclusive of Indians and Mexicans, before the desperado himself met death at the hands of Sheriff Pat Garrett, before he was 21 years old.

According to Coe, Tungstul was killed by a posse of deputy sheriffs while Billy the Kid, then 17 years old, looked on. Bonney was a ranch foreman for Tungstul. It was Coe who brought Tungstul's body out of a canyon and he reported that it was riddled with bullets, which Billy declared were fired while the rancher's hands were in the air. At that time Bonney told Coe: "George, I'll bet you this gun against yours that it is the one that will kill Dick Brady."

Brady was leader of the posse that killed Tungstul.  
Thirty days later Brady was dead, as were George Hineman, another deputy, while Bill Matthews, a third member of the posse, was seriously wounded as a result of an attack by Billy the Kid and his friends. Thirteen of the 20 or more in the posse died by Bonney's gun.

## RUNNELS WILL HAVE 75 AT SHORT COURSE

Between 75 and 100 rural club members, including boys and girls, fathers and mothers, will attend the Texas A. & M. College farmers short course to be held at College Station starting next Monday, July 25th and closing Saturday, July 30th, C. W. Lehmburg, county agricultural agent, announced Wednesday.

"I have already made fifty-two reservations," Mr. Lehmburg declared, "and there are others going who expect to camp out at the college, and I am to send in several more registrations before the end of the week."

"Runnels county is expected to have one of the largest delegations to travel the greatest distance to attend the course this year," Mr. Lehmburg said, "and if that means anything our county will be very well advertised at the annual gathering."

Never before has such a large crowd been signed up to attend the short course from this section and the great number is due partly to the uninterrupted work of Mr. Lehmburg and Mrs. Lura Hollingsworth, county home agent, who together held community socials in practically all clubs of the county in order that

money might be raised to send representatives from the various communities to the short course.

There are about 15 or 20 people who expect to camp out during the week and reservations for them was not necessary, Mr. Lehmburg said.

"Those going by train will leave Saturday afternoon, July 23rd, on the 5:00 o'clock Santa Fe, while those going by car will leave at 5:00 o'clock Sunday morning, from the court house. Everyone is requested to be on time as it is a long distance from Ballinger to College Station and we want to make the best possible time early in the day before the sun gets too bright. We also want to urge that everyone bring a lunch so very little time will be lost at the noon hour," Mr. Lehmburg said.

Seventeen free trips were given by three chambers of commerce in the county, business houses of Ballinger, the Commissioners Court and county officials. Mr. Lehmburg said that all these trips were appreciated very much and that letters of thanks would be sent those who gave them

## BELOVED KING OF RUMANIA IS DEAD

(By Associated Press)  
BUCHAREST, July 20.—King Ferdinand of Rumania, long failing in health, died at 2:15 o'clock this morning.

The monarch's long and courageous battle with the dread malady cancer came to a close at the Chateau de Pelishor at Sinaia, the summer residence of the Rumanian royal family.

The end came with suddenness but was peaceful in the extreme, with the sovereign closing his eyes calmly as if falling asleep.

Members of the royal family were at his bedside.  
Ferdinand's death had long been expected and even the simple country folk who loved him more as a kindly father than as a king, knew the disease which he so courageously battled would be fatal.

BUCHAREST, July 20.—Prince Michael, young son of former Crown Prince Carol, will be proclaimed king of Rumania this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock, to succeed his grandfather, it was announced today.

The prince, whose mother is Princess Helen of Greece, was born on October 25, 1921, and was created the heir apparent December 31, 1925, when his father, Prince Carol, renounced his rights to the succession.

BELGRADE, July 20.—The Rumanian government has wired Prince Carol of the news of his father's death and at the same time telling him that Rumania is firmly decided to respect his decision of January 19, 1926, in which was accepted his renunciation of the throne and established the regency for young Prince Michael, say reports received here from Bucharest.

PARIS, July 20.—Former Crown Prince Carol of Rumania is at his home near here today. He has refused to be seen by newspaper men.

No word has been received from Carol regarding his father's death in Rumania.

VIENNA, July 20.—Advice received here from Bucharest in connection with the death of King Ferdinand, say that troops have been concentrated at the barracks.

These measures were taken by the government in the event of a return to Rumania by the former crown prince, Carol.

King Ferdinand ascended the Rumanian throne during the troublous times shortly after the outbreak of the World War when his country was greatly agitated regarding the position Rumania was to take in the conflict. During the first two months of the war Rumania, under the rule of the late King Charles, it was charged, had been secretly aiding the Central Powers. Ferdinand took the oath as king upon the

death of his uncle in October, 1914, and immediately announced that Rumania would remain neutral unless attacked.

During a speech from the throne in November, 1915, King Ferdinand was shouted down with cries of "Down with Hungary," "Down with Germany," "Down with the Hohenzollerns."

This demonstration was taken as an indication of the government's sympathy in the conflict, Ferdinand and his predecessor having been princes of the house of Hohenzollern.

In August, 1916, the former German kaiser sent a letter to King Ferdinand informing him that it was his intention to send a special mission to Bucharest relative to Rumania's position. The king replied that such an act would be inopportune and since he was a constitutional monarch, he would be obliged to refer the

envoy to his ministers. A few days later Rumania entered the conflict on the side of the Allies by declaring war against Austria. This action was believed to have resulted from the influence of Queen Marie, who was a princess royal of Great Britain and Ireland. The declaration by Rumania was followed almost immediately by Germany declaring war against Rumania.

With his troops at the front King Ferdinand's throne began to totter from intrigue charged against Rumanian politicians and German agents, who planned to dethrone the ruler and install a German prince in his place. There were even plots against the life of the king.

Rumania's position in the war was a difficult one and after nearly two years' fighting two-thirds of the country was overrun by the enemy. The Rumanians, isolated and without outside support were obliged to accept

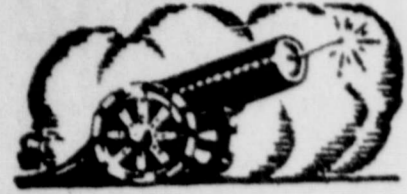

HELENA, Mont., July 20.—A characteristic willingness to face facts was indicated early in the career of Governor John E. Erickson of Montana.

As a county prosecutor, Erickson had convicted a murderer. The man entered the penitentiary doors swearing that, when he got out, he was going to "get" the prosecutor. The prosecutor became a candidate for district judge and, during the campaign, visited the little oil town of Shelby. His friends recalled the threat and told him the man's prison term had ended and he was in town.

Erickson determined to hunt the man up. He found him playing cards in a bar, went up to him, called him by name, offered his hand and found his supposed enemy most affable. The man had decided in prison that his threat was senseless.

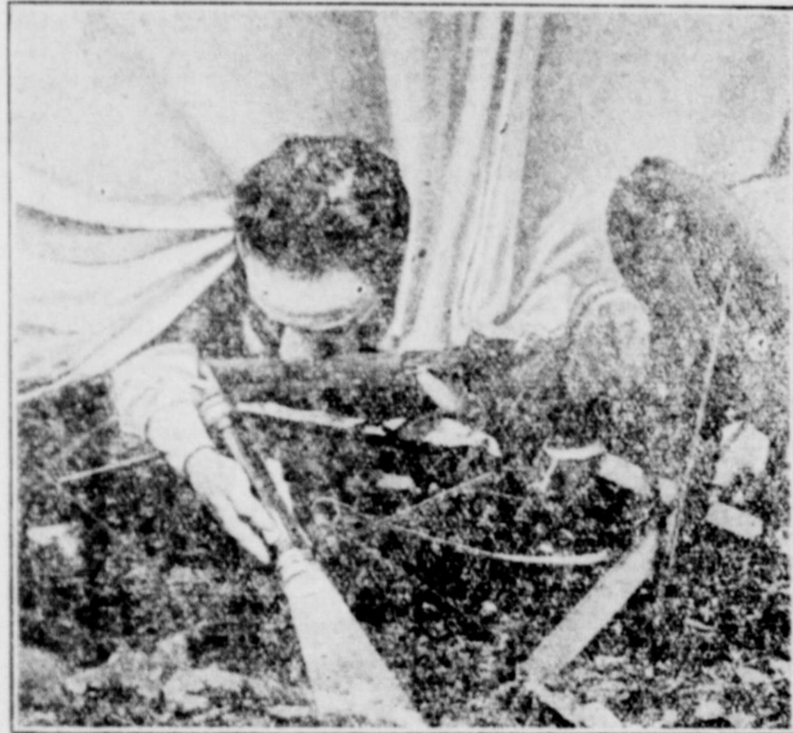

(By Associated Press) PAWBUKA, Okla., July 20.—In frontier days women did not have much to say in the tribal councils of the Indians. Conditions today, however, are different, and when the Society of Oklahoma Indians met here two "queens" were selected to rule over the organization. They were Miss Isabel Rogers of Pawhuska, member of the Osage tribe, who was elected queen of the 1927 convention of the society, and Miss Wauhullau Lalloy of Muskogee, who was elected "Queen of the 1928 Society of Oklahoma Indians Convention."

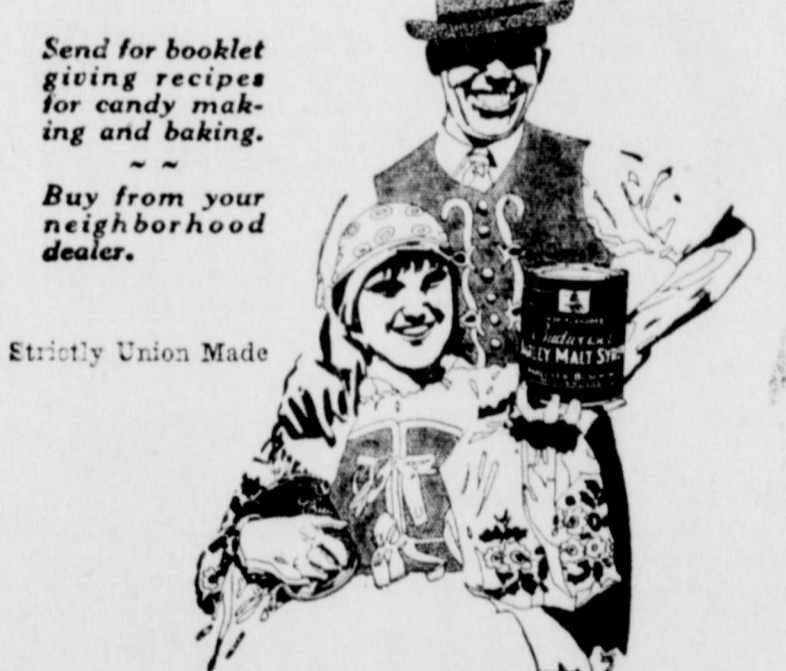

**Beloved King of Rumania is Dead**

drastic peace terms sent by Germany with an ultimatum that they be accepted in 24 hours. The collapse of the German army on the western front and the armistice, however, rendered the enforced treaty between Germany and Rumania ineffective.

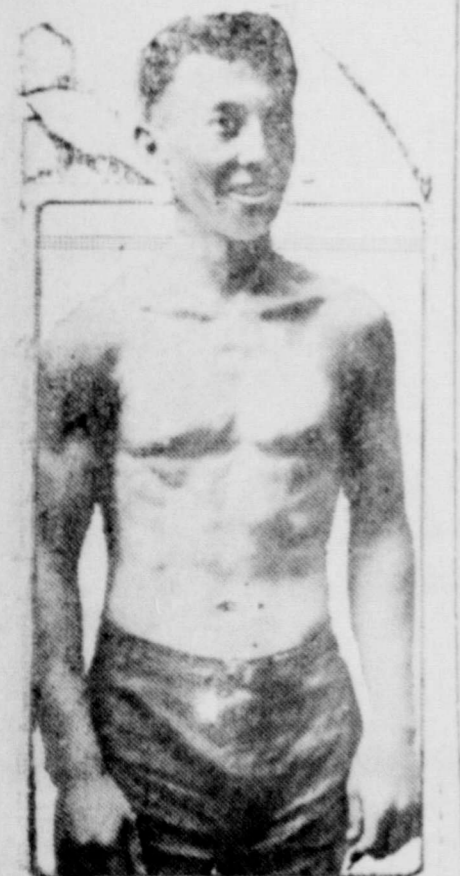
Ferdinand Victor Albert Mainrad was born at Sigmaringen, August 24, 1865, the son of Prince Leopold of Hohenzollern and Antonia, Infanta of Portugal. He was educated in Germany and was an officer in the German army. He was created a prince of Rumania by royal decree in 1889 and the path cleared for his ascension to the throne by a series of renunciations. The heir presumptive of King Charles was his elder brother, Prince Leopold of Hohenzollern-Sigmaringen, who renounced his rights in favor of his son, Prince Wilhelm. The latter in turn resigned his rights in favor of his younger brother, Ferdinand.

King Ferdinand achieved considerable notoriety before his marriage thru a love affair with Mlle. Helene Vacaresco, a favorite of the then queen of Rumania. When marriage between Ferdinand and Princess Marie, daughter of Alfred, Duke of Edinburgh and later Duke of Saxe-Coburg, was talked of, it was said the Rumanian queen was much incensed and that Mlle. Vacaresco felt it so keenly that she sent Ferdinand's love letters to Princess Marie. However, he married the latter January 10, 1893.

The royal couple had six children, one of whom died in childhood. The others were Crown Prince Carol, born in 1893; Princess Elizabeth, born in 1894, and married in 1921 to King George of Greece, who afterward abdicated; Princess Marie, married to King Alexander of Yugoslavia; Prince Nicolas, and Prince's Heana.

Although he took the oath as king the day after the death of his uncle, King Charles, in 1914, King Ferdinand and his queen were not crowned until October, 1922. On that occasion the crown used by the late King Charles again was pressed into service. It is made of steel from Turkish guns captured at Plezna in 1877.

**MUST REMOVE ROAD SIGNS**

Max Wilson, foreman of the State Highway Department for Runnels county, announced Wednesday morning that merchants of this county had until August 1st, 1927, to remove their signs from the highways in the county, on instructions sent out by the State Highway Commission.

"There are many signs on the highways in this county," Mr. Wilson asserted, "and they must be removed by August 1st, or a penalty will be assessed. Only Winters merchants have removed signs to date, and all must be removed."

Mr. Wilson said signs on fence posts along the roads must be placed behind the posts or removed. Signs on individual property along the roads may remain, but there must not be a sign of any description along the 60-foot width of state highways.
