Miles, Hatchel, Runnels Win in School Parade

Miles, Hatchel and Runnels schools were the winners in the school children's parade here last Friday afternoon, it was announced Saturday by the judges, after all the records had been checked. These schools had the largest percentage of enrollment of their respective classes in the parade.

In the independent schools class Miles was first, Rowena was second; class A rural, Hatchel, first; Crews, second; class B rural, Runnels, first; and Lone Star, second.

The winning schools were awarded loving cups and basketballs by the West Texas Utilities Company. The winners of first places were given loving cups, while those in second position were given basketballs.

This parade was declared to have been the best of the 1927 Runnels County Fair.

Ballinger had practically 95 per cent of its pupils in the parade but did not compete for the trophies.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK IN TEXAS

This is Fire Prevention Week in Texas and the Texas Inspection Bureau has asked that all methods be used to make this a no-fire week and to continue with the practice throughout the remaining 51 weeks of the year.

Chief Louis Cohen of the Ballinger volunteer department, declares that Ballinger has a good record now and with additional practice on methods of preventing fire, that the record will be still better.

Chief Cohen handed The Ledger a paper which comments on Fire Prevention Week, as follows: "Stop fires before they start. Fires can be prevented—the week directs attention to this. It is time to start stopping fires—to begin a campaign lasting 52 weeks in the year.

"We are told that a cow in Mrs. O'Leary's barn kicked a lantern and started the great Chicago conflagration in 1871. The 56th anniversary of this Fire Prevention Week in 1927. Mrs. O'Leary's cow is symbolic of our everyday carelessness which is costing annually thousands of lives and hundreds of millions of dollars. Most fires are preventable—we need only to apply plain, common sense. There is no excuse for fire starting, or once started, spreading beyond the place of origin.

"But why should I be concerned about fire, perhaps you say, 'my house and property are insured.' Yes, the dry goods merchant, the grocer, the butcher and the baker also carry insurance on their property—on their stores and stocks of goods. Everything that we buy is insured in every step of its route from producer to consumer. In the price of a suit of clothes, a package of coffee, a pound of meat or a loaf of bread is concealed a tax which is our share of what is paid to replace what fire destroys. The insurance company, taking the premium money it collects, distributes it to those who lose by fire. Last year the per capita fire tax imposed by America's huge fire waste was \$3, and when we add to this the indirect loss, such as interruption of business, overhead cost of insurance and upkeep expenses on fire protection facilities, the individual burden becomes at least twice the above figure."

FRENCH FLYERS OFF FOR BRAZIL

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Oct. 10.—Dieudonne Coste and Lieut. Le Brix, French aviators, took off from here this morning on a flight to Brazil. They plan to make their first stop at St. Louis, Senegal, Africa, 2,700 miles away.

Announcement was made Monday by L. P. Bottenfield, lately of Tampa, Fla., that Ballinger is to have a new sub-division, located in the northern part of the city and containing approximately 143 acres, purchased from J. H. Wilke of this city.

This property is situated between Fifth Street and Elm Creek and runs from the road leading to the upper dam down the creek to the Giesecke property.

Mr. Bottenfield and associate, F. W. Keller, also from Florida and from Georgia, have been here for the past few weeks preparing plans for the sub-division and work began Monday morning on staking off the lots and laying out the circular drives. Other work will proceed as rapidly as possible on the new addition.

Bottenfield and Keller have had considerable experience in selling property and real estate in Georgia and Florida, but have been in West Texas only a short time. Mr. Bottenfield said he came to this section with plans to promote a new sub-division in San Angelo but that about the time he arrived in this vicinity the Sillix et al McMillan No. 1 came in and that he came to Ballinger to view prospects in this city. He decided that Ballinger was in a better position for a new sub-division than San Angelo and that the property he and his associates have obtained is an ideal location for a residential district. The tract is located on some of the highest ground in the city, is near the business district, schools and churches.

It is planned to make a scenic drive from the south side of the district along the creek bank to the north line. A pecan grove, known as Slicky's, will be made into a very beautiful park with all modern park equipment.

At present Mr. Bottenfield and Mr. Keller are organizing the Ballinger Trust Company, which organization will handle all financial transactions relating to the sub-division.

All streets in the new addition will be gravelled with material from their own holdings on the creek, Mr. Bottenfield said. Sale of the lots will be restricted, the owners announce, as to the cost of the residences to be erected. It was not mentioned when the first sale would be held for this sub-division but it was intimated that it would begin shortly after the completion of the streets. Staking of lots and laying off of the drives was to have been started Monday morning if the weather permitted.

This is the second sub-division to be announced for this city, another organization having announced plans for a residential district last week.
