## PREVENTION OF HOPS OVER WATER IS ASKED

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Steps to prevent long distance air flights over the water by land planes was recommended in a report to the Navy Department today by Lieutenant Ben Wyatt, who served on the committee which inspected the Dole flight planes before their take-off from San Francisco.

WINDSOR, Ontario, Sept. 10.—The flight of the Royal Windsor to England was definitely abandoned today by V. A. Schiller, pilot, who wired the local flight committee that he and Phil Wood, co-pilot, would return here as soon as possible from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland.

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Charles Levine announced today that unless weather conditions improve by Monday that he would abandon his proposed western trans-Atlantic flight to the United States.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 10.—The globe circling monoplane The Pride of Detroit arrived here from Hong Kong tonight after a flight of 780 miles.  
The plane landed at the Chinese Nationalist government airfield, ten miles outside of the international settlement.

## COTTON DROPS \$4 PER BALE

(By Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—Cotton futures broke about \$4 a bale on the New York Cotton Exchange today, practically wiping out gains previously recorded on the publication of the reduced government crop estimate Thursday.  
December contracts, which Thursday sold high to 24.72 cents per pound dropped to 22.70 today as the result of heavy liquidation, accompanied by Southern hedge selling. This was inspired by a weakness in the technical position of the market, which shows weakness abroad, and the general improvement of weather conditions over the cotton producing belt which is expected to greatly benefit the growing crop.

## Nurse Held in Jail While Analysis Made

ENID, Okla., Sept. 10.—While Miss Mary Atkinson, a nurse in the home of Rev. Charles Bailey here, awaited in her cell the outcome of an analysis of the viscera of Mary Jane Bailey, 18, officials today sifted again the evidence which had caused her detention for questioning.  
The pastor's wife also died about two weeks ago.  
The minister yesterday denied that he had had any relations with the nurse other than such as were compatible with his position as her pastor.

## SATTERWHITE TELLS WHAT THE NATION NEEDS

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—There is need for the restoration of self government through a check-up of the centralization of power in the federal government, Lee Satterwhite, former speaker of the Texas legislature, declared today in an address before the committee preparing the program for the annual national conference of State Legislatures.  
There are many steps to follow in the march back to readjustment on the basis of sanity and justice between the federal and state governments, the Texan declared in outlining a series of alleged problems of state's rights.  
The immediate aim of the conference's program should be to repeal the federal estate tax, Satterwhite urged, adding that to levy an inheritance or estate tax is no federal right and it has never belonged to the states and has never been granted by the states to congress.

## KANSAS OIL MAN COMES BY PLANE

Ralph Lawson, oil operator, of Wichita, Kansas, arrived in Ballinger Saturday morning about 8:00 o'clock from Kansas in an airplane piloted by R. E. Briley.  
Mr. Lawson is associated with A. H. Parks, formerly of the Kansas fields but now a resident of this city. Mr. and Mrs. Parks have been making their home in Ballinger for some time.  
Parks & Lawson have a block of acreage in Concho county, and within the next two weeks will spud a well on the W. O. Shultz ranch, nine miles southeast of Paint Rock, near the Shultz ranch house.  
At present there is only one well drilling in Concho county, the Exploration Company's test on the Hartgrove ranch near Paint Rock.  
Both Mr. Parks and Mr. Lawson speak well of the Sillix and others McMillan No. 1 and they also think that there is a fine possibility for an oil field in Concho county. The rig and material for the Shultz well will be moved in next week and the hole started not later than two weeks from Monday.

## REFUSES AID FLOOD AREA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Comptroller General McCarl today again refused to authorize the War Department to use \$2,000,000 of the 1927 unexpended rivers and harbors appropriations for Mississippi valley flood relief.

## Ladd, Sillix and Associates to Drill Two More Wildcats

### WILL LIGHT GAS TONIGHT

Miss Mildred Butler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Butler, will strike the match that will light the first gas fire in Ballinger tonight at 8:00 o'clock on Sealy Avenue, when the Lone Star Gas Company will hold a public demonstration celebrating the completion of the gas system here and the main gas line into Coleman county.  
The gas was turned on at noon Friday but the setting of the gas meters will not be started until Monday morning.  
Scott H. Mack, former president of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, will welcome the company here. It is not known whether there will be a response from some official of the gas company, but two or three of the officers are expected to be here.  
The Ballinger Band will play a short concert on the court house lawn commencing at 7:30 o'clock. All the program with the exception of the lighting of the torch will be held on the court house lawn.

### CONTRACT LET FOR ROAD WORK

The State Highway Commission Friday closed contracts for the topping of state highways with asphalt in about nineteen Texas counties, covering 225 miles, and these included a contract to Cooke & Turner of Marshall, for a one-treatment of asphalt topping over 15.6 miles of Highway No. 30 in Rinnels county, which extends from a point 9.4 miles north of Ballinger to the Taylor county line.  
This work will cost \$26,353.7.  
Rinnels county had been asking for some such work for several months and it was only recently that the commission passed a resolution allowing this improvement.  
Other counties in West Texas to receive similar improvement on highways are:  
Val Verde, 11.69 miles on No. 3 from Del Rio, east to Kinney county line, \$21,403, to Gilliam, Green and Menard, Del Rio.  
Hall, 5 miles on No. 18, from Estelle west to Culvert, \$11,508, to Dexter Construction Co., Dallas.  
Potter, 4.4 miles on No. 5 from 7.3 miles north of Amarillo, north to Amarillo creek and 6.8 miles east of Amarillo to Carson county line, to American Asphalt Company, Dallas.  
Dimmitt and Frio counties, 41.2 miles on No. 85, from Carrizo Springs to Dilley, to Lone Star Construction Company, San Antonio.  
Comanche county, 17.43 miles of No. 67, from Eastland county line southeast to Erath county line, \$27,650, to J. E. Ward Co.  
Dickens county, 3.97 miles on No. 18, and 13.23 miles on No. 53 from four miles north of Dickens south and west to 13.2 miles west of Dickens, \$28,252.

### ROBBER FACES MURDER CHARGE

When Mrs. Ida Morgan, of Borger, was arrested in Childress and charged with the murder of her husband, whose badly decomposed body was found pushed into a culvert near Childress last January, she made a statement to officers implicating one of the three men arrested near Winters recently.  
The men are now being held in two Texas jails on charges preferred against them in this state and in Oklahoma.  
Two of the men are held at Wellington, where they face charges of robbing the Dodsonville, Collingsworth county, bank. The third man is being held at Sweetwater.  
They are also wanted in Harmon county, Oklahoma, and at Sweetwater for robbing a filling station.  
The trio were arrested near Winters, and a woman was later arrested at Miles, about two weeks ago, as they were endeavoring to escape by officers who had been informed they would probably pass through this county. The car in which the men were riding collided with a truck as it was about to outdistance the officers.  
A few hours later officers from Oklahoma and two Texas cities were en route to Ballinger to get the prisoners.

### TWO KILLED IN CAVE-IN

MT. PLEASANT, Tex., Sept. 10.—Sam Butterfield and his 16-year-old son, Harvey, were fatally crushed by a cave-in Friday while digging in a coal mine near Winfield, in Titus county.

Lou Ladd, Fort Worth; C. E. Sillix, of this city, and others interested in the Sillix et al McMillan No. 1, will drill two more wildcat wells in Rinnels county, it was announced Saturday by Mr. Sillix, who is making efforts to secure two drilling blocks in two different sections of the county.  
"We are making plans to drill two more wildcat wells," Mr. Sillix asserted, "but at present we are not able to give the location of these tests. For the present we will not drill any offsets on our blocks of 3,100 acres at the McMillan well."

Mr. Ladd is now in Denver, Colo., en route to Ballinger, and will probably arrive here next week.  
B. C. Rhome, Jr., Ben Simon and George Hill, of Fort Worth, also interested in the well, were here this week, returning to Fort Worth Friday.

Well Continues Flow  
Sillix et al McMillan No. 1 is being cleaned out as fast as possible and Friday night the well made a head of some 40 minutes duration, flowing between 40 and 60 barrels of oil.

The hole is being cleaned out rapidly and when the bottom is reached the liner will be set and the well allowed to flow a natural stream for a few days with the hope that it will blow in stronger.  
"When we get ready to deepen we will do it very carefully," Mr. Sillix declared, "because it will not be hard to lose the well and a lost producer in a new field gives the territory a black eye."  
It is believed that as soon as the mud is removed from the hole the well will flow a steady stream of oil.

In Strawn Formation  
Scouts and geologists from the larger companies who have checked the log of the well and who have watched it very closely during the past two weeks believe the bottom of the hole is in the Strawn series of formations, and if such is the case, the larger companies will not hesitate in coming full force into Rinnels county.  
It was believed for a time that the well was in the Canyon series, and the big companies, it is understood, and all operators with any knowledge of oil and the earth's formations, do not play the Canyon series very strong.

It is said that the hole has passed through the Canyon series and is now in a fine Strawn sand at 2,545 feet.

Deals Made Slowly  
Deals are being made every day but the buyers and sellers are taking their time and not rushing the matter as the well has not yet been given a fair test. It is understood that other drilling blocks are being obtained by several lease buyers for operators and that within the next two weeks, these drilling contracts and locations will be made.  
To date about ten contracts have been signed and work will be started within the next few weeks on every hole contracted.

Pecos Pool Extended  
The Pecos shallow pool in Crockett county was extended Saturday morning when the Gulf Production Co.'s No. 1 George Thompson, 150 feet from the south and west lines of section No. 71, T. & G. N. R. R. Co. survey, flowed a head of 30 barrels of oil in 15 minutes.  
This well extends the shallow pool a considerable distance. It is only 400 feet northeast of the Allsman & Bell river bed producer.

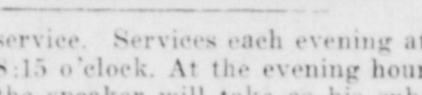

"The well has the earmarks of a good producer," Mr. Nichols declared, "and when the drillers have completed cleaning the hole I believe it will make a good, steady flow."

Mr. Nichols was the man who gave impetus to the oil industry here last year when he blocked acreage for the Red Bank Fowler

No. 1, six miles south of Ballinger. He has been connected with several other drilling blocks in this county.

"I believe the Johnson et al Simms No. 1 will be a well after the drillers have recovered the tools and drill deeper," Mr. Nichols said. "The Simms well is checking very favorably with the Sillix well and I believe that a good find will be struck in this hole."

Mr. Nichols is very optimistic over the prospects for a good pool in this county and he has been working hard to help develop a field somewhere within the bounds of Runnels county since he first located in this section.
