Two Plead Guilty to Theft of Cotton

The first cotton theft of the year was reported Thursday afternoon when two men pleaded guilty to stealing cotton in the justice court here. They were fined and given short jail sentences and also required to return the cotton to the owner.

Elder Hoes and E. B. Lohse were the pair who entered pleas of guilty and received sentence for alleged theft of cotton from Frank Dueck, who resides near Rowena.

The two men are alleged to have taken two large cotton sacks Tuesday night and to have gone into Mr. Dueck's field and filled the sacks from a pile of cotton already gathered. They were further alleged to have taken the cotton to their place and finished out a bale they had been picking, brought the cotton to town and had it ginned. Mr. Dueck missed the cotton, and Sheriff R. E. McWilliams and Deputy Sheriff Fisher of Rowena, went to the scene and tracked the men from one field to the other. The two men were arrested and after being confronted with the evidence confessed to the theft.

BOTH CANADIAN PLANES DOWN

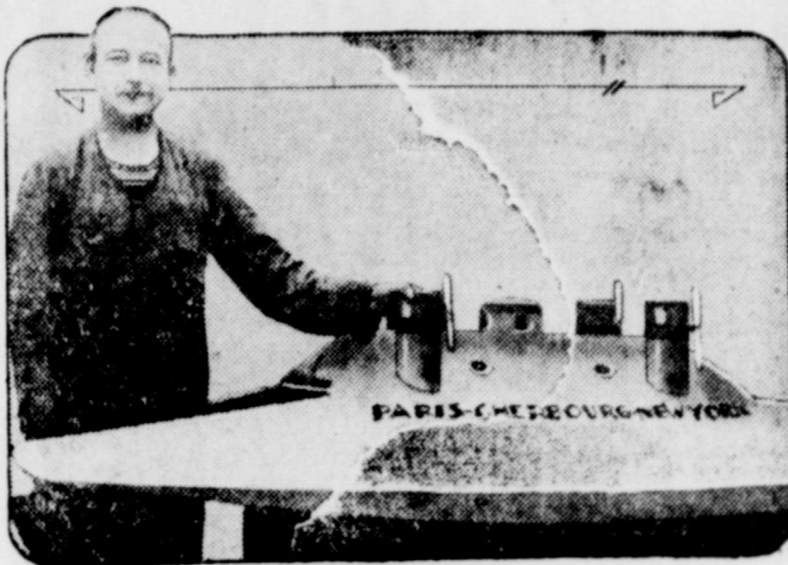

Devises Glider to Cross Ocean



Adrien Remy, French inventor, and his new hydro-glider, with which he hopes to cross the Atlantic in four days.

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Sept. 2.—A hydro-glider, designed to cross the Atlantic Ocean in four days, is being fashioned by Adrien Remy, French inventor.

It is to travel on the water, but it will have motor-turned propellers like an airplane and a shallow hull, so built upon two floaters that it will "slip over the tops of the waves" instead of cutting them. The floaters are

nine feet apart, joined by a cross-structure which contains a seven-foot-high cabin in which ten persons can be accommodated.

Remy is building the craft from a model, but he has not set a date for the launching, pending installation of motors. His estimate of a four-day Atlantic crossing is based on a reckoned speed of 40 knots an hour for the finished craft, which is 60 feet long and 24 feet wide.

360 TEACHERS REGISTER HERE

The Concho-Colorado Teachers Institute came to a close Friday afternoon at 4:15 when the last session closed. Many of the teachers were leaving for their homes in cars and busses and only a few remained in Ballinger for the night. Threatening weather, however, induced some to remain here who live quite a distance from the city.

The institute, while consisting of only a two days program, was considered by those in charge as one of the best held recently. As soon as the body convened work was commenced and under excellent instructors and lecturers a great deal of good is believed to have been accomplished in a short time.

The largest gathering was held Thursday night when citizens of Ballinger were invited with the teachers to attend the lecture presented by Prof. S. C. Eisenlohr. A large crowd in the high school auditorium heard the excellent address by the famous artist.

All sessions were held in the Ballinger Senior high school building.

60 FOOT CAVE IN FAILS TO STOP FLOW

Thursday afternoon the bailer was dropped in the Sillix well and it was found that the well contained a 60-foot cave-in. There is something like 100 feet of open hole at the bottom of the well. After the well ceased to flow Tuesday it was thought that a bridge had formed. Following a big head of 40 barrels Thursday afternoon the bailer was run and the 60-foot cave-in discovered. The head Thursday evidently opened the hole pretty well as during Thursday night the well headed twice, giving a good flow each time.

There has been no decrease in the buying and selling of leases during the past few days, with some of the late deals setting a high mark for acreage.

I. L. Bagwell and Chalk Bailey of San Angelo bought for themselves and the Marland Oil Company the lease on the Sam Boyer farm of 190 acres, comprising lot 25, Domingo Diaz survey, for \$109 an acre, or \$19,950. The farm is southwest of C. E. Sillix and others' No. 1 McMillan, discovery producer, the nearest part of it being at a distance of 3,500 feet. Bagwell and Bailey got the east third of the tract nearest the well. Dave Schonewald of Blackwell, Okla., secured from the center third, and Marland retained the west third.

Bagwell and Bailey leased 100 acres on the Wood farm in J. H. Thompson survey No. 146, one and one-half miles south of the well, for \$27.50 an acre. I. G. Bagwell and Brown Bros. of San Angelo leased twenty acres in the north part of Domingo Diaz survey for \$20 an acre.

The largest single lease so far reported was that of 3,200 acres in a solid block in survey 362, four miles east of the Sillix well, on the H. F. Lindeman and E. O. Lange farms. G. Guy Miller, of San Angelo, bought the lease for H. E. Lamar and C. D. Collins, of San Angelo, representing the Iowa Park Oil & Gas Company, of Iowa Park, Texas.

North of this block the Republic Company leased 568 acres out of the H. F. Lindeman farm through Paul Buddy of San Angelo at \$17.50 an acre. One hun-

ded and sixty acres lie in survey 362, and 408 acres in survey 263. Both the Iowa Park and Republic deals were five-year commercial leases.

M. U. Ward, of San Angelo, bought for C. D. Shaffer, of Chicago the lease on 109 acres in the Domingo Diaz survey 1-1-4 miles southwest of the Sillix producer, at \$45 an acre. This tract comprises the west fifty-nine acres out of lot 40 on the J. L. King farm and the west fifty acres of E. W. Gray's 200 acres. C. D. Shaffer will operate in Texas as the Barbara Oil Company.

Marland Oil Company bought one-half the royalty on 179 acres under the H. E. Wade farm in lot 24, Domingo Diaz survey, on a \$200 base, or for \$10,000.

Sillix Well to be Completed
Completion and a test of capacity in the L. D. Ladd et al No. 1 McMillan, wildcat which has opened up a new pool in Runnels county, in the Domingo Diaz survey, north of Ballinger, is expected as soon as additional tankage can be erected.

This was announced Wednesday by one of the Fort Worth men interested in the test following a conference in the field by various owners which cleared the

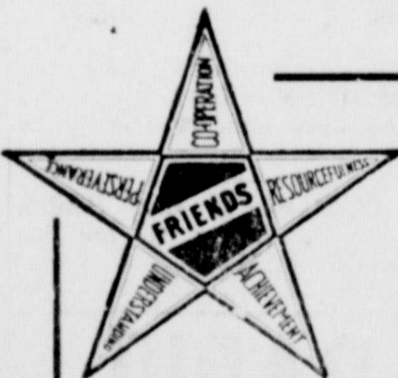

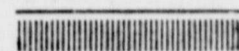

WHY STUDY EXPRESSION

Lucibel Taylor

In our talk on Expression, it might be well to consider just what expression is. There are many definitions of the spoken art, but doubtless, the one that is the simplest and still more comprehensive and satisfying is that Expression is the giving out of an impression.

All life expresses itself. There is no question as to whether there is life or not. The blush of a rose tells us that the rose is living; the color of the grass proclaims the fact that it is not dead; he fruit upon the tree tells us that sap is still coursing through its veins, and the waving grain tells that the fields are not barren.

All the arts are kindred for the purpose of each is to express life. The sculptor chisels his thoughts in marble or stone; the painter expresses his thought by his canvass and paints; a musician expresses his thoughts through rhythmic notes, the poet expresses his thought through cold metallic type, but the orator expresses his thought through a living, breathing soul. Hence, spoken art is greatest of them all for it is man's means of communicating with man.

Let us apply the art to life and see what it does for the boy and girl or the man and woman. First, and foremost, the study of expression increases one's vocabulary (and it is the basis of our conversation). Words are studied from every angle and one may see how valuable the study is in itself, for words are the stock and trade of our language. Upon them are built sentences, paragraphs, compositions and in fact, every form of literature, and it is the basis of our conversation. If one sees how great men express themselves and have a chance to understand and memorize, their expressions, surely a great insight into the language is achieved. So a careful study of words gives the child the ability to get the thought quickly, from the printed page, and helps him to learn to express his thought.

We look, not only at the meaning of words, but we work upon the enunciation and pronunciation and color of a word. There is a great difference between enunciation and pronunciation. A person may pronounce his words correctly and still not speak distinctly enough to be understood. Enunciation deals with the letters that make up the word. Expression does more than that for the word, it deals with the full power of the word, for example, the word rock; has a hard sound, fleecy, a soft sound, leap and swish sound their meaning. All words suggest their meaning.

In fact, the careful student of expression always leads in his school work and it is obvious that they should especially in English. Then, too, a careful study is made of the body. Of course, it is very essential that one should know how to stand, sit and walk

correctly. We go further than have the child acquire good habits in his posture. We make a beautiful use of the body—for the training of the other faculties would be of no use unless the body co-operates. The body is not only made beautiful, but is strengthened. We also make a careful study of breathing. Some doctors have said if people would stand and breathe correctly, there would be no need of doctors.

Everyone loves to hear a pleasing voice. Shakespeare said of Cordelia, "Her voice was ever sweet, gentle and low, an excellent thing in woman." We strive for this development in order to produce resonant and beautiful tones.

The child who does not like history or geography and finds it hard to express himself orally, could overcome this difficulty were he to study that phase of expression known as story-telling. This gives him spontaneity, freedom of speech and self-confidence so that reciting lessons at school is not longer a thing to be dreaded. In his work and activities of school the child easily becomes a leader because he knows how to express himself, easily and forcibly.

Memory is that power of the mind that most of us need trained. Youth is the time for the training of the memory. The child learns to concentrate and memorize his selections by a careful study of it and not merely by a mechanical device. If he takes the thought to himself and stores the mind with good things early in life, that will be a great benefit. Ruskin has said, "Why associate yourself with common things and people, with low and common thought when you may be acquainted with kings and queens and the brightest students of literature?"

All these phases combined, gradually assure the child of self confidence and assertiveness. Socrates said the great problem of life is "Know thyself," and there is no better opportunity

offered in all education than the study of the art of expression, for it deals with the full power of man.
