SNOW GOES TO DEATH ON FRIDAY

(By Associated Press)

HUNTSVILLE, Aug. 12.—F. M. Snow, 50, wood-chopper of Erath county, died in the electric chair at the state penitentiary here shortly after midnight for the murder of Bernie Connally, 19, his step-son.

The boy was decapitated and it was the finding of the boy's head in a storm cellar in December, 1925, that led to Snow's arrest, and his confession to the murder of the boy and later to that of his wife and her mother, Mrs. S. A. Olds.

STEPHENVILLE, Aug. 12.—The trial and conviction of F. M. Snow, 50 years old, a wood-chopper and farmer, for the slaying of his step-son, Bernie Connally, attracted more attention than any other criminal case in Erath county. Altho tried only for the death of his step-son, Snow was charged and confessed to have killed his wife and mother-in-law.

On the morning of Dec. 9, 1925, Ben Aycock was surprised when his pack of dogs accompanying him on a hunt fled howling from the ruins of an old house on the Riggs ranch, 14 miles from Stephenville. Investigating, he found the head of a youth, wrapped in a sack in a cellar under the house and later identified as that of 19-year-old Bernie Connally, step-son of Snow.

The following day, Snow, en route to Hico in a wagon containing all his household goods and behind which his cow was tied, was arrested by Sheriff Hassler and a Texas ranger, who had found discrepancies in his story of his family's disappearance. After questioning, he confessed that he had killed the boy, his wife, Bernie's mother, and his wife's mother, Mrs. S. A. Olds, at their farm home about seven miles from here.

In his confession, made on the top of Cedar Point Mountain at midnight when he revealed to officers the headless body of Connally, he said a quarrel over a cow's getting into his pet cotton patch had preceded the triple killing. Two shots from his rifle killed Connally, who was advancing toward him with a stick of wood in his hand, and one shot, likewise fired in self-defense, he declared, killed both his wife and his mother-in-law.

After the triple murder, he loaded young Connally's body into his wagon, carried it to Cedar Point Mountain and there beheaded it, but why he did this he was unable to say. On his return, he burned the bodies of the two women on the hearth of his fireplace, using half a cord of wood in the process, he said. The death penalty was affirmed.

FARMER BRINGS IN FAIR EXHIBIT

E. F. Kevil, residing about 17 miles up the Colorado River, dry land farmer, was exhibiting some fine feed crops in the city Thursday afternoon and he has been asked to enter these in the 1927 Runnels County Fair.

As far as can be learned, Mr. Kevil is the first farmer to bring in crop samples and make preparations for exhibiting them in the fair, which starts on October 4th and continues through October 8th.

Some of the finest fertilizer, "hi-gear," milo maize, yellow dent corn, Dawson corn, and kershaws, ever produced on a dry land farm, were brought in by Mr. Kevil. He declared that practically all of his crops were extra good this year with the exception of his cotton which needed rain. It is believed Mr. Kevil's cotton received a good rain Thursday night.

Other farmers in the county are expected to bring in farm products for display in the fair within the near future in order that they may secure the best exhibit spaces in the agricultural building.

DOLE FLIGHT IS DELAYED

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 12.—The start of the James Dole \$35,000-prize aerial derby from here to Hawaii to day was postponed until next Tuesday at noon by agreement of nine of the eleven entries already here.

The agreement was reached shortly after midnight.

FRUIT IN TEXAS IS QUARANTINED

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, August 12.—Quarantine on the movement of grapefruit, oranges and other fruits from Cameron, Hidalgo and Willacy counties of Texas, was announced today by Secretary Jardine.

The quarantine was decided on because of the presence of the Mexican fruit worm, and will become effective on August 15th.

Feb. 9, 1927, a motion for rehearing was overruled March 9, a mandate ordering sentencing was issued March 12, and on June 7 sentence of death was passed on Snow.

A commutation to life imprisonment was denied by Gov. Dan Moody in July.

RAINFALL WAS GOOD IN PLACES

Thursday night's rainfall in Ballinger amounted to three-tenths of an inch, the rain gauge showed here Friday morning. The moisture came slowly and soaked in. In the country both north and south of Ballinger one inch rains fell, according to a report compiled by the West Texas Telephone Company.

Concho, south of here about 18 miles, received 1.30 inches of rain, while Truitt, Wilmeth, Norton, Wingate, Winters and Maverick each received an inch. Bradshaw received one inch while Ovalo got half an inch. Paint Rock received half an inch. Pony reported one-fourth of an inch, and other points from light to good showers. Olfen and San Angelo reported good rains.

The Colorado River was up Friday morning about four or five feet, and Elm Creek was expected to come down on a rise Friday afternoon.

In almost every section where the rain fell, cotton was greatly benefited, especially in the northern and northwestern sections of the county. The precipitation will also help to bring the cotton out in the Pony, Olfen, Rowena, Miles and Ballinger sections.

Hot dry winds were causing the crop to become sickly and more rain would still do much good in some parts of the county.

Just how much the smaller showers will aid the cotton is not known but the inch rains in the northern part of the county will help quite a bit.

U. S. RANCHER IS KIDNAPPED

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, August 12.—A report of the kidnapping by Mexican bandits of Robert Pirie, American rancher, near Vincente Guerrero on August 11th, reached the State Department today from Edward Hall, American consul at Durango.

The bandits are said to have looted the Pirie ranch.

KING BEN ON STAND TODAY

ST. JOSEPH, Mich., Aug. 12.—"King" Benjamin Purnell, on the stand for himself in the state's dissolution suit against the House of David today admitted on cross-examination that he had never secured a legal divorce from his first wife.

It had been the contention of the state that Purnell was a bigamist.

Purnell was brought to the court house in an ambulance.

LIQUOR BOAT IS CAPTURED

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, August 12.—A single-stacked steamboat, said by police to contain a \$500,000 load of contraband liquor was anchored under guard off the Statue of Liberty today after it had fled from a surprise attack by the police and had run on a sand bar, was captured by the United States coast guard.

SACCO STILL REFUSES FOOD

(By Associated Press)

BOSTON, Aug. 12.—Warden William Soudry of the Charleston state prison, took occasion today to say that Nicola Sacco, who started the 27th day of his hunger strike by refusing breakfast, was not in a state of collapse.

It was explained at the prison that so long as Sacco is able to walk the prison physician will not consider attempting forcible feeding.

Bartolomeo Vanzetti broke his intermittent fast after he had received word of his latest respite under his physician's advice. He is gradually working back toward a normal diet.

TROOPS KILL 100 INDIANS

(By Associated Press)

LA PAZ, Bolivia, Aug. 12.—A hundred hostile Indians were reported to have been killed and many wounded in a clash with Bolivian federal troops who had been sent to put down an uprising in the department of Potosi.

In the uprising it is said that 50,000 Indians are involved.

The rebels have seized farms, warehouses and homes. They have been looting and burning many buildings.

COMMISSION ORDERS 25 BLOCKS OF PAVING

ELECTRIC CO. LOSES IN POOL

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—The A. L. Fuller Company, member of the New York Stock Exchange, was suspended today for inability to meet obligations. The firm is reported to have been identified with the pool in Manhattan Electrical Supply, which collapsed in sensational fashion yesterday when the stock broke more than 60 points.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Altho loser by nearly \$4,000,000 in paper profit wiped out by the collapse of the pool operating in Manhattan Electrical Supply Co. shares, George Carden, attorney of Dallas, Texas, still thinks he has a bargain in the control of the company which rested in his hands today.

The drop of 60 points yesterday in Manhattan Electric cut almost in half the market value of the company's 130,000 shares, about 65,000 of which are believed to be held by Carden.

Twenty-five blocks of new paving were ordered Thursday night by the City Commission of Ballinger in a special meeting at the city hall.

The order calls for the paving of ten blocks on Broadway from the Santa Fe railroad to Sharp Street; eleven blocks on Eighth Street from the railroad to Large Street, and from Tenth Street on Hutchings Avenue to the Colorado River bridge.

Plans for this work will start within the next thirty days, it was declared.

Mayor Raby, Commissioners Holt and Eubank, City Secretary Lusk, City Attorney Doss, and a Mr. Clark representing the Uvalde Rock Asphalt Company, were present.

The commission, it is understood, intends to use rock and asphalt to pave the streets. Each street will have pavement of fifty feet in width with curb and gutter. The cost per foot will be \$3.20, it was estimated. The cost of the new paving is expected to total about \$75,000.

The commission also passed an ordinance in regard to the gas systems and another creating the office of a building inspector. Other minor business was transacted.

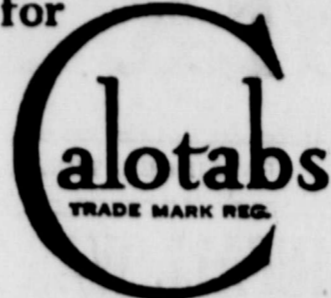

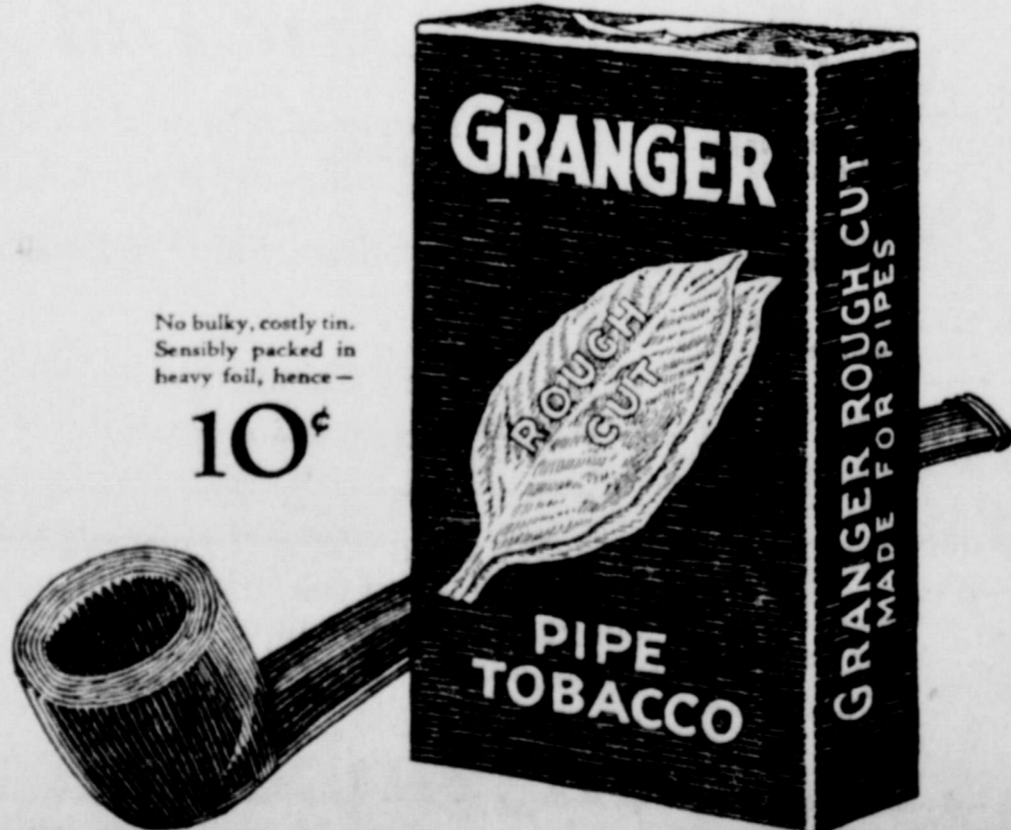

Mr. Doose has been instrumental in getting several individuals and companies to come into this county during the past few months to drill wells and it is due to his efforts that the new test is to be drilled.
