OLD GLORY IS DOWN; SHIPS RUSH TO AID

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—A wireless S. O. S. from the monoplane Old Glory sent during the early hours of morning darkness when she was apparently about 500 miles east of the northeast tip of Newfoundland on her trip from Old Orchard, Maine to Rome, Italy, sent liners and warships racing to her assistance.

Beyond the fact that her crew, Lloyd Bertaud, James Hill and Phillip Payne, were in the grip of some tragedy over the trackless wastes of water, no details were given in the message.

Within a few minutes after receiving the distress call, several ships were rushing under full steam towards the estimated position of the monoplane.

The steamship Carmania notified the Radio Corporation of America that the plane, prior to her distress call had reported that she was following the great circle to Rome at a speed of about 100 miles per hour. This being the case the monoplane might have encountered severe weather.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—The liner Transylvania reported this afternoon that she had reached the position where Old Glory is thought to have come down and to have searched the 30-mile area without results.

Captain Bone said he was proceeding further with the search.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—An independent wireless company today announced that ships in the North Atlantic has reported a high sea running, with a strong wind prevailing, and that for this reason it was noted, the locating of the monoplane Old Glory and the rescue of its two pilots and passenger would be difficult.

HARBOR GRACE, Newfoundland, Sept. 7.—The airplane Sir John Carling, bound from London, Ontario to London, England, hopped off from the airport here this morning.

Captain Terry Tully is pilot, and Lieutenant James Medcaff is navigator.

If Tully and Medcaff reach London safely they will receive a \$25,000 prize offered by the backers of the flight.

The plane took the air easily. The Royal Windsor arrived here this afternoon from Old Orchard, Maine on its way to England.

OLD ORCHARD, Maine, Sept. 7.—The Royal Windsor resumed its trans-Atlantic flight Englandward this morning, heading its nose toward Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, its next stop.

The flyers, C. A. "Duke" Schiller and Phil Wood took off without knowledge of the plight of Old Glory.

The airmen had not been informed of the fate of Old Glory when they took off, but local authorities, however, had inserted a memorandum describing

OIL BROKER LOCATES HERE

JUDGE GRANTS INJUNCTION

AUSTIN, Sept. 7.—An injunction restraining Comptroller Terrell from paying seven state legislators who are members of the Tax Survey Commission \$10 per day and expenses, as authorized by the legislature, was granted today by Judge Hamilton of the criminal district court here.

The application was refused insofar as it applies to eight private citizens who are members of the commission.

Senator Witt, vice-chairman of the committee, said the work of investigating the state's tax system would be completed regardless of the injunction, and Grady Chandler, assistant attorney general, said the case would be appealed immediately.

Cleaning Out of Sillix Well is Started; To Deepen Hole Soon

DANCIGER HEAD SAYS WELL O.K.

Jack Danciger, vice-president of the Danciger Oil Company, of Fort Worth, was in Ballinger Tuesday afternoon looking over the oil situation here. With him was D. E. Williams, of Wichita Falls, another representative of the firm.

"Runnels county is due for some good play," Mr. Danciger asserted. "Heretofore this section did not have enough wildcat wells but now there is a chance that too many wells will go down and that the field will get too much play. The Sillix find, I believe, is a good one. The well looks very promising to me."

"The strike will also give other counties of this section renewed vigor in the oil business. Leases on acreage in Coke county are more in demand now than before the find."

Mr. Danciger is drilling a test on the ranch of Mrs. Velma Byrens, Clinton survey. It is in a block of 12,000 acres. The hole has been taken to a depth of 1,625 feet, where the 10-inch casing now extends.

The block which the Danciger Oil Company holds was worked by Phillip Maverick, San Angelo lease buyer and geologist.

Mr. Danciger says he will keep a close watch on the development in Runnels county. He did not state Tuesday whether his firm had purchased any Runnels county acreage.

FOUR DIE IN GUN BATTLE

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—The fourth death from a shooting which came as the climax to a conference over a \$500 real estate transaction in a law office here yesterday, occurred today when Robert McGrorty, 29, died in a hospital.

Death was due to injuries received when McGrorty was struck by the body of Victor Steinberg as it was hurled from the ninth floor to the street.

SAYS OIL WELL IS A GOOD ONE

Thos. C. Hall, Temple banker and real estate dealer, owner of a fine farm in this county a few miles north of Ballinger, was in the city Tuesday looking after business interests and signing papers for the drilling of a well on a 1,200-acre block, four miles north of the city, which embraces parts of his farm and the Gray and Evans places.

"The Sillix et al McMillan No. 1 is the best find in any of the counties adjoining Runnels," Mr. Hall declared. "I think Ballinger is destined to become a leading oil town of this section with the strike in the Sillix test."

Mr. Hall said that neither Taylor, Coleman, McCulloch, Tom Green, Coneho nor Coke counties had such a fine thing as this oil well and that it would mean much to Ballinger and Runnels county citizens.

The Empire Gas & Fuel Co., of Bartlesville, Oklahoma, and Bert H. Collins, of Tulsa, have contracted to drill a well on the acreage recently acquired and the work will be started as soon as the abstracts and titles to the lands and leases are okehed by attorneys for the contractors.

The location of this well has not yet been made, but the contract has been signed and work will be started within the very near future. The acreage lies about two miles south of the Sillix, and four miles north of Ballinger. As the days go by the acreage nearer to Ballinger is being blocked and drilling contracts are being let.

It is believed that within the next few days a half dozen or more wells will be drilling in this county.

As drillers were preparing to set a liner in the Sillix et al McMillan No. 1, Wednesday afternoon, the well made the best head since it has been connected with the storage tanks, oil men returning from the producer at 3:00 o'clock this afternoon declared.

The loading racks have not been completed at Benoit and the owners will not deepen the well until the Humble pipe line is connected with the racks so that the oil may be removed as fast as possible.

Work on the Sillix well, six miles north of Ballinger, preparatory to deepening the hole, was reported to have been started Wednesday, it was learned here in the afternoon. It is known that some work is being done at the well and it is said that drillers, under the direction of C. R. Dutton, one of the owners and drilling contractor, are making ready to deepen the hole in an effort to further determine just what the well will make.

It was stated that it would probably require two or three days to clean the mud from the hole, but this was not certain as it is not known just how much mud there is in the hole. Casing was set in the well to 2,420 feet, which left 125 feet of open hole; and it is believed that there is 60 feet or more of mud below the bottom of the casing. A liner will be set in an effort to shut out the mud and when this is done, the bit will go deeper.

Trading is still reported to be very brisk, with from \$2 to \$105 per acre being paid. No new deals have been announced, but it is a known fact that trading in leases and royalties has not slackened since the well blew in about ten days ago.

It is reported that the Humble Pipe Line Company's two-inch line from the well's storage tanks to the Santa Fe tracks at Benoit have been completed, but that loading racks are not yet finished. This part of the work, however, is expected to be completed within a day or so.

Empire to Drill
The Empire Gas & Fuel Company, Bartlesville, Okla., and Bert H. Collins, Tulsa, closed a contract Tuesday afternoon to drill a well on a 1,200-acre block

about four miles north of the city and two miles south of the discovery well. This block takes in parts of the Hall, Gray and Evans places.

This deal had been pending for some time but was consummated Tuesday afternoon. This brings active drilling nearer to Ballinger.

Thos. C. Hall, of Temple, owner of the Hall ranch, said that drilling would be started as soon as the titles are examined by attorneys for the Oklahoma parties.

Other Contracts Rumored
Plans calling for the drilling of about five or six other wells, the locations of which are not expected to be more than eight miles in any direction from the producer, are being made and a contract was pending Wednesday afternoon for the drilling of a test still closer to Ballinger than the Empire-Collins well.

Operators from all parts of the Southwest are coming to Ballinger and inspecting the discovery well.

Most of the visiting oil men seem to be rather favorably impressed with the showing the well is making.

PIPING HOMES FOR GAS SLOW

Ballinger citizens are very slow in having their homes piped for gas, W. B. Dunlap, city gas, electrical and building inspector, declared Wednesday morning. Only 21 homeowners have asked that their houses be inspected, he said. Mr. Dunlap has inspected all of these residences and if there are others piped for gas he knows nothing of them. When a home is piped, the owner of the residence should call Mr. Dunlap to make an inspection of the plumbing and see that everything is done in accordance with the gas ordinance passed by the city commission several weeks ago.

"Plumbers who have not made bond will have charges filed against them Thursday unless they comply with the ordinance, Mr. Doss, the city attorney, tells me," Mr. Dunlap stated. "The plumbers who have already made bond are DeMerville Plumbing Co., E. J. Carroll Plumbing Co., and Jennings Plumbing Co., of Abilene. There are two others who are reported to be doing gas fitting here who have not made bond."

It is understood that the Lone Star Gas Company will turn on gas here some time this week. The company's pipe line to Coleman county is completed and the crew which had been here piping this city was removed last week to Merkel where it will construct a gas system.

The Western Gas Service Company, it is understood, is now piping Ballinger for natural gas. Record time was made by this company in building the main line from Coleman county fields through Ballinger to San Angelo.

CITY FATHERS TALK PARKING

The city commission of Ballinger in regular monthly meeting Tuesday night discussed at length the parking situation in Ballinger business streets and although no definite action was taken, the commission will probably meet within the next few days to discuss further this matter and to eliminate if possible all traffic hazards on the downtown streets. The main problem in the traffic congestion is the double and triple parking in front of drug stores and other business houses on downtown streets when trade is rushing and when there are many people and motorcars in town.

Mayor S. B. Raby presided at the meeting. Commissioners W. A. Holt and E. M. Eubank were present together with City Attorney A. K. Doss and City Secretary J. R. Lusk.

Mr. Davis, of Fosgard & Davis, engineers, of Houston, who have been employed to supervise the paving extension here and make a preliminary survey of Broadway, Eighth Street and Hutchings Avenue, reported that he expected to have a complete report and estimate to make some time next week. A special session of the commission will be called to hear the report.

Work on the water system improvements is continuing, it was reported and the construction crews are now at work on Broadway. Supt. Lusk, who is supervising this work, said Wednesday that an under-paving service line would be laid before the paving of Broadway commenced, and that the city had much work of this kind to do. He stated that the ten-inch line would be completed some time next week. The commission ordered all bills paid.

"School opens each morning at 8:45 o'clock," H. C. Lyon, superintendent of the city schools, announced Wednesday morning. "The teachers are on duty at 8:15 a. m., but we will be responsible only for the students' actions after 8:15 each morning." During the first day or two of the present term some little trouble over hazing the Freshmen of the high school occurred before time for opening the buildings, and Mr. Lyon declared that the faculty would be responsible for the children from 8:15 o'clock until they are out of school. Parents are requested by the superintendent not to let their children come to school before 8:15 o'clock in the morning.

In discussing the first few days of the 1927-28 term, Mr. Lyon declared that the faculty had been so busy that a complete check-up had not been made, but that there had been a large increase in the Senior and elementary schools. The number of employees in County Clerk W. A. Forgy's office has been increased, and the real estate and abstract offices here have also employed extra clerks to take care of the business that has been pouring into the city during the past ten days.

It is predicted that Ballinger will grow, not like the usual mushroom oil town, but with sure, steady strides. The city so far has handled the situation very well but the big rush has not come yet because of the fact that the producing well has not been drilled in.

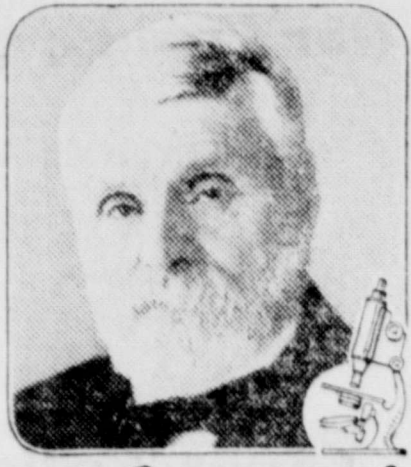
