## ROWENA GETS FIRST BALE 1927 COTTON

Special to The Ledger:

**ROWENA, Aug. 5.**—Runnels county's first bale of cotton for the 1927 season was ginned here late Wednesday evening by the Wilde gin for Martin Zidler, farmer, residing seven miles north of this city.

The bale weighed 554 pounds and was sold to W. A. Halamicsek for 21 cents per pound.

Rowena merchants are making up a premium for Mr. Zidler.

This is the third bale for West Texas, according to information received here and the first for Runnels county.

The county's first bale last year was ginned in Winters about July 14 or 15, while Ballinger and Rowena both came in immediately after that date with first bales.

Rowena's first bale in 1926 was ginned on August 16th, A. T. Falticsek being the grower. This bale weighed 491 pounds and was sold for 22 cents.

The cotton crop of this county is holding up very good for this time of the season and a large production is expected despite reports that the northern part of the county is in bad condition. The county as a whole is declared to be in much better condition today than at corresponding periods in 1926 and 1925.

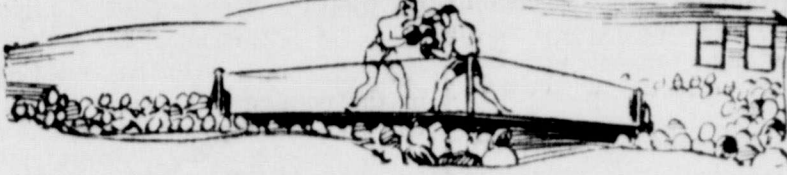
Urge Franklin Memorial

**PECKHAM, Eng., Aug. 5.**—The "fighting parson" and the "fighting doctor" are going to stage a boxing bout for the benefit of the Camberwell Children's Treat Society.

The parson is the Rev. George Potter, vicar of St. Chrysostom's, Peckham. The physician is Dr. Hugh Dalton, a member of parliament.

Before he came to Peckham Rev. Potter was known as "the fighting parson of Bermondsey." He used to put on the gloves with his parishioners. He once had a vigorous bout with a fish porter and went into the pulpit afterwards with a black eye.

Dr. Dalton is better known as a fighter in the World War than as a fighter in the ring.

The contestants are 40 years old. The parson weighs 168 pounds and the doctor about 200.

## TWO GERMAN FLIERS MAKE NEW RECORD

**DESSAU, Germany, Aug. 5.**—Cornelius Edzard and Johann Ritzsch brought their Junker airplane to earth this morning after having established a new world endurance flight record of 52 hours and 23 minutes.

The former record of 51 hours and 11 minutes was held by Clarence Chamberlin and Bert Acosta.

The Junkers Company officially announced that the distance covered was 3,753 miles.

## ENGLISH SWIMMER CROSSES CHANNEL

**DOVER, Eng., Aug. 5.**—E. H. Temme, English swimmer, succeeded today in the first attempt of the season to swim the English Channel, taking off from Cape Gris Nez at 12:42 o'clock this morning and landing two miles west of Dover.

## BANK COUNSEL RESIGNS TODAY

**AUSTIN, Aug. 5.**—Nat Gentry, counsel for the State Banking Department in the enforcement of the banking laws, has resigned, effective August 15, it was learned today.

C. O. Austin, banking commissioner, will be succeeded at the expiration of his term, September 1st, by James Shaw, of Taylor, a banker of that city.

## RUNNELS GINS SELLS PLANT

Arthur Giesecke, manager of the Runnels County Gin Company, announced Friday morning the sale of the Bradshaw plant of the company to the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association. The deal was closed Friday morning. The consideration involved was not disclosed.

This leaves the local gin company with four plants in this county, located at Rowena, Hatchel, Winters and Ballinger.

The Bradshaw gin was considered one of the best of the string and had only recently been overhauled and put in condition for the 1927 season.

The other gins of the company have also undergone considerable improvements during the past few months and will be ready for the 1927 cotton crop. Several thousand dollars has been spent by the company in reconditioning and in the purchase of additional machinery.

## PAIR MAY APPEAL TO THE SUPREME COURT

(By Associated Press)

**BOSTON, Aug. 5.**—Indication that an appeal to the United States supreme court in behalf of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti would be made within a short time was learned at the headquarters of the Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee today, although no definite announcement has been made as to the course to be taken forth-coming.

Sacco and Vanzetti are scheduled to be electrocuted.

The prisoners slept well last night, according to attaches of the state prison at Charleston, but both refused breakfast today while Celestino Madeiros, convicted of another murder and in the death house with the two men, eat heartily.

By refusing breakfast today Sacco prolonged his hunger strike into its twentieth day.

Buenos Aires, Aug. 5.—A general strike in protest against the Sacco-Vanzetti sentence went into effect today with nearly all the workers in the factories and shops joining the movement.

**NEW YORK, Aug. 5.**—Plans by the I. W. W. for an attempted tie-up of New York's waterfront next Tuesday as part of the nation-wide protest against the execution of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, were announced by Roger Francez, chairman of the general executive board of the organization, today.

"I shot because I believed he would kill my mother and myself," young McKinley told officers. "I left home two years ago because Holloway mistreated us both."

understood they are to take this  
step, while friends and sympa-  
thizers are making efforts to save  
their necks. Sacco and Vanzetti  
should die for their brutal murder.

**Byrd's Wife Avoids Share of  
Publicity With Flier Husband**

BOSTON, August 5.—The spot-  
light of public attention has  
sought in vain to focus on Mrs.  
Richard E. Byrd, wife of the in-  
trepid naval aviator.

Although Lieutenant-Com-  
mander Byrd recognizes her as a  
full-fledged partner in his aero-  
nautic achievements, she refuses  
to take public share in his glory  
and declines to allow herself or  
her four children to be exploited.

When her husband made his  
successful flight over the North  
Pole in 1926, Mrs. Byrd went into  
the country, keeping her address  
a secret. After seeing her hus-  
band off on his trans-Atlantic  
flight she went into seclusion at  
her home here.

When she went to New York to  
meet her husband on his return  
from his polar and trans-Atlantic  
flights she remained in the back-  
ground.

But while Mrs. Byrd has sought  
no share in the honor that has  
been heaped upon her husband,  
Commander Byrd himself after  
his flight to France paid deep  
tribute to her and to his mother  
as full partners in his adventures.

"Indeed," he said, "I should  
have gone mad but for two  
things. First, my mother's shar-

ing in my fondest hopes, and sec-  
ond, my wife's adroit discovery  
of the compelling urge within me,  
which I thought I was concealing.  
Promptly thereupon she acquies-  
ced in my taking up these  
hazardous efforts in deadly  
earnest."

When he returned safely from  
the North Pole, and again when  
he landed safely in France, he  
said he thought: "Well, again  
this little family partnership has  
been successful, leaving body and  
mind able to try some other  
worthwhile thing."

Although Mrs. Byrd has never  
made known publicly her feelings  
toward the hazardous under-  
takings in which her husband is  
engaged, members of her house-  
hold say that she is as courageous  
as he is modest. At the time of  
the polar flight a nurse in the  
Byrd home said, "Her worry  
since Commander Byrd's depart-  
ure has been something tremen-  
dous, but she has never wince-  
d and has been confident all the  
time that he would be success-  
ful."

Before her marriage Mrs. Byrd  
was Marie Donaldson Ames, of  
Boston. She was married to Com.  
Byrd at Winchester, Va., Jan. 29,  
1919, when he was an ensign.

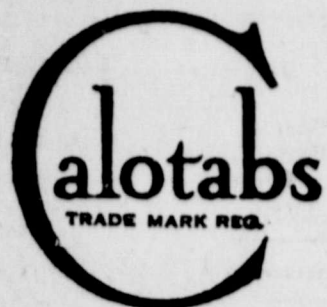

**SLOW MOVIES FALLIBLE IN SETTLING DECISIONS**

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Two recent incidents in sport have proved that even the motion picture camera is fallible as a court of appeal from most decisions. When "slow movies" were devised the sport world anticipated a visual record of close finish races and questioned fight blows which would establish decisions beyond doubt.

When Bowman and Borah raced almost a dead heat in the 100-yard dash at the national A. A. U. championships at Lincoln, Neb., judges gave first place to Borah, then to Bowman, and awaited the film picture of the finish to ascertain which won. When the film was screened, it did not show Bowman at all.

When Sharkey claimed that his knockout by Dempsey resulted from foul blows, experts flocked to slow movies of the fight to see whether Dempsey landed too low. Again the pictures failed to settle it. They caught the action from such an angle that each sport writer found confirmation of his own opinion.

**BOY, 19, CONSTRUCTS OWN PIPE ORGAN**  
(By Associated Press)

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 5.—In spite of the fact that his family discouraged him and he lacked musical playing a nineteen year old boy of San Antonio has gratified his desire for pipe organ training by building his own organ.

Organists here say that the instrument, which includes 1,168 pipes, 500 bellows and 16 stops and pedal pipes, is the finest of its size in the city. Lucien Lewis, the builder, had always loved organ music because of its "nobility." When it seemed impossible for him to obtain the training he desired he obtained a

book on organ construction and set out to build one of his own, using an alcove in his home to house the instrument.

He worked all of the problems out himself and refused to reduce the worth of his instrument by adopting easier, but less efficient methods of construction. Local organists say Lewis' organ has the most perfect violin cello string in the country. Lewis will learn to play the organ this winter.

**CHELSEA HUNTS SARGENT GHOST IN OLD STUDIO**  
(By Associated Press)

LONDON, August 5.—All of Chelsea, London's Bohemian quarter, is trying to help Alfred E. Orr, artist, solve the sound of footsteps and the mysterious turning of door-knobs in the studio where John Singer Sargent, American painter, died two years ago.

Orr, a close friend of Sargent, now occupies the studio which used to be that of the American master. He is neither a spiritualist nor a skeptic, he says, and he can neither affirm nor deny belief that Sargent has returned to haunt the studio where he rose to fame.

Footsteps which resemble Sargent's heavy tread are frequently heard, Orr says, and one might be awoken to see the knob of his bedroom door turned all the way over and back again, but when Orr and his butler searched the house no evidence of the visitor could be found. The bedroom is the one in which Sargent died.

**Church for Deaf**

CHICAGO—(AP)—Chicago has an Episcopal church where hymns are never sung and sermons never spoken. It is attended by 200 deaf and dumb parishioners. Rev. George Flicke, pastor since 1908, preaches in the sign language. The church carries on a regular program of religious, missionary and social work. It was founded 52 years ago.

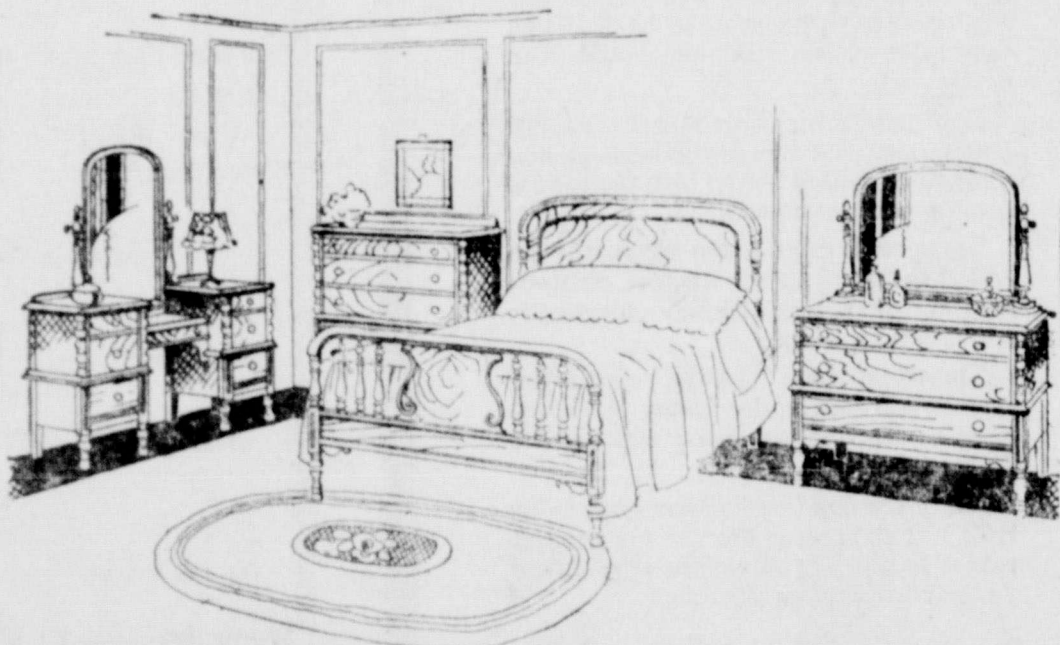
