Sillix Well Makes Forty Barrells in 10 Minute Head

Parties returning to Ballinger at 3:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon from the Sillix well reported another heavy head after production had ceased for many hours. The well was evidently bridged in and shortly after noon the derrick began to shake and deep rumbling was heard. Following this the largest head since the well came in was made. Forty or fifty barrels of oil flowed following the demonstration and it is thought that the hole is open again.

Production in the Sillix et al-McMillan No. 1 had stopped Thursday morning and it was thought that the well had bridged. There is quite a length of open hole at the bottom of the well and for the past two days indications were that a bridge was forming.

C. E. Sillix, local oil operator, stated Thursday afternoon that nothing would be done to the hole for a few days and before the bit was dropped again pipe lines would have to be laid and additional storage tanks with large capacity erected. Just when the well will be drilled in cannot be stated just now but within the near future the well will probably be brought in to its full strength.

Several deals looking to the blocking of acreage and the spudding of other wells were progressing Thursday and those in charge stated that they would probably have something to report by Friday afternoon.

A rig and boiler was being transferred to a location near Crews Thursday afternoon, and reports were rife that a number of other locations had been made with drilling in prospect immediately. Details could not be learned, but it is certain that a drilling campaign is in prospect.

In the meantime the excitement runs high and the town is filled with scouts, geologists, operators and other visitors who are looking the situation over for many reasons. Calls are coming in daily from other towns by people desiring to locate in a booming oil town with various lines of business.

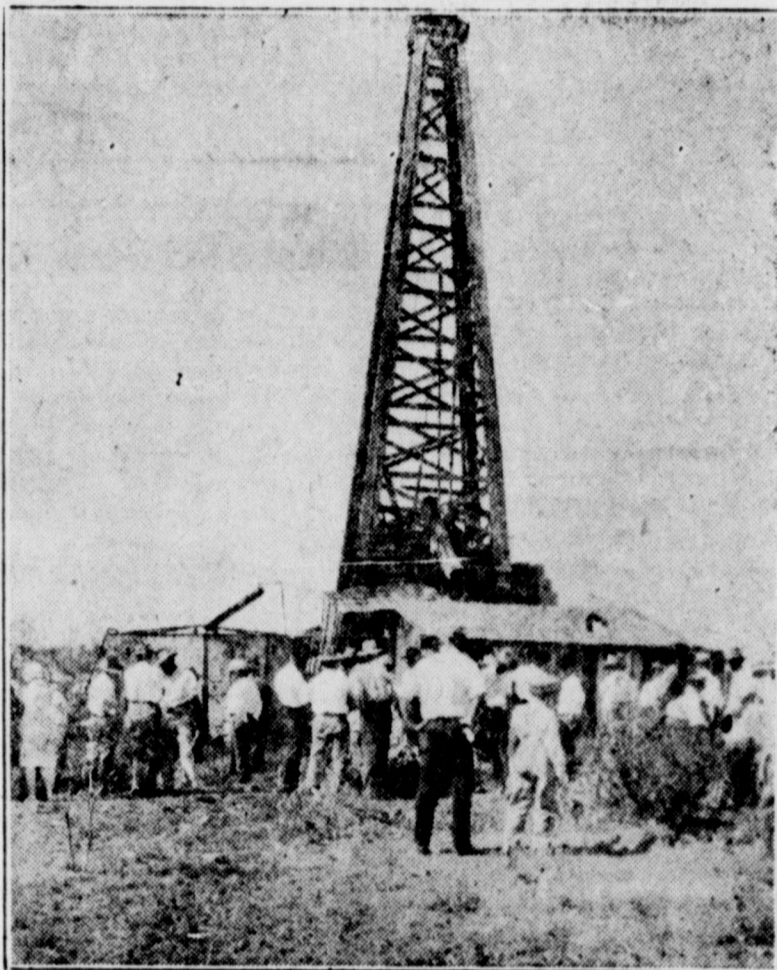
WINDSOR, Ontario, Canada, Sept. 1.—The monoplane "Royal Windsor," bearing Phil Wood and C. A. Schiller hopped off from here this morning for Windsor, England.

A wreath bearing the words—Nungesser-Coli—was placed in the plane by the flyers and they plan to drop it in the ocean as a memorial to the French flyers who attempted the westward flight across the Atlantic.

LONDON, Ont., Sept. 1.—Capt. Terry Tully and Lieut. James Metcalf took off this morning in the monoplane "Sir John Carling" on their attempted flight from here to London, England. Tully is piloting the plane, with Metcalf as navigator.

A \$25,000 prize by backers of the flight awaits the flyers if they reach London.

Officers Get 3 Held Here; Auto and Loot is Recovered

Jack Smith, Erbert Bailey and Charlie Fee, who were arrested near Winters Tuesday afternoon and who had been in the county jail in Ballinger for the past two days, were carried away from here to different points Thursday after a number of identifications had been made.

Sheriffs from Welton, Texas and Hollis, Oklahoma took two of the men and the sheriff of Nolan county took Jack Smith to Sweetwater to answer hi-jacking and robbery charges at Blackwell.

Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Fee and Erbert Bailey will be taken to Welton to answer charges of robbery of a drug store at that place. They are also wanted in Oklahoma in connection with the Dodsonville bank robbery.

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams put in two days of detective work after the arrest of the three men and during that time practically fastened several crimes on the men

they are said to have committed in this section of the country in the past few weeks. It was learned Wednesday that there was a woman in the case, and Mr. McWilliams immediately went to Miles and placed her under arrest. A Nash automobile was seized by the sheriff and in the car and in the woman's room merchandise and other loot was found and soon identified at the places where the men were taken from here. A large amount of jewelry found in the woman's room identified the men with the robbery of a drug store and jewelry store at Welton, and a flashlight, shoes, and gun were identified by a man at Blackwell who was hi-jacked and robbed a few nights ago. The woman gave her name as Mrs. Charlie Fee, wife of one of the men who was arrested near Winters the day before.

Sheriff McWilliams was given a \$300 reward which had been posted in Oklahoma for the arrest of the men.

400 TEACHERS GATHER HERE FOR INSTITUTE

The Concho-Colorado Teachers Institute opened in Ballinger at the high school auditorium Thursday morning, with about 400 teachers in attendance. After the opening many others continued to arrive by automobiles from nearby cities and the attendance at the close of the first session at noon climbed to approximately 500.

At the opening session all lecturers and conductors were present to begin work at once and by 10:00 o'clock the different divisions were assembled and actual work commenced.

Supt. B. B. Cobb, of the Waco city schools, was on hand at the opening session to take charge of the high school section. Mr. Cobb is director of high school work at the institute and will lecture to that division at each session.

Miss Nina B. Glass, of the Waco

city schools, is director of primary work and took charge at the Thursday morning session.

Miss Mary E. Johnson, of the East Texas State Teachers College has arrived to take charge as director of the intermediate department.

Hon. John Lee Smith, of the State Department of Education, will address the teachers at 10:30 Friday morning, and Supt. R. D. Green, president of the Texas State Teachers Association and superintendent of the Abilene city schools, will also talk to the teachers.

Supt. R. E. White, conductor of the institute, stated Thursday morning that up to that time all the teachers who had made application for rooms were taken care of and that a sufficient number

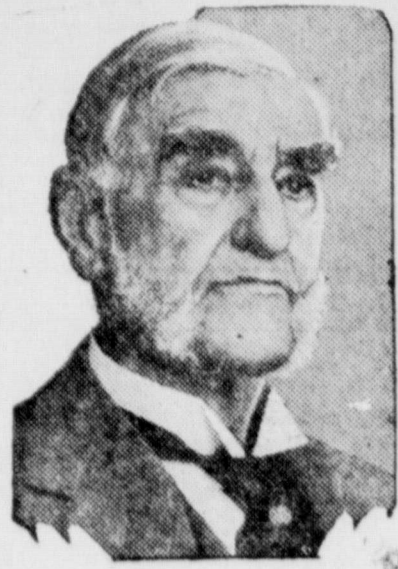

STATE AWARDED
MANY MILLIONS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 1.—The State
got a judgment for undetermined
millions of dollars in the district
court here today when Judge
George Calhoun awarded it the
title in the R. L. Baffler suit in
which there were more than fifty
litigants including several big oil
companies.

The State was allowed to re-
cover all profits running into
some eight or ten millions of
dollars from land since it had
been developed, less the cost of
development.

Titles on which the suit was
based extend back to the days of
Spanish land grants in Texas.

SPUR, Tex.—The educational
committee of the West Texas
Chamber of Commerce headed by
Clifford B. Jones, of Spur, is
broadcasting to territory of the
regional organization announce-
ment of a profitable type of
agricultural training easily avail-
able to its member towns. Under
the federal Smith-Hughes law,
local chambers of commerce or
local schools can secure services
of a Texas Agricultural &
Mechanical College graduate to
teach vocational agriculture and
promote agricultural interests,
with half or more of his expenses
paid by the government. The
amount of the salary paid by the
government depends upon the
amount of time the teacher de-
votes to agricultural work. The
Smith-Hughes teachers often
sponsor fairs, encourage distribu-
tion of good seed, terrace, help
with insect control, conduct night
schools with farmers and boys
out of school, and do work of
farm nature that is highly ben-
eficial to any section.

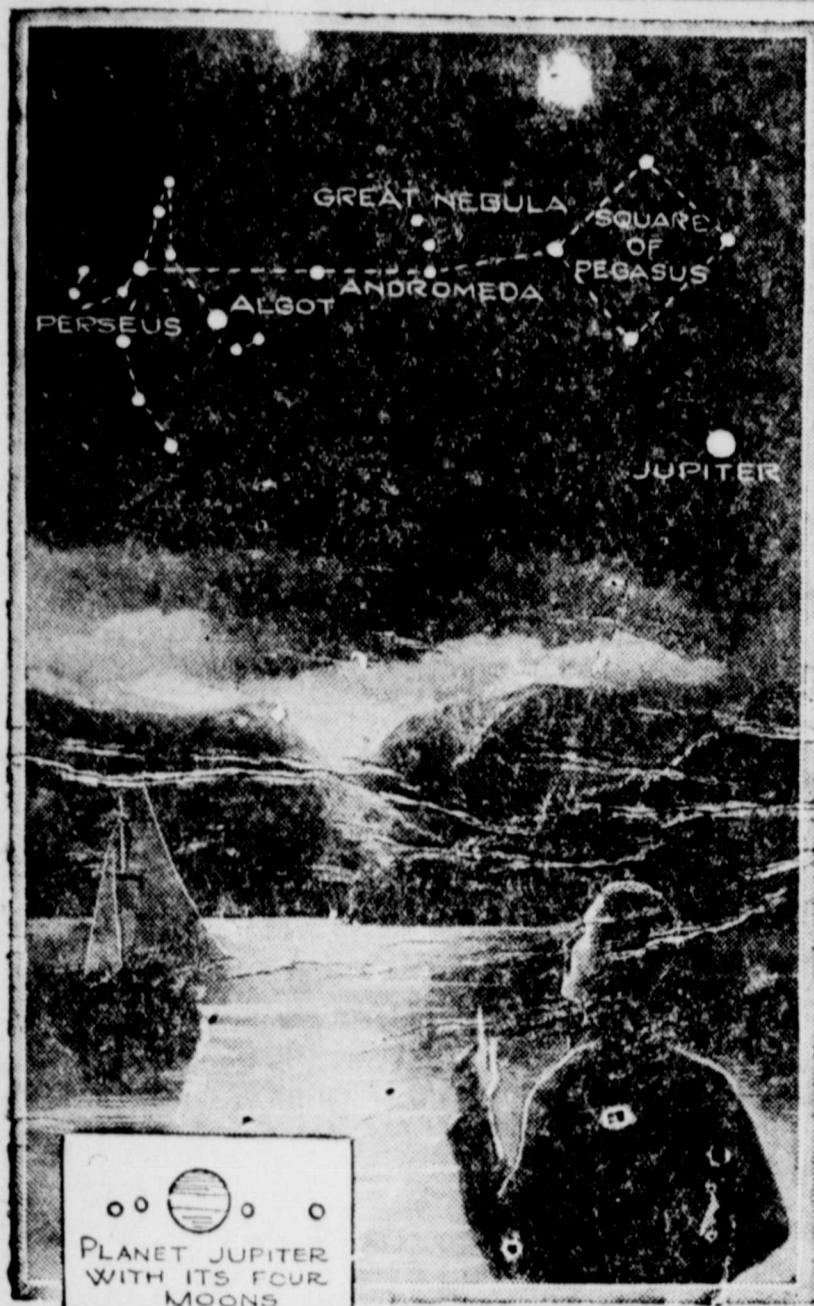

THE MONTH IN THE SKY

URBANA, Ill., Sept. 1.—Jupiter, largest of the planets, will be a conspicuous object during September, rising at nightfall above the eastern horizon. It appears as a brilliant yellow star, so much brighter than any of the real stars that it is easy to find.

Only a small telescope is required to show the banded disk of this great planet and its four brightest moons, three of which are larger than our own moon. Jupiter has nine satellites revolving around it. Five of them may be viewed only through powerful telescopes.

Jupiter is now 400 million miles away. Having a diameter of 88,000 miles, it outbulks and outweighs all the rest of the planets put together. Like the other planets it shines entirely by reflected sunlight. The surface which we see with the telescope is gaseous, spun out into bright and dark cloud-bands by the planet's rapid rotation. What lies underneath the cloudy covering no one knows.

Other interesting sights are displayed in the eastern sky in the early evening during September. Not far above Jupiter we have the familiar square of Pegasus tipped on one corner. If this square is imagined to be the bowl of a dipper, the handle is found extending northward.

The middle of the handle, with the stars around it, forms the constellation Andromeda, the chained princess who, according to mythology, was left on a rock to be devoured by a sea monster. The star which marks the end of the handle of this dipper is the brightest star of Perseus, the hero of the same story. Perseus comes flying into the scene carrying in one hand the head of the demon Medusa which he points toward the monster, at once turning it to stone.

Perseus looks not at all like a hero, but like a starry arrow pointing upward along the Milky Way.

Medusa's head is marked by the Demon Star, Algol, the star that winks. At regular intervals of 69 hours this famous star is reduced to one-third its usual brightness. The reason is now known, namely that a fainter companion revolves around the brighter star and partially eclipses it periodically.

The Great Nebula in Andromeda is visible to the unaided eye on a clear moonless night as a small, faint, foggy patch. Actually it is a huge spiral structure of millions of stars. With the aid of the accompanying picture a keen eye should be able to detect it in the sky.

The Andromeda Nebula is the most distant object which it is

possible to see without the aid of a telescope. It is far beyond the Milky Way, so remote in fact that its light required 950,000 years to reach us, travelling all that time at the rate of 186,000 miles a second.

"SAINT RAPHAEL" NOW OVERDUE

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—A check up of all Eastern Canadian wireless stations was completed this morning but failed to reveal the whereabouts of monoplane "Saint Raphael," flying from England to Ottawa.

ST. JOHNS, Newfoundland, Sept. 1.—Noon today was near the end of the time limit for the "Saint Raphael" with its flying princess to sight American land on its flight to Ottawa, Canada. The hours passed with no word from the ship.

At the earliest the monoplane was expected here around 4:00 o'clock this morning, but it could have been delayed many hours beyond that time by head winds which are known to have blown over much of the North Atlantic course yesterday. Visibility was such that a plane might have passed inland without being seen especially if off its course.

EL PASO—Manager Homer D. Wade has issued invitations to governors of two states and the governor of Chihuahua, Mexico, as well as other high officials of Texas and New Mexico, to attend an international highway conference in El Paso, September 24, the occasion of Col. Lindbergh's visit to the "Gateway City." The prime purpose of the proposed meeting is to better co-ordinate the highways that lead from West Texas, the republic of Mexico and New Mexico.
