Three Die When Train Hits Bus

Three of the injured died soon after the crash.

THYSSEN FINDS AMERICA HAS NO TIME FOR FUN

DENVER, Oct. 29.—"America is a most staggering country from whatever angle we view it," declared August Thyssen, member of the world-famous house of Thyssen, and for many years associated with the house of Krupp of Germany.

Thyssen, indirect contact with the business domain of Germany expressed his enthusiastic admiration for the United States. Efficiency of workmen, improved mechanical ability, mammoth production from natural resources were all mentioned in an informal discussion here recently.

"We turn out 2,000 tons and we think it is big but your American tonnage makes us a joke," he said in referring to the steel industry. "Our steel industry is based on a wage average of \$2 a day, yours on a wage average of \$6 per day."

Rushing Madly

While very much impressed with the material things of American life, Thyssen says Europeans cannot understand the psychology of the American people. He cannot fathom why business and work are made the paramount issues of life. He says Americans rush madly from labor to refreshment and then back to labor again.

"You seem to have no leisure for the finer things of life—art, literature, drama, social intercourse and companionship—as we understand companionship."

"Your are over-governed with too many restrictive regulations and prohibitions. In some places even a cigarette is forbidden. A harmless drink is against your constitution. These things amaze and puzzle us."

German industry is recuperating rapidly since the war, according to Thyssen, thanks to American capital. All western European trades are becoming harmonious and making great progress in reconstruction.

Russia Hopeless

"The one exception is Russia, and it is hopeless as long as the Soviets have rule," said Thyssen. "We cannot expect much from the Soviet, altho Russia is potentially as great as America, probably with greater and more varied natural resources. The Russian situation is the one blight in Europe today."

Thyssen with Count Edward Oppersdorf of Berlin and Paris, and Francesco Ruspoli of Rome, a member of Italian nobility, who are his companions on a tour of the United States, planned to go from here to the western coast and thence back to New York via the southern route.

MERKEL LOSES TO BEARCATS

After playing ragged football for two periods, the Ballinger high school Bearcats got mad in the third and fourth quarters to score six touchdowns and to win from the Merkel team, 44 to 0. The Bearcats scored one counter in the first quarter, none in the second, and after the half intermission became riled and started playing real football.

The first Bearcat touchdown came after Merkel had endeavored to punt from its 14-yard line. The Merkel kicker fumbled the ball and a Bearcat covered it there. Cervenka, Bearcat half, took it over, and Middleton kicked the extra point from placement. The score at the end of the first quarter and the first half was Ballinger 7, Merkel 0.

Ballinger came near scoring another in the latter part of the second quarter when the line broke through and blocked the Merkel kicker's punt. It rolled across the goal line and a Ballinger player covered it, but the Ballinger line was offside.

In the opening of the second half Merkel kicked to Ballinger. The Bearcats went right down the field without losing the ball, making about four first downs and Cervenka took the pigskin over. Middleton failed to kick the extra point. The score was 13 to 0.

James Parrish, half, made the next touchdown, after the locals had bucked the line steadily for several downs. Arthur dropped-kicked the extra point to make the score 20 to 0.

In the fourth quarter James Parrish passed to Robison, Bearcat end, 45 yards, Robison trotted 5 yards and crossed the goal line. Arthur missed the try for the extra point. Score 26 to 0.

In the kick-off Daugherty came near getting loose for a touchdown and had he gone two steps farther he might have been loose with all the Merkel team behind him. Daugherty, a line-man, had returned the kick about 25 yards.

Right along here, Cervenka, Parrish, Arthur and Beck were making good gains with Cervenka and Arthur making runs for 30 and 35 yards around the ends and thru the line. Cervenka made his third touchdown, running about 20 yards. Arthur missed the try for point. Score 32 to 0.

Cervenka then made his fourth touchdown, after the Bearcats had received. Middleton missed this try. Score 38 to 0.

The last touchdown came in the closing minutes of play when Arthur broke around his left end for 70 yards and a touchdown. The interference was good and the Bearcat back traversed the field very nicely.

But while Ballinger was doing all this scoring the Merkel team had some good defensive players who were making the Bearcat backs work hard to get anywhere. They were Proctor, left end; McClain, full; Miller, right tackle; and Swofford, right guard. These boys played excellent defensive football and in the last half scored three first

downs in rapid time before the final whistle blew. The team had previously scored three first downs in the first quarter.

Coach Camp's boys did not seem to be quite as fast or as heavy as the Bearcats and Coach Wright has been giving the squad some good instructions before the game because they lost to the Brownwood Lions last week, a team that fans say could not have downed Merkel for a victory.

The Ballinger line was working good and holes were opened almost every time one was asked for. Smith, Reese, Jones Parrish, Echols, Daugherty, Middleton, and Robison all showed up well, while Lusk, as a substitute, played good football. Coker, who started at full, played good ball during the time he was in the game.

MUCH CEMENT PRODUCED IN FIVE TEXAS PLANTS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 28.—Six cement plants located in San Antonio, El Paso, Dallas, Houston and Ft. Worth produced 5,007,374 barrels during 1926 and sold 5,042,359 barrels of the product, thus somewhat reducing the stock carried over from the previous year.

These figures were compiled by the Bureau of Economics and Geology at the University of Texas in co-operation with the United States Bureau of Mines. The average per barrel sale value was \$1.89. Both production and sales increased materially last year over 1925.
