HATCHEL WINS COMMUNITY AWARD

Decorated Car Parade Draws Much Attention

LEADERS OF REVOLT IN MEXICO ARE EXECUTED

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO, D. F., Oct. 5.—Further executions were announced today in the federal government's campaign to stamp out the military revolt following hard upon the news of the execution of General Serrano, presidential candidate, and thirteen of his followers, declares a statement issued from the presidential palace, which tells of three more captures and punishments in widely separated regions.

General Alvarez, chief of the army staff, claims that only two rebel military groups remain under arms in the entire republic and that they are small in numbers. With 5,000 federal "patriots" pursuing them an early surrender by the insurrectionists is expected by the government.

There are two groups of insurrectionists in the state of Vera Cruz, one of perhaps 800 men led by General Gomez, and the other commanded by General Almada, chief of the city of Mexico garrison, who led the troops which left the capital Sunday night.

MEXICO, D. F., Oct. 5.—The army revolt has been crushed, President Calles' office announced today, stating that 4,500 federal troops were in close pursuit of General Gomez, presidential candidate, and his supporters.

He was the third man to be arrested at Marlin and brought here for investigation in connection with the robberies of banks at Plano and Pampa and the attempted robbery of the Stockyards National Bank here.

A number of persons who witnessed the robberies are here to attempt to identify the suspects.

Yanks Take First Game On 2 Errors

FORBES FIELD, Pittsburgh, Oct. 5.—The New York Yankees defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates 5 to 4 today in the opening game of the World's Series.

A record breaking crowd of 45,000 people looked on as the National League champions went down in defeat.

Leading through a bad third inning, the winners scored three runs on one hit, two errors and two bases on balls.

FORBES FIELD, Pittsburgh, Oct. 5.—With a record Pittsburgh crowd of nearly 45,000 persons looking on the 1927 World's Series started today with the New York Yankees opposing the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The big stands were jammed to their utmost capacity and there were thousands of disappointed fans on the outside listening to cheers of the more fortunate.

Both managers, Miller Huggins of the Americans, and Donnie Bush of the Nationals, repeated their faith in their pennant winning players, each professing to be confident of an eventual victory.

Pittsburgh sent Ray Kremer, star right hander, in the box, while Earl Smith was doing the catching.

New York depended upon Waite Hoyt, also a right hander, to do its pitching, with Collins on the receiving end.

Each team scored once in the first inning.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 5.—One of the fairest October days with moderately cool temperature and bright sunshine greeted the thousands of baseball fans gathered here today for the first game of the World's Series.

The band was followed by closed cars carrying officials of the fair association, county officials, city officials, Fire Chief L. Cohen in new coupe, with fire trucks.

The school classes' cars came next in line. The Freshman car was piloted by Davis Sims with Misses Loucille Sledge, Lillian McMillan and Gladys Fulcher as passengers. This car was decorated with white and pink crepe paper with a bow across the top, entwined with running rose leaves and vines.

The Sophomore car was second. Raymond McShan was the pilot, with Drew Dixon, Misses Claudia Smith, Opal McWilliams, Evelyn Brewer and Doty Sims as passengers. This car was also decorated with crepe paper, the colors of pink and lavender being employed.

The Junior car, decorated with white and purple crepe paper, came third. This float was in the form of a cab with a small top spreading over the passengers on the rear seat. The top had a purple lining with a white covering, making the motorcar very attractive. Willie Cervenk was the pilot, with Misses Nanell Jones, Imogene Clark and Martha Kelly Bowden as passengers.

The Senior car was given third prize. It portrayed a rather brilliant idea with the Eskimo motif. Joe Beck was the pilot, with Miss Katrina Dooze as a passenger. Little Miss Helen Thomson, Scott Strain and Arthur Dooze, Jr., were pictured as young Eskimos.

Another school car in the parade which attracted notice showed a scene with boys of the high school manual training department at their duties. The boys on this truck were actually at work. They were: J. M. Moore, Jr., Ellis McMillan and Vernon Dankworth.

The award for the most comical car went to a group of ladies, occupying an old decrepit motor car with college pennants, signs of all descriptions and inscriptions over the body. They brought back memories of college girls of fifteen or twenty years ago.

A group of high school girls also made a good showing with a similar vehicle and arrangement, drawing a number of laughs.

The Chevrolet motor truck brigade followed the copical cars with some twenty models being exhibited. The caravan will remain in the city throughout the





FAIR NOTES

The judges are busy in all departments today and announcements will be made Thursday and Friday who the winners of the various entries are.

E. A. Jeanes, Jr., superintendent of the poultry department of the fair, says he has the best bunch of turkeys on display this year that he ever saw. These fine birds come from all parts of the county and are in excellent condition. The turkey entries are larger than in the 1926 fair.

Four schools, Ballinger, Winters, Bethel and Spring Hill have displays at the fair this year, showing specimens of work during the past year and this term. These displays show what the pupils are doing both in the city and in the rural schools.

Coleman county has a fine agricultural display in the agricultural building. A sign says, "Not competing, but just co-operating." That expresses a fine West Texas spirit.

The school children's parade Friday afternoon will be formed on Eighth Street between the American Legion building and the city school buildings on the hill. The line of march will be announced later.

The Baby Show, held annually in connection with the fair, will take place Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the women's building at Fair Park. All babies up to two years of age are eligible for this event.

Immediately following the Grandi Bros. performance Thursday night, there will be an illuminated balloon ascension with a fireworks display 6,900 feet in the air. There will also be an illuminated parachute drop from that height.

A special parade, featuring Chevrolet trucks in all shapes and forms, will be held this afternoon at 5:30 o'clock through the business district of Ballinger. This parade will be led by the Ballinger Booster Band, the official musical organization of the

fair association.

The livestock department is the best ever, officials declared Wednesday morning. It has been improved in every way, 100 per cent over all previous displays in the fair.

Be sure and see the football games. Thursday afternoon the Ballinger Bears play the San Angelo Bobcats, while on Friday afternoon the Winters Blizzards play the Eden Indians.

The Bill H. Hames' midway shows attracted a considerable portion of the crowd Tuesday night, and as the week goes by larger crowds will attend the carnival attractions.

San Angelo's special train, Abilene's caravan and Coleman boosters will be here Thursday afternoon. Ballinger citizens should turn out and help show the visitors a good time.

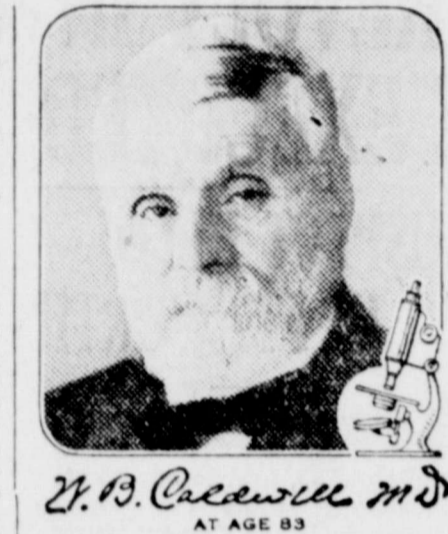

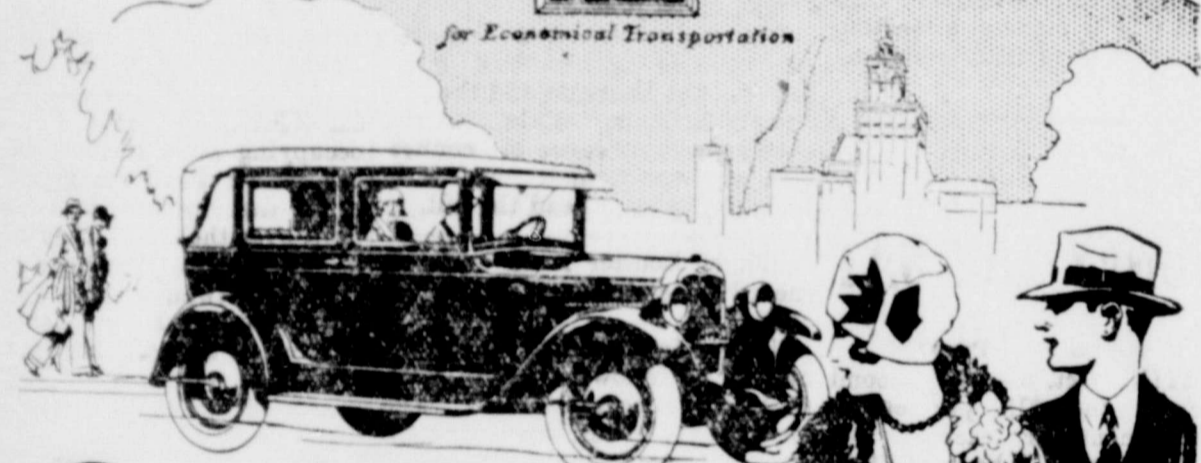

Merchants Display at Fair is the Best Ever

Lack of space in the Merchants Exposition building was all that kept the number of exhibitors from being increased this year over the past year in the Runnels County Fair. Every booth and space in the building is occupied by some local firm and had there been more room there would have been a larger number of displays in this department.

About twenty-five firms are represented in the exhibition, one of the largest number ever to display wares and service in this building. Each booth is very attractive and much attention was given to arrangement.

This building was crowded throughout Tuesday afternoon and night and again Wednesday there were large crowds visiting this department.

Higginbotham Bros. & Co., Ballinger and Winters, have a fine dining room suite on display. It has been attractively and artistically arranged.

Radios are being shown by the Ballinger Electric Co. and a large crowd is to be seen at this booth at any time during the day. A Freshman radio set will be given away by this firm on the final night of the fair, and this contest is drawing much interest.

The Ivory, general variety store, is displaying merchandise that particularly interests the children. A nice group of toys is being shown which draws the kiddies like a magnet.

G. A. Ladwig, general merchandise, has two booths. One presents ladies' ready-to-wear and the second has a very nice arrangement of men's clothing.

The Farmers & Merchants State Bank has a display that excites considerable speculation. It is a magic floating sphere that rotates above a small opening. How the ball is kept in the air is a mystery to all who see it.

McCarver & Lynn, insurance, abstracts, loans and real estate, have a novel exhibit, showing the location of the prospects here last year in the oil industry, the Fowler and Bruce tests; and this year's success, Sillix-McMillan No. 1. The background gives the scene a nighttime effect with the ground covered with artificial snow.
